The Finance Committee, as required by the By-laws, and in response to the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, presents herewith for the consideration of the Board, an estimate of the sums required on account of Public Instruction for the year 1895, the aggregate of which is five millions one hundred and sixty-seven thousand three hundred and sixty dollars and sixty dollars and sixty dollars and sixty dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$53,167,360.16), being an increase over the apportionment for 1894 of five hundred and thirty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$533,225.89).



The 765 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.28 against 19.56 for the previous week and 30.64 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox, being respectively 104, 11, 22, 26 and 7, against 108, 31, 28, 26 and 3 for the previous week, a total of 170 against 196. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh, Twentieth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. The decrease of measles was most marked in the Tenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eleventh and Sixteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Twentieth Wards. Sixteen of the 26 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 of the remaining 10 were below Fourteenth street. The cases of small-pox were all below Houston street,

No fat, lard or tallow shall be brought into the City of New York to be rendered or melted, and none is to be rendered or melted that has come from any place outside of said city, except as part of the living animal, and except such fat as is suitable for food purposes and is handled in accordance with the terms of a special permit in writing of this Board.
