

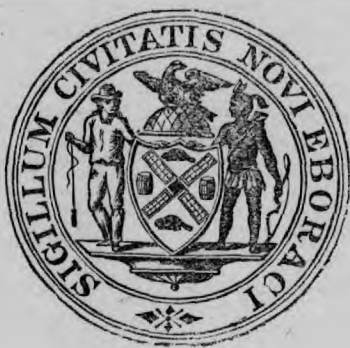

Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor:

SIR—In compliance with the requirements of section 110 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, as amended by chapter 516 of the Laws of 1884, we herewith transmit the results of our examination of the Chamberlain's and Comptroller's offices for the second quarter of 1892, and submit statements as follows:

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and Miscellaneous Accounts on June 30, 1892, was \$4,775,479.50, which agrees with the balances as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

The following tables accompany this report:

"A"—Receipts and Payments—Special and Trust Accounts.

"B"—Receipts and Payments—Appropriation, General Fund and Taxes Accounts.

"C"—Receipts and Payments—Sinking Fund, Redemption Accounts.

That, as the Counsel to the Corporation reports that the expenses thus incurred were reasonable and necessary for the proper conduct of the condemnation proceedings before the Commissioners of Estimate and the Court, your Committee have approved of the bills of L. J. Phillips, for one hundred dollars; William E. Haws, for one hundred dollars, and that of Benjamin P. Fairchild, for fifty dollars.

With reference to the bill of Nathan Fernbacher, Inspector of Common Schools of the City of New York for the Fifth District, your Committee are of the opinion that it should not be approved, as to do so would be in direct violation of section 1027, sub-division 11, of the Consolidation Act of 1882, as follows :

"§ 1027. The Board of Education shall have power :

"11. To remove from office any school officer who shall have been directly or indirectly interested in the furnishing of any supplies or materials, or in the doing of any work or labor, or in the sale or leasing of any real estate, or in any proposal, agreement, or contract for any of these purposes, in any case in which the price or consideration is to be paid, in whole or in part, or directly or indirectly, out of any school moneys, or who shall have received, from any source whatever, any commission or other compensation in connection with any of the matters aforesaid; and any school officer who shall violate the preceding provisions of this section shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars and imprisonment in the City Prison not exceeding one year, and shall also be ineligible to any school office."

And also in section 1044, as follows :

"No compensation shall be allowed to the Commissioners, Inspectors or Trustees of common schools for any services performed by them, but the Commissioners and Inspectors shall receive their actual and reasonable expenses while attending to the duties of their office, to be audited and allowed by the Board of Education."

Your committee therefore submit for adoption the following resolution :

Resolved, That the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) be and the same is hereby appropriated from the proceeds of bonds to be issued by the Comptroller of the City of New York, with the approval of a majority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to chapter 264 of the Laws of 1891, application for the issue of which is hereby made, said sum to be applied in payment of the bills of

L. J. Phillips, dated November 1, 1892.....	\$100 00
William E. Haws, dated July 6, 1892.....	100 00
Benjamin P. Fairchild, dated November 1, 1892.....	50 00

—for services as expert witnesses in the matter of acquiring title to certain lands on the northerly side of One Hundred and Fourth street, between Columbus and Amsterdam avenues, in the Twelfth Ward, as a site for school purposes, requisition for which sum is hereby made upon the Comptroller.

Commissioner Lummis moved that the resolution be amended by striking out "1893" in the tenth line and inserting "1892."

Adopted.

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT to amend chapter three hundred and thirty-one of the Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-two, entitled "An Act to provide for the celebration in the City of New York of the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America."

Approved by the Governor, February 11, 1893. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section ten of chapter three hundred and thirty-one of the Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-two, entitled "An Act to provide for the celebration in the city of New York of the four hundredth anniversary of the discovery of America," is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 10. The committee aforesaid shall immediately appoint after its organization an auditing committee of three members, whose duty it shall be to audit all bills payable on behalf of the city on account of said committee and the comptroller is hereby directed to pay out no moneys on account of such celebration, unless vouchers therefor are properly passed and audited by the entire auditing committee of the said committee of one hundred.

§ 2. Section eleven of said act is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

§ 11. The said committee of one hundred shall select a treasurer who shall account to the comptroller of the city of New York for all moneys passing through his hands, and shall pay to the comptroller of said city all moneys received by him from said committee and on behalf of said committee from rentals of stands or from any other source, and such moneys thus collected and paid over to the comptroller aforesaid, shall be applied by the comptroller of the city of New York to the payment and liquidation of any debts, liabilities or obligations, incurred or created by said committee in carrying out the provisions of this act, after the same shall have been audited and allowed by the board of estimate and apportionment, and if said sum or moneys be insufficient to pay the debts, liabilities or obligations, then the board of estimate and apportionment of said city of New York shall immediately appropriate sufficient money to pay and liquidate all debts, liabilities or obligations incurred by said committee remaining unpaid.

§ 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

SIR—The resolution of your Board of February 15, 1893, requesting the issue of \$20,425.30 of School-house Bonds, to pay the award, costs, etc., in the proceedings to acquire title to No. 365 West Thirty-fifth street, as a site for school purposes, adjoining Grammar School No. 32, was passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment yesterday. An interchange of views on the part of the members of the Board revealed the opinion that condemnation proceedings should not be resorted to until all other methods of arrangement as to price with the owner have failed, and the Comptroller was requested by the Board to communicate with you on the subject.

In the resolution mentioned, the costs, etc., amount to more than ten per cent. of the award. I am fully aware of the fact that occasions may arise when, from various considerations, condemnation proceedings become the only method of acquiring the title to the lands desired for school purposes, but in the Thirty-fifth street case mentioned, it appears from a communication of the 21st instant, from the clerk of your Board to Mr. Lummis, that the above lot could not be purchased for less than \$18,000, which the Committee considered too high. The Court subsequently awarded \$18,250, so that it would seem as if the arrangement could have been effected with the owner at \$18,000, or thereabouts, and the cost saved to the City.

I inclose a list of the expenditures incurred in these proceedings under chapter 191 of the Laws of 1888, from which it is seen that the costs, charges and expenses thereof amount to over sixty-one thousand dollars in less than four years, and which list does not include the fees paid to special counsel and expert witnesses.

I have to request, on behalf of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that you, as President of the Board of Education, will see that the Committee on Sites exhausts every means to avoid condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of lands required for school purposes; and also in cases where purchase prices cannot be arranged satisfactorily between the owner and the committee that the question be referred to this office for adjustment.

I trust that this matter will receive serious consideration on your part.

Hon. PAUL DANA, President, Department of Public Parks:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of February 25, requesting my opinion upon the statement of facts therein given.

It appears from your letter, and from the letter of John H. Winsor, Esq., Secretary of American Museum of Natural History, that at the time the plans for lecture halls and other additions to the American Museum of Natural History (which plans were prepared under chapter 423 of the Laws of 1892) were submitted to the Park Board for consideration, they had not been approved by the Trustees of the Museum, but by an executive committee of the Board of Trustees.

You ask whether, after such irregular proceeding, the Comptroller would be justified in issuing bonds for the improvements contemplated.

The language of the act already cited, chapter 423 of the Laws of 1892, is (in section 1): "Said plans when completed and approved by said Trustees, shall be submitted to the Commissioners of said Department for their approval."

It is very evident that the approval by the Board of Trustees, not by the Executive Committee of the Board, is a condition precedent to the action of the Park Commissioners, and therefore the approval by the Commissioners without the prior approval of the Trustees was an irregularity which was not cured by the subsequent action of the Trustees.

Inasmuch as the plans have not been approved in the manner required by the Act of 1892, it follows that the Comptroller would not be justified in issuing bonds for the erection of the proposed building.

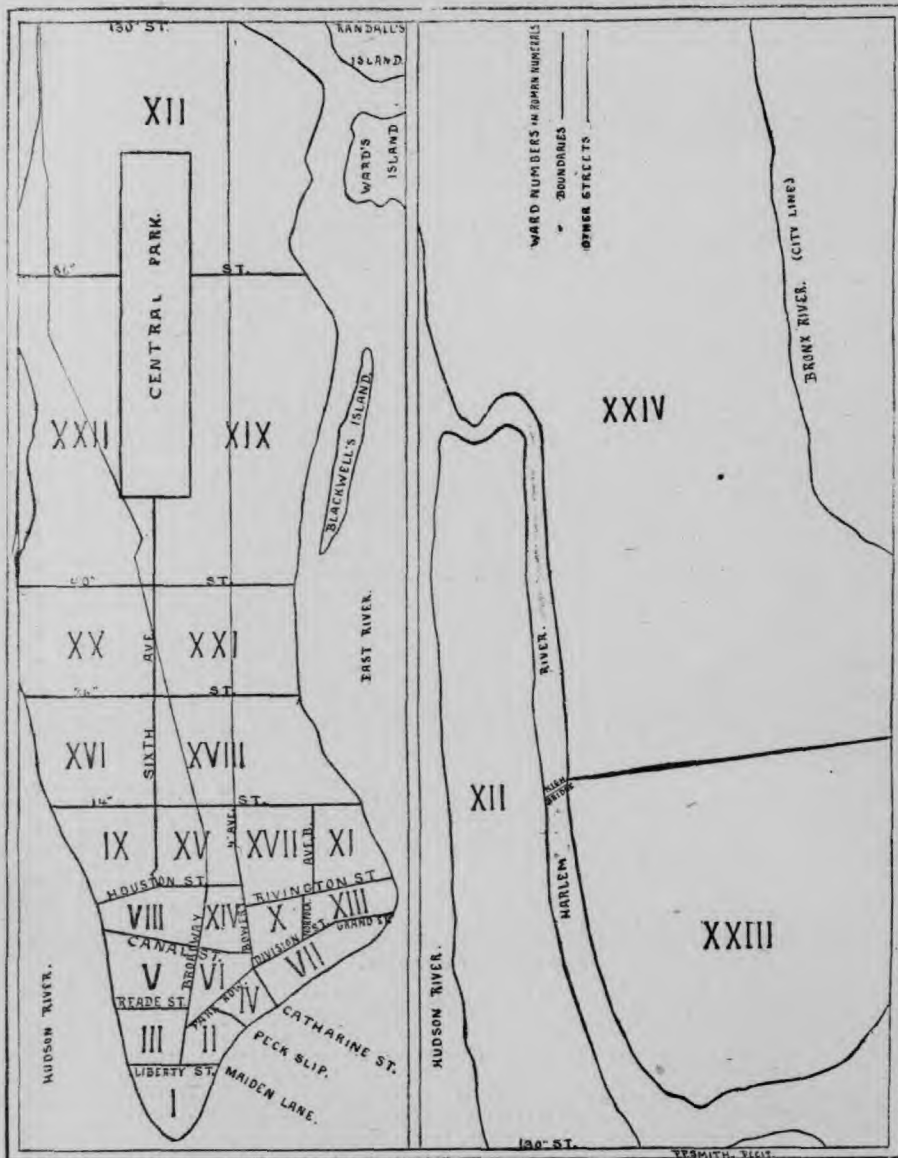

The 862 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.05, against 24.48 for the previous week and 28.01 for the corresponding week of 1892.

Contagious and infectious diseases increased very slightly, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and small-pox being respectively 104, 109, 183, 12, 13 and 8 against 119, 96, 185, 10, 5 and 9 for the previous week, a total of 429 against 424. Diphtheria increased markedly in the Twelfth, Thirteenth and Twentieth Wards, and decreased in the Seventh, Eleventh, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards. There was a marked increase of measles in the Eleventh, Twelfth, Eighteenth and Nineteenth Wards, while the decrease was chiefly in the Seventh, Thirteenth and Twenty-first Wards. The increase of scarlet fever was mainly in the Sixteenth, Nineteenth and Twenty-first Wards, and the decrease in the Ninth, Eleventh, Twelfth and Fourteenth Wards. Seven of the 12 cases of typhoid fever were below Fourteenth street and 8 of the 13 cases of typhus fever. Only 2 of the 8 cases of small-pox were below Fourteenth street.

The proposals must state the mines from which it is proposed to supply the coal (which is to be furnished from the mines named if accepted), and must state the price per ton of two thousand two hundred and forty (2,240) pounds.

The coal and wood must be delivered at the schools as follows: Two-thirds of the quantity of each between the fifteenth of May and the fifteenth of October, and the remainder as required by the Committee on Supplies; the contracts for supplying said coal and wood to be binding until the first day of May, eighteen hundred and ninety-four.
