

SPECIAL MEETING.

FRIDAY, September 8, 1893, (12 o'clock M.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR,

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

CITY OF NEW YORK—OFFICE OF THE MAYOR, September 8, 1893.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

It becomes my painful duty to communicate to you the news of the death of the Honorable Hamilton Fish, a distinguished native of the City of New York.

This dispensation of Divine Providence may properly be made the occasion for public recognition of the services rendered by him to the State and nation. Though removed from us by death, his record as a citizen, an official and a statesman remains as a conspicuous example to those who

The diplomatic services which crowned his public career are remembered with especial gratitude by our people.

I recommend that your Honorable Body take proper action to show fitting respect to the

memory of the deceased.

Respectfully, THOS. F. GILROY, Mayor.

In connection therewith the President offered the following resolution:

His Honor the Mayor having officially announced to this Board the news of the death of the Honorable Hamilton Fish, it is our sad duty, on behalf of the City of New York, to give expression to the profound regret with which it has been received by this community.

As a member of the Twenty-eighth Congress, as Lieutenant-Governor in 1848, as Governor in 1849 and 1850, as a member of the United States Senate for the term beginning 1851, and as Secretary of State under President Grant, Hamilton Fish furnished an example to his contemporaries and to future generations of pure American manhood and statesmanship. His native State and city have special cause to feel pride in his career and to lament their loss.

He had exceeded the measure of man's allotted years. His life work was complete and unblemished. The blow to those who love him must be softened by the knowledge that its history is but one of honor and probity.

Therefore be it
Resolved, That as an expression of sorrow and of respect to the memory of Hamilton Fish, the flags on the City Hall and the other public buildings be displayed at half staff from sunrise to sunset until after the day set apart for the funeral.

Resolved, That a Special Committee of seven be appointed by the Chair to attend the funeral.

Resolved, That the foregoing preamble and resolutions be spread upon the minutes of this Board and that a copy thereof, suitably engrossed, be sent to the family. And be it further Resolved, That as a further mark of respect that the portrait of the deceased statesman in the Governor's Room be draped in mourning for a period of thirty days.

Which was decided in the affirmative by a rising vote.

And the President appointed as such Committee Aldermen Morgan, Brown, Flynn, Murphy, Wund, Prague and S. W. Smith.

The 752 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.64, against 22.10 for the previous week and 20.62 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases continue to decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 104, 80, 30, 40 and 2, against 98, 111, 37, 29 and 0 for the previous week, a total of 256 against 272. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Seventh, Ninth, Twelfth, Sixteenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-fourth Wards, and the decrease in the Thirteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Fourth, Twelfth and Sixteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Seventeenth, Twenty-first and Twenty-second Wards. Scarlet fever increased slightly in the Seventh, Tenth, Eighteenth and Twenty-second Wards, the decrease being most noticeable in the Twelfth, Nineteenth and Twenty-third Wards. Seventeen of the 40 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 18 of the remaining 23 were below Fourteenth street. The 2 cases of small-pox were below Rivington street, east of the Bowery.
