## COMMISSIONERS OF ACCOUNTS.

Hon. W. R. GRACE, Mayor:

SEPTEMBER 8, 1886.

SIR—We have examined the accounts of the Bureau of Permits for the period commencing January 1, 1885, and ending January 31, 1886. The number of permits and dog licenses granted by said Bureau during the above-mentioned period, as shown by the records of the office, is 24,861, and the amount received therefrom \$27,968. The amount deposited with the Chamberlain is \$27,972, being an apparent over payment of \$4. The expenditures of the Bureau for the above-mentioned period were \$12,180.08.

The particulars of receipts and expenditures are contained in the tables herein submitted, marked A, B, C, D, E and F, G and H.

The Bureau was abolished by resolution of the Board of Aldermen January 19, 1886, approved by the Mayor January 28, 1886, and such of its duties as remained were assigned by ordinance of February 2, 1886, to the Bureau of Licenses.
