CITY OF NEW YORK, OFFICE OF THE MAYOR.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by law, I, Robert A. The Chairman then laid before the Municipal Assembly the following communication from the Department of Taxes and Assessments:

To the Municipal Assembly, The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—I transmit herewith one volume of the Assessment Roll of the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, containing installments of assessments for improvements up to and including those of 1901, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended by chapter 171 of the Laws of 1893 and chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899, which has been prepared by the Joint Finance Committees of the Council and the Board of Aldermen, and is now transmitted to you, under an opinion of the Corporation Counsel dated June 28, 1899, in order that a warrant may be issued for the collection of such installments in connection with the other taxes.

Which was referred to the Joint Committees on Finance.

Alderman Muh offered the following report of the Joint Committees on Finance.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly:

The Committees on Finance of the Council and the Board of Aldermen, to whom were referred the assessment-rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the

year 1901, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated May 31, 1901, transmitting the Budget for the year 1901, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts of the appropriations authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1901, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submit the following

REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1901 is ninety-eight million one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating two million six hundred and twenty thousand five hundred and sixty-eight dollars and sixty-two cents (\$2,620,568.62), and an item of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for the payment of the claim of James F. Carey, which under the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897 is to be levied upon the taxable property of the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, leaving eighty-seven million four hundred and seventy-five thousand eight hundred and forty-four dollars and eighty-one cents (\$87,475,844.81) as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rate of The City of New York.

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinct from city purposes. Compliance with this provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY PURPOSES BY ONE GENERAL RATE.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the Budget which is to be raised by taxation at an uniform rate throughout the whole city:

Total Budget less appropriation for claim of James F. Carey..... \$95,855,844.81
Less estimated revenues of the General Fund as certified by the Comptroller and deducted pursuant to section 247 of the Greater New York Charter..... 11,757,949.88

Net Budget to be collected by tax..... \$84,097,894.93
Less aggregate of county budgets to be severally raised in the respective counties as provided by section 902 of the Charter..... 10,620,568.62

Tax to be raised by a general rate throughout the city..... \$73,477,326.31

Percentage to be Added for Deficiencies in Collection.

Section 248 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the Municipal Assembly to include, in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied thereon."

Your Committee have conferred with the Department of Finance in regard to the amount that will be required to provide for and meet such deficiencies as may occur in the actual product of the taxes to be imposed and levied in and for the year 1901, and have concluded to recommend that two per centum (2%) of the amounts to be collected by taxation for State, city and county budgetary purposes be added to and included in the tax levy for this purpose, this being the same percentage adopted last year and almost exactly the figure which, having prevailed in The City of New York prior to consolidation for over twenty years, has been found by experience to offset with substantial accuracy the deficiencies in the product of the tax resulting from vacated and modified assessments, uncollectible personal taxes, etc., etc. This estimate assumes that the so-called Special Franchise assessments will be finally sustained by the Courts.

COUNTY CHARGES AND EXPENSES: THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

The county charges and expenses included in the Budget are as follows:

New York County..... \$7,658,704.81
Kings County..... 2,437,945.45
Queens County..... 363,804.71
Richmond County..... 160,050.62
Total..... \$10,620,568.62

It is to be noted that included in these amounts is the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties. Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202.—The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for state purposes, and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven of this article, other than for an organization tax, and as provided in chapter thirty-seven of the general laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations which are exempt from local taxation for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for county purposes.

On the other hand, in the County of Kings, certain property of the Pratt Institute is exempt from local taxation by chapter 398 of the Laws of 1887, but not exempt from taxation for State purposes. This makes it necessary to fix a rate of tax on the assessment of this institution (\$1,157,400) which will produce only its proportionate share of State taxes.

The assessment-rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Municipal Assembly on July 4, 1901, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which together, constitute New York County, and as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

The assessed valuation of the personal estate of corporations, joint stock companies or associations which have been found to be exempt under section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896 from taxation for State purposes in the year 1901, as appears by a detailed statement thereof on file in the Department of Finance, is as follows:

In the Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards of the Borough of Brooklyn the tax rates will be increased .88225882 per cent. and .44922917 per cent. respectively.

Your Committee recommend that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the amount of such rates be not varied beyond five figures, i. e. hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$281.49 in the whole tax levy of \$56,280,000.00.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the city, ward and county taxes, your Committee recommend that the aggregate thereof, or in other words, the total tax rates in each borough or ward, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1901. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Municipal Assembly.

SPECIAL ASSIGNMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 235 of the Laws of 1895, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewer improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The amount required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 344 of the Laws of 1888, for flagging improvements in the Thirtieth Ward of said borough (late the Town of New Utrecht).

Fifth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots Bonds is twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is thirty-three thousand seven hundred and seventy dollars and ninety-two cents (\$33,770.92); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is fifty-five thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and three cents (\$55,967.93); the amount of the Thirtieth Ward flagging tax is ten thousand and nine dollars and forty-six cents (\$10,046.46); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-four thousand five hundred and five dollars and fifty-four cents (\$34,505.54).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

The assessed valuation of property liable to taxation for general City purposes is \$3,786,813,473.00

—upon which the amount to be levied will be produced by a tax rate of 2.038620039 per cent.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS AFFECTING TAX RATE IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Under the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899, there must be raised by taxation the sum of one hundred and ninety-nine thousand four hundred and forty-two dollars and seventy-two cents (\$199,442.72) to provide for the deficiency resulting from the discharge of assessments for the improvement of Surf avenue. One-half of this amount is required to be assessed on the taxable property in the Borough of Brooklyn, and the other half on the taxable property in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough. A special tax rate of .0033487515 per cent. on the taxable property of the Borough of Brooklyn (\$747,046,343), will produce one-half of this deficiency, and a special tax rate of .882258862 per cent. on the taxable property of the Thirty-first Ward of said borough will produce the other half.

Under the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, there is also required to be raised by tax levied upon the taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) to provide for the claim of James F. Carey. A special tax rate of .00192920187 per cent. would produce this amount.

From the foregoing data it follows that the tax rates in the several boroughs and counties expressed in percentages will be made up as follows:

the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1901.

Be it Ordained by the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of seventy-five million six hundred and eighty-seven thousand eight hundred and ninety-four dollars and ninety-three cents (\$75,687,894.93), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1901, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City Debt, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1901, amounting in the aggregate to ninety-eight millions one hundred thousand four hundred and thirteen dollars and forty-three cents (\$98,100,413.43), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of ten millions six hundred and twenty thousand five hundred and sixty-eight dollars and sixty-two cents (\$10,620,568.62), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, including the State taxes due from said counties, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter, and the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for the payment of the claim of James F. Carey, which, under the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897, is to be assessed upon taxable property in the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn; and after also deducting the sum of eleven million seven hundred and eighty-seven thousand nine hundred and forty-nine dollars and eighty-eight cents (\$11,787,949.88), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York, in a communication dated May 31, 1901, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1901, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

CITY OF NEW YORK—DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE,
COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
May 31, 1901.

To the Honorable the Municipal Assembly:

Section 247 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said The City of New York to prepare and submit to the Municipal Assembly, at least four weeks before their annual meeting, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement, setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts by the City Treasury during the then current year, from all the sources of revenue of said general fund, including surplus revenues from the Sinking Fund, available in accordance with law, other than surplus revenues of the Sinking Fund for the payment of the City debt, and the said Municipal Assembly are hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which, by law, they are required to order, and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised, by tax only, the balance of said aggregate amount, after making such deduction."

Section 902 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the comptroller to the municipal assembly, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the county officers and the other county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings and Richmond, respectively, and the sum or sums which should be paid for like purposes by that part of Queens county included within the City; and the Municipal Assembly is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said counties and part of county, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of county officers and other county charges and expenses of such county or part of county; to the end that each of said counties and said part of Queens county shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses

necessary to be incurred within the county or part of county for county as distinguished from city purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law, I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statements, as follows:

1. The Budget, in detail, for the year 1901.
2. The amount of county charges and expenses in the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, included in said budget, and to be raised respectively by levy upon taxable property within each of said counties, as provided by said section 502 of the Charter.
3. Correspondence, showing the amounts to be levied on the taxable property in the Borough of Brooklyn and the Thirty-first Ward thereof (late Town of Gravesend), respectively, under the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899.
4. The estimated receipts of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation.

The attention of your Honorable Body is respectfully called to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, as follows:

"Section 248. It shall be the duty of the municipal assembly to include in any and every ordinance or resolution passed by them, imposing and levying taxes for any purpose or purposes authorized by law, such sum, in addition to the aggregate amount required for such purposes, as they shall deem necessary, not exceeding three per centum of said aggregate amount, to provide for deficiencies in the actual product of the amount imposed and levied therefor."

Your attention is also specially called to the provisions of section 500 of the same act, prescribing the method of preparing and disposing of the assessment rolls, and also to the provisions of section 511 of the same act, designating the first day of September as the date when the assessment rolls shall be finally completed, to be delivered to the Receiver of Taxes, with the proper warrant or warrants annexed thereto, directing him to collect the several sums mentioned in said rolls, and to pay the same, from time to time, when so collected, to the Chamberlain of said city.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller, The City of New York:

DEAR SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of February 4, 1901, in which you refer to the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899, for levying an assessment, one-half upon

the Borough of Brooklyn and one-half upon the Thirty-first Ward of that Borough, individually, for the purpose of providing for the deficiency caused by the discharge of certain assessments and installments of assessments for the grading, construction and improvement of Surf Avenue.

You say:

"It would seem to me that in order to provide for the collection of this deficiency it will be necessary for you to direct that the necessary additional columns be printed to the assessment rolls so that the deficiency may be extended in the same."

It was my opinion that the provision for this deficiency should be made in calculating the tax rate for the Borough and Ward affected, and in answer to my inquiry the Corporation Counsel has rendered an opinion in that effect, a copy of which is herewith inclosed.

SIR—I have received your communication of February 8, 1901, which reads as follows:

"May not one-half of the deficiency chargeable against the whole Borough be so charged in one item and thus increase the tax rate of that Borough?"

Further, may not the other half of the deficiency chargeable against the old Town of Gravesend be levied by the Board of Assessors, in an assessment roll prepared by them in the usual manner, and thus carry on the provisions of the act more properly than is incumbent on the assessment rolls with additional columns?"

In reply thereto I would say that chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899 provides for the discharge of all assessments and installments of assessments for the improvement of Surf Avenue upon the receipt of one-third part of the same originally assessed by the assessment continued April 15, 1891. Section 5 of the act sets forth the manner in which the deficiency thereby arising is to be met, to wit:

By the levying and raising of the same in the general taxes of The City of New York in the manner provided by law, one-half of said deficiency, or its charged and levied upon the taxable property of the late Town of Gravesend, now the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, and the remaining one-half to be charged and levied upon the taxable property in the Borough of Brooklyn.

No mention is made in the act of any additional columns to be shown by the assessment rolls. The charges authorized by the act are to be made a part of the general taxes of the city and are to be apportioned and levied in the same manner as such general taxes are apportioned and levied.

In answer to your first question then, I say that the deficiency chargeable against the whole Borough may be charged in one item, to be added to and become a part of the general tax and to be ratably distributed as a portion of said tax. The same answer will apply in that portion of the deficiency chargeable against the late Town of Gravesend. This deficiency is no longer to be considered as an assessment for a local improvement, but as a charge upon the property of the Borough of Brooklyn and upon the former Town of Gravesend in the respective proportions fixed by the act.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show the receipts of and disbursements from public moneys separately from the other receipts of and disbursements of all institutions, and all institutions so assisted, to be forwarded from time to time, in a form to be approved by the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the inspection and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payments for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commission of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commission of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whom care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and for infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$3 38

In addition to the sum of seventy-five million six hundred and eighty-seven thousand eight hundred and ninety-four dollars and ninety-three cents (\$75,687,894.93) imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, in and by the first section of this ordinance, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon said estates, to be raised, collected and paid according to law, two per cent. of said sum, or one million five hundred and thirteen thousand seven hundred and fifty-seven dollars and eighty-nine cents (\$1,513,757.89), the said amount being necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by the first section of this ordinance, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter.

Sec. 3. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, the sum of seven millions six hundred and fifty-eight thousand seven hundred and four dollars and eighty-four cents (\$7,658,704.84), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1901, including the quota of State taxes due from said county, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or one hundred and fifty-three thousand one hundred and seventy-four dollars and nine cents (\$153,174.09), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and

levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making the total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of New York, seven millions eight hundred and eleven thousand eight hundred and seventy-eight dollars and ninety-three cents (\$7,811,878.93).

Sec. 4. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings, the sum of two millions four hundred and thirty-seven thousand nine hundred and forty-five dollars and forty-five cents (\$2,437,945.45) to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1901, including the quota of State taxes due from said county, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or forty-eight thousand seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars and ninety cents (\$48,758.90), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter; and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county the sum of ninety-nine thousand seven hundred and twenty-one dollars and thirty-six cents (\$99,721.36) for the purpose of providing for that portion of the deficiency arising from the non-collection of the assessments for the grading, construction and improvement of Fort avenue in the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, which under the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899, is to be assessed and levied upon said estates within the said Borough of Brooklyn and County of Kings, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Kings of two millions five hundred and eighty-six thousand four hundred and twenty-five dollars and seventy-one cents (\$2,586,425.71).

Sec. 5. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, the sum of three hundred and sixty-three thousand eight hundred and sixty-one dollars and seventy-one cents (\$363,860.71), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1901, including the quota of State taxes due from said county, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or seven thousand two hundred and seventy-seven dollars and twenty-three cents (\$7,277.23), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Queens, of three hundred and seventy-one thousand one hundred and thirty-eight dollars and ninety-four cents (\$371,137.94).

Sec. 6. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, the sum of one hundred and forty thousand and fifty-six dollars and sixty-two cents (\$140,556.62), to pay the expenses and charges of said county for the year 1901, including the quota of State taxes due from said county, and there shall also be and there is hereby imposed and levied upon said estates within said county two per cent. of said sum or three thousand two hundred and one dollar and thirteen cents (\$3,201.13), which last-stated sum is imposed as necessary for the purpose of providing for deficiencies in the actual product of the taxes imposed and levied by this section, pursuant to the provisions of section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, and making a total sum imposed and levied by this section upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation, of and within the County of Richmond, of one hundred and forty-three thousand two hundred and fifty-seven dollars and seventy-five cents (\$143,757.75).

Sec. 7. In addition to the taxes imposed by the fourth section of this ordinance upon the estates, real and personal, of and within the County of Kings, there shall be and there is hereby imposed upon the estates, real and personal, of and within the Thirty-first Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, the sum of ninety-nine thousand seven hundred and twenty-one dollars and thirty-six cents (\$99,721.36), being that portion of the deficiency arising from the non-collection of the assessments for the grading, construction and improvement of Fort avenue in said Thirty-first Ward, which under the provisions of chapter 522 of the Laws of 1899 is to be levied and assessed upon said estates; and there shall also be and there is hereby levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, of and within the Thirty-second Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, the sum of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), to pay the claim of James F. Carey, audited and allowed at said sum, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 525 of the Laws of 1897.

Sec. 9. The rates of tax upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, and the several counties and boroughs included within said city are, for the purpose of carrying out and making effective the foregoing sections of this ordinance, hereby fixed for the year 1901, as follows:

I. In the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (being also the County of New York), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.122 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.31733 per centum.

II. In the Borough of Brooklyn (being also the County of Kings), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations, as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes, 2.20112; on the estates not subject to local taxation, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 398 of the Laws of 1897, 1.874 per centum; and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.35853 per centum, excepting, however, in the Thirty-first and Thirty-second Wards of said Borough (County of Kings) wherein the rates of tax upon the said all other estates shall be as follows: in the said Thirty-first Ward 3.27376 per centum, and in the said Thirty-second Ward 2.43784 per centum.

III. In the Borough of Queens (being also the County of Queens), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes 2.17909 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.35702 per centum.

IV. In the Borough of Richmond (being also the County of Richmond), on the personal estates of such corporations, joint stock companies or associations as are by law exempt from taxation thereon for State purposes 2.16292 per centum, and upon all other estates, real and personal, 2.35101 per centum.

Sec. 10. In addition to the sums mentioned in the preceding sections of this ordinance, to be levied and imposed upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation according to law, of and within The City of New York, there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-sixth Ward (late Town of New Lots) of the Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward improved by flagging, guttering, curbing and paving under authority of chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purposes, the sum of twenty-six thousand eight hundred and ninety-two dollars and twenty-two cents (\$26,892.22), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in the proportion of benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Commission charged with making said improvements; there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by the construction of sewers authorized by chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and the amendments thereto, the sum of thirty-three thousand seven hundred and seventy dollars and ninety-two cents (\$33,770.92), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined by the Board of Street and Sewer Commissioners of said town and its successors; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirty-first Ward (late Town of Gravesend) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward benefited by local improvements, for which the unpaid assessments heretofore levied in said town exceeding the sum of one hundred dollars are, under the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, and the amendments thereto, to be levied in forty annual installments, the sum of fifty-five thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and three cents (\$55,967.03), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land in proportion to the benefit derived, as heretofore fixed and determined; and there shall be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Thirtieth Ward (late Town of New Utrecht) in said Borough of Brooklyn, bounded by that part of any street, avenue or highway in said ward, improved by flagging, under authority of chapter 544 of the Laws of 1888, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on bonds issued for the above purpose, the sum of ten thousand and nine dollars and forty-six cents (\$10,009.46), as the same has been apportioned and assessed by the Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments on each lot, piece or parcel of land situated in the flagging districts established by the Flagging Commissioners of said town; and there shall also be and is hereby imposed upon the real estate in the Twenty-ninth Ward (late Town of Flatbush) in said Borough of Brooklyn, situated within the districts of assessment fixed and determined by the Board of Assessors of The City of New York, for the improvement of Flatbush avenue under authority of chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894, for the purpose of meeting the principal and interest on the bonds issued for said improvement, the sum of thirty-four thousand five hundred and five dollars and fifty-four cents (\$34,505.54), as the same has been apportioned

and assessed by said Board of Assessors, in each lot, piece or parcel of land lying within the boundary lines of said assessment districts.
