The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Education :

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City and County of New York :

The Board of Education, as required by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, present herewith to your Honorable Body their estimate of the sums which will be required for the support of the public schools of this city for the year eighteen hundred and ninety-five (1895) :

To the Board of Education :

The Finance Committee, as required by the By-laws, and in response to the request of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, presents herewith for the consideration of the Board, an estimate of the sums required on account of Public Instruction for the year 1895, the aggregate of which is five millions one hundred and sixty-seven thousand three hundred and sixty dollars and sixteen cents (\$5,167,360.16), being an increase over the apportionment for 1894 of five hundred and thirty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-five dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$533,225.89).

Whereas, At a meeting of the Board of Police, held on June 29, 1894, a resolution was adopted for the investigation of the Police Department, and the trial of members of the force implicated by the testimony taken by the Senate Investigating Committee, and under said resolution the Board of Police had counsel assigned to it, and conducted an investigation in a thorough and conscientious attempt to remove evils existing in the Department ; and
Whereas, Such investigation was instituted and conducted during a recess of the said Senate Committee ; and

Whereas, In reply to an inquiry by the Board of Police, the Chairman of the said Senate Committee addressed a letter to the Superintendent of Police, dated June 7, 1894, wherein it was stated : " We are convinced that any investigation or trial of charges based upon testimony of witnesses who have been subpoenaed by the Committee, if now undertaken by the Police Commissioners, would hamper and prejudice the successful continuance of our investigation." * * *
" Any interference at this time, however laudable the motive, must necessarily and to a large extent impair the usefulness of the Senate Committee, and its ability to perform the service for which it was appointed " ; and

Whereas, In reply to another inquiry by the Police Board as to whether said Board should continue its investigation of the Department during the present session of this Committee, a communication has been received from said Committee, in which it is stated " that the matter has been considered by the Committee, and their unanimous conclusion is that upon all the facts and circumstances they have neither suggestions to make nor requests upon that subject " ; and

Whereas, The Board has no desire to hamper or prejudice the successful continuance of the investigation of said committee, or to impair the usefulness of the Senate Committee, or its ability to perform the service for which it was appointed ; therefore

Resolved, That in view of the statement contained in the communications from said Senate Committee, dated June 7 and September 12, 1894, the Board of Police discontinue, until the further action of the Board, the trials of members of the Police Force implicated by the evidence taken before said Senate Committee, and that the Superintendent of Police and Counsel to this Board be and they are hereby directed to continue the investigation, but in such a way and manner as in no wise to impair, hamper or prejudice the successful continuance of the investigation of said Senate Committee.

On motion of Commissioner Murray, the following were adopted :
Whereas, It has been published in the newspapers of this city that Officer Charles H. Webb, Fourth Precinct, arrested a peddler, William Mayston, who had appeared as a witness before the Senate Investigating Committee, for the purpose of intimidation ; and

Whereas, The Board of Police Commissioners wish to discountenance all attempts at intimidation, coercion or alleged annoyances of witnesses who may appear before said committee, and any and all efforts to hinder, hamper, retard or interfere with the full investigation of the Department by any member of the force ; therefore

Resolved, That the Superintendent of Police fully investigate the facts, circumstances and causes attending said arrest by Officer Charles H. Webb, and report the same to this Board ; and if, after such investigation by the Superintendent, the facts in his opinion warrant the presentment of charges against such officer, the Superintendent is directed to present the same.

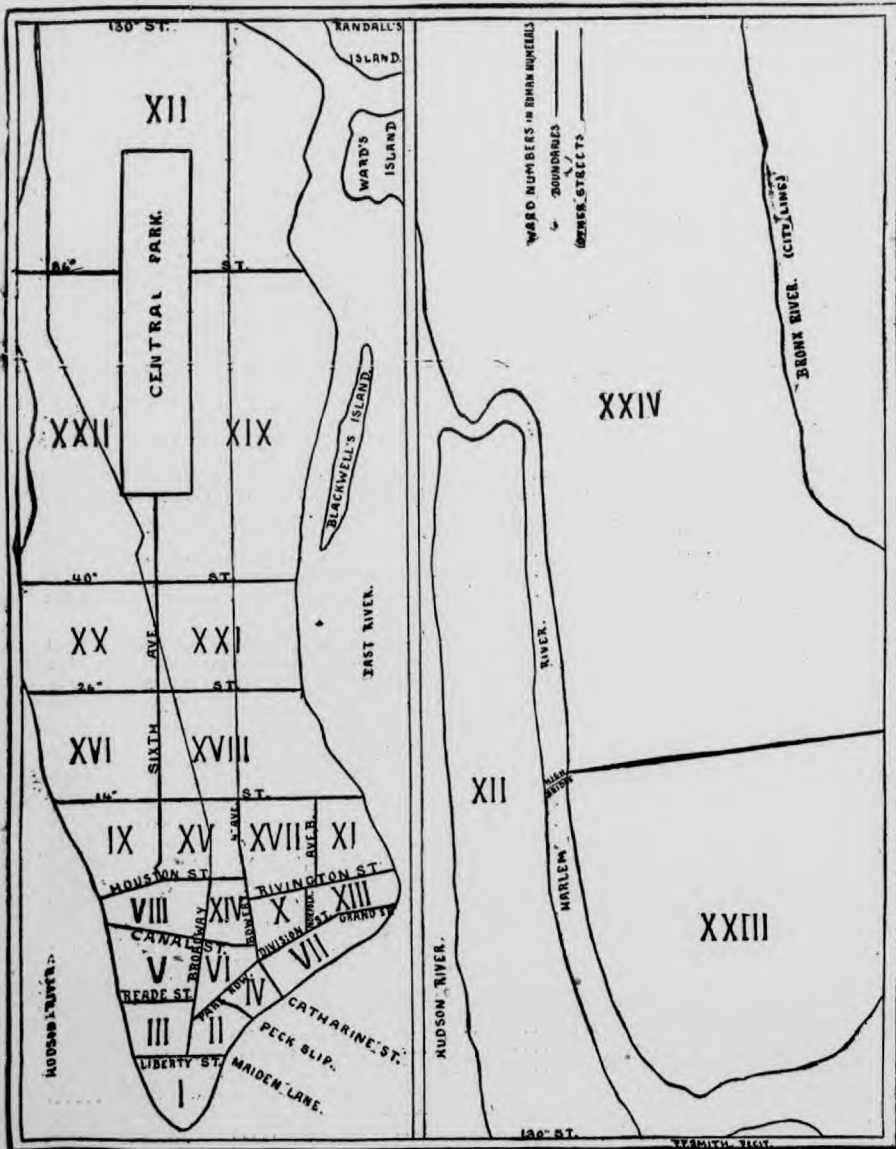

The 765 deaths represent a death-rate of 20.28 against 19.56 for the previous week and 30.64 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a considerable decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox, being respectively 104, 11, 22, 26 and 7, against 108, 31, 28, 26 and 3 for the previous week, a total of 170 against 196. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh, Twentieth and Twenty-third Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Nineteenth Wards. The decrease of measles was most marked in the Tenth Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Eleventh and Sixteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Tenth and Twentieth Wards. Sixteen of the 26 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 of the remaining 10 were below Fourteenth street. The cases of small-pox were all below Houston street.

avenue (all), Seventh avenue (Forty-second street to
Fifty-ninth street), Eighth avenue (Hudson street to
Fifty-ninth street), Lexington avenue (all), Madison
avenue (all), Fourteenth street (First avenue to Eighth
avenue), Twenty-third street (all), Thirty-fourth street
(East river to Tenth avenue), Forty-second street

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT
act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889),
which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in
the city, described in any grant of land under water,
from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing
covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to
pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets
shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement,
the Common Council may, by ordinance, require
the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and
the expense thereof to be assessed on the property
benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed
shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving,
repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and
discharge such owner from any and every covenant and
obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, con-
tained in the water grant under which the premises are
held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on
such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or
avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority
of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners
of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of
the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such
lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in
writing, specifying the ward number and street number
of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and
assigns, to be released from the obligation of such
covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be
thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and
thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns
shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to
pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot
in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable
to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give
the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the
Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or
lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are
forever released from all obligation under the grant in
respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in
front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment
for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Com-
mon Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made
thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants
can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is
authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and
when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be
paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their
desire and make their application to the Board of Alder-
men and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who
has no authority in the matter until directed by
ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the
pavement, repavement or repairs.

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional amendment of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Resolved, That section 86 of the Sanitary Code be amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 86. That no fat, tallow or lard shall be melted or rendered, except when fresh from the slaughtered animal, and taken directly from the places of slaughter in the City of New York, and in a condition free from sourness and taint and all other causes of offense at the time of rendering, and that all melting and rendering are to be in steam-tight vessels, the gases and odors therefrom to be destroyed by combustion or other means equally effective, and according to the best and most improved means and processes; and everything preceding, following and in connection with such melting and rendering, and the premises where the same shall be conducted, must be free from all offensive odor and other cause of detriment to the public health. No fat, lard or tallow shall be brought into the City of New York to be rendered or melted, and none is to be rendered or melted that has come from any place outside of said city, except as part of the living animal, and except such fat as is suitable for food purposes, and is handled in accordance with the terms of a special permit in writing of this Board.
