

#### APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending May 18, 1878.

Resolved, That the Special Committee appointed April 23, 1878, to investigate and report concerning the receipt and return of fees by certain civil justices and their clerks, have power and they are hereby authorized to employ a stenographer to take testimony on such investigation.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 30, 1878.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, May 13, 1878, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to B.
