### BELLEVUE AND ALLIED HOSPITALS.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the office of Mr. Sachs, 60 Wall st., on Wednesday, September 7, 1910, at 2 o'clock. Present—Mr. Paulding, the Acting President, in the chair, and Messrs. Robbins, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Dr. Brannan and Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe and Drummond,

The minutes of the meeting of July 29, a copy of which had been sent to each member, were held as read and approved.

Bills amounting to \$37,355.10 were presented for approval, and it was

Resolved. That they, having been duly examined by the Finance Committee, be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

In order that the payroll for August could be passed, it was necessary to ask for the amendment of the salary schedules of the Budget for 1910. The amendment involved no increases of salary and required no additional funds. It chiefly related to the nursing service. Your approval is asked for.



Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
