Honorable President, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Dear Sir-We are advised that in the past efforts have been made by the Park Commissioner of the Borough of The Bronx and by the Health Department of The City of New York to obtain from the Board of Aldermen an appropriation to drain the salt marsh meadows forming part of Pelham Bay Park in the Borough of The Bronx, which meadows lie southwest of the village of North Pelham. We are not advised whether the matter is before the Board of Aldermen, but presume that it will come before the Board again, and we desire to complain to you and through you to the Board of Aldermen of the nuisance created by the presence of this undrained meadow land. It constitutes the principal breeding place for the mosquitoes that infest North Pelham and adjacent territory in swarms and make it impossible for us to make substantial headway against the mosquito in our territory. Thus the health and comfort of the residents of North Pelham is to a very great extent dependent upon the action of your Board in this matter, and we feel that The City of New York ought not to maintain such a nuisance upon their property as would not be tolerated upon the land of a private owner.

We therefore, on the part of the residents of North Pelham, earnestly request

Mr. A. H. SPENCER, Chairman of the Parks Advisory Committee:

Dear Mr. Spencer-In behalf of the Subcommittee on Landscape Development, we beg to report the fact that throughout the twenty-eight years that Van Cortlandt Park -a tract embracing 1,400 acres-has been in the possession of The City of New York, no general plan for the development of that area ever has been prepared. Owing to circumstances beyond the control of the Park Department of the Borough of The Bronx-partly due to important new operations along the line of the City Aqueduct, but chiefly due to lack of available funds-no planting operations on any extensive scale, other than the beautiful Dutch Garden near the Van Cortlandt Mansion, have yet been undertaken in that park. To a very great extent—excepting for the making of roads, the improvement of the golf links, parade ground, and the formal garden referred to above—Van Cortlandt Park is practically in the same condition to-day as when it was acquired by the City in 1884, so far as planting is concerned.

To all persons interested in the landscape development of public parks, it is clearly evident that some very extensive planting operations are necessary in Van Cortlandt Park, and that the beginning of those operations should no longer be delayed. It is safe to say that there is no park in The City of New York in which so great an amount of border plantations and arboreal screens are called for as in Van Cortlandt. This condition is rendered necessary by the unplanted western frontage extending along Broadway, the unscreened condition of a large portion of the Putnam Railway lines, and also the planting that will be necessary in the near future along the aqueduct

The proposition that the time has come for the preparation of an aqueduct development plan, embracing all necessary planting operations for Van Cortlandt, is one which is hardly open to argument. In view of the slow growth of trees, it is also very evident that the sooner planting operations are begun, the sonner will satisfactory results be attained. In all probability, few of the citizens of New York are aware of the splendid opportunities that exist in Van Cortlandt Park awaiting development. This subcommittee strongly recommends that this work should immediately be undertaken by the Park Department of the Borough of The Bronx, and supported, from year to year, by adequate appropriations.

We respectfully point out the fact that the greatest urgency exists for the planting of arboreal screens along 15,150 linear feet of the frontage of the park on the main line of the Putnam Railway, and the Yonkers Branch. The existing conditions are as

Along the eastern side of the main line, for practically the entire course of the railway, from the southern boundary of the park to the northern boundary no arboreal screen of any extent worth mentioning now exists. The total length of screen planting required on the eastern side of the main line is 8,700 feet.

On the western side, no arboreal screen exists from the southern boundary until Mosholu road is reached, on the Yonkers Branch. This distance measures on the

map 6,450 linear feet.

Leaving entirely out of the question for the present the necessity or lack of necessity for border plantation screens along the foot of the high hill situated between the two branches of the Putnam road, we have a total of more than two and fourfifths miles of exposed railway, which is a very great disfigurement to the park, and which should be heavily planted at once with quick-growing deciduous trees next to the track, banked in front with a judicious planting of coniferous trees and shrubs.

On the latest occasion, when the Chairman of this Committee made a count of the trains passing through Van Cortlandt Park, he found that 72 trains daily traverse that preserve. There is no reason why the railroad should not be so completely screened that its existence should be known only by sound and the presence of smoke

In order to bring the necessities of Van Cortlandt Park before the Mayor, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, we have the honor to submit herewith a preamble and two resolutions for the consideration of the General Parks Advisory Committee, and in the hope that they will be adopted and by you transmitted to the Government of The City of New York. Resolutions Regarding the Development and Planting of Van Cortlandt Park. Submitted by the Sub-Committee on Landscape Development of the Parks Advisory Committee, March 21, 1912.

Whereas, It appears that up to this time there never has existed a general plan for the landscape development and planting of Van Cortlandt Park, the second largest park in the Borough of The Bronx and now worth several millions of dollars;

Whereas. No planting ever has been done to screen from view the two railway

lines running through that park; be it now

Resolved, That the Parks Advisory Committee hereby recommends that the City Landscape Architect be requested by the Board of Parks to prepare a general plan for the landscape development and planting of Van Cortlandt Park, which shall include adequate plantation screens of deciduous and coniferous trees to hide all the exposed portions of the Putnam Railway within the park; and be it further

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen be requested to provide as soon as possible a special initial improvement fund of \$20,000, of which \$3,000, or as much thereof as may be necessary, shall be used in defraying the cost of the preparation of a general plan of development, the remainder of the fund be made available for the planting of screen plantations along the lines of the Putnam Railway within Van Cortlandt Park.

Sir-Enclosed herewith is a copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Health May 7, 1912, requesting the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds under the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, in the sum of \$2,000, the proceeds whereof to be used by the Department of Health to reimburse the Department of Docks and Ferries for labor and materials the said Department of Docks and Ferries is willing to furnish in making temporary repairs to the offal dock at the foot of West 39th street, Borough of Manhattan, which is submitted for consideration.

The contractor for the removal of nightsoil, offal and dead animals from The City of New York, has notified this Department on several occasions that the dock referred to in the above-mentioned resolution is in a dangerous condition and that unless it is repaired without delay, it will be almost impossible for the contractor to perform the work of collecting and removing dead animals during the summer months.

The Commissioner of Docks and Ferries has lately caused a careful examination of the dock to be made and he finds that it will necessitate an expenditure of from \$7,500 to \$8,000 to place the area in absolutely first-class condition.

It is of course a very difficult matter to make an accurate estimate as to the cost of repairs in a case of this character for the reason that the extent of rot and other defects can only be ascertained absolutely by uncovering the pier. Provisions for an appropriation of from \$7,500 to \$8,000 will be embodied in the estimates of the Department for the Budget for the year 1913.

In the meantime, temporary repairs can be made at an expense estimated at \$1,000 for labor and \$1,000 for material, a total of \$2,000, and this temporary work will be undertaken by the Department of Docks and Ferries provided the necessary appropriation is made. A bill for the actual amount of the temporary repairs will be sub-

Gentlemen—On December 18, 1911, the Commissioner of Water Supply. Gas and Electricity requested an authorization of corporate stock in the sum of \$200,000, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, to provide for remodelling and repairing the old Croton Aqueduct. In connection therewith we report as follows:

An appropriation for repairs to the old Croton Aqueduct was requested in the Departmental Estimate for 1912, but was not approved by the Budget Committee for the reason that the proposed work was considered to be a permanent betterment and properly chargeable to corporate stock. The Committee therefore suggested an application for short term bonds.

The Commissioner states the following:

This work can best be done in the early spring, as at that season the consumption is usually at a minimum and there would be less interference with the supply. At present the condition of the old Aqueduct is such that not more than one-half its normal capacity is available, and it would be decidedly unsafe to attempt, in its present condition, to increase the quantity of water it now carries. The request is based on the following estimate:

For rebuilding about 5,700 feet of the Aqueduct by contract...... \$145,000 00 For repairing approximately 27,000 feet: For material ......\$20,000 00

55,000 00

Total......\$200,000 00

The Departmental Engineers have submitted detailed estimates covering the proposed improvement. They have also submitted the following memorandum:

The old Croton Aqueduct is mainly of cut-and-cover type; that is to say, excavation is made through the ground at approximately the elevation of the water level in the aqueduct and the aqueduct constructed with normally 4 feet of earth cover for protection. Where the line of the aqueduct crosses a valley, the usual type of construction adopted is dry rubble walls for the support of the sides of the aqueduct with loose rock fill between. During the 70 years that have elapsed since the aqueduct was constructed several of the embankment sections have settled and weakened the aqueduct to such an extent that it cannot now carry more than about 40 million gallons daily, whereas the normal capacity is over 80 million gallons daily.

It is proposed to reconstruct these sections by taking off the crown of the Aqueduct, rebuilding and reinforcing. In other sections where there are only a few cracks in the invert or bottom of the Aqueduct, it is proposed to point up or plaster the same.

The detailed estimate for the part of the work to be done by contract shows a total of \$143,839.50. An allowance of \$144,000 for this item would therefore appear to be ample. The estimate for plant, tools, materials and supplies calls for \$19,400. The schedule of wages, as now revised, shows a total of \$34,237. The three amounts which are stated to be ample would give a total of \$197,637. The employees requested should be added to the present schedule for Personal Service, Water Supply, Collection and Storage, Wages, Temporary Employees, Corporate Stock Force, making the total of the schedule \$34,267.

In view of the foregoing compliance with the Commissioner's request would

appear to be proper.

We therefore recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions approving the request to the extent of \$197,637, and making the necessary schedule modification.

Whereas, It is possible to relocate said kitchen and shop in other parts of said school building, whereby it will be rendered practicable and possible for the students to properly pursue their prescribed course of study; there-

"Resolved, That the Board of Education, through its appropriate committee, be and it is hereby requested to take the necessary steps and do all things proper to remedy said conditions now existing in said Public School No. 44 in the Borough of Brooklyn, to the end that said school may be provided with a more spacious kitchen and a more spacious shop.

In connection with the foregoing a report was submitted by Associate City Superintendent Meleney, who is assigned to the division in which Public School 44

is located, as follows:

"The communication calling the attention of the Board of Education to the matter of better facilities for shopwork and cooking in Public School 44, Brooklyn, has been under consideration by District Superintendent Griffin and myself, to ascertain whether a recommendation should be made that an addition to the building be erected in which a larger shop and kitchen could be provided.

'We are agreed that while the facilities are not as ample as provided in the new buildings, they are equal to and in some respects more commodious than have been provided in other schools in the City. The shopwork for boys and the cooking for girls have been conducted with excellent results and in a satisfactory manner. At present it would be impossible to provide any additional room or to enlarge the present rooms in that building.

"It does not seem advisable to recommend an addition to Public School 44 at the present time, for the reason that the school is located in a district where there is no congestion, and it is thought that the Board of Education would not be justified in asking for additional facilities for that school when so many other parts of the City need better accommodations.'

Your Committee concurs in the views set forth in the above-quoted report, and submits the following resolution for adoption:

Gentlemen-I respectfully request that you recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment an authorization of special revenue bonds to the amount of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds whereof to be used for the purpose of making necessary repairs to the American Museum of Natural History under the juris-

diction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

In the Corporate Stock Budget for the year 1911 an appropriation of \$75,000 was included in the account entitled C. D. P.—3C, Equipment and Construction of Permanent nent Improvements. It was intended to charge the necessary repairs to this account, in fact, the allowance of \$75,000 made included an estimated amount for same. An examination of the class of work to be done, however, discloses the fact that no part of same should be charged to the corporate stock account for the reason that they are not permanent improvements.

A conference was held with the Director of the Museum, terminating in this request for an issue of special revenue bonds, with the understanding that \$10,000 of the corporate stock account would be rescinded and returned to the general fund.

I transmit herewith a copy of a communication received from Henry Fairfield Osborn, President of the Museum, which includes a list of the necessary repairs to be made, and the estimated cost of each.

In view of the fact that the request means only a change from corporate stock to revenue bonds entailing no additional cost to the City, I request that you give the matter your immediate consideration so that the work may be started at the earliest possible moment. Respectfully,

The first section of the building to be constructed, namely, the north wing, was completed in 1877, more than thirty years ago, and many parts of this section are in need of repair or renewal.

History, May 13, 1912. 1. Extracts from a letter dated January 18, 1909, from Honorable Joseph H. Choate to President Osborn:

In 1897 the question was raised as to whether men employed by the Zoological Society, which did not differ in this respect in its relations to the City from the Museum, were subject to the Civil Service Rules, and in answering the same question, under date of February 16, 1897, Judge Francis M. Scott, who was then Counsel to the Corporation, advised the Comptroller that the employees of the Museum were not subject to the Civil Service Rules, and I have been favored by the Comptroller with a copy of that opinion:

"Hon. ASHBEL P. FITCH, Comptroller: "Sir-I have your letter of February 15 inquiring whether in my opinion the employees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, under the provisions of chapter 139, Laws of 1876, are appointed and controlled by the Trustees of the respective museums, under their contracts with the Department of Public Parks, are within the requirements of article 5, section 9 of the Revised Constitution of the State of New York, requiring classification by the Civil Service Board.

"Both of the institutions named by you are incorporated bodies controlled by Boards of Trustees and are in no sense public institutions, nor are their employees in the public service. Their only relation with the public at all is that the City makes contributions to their support, as it does to many other institutions.

"In my opinion, therefore, the employees of those museums are not within the purview of article 5 of section 9 of the Constitution referred to by you. "Yours very truly, FRANCIS M. SCOTT, Counsel to the Corporation."

Again, in 1905, the question came up in another form in the case where the New York Zoological Society, which received annual sums for maintenance under a similar act, and Mr. G. L. Sterling, then Acting Corporation Counsel, gave an opinion to the Comptroller, the Hon. Edward M. Grout, in which he quoted with approval the opinion of Judge Scott of 1897, and added:

"This opinion has been followed, I think, in every other case since, and I see no reason to question its correctness or application to the New York Zoological

In view of the tenor of the contracts and of the long established and settled practice under them, and of the relations established between the Museum and the City by the various enactments referred to, and considering these successive opinions of the Corporation Counsels from time to time, I think that any claim now made that the employees of the Museum are public officials, subject to be interfered with in any manner by the City, or that the purchases of supplies made by them are subject to the peculiar laws regulating purchases by the Departments of the City, cannot be seriously pressed.

6. Letter dated April 11, 1911, from the Mayor, through his Secretary, to President Osborn:

Requests list of employees to be published in the semi-annual Civil List. 7. Letter dated April 12, 1911, from President Osborn to Mr. Adamson, Secretary to the Mayor:

Replies to the Mayor's request for list by citing section 613 of the New York Charter relative to the duties of Commissioners for maintaining the Museum; the contract between the Trustees of the Museum and The City of New York relative to the control of employees, and from a letter dated January 10, 1911, from David Ferguson, Supervisor of the City Record, to Mr. de Forest, Secretary of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, stating that the Corporation Counsel advises that it is not necessary for the Museum to furnish such a list. 8. Letter dated April 25, 1911, from President Osborn to Mayor Gaynor:

Refers to previous requests for a list of the employees; rehearses the terms of the contract between the Museum and the City; refers to the opinions of Corporation Counsel and gives the position of the Executive Committee of the Museum in this matter.

9. Circular dated June 24, 1911, from David Ferguson, Supervisor of the City Record:

Request for list of officers and employees. 10. Letter dated June 27, 1911, from Director Lucas to Supervisor of the City Record:

Acknowledges receipt of circular and states that it has been transmitted to President Osborn.

Request from Mr. David Ferguson,, Supervisor of the City Record, for list of employees.

12. Letter dated December 28, 1911, from Director Lucas to the Supervisor of the City Record: Calls attention to President Osborn's letter to Mayor Gaynor and to the

opinions of Corporation Counsel. 13. Letter dated April 22, 1912, from Commissioner Stover to President Osborn:

In response to a request from Honorable Henry H. Curran, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, requests a list of the employees for publication in the Civil List.

14. Letter dated April 24, 1912, from President Osborn to Commissioner Stover: States the position of the Trustees and encloses extracts of laws pertaining to the relation of the Museum employees to the City.

15. On Thursday, May 9, President Osborn had a personal interview with the Honorable Henry H. Curran, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, in which the history of the contract and charter and successive opinions of Corporation Counsels were cited, together with reasons which made it inexpedient to publish the names and addresses of employees of the Museum in the CITY RECORD. The Chairman of the Finance Committee expressed himself as satisfied that these reasons were valid and stated that he would so present the matter to the Finance Committee.

Legal Opinions Affecting the Relation of Employees of the Museum to the City. On February 16, 1897, in a communication to the Comptroller, Judge Francis M. Scott, Corporation Counsel, advised that the employees of the Museum were not subject to the Civil Service Rules.

In 1902 Honorable George L. Rives, Corporation Counsel, gave it as his opinion that "the maintenance of the buildings and institutions \* \* \* shall be subject to their respective acts of incorporation."

In 1905, in connection with the employees of the New York Zoological Society, Honorable G. L. Sterling, then Acting Corporation Counsel, in a communication to Comptroller Grout, confirmed the opinion of Judge Scott, rendered in 1897

Honorable Joseph H. Choate, Counsel of the Museum, on January 18, 1911, maintained that those engaged in the service of the Museum are not employees

Lastly, the present Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion about January 18, 1911, to the Honorable David Ferguson, Supervisor of the City Record, that it would be illegal to print in the Civil List the names and salaries of the employees of the Museums of The City of New York.

The above memoranda transmitted to the Honorable Henry H. Curran, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen at his request on May 14. 1912.

New York: Sir-I desire to make a test of the availability of motor trucks for use in makng the collections of the wastes by the force of this Department. I have investigated this matter and believe that there are types of trucks of three-ton and five-ton capacity which could be used in this work with great efficiency and economy.

I have taken the matter up with the manufacturers of the various trucks and

find that they are willing to construct the bodies to conform to our requirements and permit us to make a long time test if we will pay the cost of operation. I estimate the cost of this test, allowing for the use of six trucks from the 1st of May for the remainder of the year, would be \$61.80 per day or \$12,978. The items of this expense are as follows:

Wages (per day)..... Garage (per day)..... 

\$61 80 Per truck, \$10.30 (6 trucks)..... I estimate that each of these cars should carry 45 tons per day, which will make the cost 23 cents per ton. As the present carting cost is approximately 75 cents per ton,

I believe that this test will prove of value in the City service. I therefore request that your honorable body authorize the issue of special revenue bonds to cover the cost of this proposed test. Respectfully.

In my estimate for the Budget for 1912, I included an amount of \$2,000 for the purchase of horses, and \$5,000 for the purchase of an auto truck. When the advisability of making these appropriations was taken up by the Budget Committee, it was decided, after a conference between the members of that Committee and myself, to eliminate my request for the purchase of horses, in view of the fact that they provided an amount of \$5,000 for the purchase of an auto truck, as I figured that the work of five teams could easily be done with a truck.

When the Budget adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was referred to the previous Board of Aldermen for concurrence they eliminated the allowance of \$5,000 for a truck, but failed to restore the amount of \$2,000 for the purchase of horses.

During the last two months of 1911, we lost, through sickness, four of our horses, and were at that time running the Department with eight horses less than we ordinarily have for a full equipment. At the present time we lack fourteen horses, two having died since January 1 of this year.

The work in the Department at the present time is very heavy, and will continue so for the next eight months, and I earnestly request that you give this matter your favorable consideration to enable me to carry on some very necessary work. The amount of money requested will only provide three teams.

Dear Sirs-At the meeting of your honorable Board held on April 25, a communication from the President of the Borough of Manhattan, asking for an additional appropriation of \$85,000 for the proposed Children's Court Building was referred to this Committee.

In July, 1911, the amount of \$150,000 was authorized for the purpose of erecting a Children's Court Building upon a site at that time not as yet acquired, and for the purpose whose purchase the amount of \$165,000 was recommended to the Board of Aldermen. The appropriation of this \$165,000 for a site was not concurred in by the Board of Aldermen, as the site then contemplated did not meet with its approval. The \$150,000 asked for at that time to cover the cost of the building was necessarily but roughly approximated, as the site had not been determined on, and it was difficult to figure the exact cost of a building of unknown dimensions. Within the past two months, by arrangement with the College of The City of New York, a plot of land 100 feet by 75 feet on the north side of 22d st., between Lexington and 3d aves., has been acquired for the purpose of the Children's Court Building, and the Architect, in consultation with the Justices and the Borough President's office, has designed a building which will answer the purposes of the court. It was found necessary, in order to accommodate Probation Officers and other necessary adjuncts of a Children's Court, to put on one additional story. After eliminating all unnecessary accommodations and designing a building which will be fitted for its particular purpose and combine in its exteror the simplicity and dignity which ought not to be lacking in a building devoted to the administration of justice, it was found that the total cost would be \$235,000, thus necessitating the issuance of an additional amount of \$85,000 of corporate stock bonds.

Your Committee recommends that this amount be authorized and attaches hereto

a resolution embodying the recommendations of this Committee.

It is estimated that 192 spaces will be required for books during the present year, so that unless additional space is supplied by December 31, 1912, there will be about 100 books without proper filing places.

This condition was recognized by your predecessor in office and I am informed that he requested the Department of Public Buildings and Offices to construct a gallery in the front record room which would provide space for at least 860 books. I believe no action has been taken on this request.

REPORTS:

That in addition to the statements made in the letter of request, Dr. Fitzgerald and Mr. Thorne appeared before the Committee and explained in detail the necessity for this increase in force. It appears that prior to the enactment of the new law the Bureau of Domestic Relations made investigations in as many cases as it could handle with the force at its command; for instance, in 1911, of 3,883 cases the Bureau, owing to its inadequate force, made no investigations in 2,250. At the same time it was enabled to settle 1,431 cases after investigation. The increase in the amount of work for the first six months of 1911 over the same period in 1910 was 116 per cent., and for the first quarter of 1912 over the first quarter of 1911 was 70 per cent. Under the new law a complete investigation must be made of each case by the Department, and the facts ascertained through such investigation must be presented to the court. With the present force it will be physically impossible to comply with the law.

The Committee believes that the additional employees asked for are absolutely essential to comply with the new law, but inasmuch as the bonds cannot be authorized, under the regular procedure, until about July 1, 1912, it has cut the amount to cover the six months commencing on that date, and recommends that the accompany-

Amount required for 8 months, \$7,900. These positions are necessary owing to the amendment to the Charter in relation to abandonment cases, recently signed by Governor Dix, which requires the Commissioner of Public Charities of The City of New York to make investigations of all applications in abandonment cases before they are heard by the court. This will often prevent a woman from taking her husband to the Court of Domestic Relations when, as a matter of fact, she has no legal case against him.

Under the old law a wife would have two or three of her children committed when she had been abandoned by her husband and his whereabouts unknown. Subsequently learning of his whereabouts, she would go to court and have him placed under an order to pay her a certain amount each week. This Department would have no knowledge of the court order and would continue to pay for the children committed to an institution. This will be impossible under the new law.

Heretofore there has been no examination of these cases before presentation in court. By the Department making a full investigation of the homes and the neighborhood of the parties connected with the various cases coming before these courts, and the result of such investigations being presented to the court at the time of the hearing, greatly facilitates the action of the court. At the same time it increases the work of this Department to such an extent that this additional help is necessary if we are to do the work properly.

The Stenographer for the Bureau of Domestic Relations is needed in order that an accurate record may be kept of all cases coming under the jurisdiction of the Brooklyn Bureau of Domestic Relations of this Department, the same as is done in the Bureau of Domestic Relations, Borough of Manhattan. This Stenographer and Typewriter remains in the Domestic Relations Court (created in 1910) and gets the decisions of cases together with an outline of the testimony. Respectfully yours,

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to which was referred, on the 9th day of nuary, 1912, introductory numbers 87, 88 and 89, composing the proposed motion ture ordinance prepared by a committee of citizens appointed by his Honor William Gaynor, Mayor of The City of New York, introduced by Alderman Folks, respect-REPORTS:

That it has held a public hearing on these ordinances, at which public hearing ght changes in the grammar and punctuation of the ordinances was suggested; t it has also received suggestions from the Mayor's committee who prepared the linances, which suggestions are also in the line of slight corrections to the wording grammar and making the operation of the ordinances less onerous without imring the efficiency of same.

That it has redrafted the ordinance incorporating these suggestions, has renumed and rearranged the same in accordance with the practice of the Board of dermen and has prepared duplicate drafts of the ordinances as so corrected. That principal changes made in the ordinances apart from the grammatical corrections

Subsection d (in the redraft section 352d), paragraph 7, has, at the suggestion the Mayor's committee and of the Iron Workers' Association, made at the public aring, eliminated the following words from the ordinance: "Provided, however, that no booth or enclosure constructed wholly of iron shall be permitted and." This correction is made because of chapter 756 of the State Laws of 1911, which sufficiently covers this point.

Subsection L (now known as section 352 L) has been amended so as to read

"Only subsections 'a,' 'b,' 'c,' 'd,' 'e,' paragraphs 7 and 13, and 'g,' 'j' and 'k' of this ordinance shall apply to open air motion picture theatres."

The result of this change is to include in the provisions applying to open air motion picture theatres the right of the License Bureau to inspect the same for violations of the laws against morality, decency or public welfare.

R. COLEMAN. THE FOLK ORDINANCES REGULATING MOTION PICTURE THEATRES.

No. 87 Section 308, article II., title II., chapter 7, of the Code of Ordinances of The

City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

308. The annual license fees shall be as below enumerated: For each public cart or truck, \$2; for each public hack coach, \$3; for each public hack cab, \$2; for each special hack coach, \$5; for each special hack cab, \$3; for each express wagon, \$5; for each junk shop dealer, \$20; for each dealer in second-hand articles. \$25; for each junk cart or boat, \$5; for each peddler using horse and wagon, \$8; for each peddler using push cart, \$4; for each peddler carrying merchandise, \$2; (for each ticket speculator, \$50;) for each coal scalper, \$250; for each common show, \$25; for each open air motion picture theatre, \$50; for each motion picture theatre, \$100; for each public shooting gallery, \$5; for each public bowling alley, \$5; for each public billiard table, \$3; for each dirt cart, \$1; for each general hoisting, \$25; for each special hoisting, \$1; for each fruit or soda water stand, or booth, \$10; for each newspaper or periodical stand, or both, and in addition also a fruit or soda water, or both, \$15; for each movable newspaper stand, \$1; for each newspaper and periodical stand, or both, \$5; for each chair of a bootblack stand, \$5; for each stand under elevated railroad stations, \$10; for each driver of any licensed vehicle, 50 cents.

No. 88.

Section 305, article I., title II., chapter 7 of the Code of Ordinances of The

City of New York, is hereby amended to read as follows:

305. The following businesses must be duly licensed as herein provided, namely, cabmen, expressmen, drivers, ju public cartmen, truckmen, hackmen, in second-hand articles, hawkers, peddlers, venders, (ticket speculators), coal scalpers, common shows, motion picture theatres, open air motion picture theatres, shooting galleries, bowling alleys, billiard tables, dirt carts, exterior hoists and stands within stoop lines and under the stairs of the elevated stations.

No. 89. Chapter 7, Title 2, Article 2A, Section 352-Motion Pictures and Motion Picture

Theatres.

Motion pictures shall be deemed a display on a screen or other device whereby pictures are displayed of characters or objects in motion, whether or not accompanied by music, lecture, recitation or song.

A motion picture theatre shall be deemed any public hall or room in The City of New York in which motion pictures are exhibited, in which the seating capacity does not exceed 600, and in which there is no stage or scenery.

An open air motion picture theatre shall be deemed any public place or space in the open air in The City of New York in which motion pictures are exhibited, and

in which there is no stage or scenery.

The Mayor shall appoint such Inspectors as shall be necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance. They shall be known as "Motion Picture Theatre Inspectors," and shall be paid such compensation as shall be fixed by the Board of Aldermen on recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The Bureau of Licenses shall issue all motion picture licenses granted by the Mayor, and by authority of the Mayor shall regulate and control all motion picture

theatres, provided:
1. Applicants for motion picture theatre licenses shall file plans and specifications of the motion picture theatre with the Bureau of Buildings of the Borough in which the motion picture theatre is to be situated, and must file a copy of such plans and specifications duly approved by the Superintendent of Buildings with the application for the license, which application shall be made to the Bureau of Licenses on blanks furnished by it for that purpose.

2. The Bureau of Licenses shall, without delay, upon the request of an applicant, pass upon the location of the motion picture theatre and upon the character of the

applicant requesting the license.

3. The Bureau of Licenses shall request the Fire Department, Bureau of Build ings, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and Department of Health to inspect said theatres, and the said Departments shall file in the Bureau of Licenses, within ten days, detailed written reports, which shall include a statement of any violations of law, ordinances, rules and regulations, and any dangerous conditions. Upon the failure of any of said Departments to file detailed written reports in reply to the request of the Bureau of Licenses, the said Bureau may disregard said Department, and, in its discretion, may issue a license.

4. Until the provisions of this ordinance shall have been complied with, no

license shall be issued.

352d.

1. Plans-Before the erection, construction or alteration of a building, or part thereof, to be used as a motion picture theatre, there must be filed with the Superintendent of Buildings complete plans and detailed statement as set forth in section and corridors, devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public, shall be so lighted 4 of the Building Code. The plans must show clearly and fully the location and by electric light during all exhibitions and until the entire audience has left the

width of all exits, passageways, stairs, fire escapes, aisles, etc.; arrangement of seats, size of floor beams, walls, supports, etc.; the location and construction of the inclosure for the motion picture light and machinery, and for other similar apparatus; a diagram of the lot or plot, showing outlets from all exits, and also such other statements, plans or details as may be required by the Superintendent of Buildings.

2. Prohibition—Motion picture theatres shall not be constructed in frame buildings within the fire limits nor in hotels, tenement houses or lodging houses; nor in factories or workshops, except where the theatre is separated from the rest of the building by unpierced fireproof walls and floors; and in no case shall they be con-

structed or operated above or below the ground floor of any building.

3. Exits and Courts—All such buildings must be provided on the main floor of the theatre with at least two separate exits, one of which shall be in the front and the other in the rear, both leading to unobstructed outlets on the street. Where the main floor of the theatre accommodates more than 300 people there shall be at least 3 sets of exits. The aggregate width in feet of such exits shall not be less than one-twentieth of the number of persons to be accommodated thereby. No exits shall be less than 5 feet in width and there shall be a main exit not less than 10 feet in

In all such buildings to be erected or to be altered so as to be used for a motion picture theatre, if unobstructed exit to a street cannot be provided at the rear of such buildings, as herein specified, either an open court or a fireproof passage or corridor must be provided from rear exit to the street front, of at least the following width: 4 feet in the clear for theatres accommodating 100 persons or less, for every 100 persons the width to be increased 8 inches. Such passage must be constructed of fireproof material and must be at least 10 feet high in the clear. The walls forming such passage must be at least 8 inches thick, of brick or other approved fireproof material, and if there be a basement the wall on the auditorium side should either run 1 foot below the cellar bottom or may be carried in the cellar on iron columns and girders properly fireproofed according to sections 106 and 107 of the Building Code.

The ceiling of said passage, and if there be a basement, the flooring must be constructed according to section 106 of the Building Code.

If unobstructed rear exit or exits to a street are provided the said exit or exits must be of the same total width required for the court or passage above mentioned. Said passages and exits to the street, as above, must be used for no other purposes except for exit and entrance and must be kept free and clear.

The level of the open court or passage at the front of building shall not be greater than one step above the level of the sidewalk, and the grade shall not be

more than 1 foot in 10, with no perpendicular rises.

All exit doors must be unlocked when building is open to the public. They must be fireproof and made to open outwardly, and so arranged as not to obstruct the required width of exit or court when opened. All doors leading to fire escapes must be not less than 40 inches wide in the clear, and shall be located at the opposite

side or end of the gallery from other exit doors.
4. Galleries and Stairs—A gallery may be permitted, but it shall not include more than 25 per cent, of the total seating capacity of the theatre. Entrance to and exit from said gallery shall in no case lead to the main floor of the theatre, and the gallery shall be provided with a stair or stairs equipped with handrails on both sides. Stairs over 7 feet wide shall be provided with centre handrail. The risers of the stairs shall not exceed 734 inches, and the treads, excluding nosings, shall be not less than  $9\frac{1}{2}$  inches. There shall be no circular or winding staircases.

The total width of the stairs shall not be less than 8 feet in the clear, where the gallery accommodates 150 people; for every 50 people less than 150 which the gallery

accommodates said width may be reduced 1 foot.
Stairs shall be constructed of fireproof material, and such material and the bear-

ing capacity of such stairs shall be approved by the Bureau of Buildings. Galleries must also be provided with at least one line of fire escapes leading to

an open court, fireproof passage or street without re-entering the same or any other building.

If the fire escape leads to a point in the court nearer the street than any exit, there must be a width of not less than 4 feet in the clear between the outer edge of the fire escape and the outer wall of the court.

5. Fire Escapes—All fire escapes must have balconies not less than 3 feet 4 inches in width in the clear, and not less than 4 feet 6 inches long, and from said balconies there shall be staircases extending to the ground level with a rise of not over 73/4 inches, and a step of not less than 91/2 inches, and the width of stairs must not be less than 3 feet 4 inches.

6. Auditorium and Other Rooms-If the walls of the auditorium contain wood studs, they shall be covered with either expanded metal lath or wire mesh and plastered with three coats of first-class plaster, or may be covered with metal on onehalf inch plaster boards. The joints shall be properly filled with mortar.

The ceilings of all such rooms shall be plastered with three coats of first-class plaster on wire mesh or metal lath, or covered with one-half inch plaster boards and plastered or covered with metal.

If there be a basement or cellar, the ceiling under the auditorium floor must be plastered with three coats of first-class plaster on wire mesh or expanded metal lath, or may be covered with metal on one-half inch plaster boards.

The basement or cellar under the auditorium shall be kept free and clear except the space used for the heating apparatus, for machinery connected with the theatre.

7. Construction of Booths-Apparatus for projecting motion pictures shall be enclosed in a booth or enclosure constructed so as to be fireproof, in accordance with the specifications of chapter 756 of the Laws of 1911. The booth shall be equipped with a vent flue, as prescribed in section 352F, paragraph 3, of this ordinance. Booths shall contain an approved fireproof box for the storage of films not on the projecting machine. Films shall not be stored in any other place on the premises; they shall be rewound and repaired either in the booth or in some other approved fireproof enclosure.

Where miniature motion picture machines are employed in connection with private exhibitions, the requirements of the above paragraph may be so modified as to permit instead of the regulation booth an approved fireproof box, unventilated,

and of a size only sufficient to properly enclose the machine. 8. Gradients—To overcome any difference of level in and between corridors, lobbies and aisles, gradients of not over one foot in ten feet, or steps having a rise not over eight inches and a width of not less than ten inches must be used.

9. Aisles—All aisles in the auditorium and gallery must not be less than 3 feet wide in the clear. No aisle, passageway or space in the rear of the auditorium shall be obstructed by any camp stool, chair, sofa or settee, nor shall any person be permitted to stand or sit therein.

10. Chairs—All chairs in the auditorium, except those contained in the boxes, must not be less than 32 inches from back to back, and must be firmly secured to the floor. No seat in the auditorium shall have more than seven seats intervening between it and an aisle. The space occupied by each person shall be separated from

the adjoining space by means of an arm or other suitable device. 11. Signs Over Exits-Over every exit there must be painted on the inside in letters not less than 6 inches high, the word "Exit" in legible type, and one red light or illuminated sign must be placed inside over each exit, and illuminated while

the audience is present. 12. Floor Loads-The flooring of that portion of the building devoted to the uses or accommodation of the public must be of sufficient strength to bear safely a live load of 90 pounds per square foot.

13. Toilets—Toilets separate for sexes must be provided.

14. Fire Apparatus—Portable fire apparatus shall be provided of the following kind and number: Ten-quart capacity buckets, painted red, with the word "Fire" in black, and letters 4 inches high, to the number of 6, for places seating less than 300 without a gallery, and two additional if there be a gallery; to the number of 10 in places seating over 300 persons, and 4 additional if there be a gallery. There shall be two buckets containing dry sand kept in the operating booth; approved fire extinguishers of 2½ gallon capacity of the regulation Fire Department pattern, of which 2 shall be on the main floor and 2 in the gallery, if there be one, and 1 in the operating booth; 4-pound flat head axes, 2 of which shall be on the main floor and 2 in the gallery, if there be one.

1. Lighting-Every portion of a moving picture theatre, including exits, courts

premises, that a person with normal eyesight should be able to read the Snellen standard test type 40 at a distance of 20 feet, and type 30 at a distance of 10 feet; normal eyesight meaning ability to read type 20 at a distance of 20 feet in daylight. Cards showing types 20, 30 and 40 shall be displayed on the side walls, together with a copy of this paragraph of the ordinance.

2. Heating—When the temperature of the outdoor air is below 60 degrees F. the air in the theatre, while an audience is present, shall be maintained at a tempera-

ture not lower than 62 degrees F., nor higher than 70 degrees F.

If gas stoves, oil stoves or other apparatus throwing off products of combustion are used to heat motion picture theatres, said products of combustion must be carried to the outside air by means of a fireproof flue or flues.

No radiator shall be placed in the aisles so as to lessen the width below the

minimum requirement.

3. Ventilation-Motion picture theatres having less than 200 cubic feet of air space for each person, or motion picture theatres in which the outside window and door area is less than one-eighth of the floor area, shall be provided with artificial means of ventilation which shall supply during the time the audience is present at least 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour for each person.

Motion picture theatres having more than 200 cubic feet of air space for each person, or which have outside windows and doors, the area of which is equal to at least one-eighth of the floor area, shall be provided with artificial means of ventilation, which shall be in operation when the outside temperature requires the windows to be kept closed, and which shall supply during the time the audience is present, at least 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour for each person. When the artificial ventilation is not in operation ventilation by means of open doors and windows shall be sufficient to provide each person with 500 cubic feet of fresh air per hour.

Motion picture theatres having more than 1,000 cubic feet of air space for each person and having outside windows and doors, the area of which is equal to at least one-eighth of the total floor area, shall not be required to have artificial means of ventilation, provided the air is thoroughly changed by freely opening doors and windows immediately before the admission of the audience, and at least every 4

hours thereafter.

No part of the fresh air supply required by any of the above paragraphs of this section shall be taken from any source containing vitiated air.

The area of outside doors and windows shall mean the area capable of being

freely opened to the outside air for ventilation purposes.

When fresh air is supplied by means of ventilating openings, at least one inlet shall be situated at one end of the room, and at least one outlet at the other end of the room. Where exhaust or inlet fans are necessary, at least one of such fans shall be placed in an outlet opening. The inlet opening or openings shall be placed in the floor or within 2 feet from the floor, and the outlet opening or openings in the ceiling or within 2 feet of the ceiling. The inlet openings and their surroundings shall be kept free from dust so that the incoming air shall not convey dust nor stir

During the time the audience is present the air in the theatre shall be kept continuously in motion by means of fans to the number of at least 1 to every 150 persons. Such fans shall be placed in positions remote from the inlet and outlet openings. No person shall be exposed to any direct draft from any air inlet.

The booth in which the picture machine is operated shall be provided with an opening in its roof or upper part of its side walls, leading to the outdoor air. The vent flue shall have a minimum cross sectional area of 50 square inches and shall be fireproof. When the booth is in use there shall be a constant current of air passing outward through said opening or vent flue at the rate of not less than 30 cubic feet

The specifications of the above paragraph shall apply to portable booths and booths in open air theatres.

Motion picture theatres must be kept clean and free from dust.

The floors where covered with wood, tiles, stone, concrete, linoleum, or other washable material, shall be mopped or scrubbed with water or swept with moisture. or by some other dustless method, at least once daily, and shall be scrubbed with water and soap, or water and some other solvent substance at least once weekly.

Carpets, rugs and other fabric floor coverings shall be cleaned at least once daily by means of suction cleaning, beating or dustless sweeping. Curtains and draperies shall be cleaned at least once monthly by suction cleaning, beating or washing. Cornices, walls and other dust-holding places shall be kept free from dust by washing or moist wiping. The wood and metal parts of all seats shall be kept clean. Fabric upholstering of seats and railings and other fixed fabrics shall be cleaned by suction cleaning, or other dustless method, at least once monthly.

352g. Through its Motion Picture Inspectors, as provided in subsection "b" of this ordinance, the Bureau of Licenses shall inspect, subject to the authority of the Mayor, the character of exhibitions in motion picture theatres, and shall report to the Mayor any offense against morality, decency or public welfare contained in said exhibitions.

All the provisions contained in this ordinance shall apply to existing places of entertainment where motion pictures are exhibited under a common show license, except those provisions of subsection "d" designated as Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, but the Bureau of Licenses shall have power in its discretion to enforce the provisions of said paragraph 3 of section "d" as to exits and courts.

Existing places of entertainment seating 300 persons or less, where motion pictures are exhibited in conjunction with any other form of entertainment, must comply, before a reissuance of its license, with the provisions of section 109 of the Building Code, covering theatres seating more than 300 persons. But if such existing place of entertainment discontinue all other form of entertainment except the exhibition of motion pictures, it may be licensed in accordance with the provisions of subsection "h."

With the exception of paragraph 7 of subsection "d," subsections "a" to "f," inclusive, and subsections "h," "i," "k" and "l" of this ordinance shall not apply to motion picture exhibitions with or without charge for admission, conducted under the direct management of educational or religious institutions, nor to motion picture exhibitions without charge for admission given or held not more than once a week in private residences or bona fide social, scientific, political or athletic clubs. Before motion pictures shall be exhibited in any of the places above mentioned, there shall be obtained from the Bureau of Licenses a permit for such exhibition. Before granting such permit, the Bureau of Licenses shall cause to be inspected the premises where such proposed exhibition will be held, and shall grant the permit if in its judgment the safety of the public be properly guarded, and provided that for an audience of more than 75 people all chairs or seats shall be securely fastened to the floor or fastened together in rows.

The Bureau of Licenses at its discretion shall specify the seating capacity for each open-air motion picture theatre. Aisles must be 4 feet wide, or wider, in the discretion of the Bureau of Licenses. At least two separate exits, remote from each other, shall be provided, and no exit shall be less than 5 feet in width. For every 25 persons to be accommodated in excess of 300, the total width of exits shall be increased one foot. All exits must be indicated by signs and red lights, and the doors must open outwardly. Seats must be stationary, with backs 32 inches apart, and so arranged that no seat shall have more than seven seats intervening between it and an aisle. The floor must be constructed either of wood with sleepers, or of concrete, and must extend at least 5 feet from the seats on all sides, provided, however, that in the discretion of the Bureau of Licenses, a gravel floor may be substituted for wood or concrete. Chairs must either be securely fastened to wood or concrete floor, or all chairs in a row must be fastened together, and at least four rows must be securely fastened to one frame, except that where refreshments are served, tables and unattached chairs or benches used with them may be permitted.

Only subsections "a," "b," "c," "d," paragraphs 7 and 13, and "g," "j" and "k" of this ordinance shall apply to open air motion picture theatres.

This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor. All other rules, regulations and ordinances inconsistent herewith and affecting buildings and places to be occupied as herein defined are hereby revoked.

In connection herewith Alderman Dowling offered the following formal motion: Motion by Alderman Dowling.

duly registered physician, which permit shall not be transferable. Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.



NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

tion of the contract period. The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the pur-chaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurte-nances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that p The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Depart ment of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings in the Law Department of The City of New York, 166 Montague with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in

the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in

every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the suc-cessful bidder will provide and furnish all ma-terials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate pur-

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its depart-ments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name

and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned be-

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Char-

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any

obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the

interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon applica-tion therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and draw-

ings of construction work may also be seen there.
