

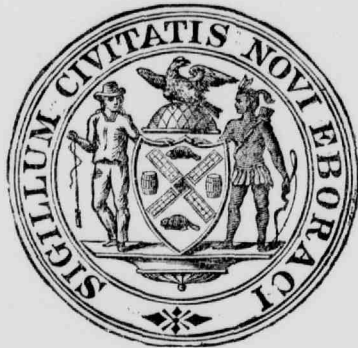

#### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
January 28, 1892.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted January 19, 1892, which provides for the lighting of One Hundred and Eighty-third street, from Jerome avenue to Valentine avenue.

The Superintendent of Lamps and Gas reports, through the Commissioner of Public Works, that the street in question is not yet regulated and graded. The resolution is, therefore, premature.

HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Eighty-third street, between Jerome and Valentine avenues, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was laid over, ordered to be printed in the minutes and published in full in the CITY RECORD.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR,  
January 28, 1892.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

I return, without approval, the resolution of your Honorable Body, adopted January 19, 1892, permitting D. Buchner & Company to drive advertising wagons through the streets of the city, on the ground that the resolution is too general in its terms. There is nothing to indicate the nature or extent of the privilege proposed to be granted.

HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to D. Buchner & Company to drive advertising wagon through the streets of this city, from January 28 to February 28, 1892, provided such wagon shall not obstruct or hinder the free uses of the streets by the public, and upon the further condition that should the privilege hereby given in any way hinder or obstruct the uses of the streets, it shall then be in the power of the Commissioner of Public Works and it is hereby made his duty to prevent any further exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

Which was laid over, ordered to be printed in the minutes and published in full in the CITY RECORD.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

By Alderman Flynn—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby respectfully requested to return to this Board, for further consideration, a resolution employing Thomas V. Costello to furnish legislative documents, at an expense of fifty dollars.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

(G. O. 64.)

Resolved, That Thomas V. Costello be and he is hereby employed to furnish for the use of members of this Board, copies of all bills, documents, and printed matter introduced in the Legislature of this State particularly affecting public interests in the City of New York, at the rate of compensation usually paid for like services in former years, viz.: fifty dollars (\$50) for the session of the Legislature of 1892, the expenses to be taken from the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Alderman Flynn moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman Flynn, the paper was then again laid over.

By Alderman School—

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby requested to return to this Board for further consideration a resolution to regulate, etc., One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from Union to Westchester avenues.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Subsequently the paper was received from his Honor the Mayor, and is as follows:

(G. O. 65.)

Resolved, That One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, from the westerly curb-line of Union avenue to Westchester avenue, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and the sidewalks flagged a space four feet in width, crosswalks laid at each intersecting and terminating street and avenue, and culverts and drains built near Intervale avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Alderman School moved a reconsideration of the vote by which the above resolution was adopted.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

On motion of Alderman School, the paper was then again laid over.

By Alderman Brown—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Excelsior Steam Power Company to build a tunnel across and under Gold street, from No. 37 to No. 38, as shown on the annexed diagram, upon payment of the usual fee for vaults, provided that the said Excelsior Steam Power Company shall stipulate with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur during the progress or subsequent to the completion of the work to any water-pipe, gas-pipe or sewer, or from any other cause, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Which was referred to the Committee on Bridges and Tunnels.

(G. O. 66.)

By Alderman Bailey—

Resolved, That a free public drinking-hydrant be placed on the south side of One Hundred and Sixteenth street, about fifty feet east of Fifth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Which was laid over.

By Alderman Flynn—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the C. W. Kopf Company to drive a wagon through the streets and thoroughfares running parallel with the East and North rivers, south of Fourteenth street, from which vehicle it is proposed to gratuitously distribute hot soup and give away samples of portable powdered soup; provided however that Broadway, the Bowery, Church street, Chambers street, Fulton street, Pearl street be exempted from said privilege; such permission to continue for only ninety days from February 1, 1892.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

(G. O. 67.)

By Alderman Harris—

Resolved, That One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, from Boulevard to Manhattan street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones set and sidewalks flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 68.)

By the same—

Resolved, That lamp-posts be erected and street-lamps placed thereon and lighted in One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, between Amsterdam and Audubon avenues.

Which was laid over.

(G. O. 69.)

By Alderman Hart—

Resolved, That Croton-water mains be laid in Avenue B, from Eighty-seventh street to Eighty-ninth street, as provided by section 356 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Which was laid over.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to E. Knowlton to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of premises No. 282 Hudson street, the Croton-water connection for same to be taken out in the front of cellar and run up under sidewalk so as not to disturb the pavement of street, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

Resolved, That Bremer avenue, from the northerly curb-line of Jerome avenue to the southerly curb-line of Birch street, be regulated and graded, the curb-stones be set, the sidewalks be flagged a space four feet in width, and that crosswalks be laid at each intersecting and terminating street or avenue, where not already laid, under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Improvements, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolutions passed by the Board of Directors of the New York and Long Island Railroad Company, at its meeting held December 3, 1891:

Whereas, This company made due application to the Corporation of the City of New York for its assent to the construction of a part of the railroad of this company within the boundaries of such city along the route and in the manner set forth in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen of said city hereinafter set forth; and

Whereas, The following resolution was passed by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, on the 23d day of December, 1890, at a meeting of said Board, to wit:

Whereas, The New York and Long Island Railroad Company, a railroad corporation organized under and pursuant to the laws of the State of New York, has made due application to the Corporation of the City of New York, for its assent to the construction of a part of the railroad of said company within the boundaries of such city, along the route and in the manner hereinafter set forth; and

Whereas, Such petition has received due and careful consideration by this body; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, in legal meeting assembled, on behalf of the Corporation of the City of New York, and in pursuance to and in the exercise of the power conferred upon it by law, that it hereby assents to the construction of a double-track railroad by the New York and Long Island Railroad Company, in, by and through a tunnel beneath the surface of Forty-second street, from its easterly end to a point therein between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, in said city, with such connections, branches, turn-outs, sidings and switches as may be requisite and necessary, in accordance with the plans and profiles of such railroad heretofore deposited with the Board, or such modification thereof as shall be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works of such city. This assent shall be availed of, pursuant to the following regulations, to wit:

First—That no openings shall be made by said railroad company in the surface of any public street, road, avenue or place in said city, unless for temporary purposes, and then only under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Second—That all damage to sewer, gas or water pipes or to other conduits, or to the foundation of any structure overlying such tunnels or railroads, or to the stability thereof, shall be repaired and remedied by such railroad company, at its own proper expense, and under the direction and control of the proper authorities.

Third—That the company shall pay annually to the City of New York three per centum of its gross earnings or receipts from the transportation of persons and property on its railroad within said city; such payment to be exclusive of all taxes levied by and payable to the City of New York on the real or personal property, capital stock or income of said company, and the books of said company showing the amount of its said gross earnings or receipts shall at all reasonable times and hours be open to the inspection of the Comptroller of the City of New York (or to his duly authorized agents) for the purpose of verifying the returns thereof of said company.

Now, therefore, Resolved, That this company has accepted and hereby accepts the rights, privileges and grants as set forth in the said resolution of the Board of Aldermen, upon and in accordance with the terms and regulations therein stated.

Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution, certified by the secretary of this company under its corporate seal, be sent to the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 12 of article I of chapter 7 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880. The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 12 of article I of chapter 7 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended by inserting at the end of the first sentence the following:

"And it shall be the duty of the Comptroller to require said sureties to be further examined before himself, or an officer authorized to administer oaths deputed by him, in respect to the items and details of their property before approving the adequacy and sufficiency of such sureties."

—so that said section, when so amended, shall read as follows:

Sec. 12. Every contract for supplies or work by the Corporation shall be executed by the contractor or contractors to whom the same may be awarded, and shall be accompanied by a bond in the penalty mentioned in the proposals therefor, executed by



the persons consenting to become bound as sureties, or by such other persons as shall be substituted therefor, with the consent of the head of the department making such contract, conditioned for the faithful performance of the contract and every provision therein contained, and which bond shall be accompanied by the oath, in writing, of the person signing the same, that each is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, as hereinbefore prescribed. And it shall be the duty of the Comptroller to require such sureties to be further examined before himself or an officer authorized to administer oaths deputed by him, in respect to the items and details of their property, before approving the adequacy and sufficiency of such sureties. And the several departments of the City Government, and officers aforesaid, by which every and each contract for work to be done for the Corporation shall be made in pursuance of these ordinances, shall have power, and it shall be their duty to require and enforce the faithful execution of each and every contract so made by them; and in case the contractor or contractors shall fail in any respect to perform the work which he or they have contracted to render or perform within the time limited for the performance of the same, then it shall be the duty of such departments or officers aforesaid having charge of such work to do and complete the same in the manner provided for the performance of the same in the contract, and the cost of the same shall be a charge against such delinquent contractor or contractors; provided, however, that the head of any department or officers aforesaid by whom any such contract shall be made may, on good and sufficient cause, extend, for a reasonable time, the period fixed for the completion thereof.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or resolutions, or parts of ordinances or resolutions, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed, annulled and rescinded.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Alderman Brown moved that the whole matter be laid over indefinitely.

At an adjourned executive meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Saturday, January 16, 1892, at eleven o'clock A. M.

James A. P. Ramsdell, representing the Homer Ramsdell Transportation Company, appeared, and requested the Board to change the location of the proposed ferry-rack of the West Shore Railroad from the north to the south side of Pier, new 23, North river, in view of the fact that the said company have expressed to him their willingness to consent to the change. He was informed that the Board would permit said change to be made, provided the West Shore Railroad would consent thereto, in writing, and pending the receipt of such communication, further action in the matter was postponed.

Upon motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Finance Department—Returning the proposal of the Atlantic Dredging Company for dredging at sundry-named places on the North river, under Contract No. 407, with the approval of the adequacy and sufficiency of the sureties.

From the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company—Accepting the terms and conditions of the resolutions adopted on the 14th instant for the use and occupation of Pier, old 29, North river.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting that the order dated August 20, 1891, directing dredging along East street, between Cherry and Water streets, East river, has not been commenced.  
Order revoked.

2d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 11590, reporting as to dredging required at the dumping-boards on Pier 44 and Pier 60, East river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for dredging.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 11608, submitting plans, specifications and form of contract for extending the Pier at the foot of West Eleventh street, North river, to the pier-head line of 1890.

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution adopted:

Resolved, That the plans, specifications and form of contract, as prepared and submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, for extending the Pier at the foot of West Eleventh street, North river, be and they hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates for doing said work inserted in the various newspapers designated by law.

4th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 11236, 11588 and 11540, that he had placed a new mooring-post on Pier, new 29, East river; superintended refastening backing-log on the bulkhead between Piers, new 44 and 45, North river; and superintended the driving and fastening of fender piles on the outer end of Pier 40, East river.

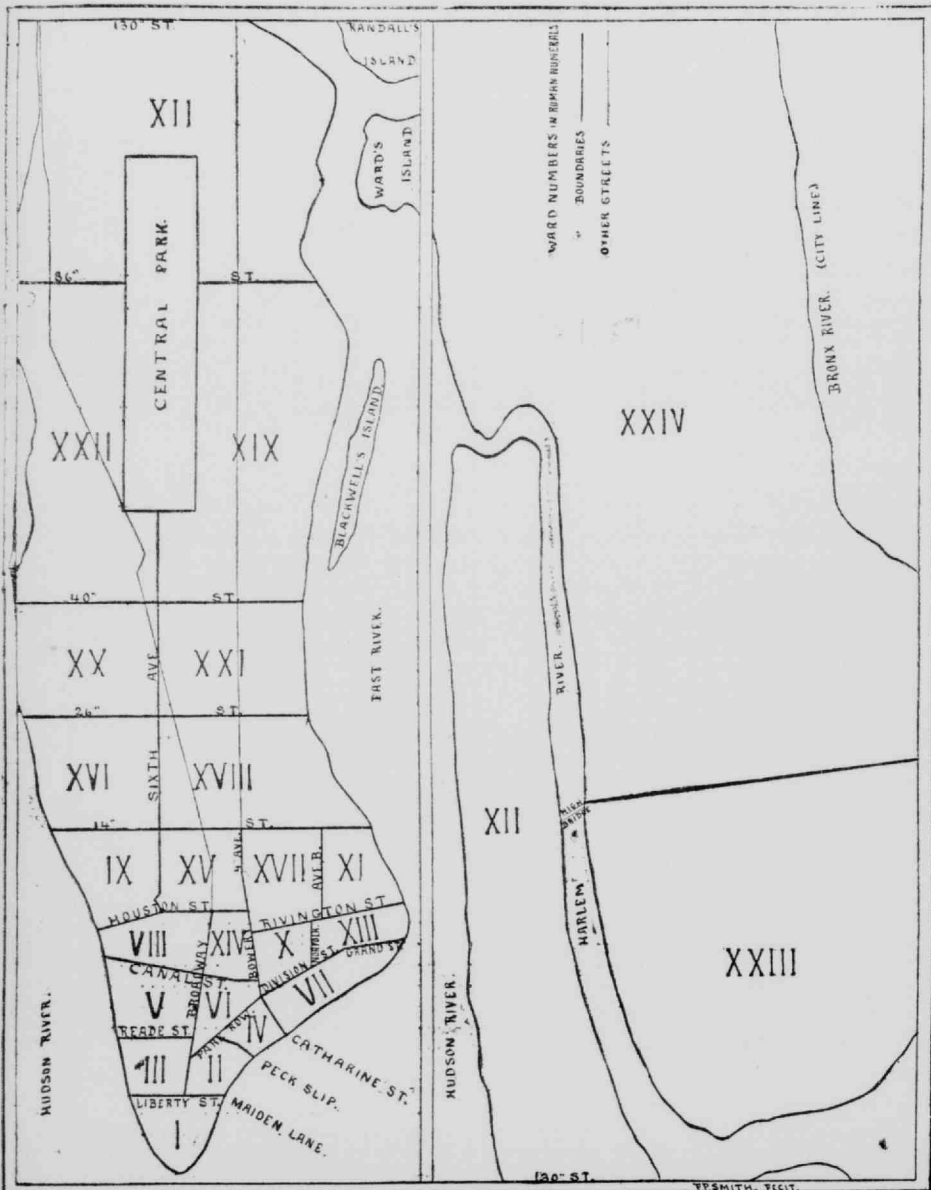

The 972 deaths represent a death-rate of 29.70, against 29.63 for the previous week and 23.42 for the corresponding week of 1891.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight increase, due entirely to the increased prevalence of measles, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 121, 156, 211 and 8, against 125, 117, 224 and 13 for the previous week, a total of 496 against 479. Diphtheria increased between Division and Rivington streets, west of Norfolk street, between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, West, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, and in the lower part of the annexed district, decreasing, as a rule, elsewhere. The increase of measles was most marked between Division and Fourteenth streets, west of Norfolk street, and Avenue B, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East, and north of Eighty-sixth street. Scarlet fever increased between Houston and Fourteenth streets, west of Broadway, between Fourteenth and Twenty-sixth streets, East, between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, West, above Eighty-sixth street, and in the upper part of the annexed district, the decrease being most marked between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, East.

Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance; and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion, and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The bids must, therefore, be in detail on the items required for a department or court.
