STATED MEETING.

Tuesday, May 2, 1905, 1 o'clock P. M.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 1676.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor, May 1, 1905.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, without my approval, a resolution passed by your Honorable Board on the 18th of April, 1905, requesting the Department of Docks and Ferries to take steps for the acquisition of property for a recreation pier in the neighborhood of Red Hook, Borough of Brooklyn.

It is provided by this resolution that the Department of Docks and Ferries be requested to take steps, under section 1822 of the Greater New York Charter, to

acquire, for a recreation pier and other beneficent purposes, certain property in the neighborhood of Red Hook, Borough of Brooklyn.

The reference to section 1822 of the Greater New York Charter is manifestly an error, there being no such section of the Charter. The section intended is evidently section 822, which provides for the acquisition of water front property by the City.

The Committee on Docks and Ferries, to whom was referred on March 21, 1905 (Minutes, page 1289), the annexed resolution in favor of requesting the Department of Docks to acquire certain property in the Borough of Brooklyn for use for recreation pier, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

Whereas, The neighborhood of Red Hook, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, has become and is a thickly congested section, and by reason of the heavy private shipping there, has no present parks or healthy places which are so necessary for the good health and happiness of especially the women and children of the crowded City districts; and

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen is ever on the watch to increase the welfare and well being of the people of our City; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Department of Docks and Ferries be and it is hereby respectfully requested to take steps under section 1822 of Greater New York Charter to acquire, if it can reasonably do so, for a recreation pier and other beneficial purposes, the following described property:

Beginning at a point in the northwesterly line of Conover street distant twenty (20) feet southwesterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southwesterly line of the strip of land formerly called and hereinafter designated as Reid street, with the northwesterly line of Conover street; running thence northwesterly on a line parallel with Reid street eighty (80) feet; thence northwesterly on a line parallel with Conover street twenty (20) feet to the southwesterly line of Reid street; thence again northwesterly along the southwesterly line of Reid street one hundred and fourteen (114) feet five (5) inches to Divine Buch's land or shipyard; thence westwardly along the line of said Buch's land or shipyard four hundred and forty (440) feet five (5) inches to the outer line of sea wall or breakwater or pier of Gowanus Bay, Basin Number I., as established by law; thence southerly along the outer line of said sea wall, three hundred and fifty-two (352) feet eight (8) inches to the land now or late of Lydia S. Cutting, executrix and trustee under the last will and testament of Heyward Cutting, deceased; thence northeasterly along said land three hundred and twenty-one (321) feet two (2) inches to a point which is distant southwesterly two hundred and forty-six (246) feet from the southwesterly side of Reid street, measured on a line at right angles thereto, and northwesterly one hundred and seven (107) feet from the northwesterly line of Conover street on a line measured at right angles thereto; thence southeasterly parallel with Reid street and still along said land, one hundred and seven (107) feet to the northwesterly line of Conover street; and thence northeasterly along the northwesterly line of Conover street, two hundred and twenty-six (226) feet to the point or place of beginning.

Together with the dock or bulkhead upon the above mentioned and described premises, and all the water rights, privileges which may now or hereinafter appertain or belong to the same as authorized and permitted by law.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—The request for the issue of bonds, herein referred to, is due primarily to the fact that, while this Department asked for an appropriation for "Supplies and Contingencies," for 1905, of \$395,550, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment only allowed \$308,000, thus reducing the amount required by \$87,550, or 22.13 per cent.

On January 1, 1904, the Department inventories at the Storehouse and the various institutions showed the value of \$66,113.96, or 20.8 per cent. of the amount granted for 1904, viz.: \$319,428.86, which is about the usual rate.

On January 1, 1905, the total amount of the Departmental Inventory was \$44,426.71, or 14.36 per cent. of the sum granted for 1905, viz.: \$308,000, or 6.44 per cent. less of a working capital than the Department should have had. This is one item which was not considered in the grant for 1905, and which should have been added, thus increasing the \$308,000 by \$13,675.20.

It is impossible to conduct the administration of this Department on the amount granted for "Supplies," \$308,000, which is, in round figures, \$11,500 less than was allowed for the preceding year. This can be most readily and convincingly demonstrated by the excessive increase in the census during the first three months of the present year, as compared with that of the year 1904.

The average daily census of the inmates for 1904 was 2,881, while that of January, February and March, 1905, is 3,774, an increase over 1904 of 893, or 31 per cent.

If we assume the normal growth of census to be, as it has been in the past, between five and seven per cent., we have an excess this year of twenty-four per cent., for which no provision could have been made, since it was not possible to foresee such a condition.

The amount required for supplies for this twenty-four per cent. increase would be \$73,920, which must be added to the appropriation for 1905; to this must be also added the above calculated shortage in working capital of \$13,675.20, making in all \$87,595.20 to conduct satisfactorily, and without causing suffering to the unfortunate inmates, the business of this Department.

The very severe winter through which we have just passed, and which resulted in the overcrowding of every hospital in this city, has probably produced this enormous growth of census, and, while the coming summer will certainly reduce the present number of inmates, experience has demonstrated that a figure of census once reached will again be attained. As we expect this to become a reality during the fall and winter of 1905, unless the issue of the bonds herewith requested of at least \$65,000 for "Supplies and Contingencies" be granted, the Department will contemplate the future with great apprehension.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor and Chairman, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Sir—On March 16, last, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$250,000, for the purchase of two (2) boats for the use of Fire Department. The application of this Department, however, was for \$375,000, to cover the purchase of three (3) fireboats. After the executive session of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the said date, announcement was made to the effect that the Corporate Stock to cover the purchase of the third fireboat was not authorized, in order to consider the advisability of purchasing one larger boat or two smaller boats, and the representative of this Department was instructed to present to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a statement of the reasons that would seem to justify the choice of one boat instead of two.

Pursuant to such direction, I beg to present the following reasons that seem to make it advisable to prefer the larger boat.

It is proposed that the larger boats have a water-line of about 125 feet. This length affords room enough to equip with the great essential of good boiler power, with twin screw engines, and so far as possible, with twin plant, in order to minimize the danger of the boat being put temporarily out of service. The larger boat also has very much greater manoeuvring power.

If the appropriation of \$125,000 for one boat is divided in order to purchase two, the two boats combined would have much less efficiency than the one single boat. The weight of the hull of the two boats combined would be much greater than that of the single boat; the speed would be greatly reduced, and the pumping capacity would have to be reduced considerably more than half for each boat. A small boat would not be as effective in pushing its way through ice or in making speed in bad weather. If twin screws were used in the smaller boats, the force required in handling the machinery would be as great in each boat as in the larger boat, with the exception of an additional Fireman, so that the cost of maintenance of the two boats and the general expense, including repairs, would be very much greater. The boats now in service are small enough to subserve all the purposes for which small boats should be secured.

On account of the additional cost of the twin screw boat over the single screw, it would be found impracticable to purchase two smaller boats with twin screws for the sum of \$125,000. There can be no doubt of the greater facility of controlling a large boat with twin screws as contrasted with a smaller boat with a single screw. Furthermore, the draft of such larger boat would not materially exceed the draft of such smaller boats.

As between the larger and the smaller boats, the efficiency of the machinery and the durability of it would be much greater in the larger plant than in the smaller. The above statement is the foundation for the opinion that the larger boat should be procured. This conclusion has been arrived at after discussion with experts, and after mature deliberation.

I therefore renew my application for an additional boat of the larger pattern, and ask for the authorization of an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of \$125,000 to cover its purchase.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000), to provide means for the construction and equipment of fire-boats for the use of the Fire Department of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 28, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000), for the purpose of providing means for the construction and equipment of fire-boats for the use of the Fire Department of The City of New York, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding one hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$125,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Sir—In compliance with your order of this A. M., I have the honor to submit the following report, showing necessary repairs required to department buildings, with approximate cost thereof (roughly estimated), and, with your approval, will prepare and submit specifications, showing in detail the nature of work required to place buildings in a clean and sanitary condition, at which time a close approximate cost will be presented.

The First, Seventh, Eighth, Twelfth, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, Twenty-eighth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-second Precinct stations should be steam heated throughout, to replace the present antiquated and unsatisfactory method of heating by stoves. This will cost approximately the sum of \$50,000.

The Second, Twentieth, Twenty-first, Twenty-second, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-eighth, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-seventh, Forty-fifth, Forty-third, Forty-fourth, Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth, Forty-ninth, Fifty-first, Fifty-second, Fifty-third, Fifty-fourth, Fifty-fifth, Fifty-sixth, Fifty-seventh, Fifty-eighth, Fifty-ninth, Sixtieth, Sixty-first, Sixty-second, Sixty-third, Sixty-fourth, Sixty-fifth, Sixty-sixth, Sixty-seventh, Sixty-ninth, Seventy-fourth, Seventy-sixth (and two subs), Seventy-seventh, Seventy-eighth, Seventy-ninth (and sub), Eightieth (and two subs), and Eighty-third Precinct stations, exterior of Twenty-ninth and Thirteenth Precincts, portion of House of Detention, should have plastering and woodwork repaired (considerable metal ceiling provided), and be painted two or three-coat work (as may be required).

This work will cost approximately the sum of \$80,000.

Defective brick wall at Seventh Precinct Prison, defective brick work of Fifth-seventh Precinct Prison and stable, alterations to upper portion of Eighteenth Precinct Prison, to provide quarters for female prisoners, for which new modern steel cells, etc., must be provided, the building of brick retaining-wall at rear of Thirty-fourth Precinct Station, frame extension to Sixty-sixth Precinct Station to provide additional room for station-house purposes, the repairing of certain other defective masonry of Department buildings now in view, would cost approximately \$20,000.

Extensive new plumbing installation is required at several stations, particularly to the First, Seventh, Tenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Twenty-second, Thirtieth, Fifteenth and Sixty-third Precincts, which with less extensive work at several other stations will require an additional \$25,000.

The appropriation of this sum and judicious expenditure of same would result in placing Department buildings, upon the whole, in a clean, sanitary and comfortable condition, and in a large measure, make good the condition largely due to the utterly inadequate appropriations of former years.

With few exceptions, none of the stations mentioned above have been painted since "consolidation" (1889), and many of them have not been painted for upwards of ten or fifteen years. Not only in the matter of painting, but in plumbing work, steam heating, etc., the work has been retarded or neglected for years owing to lack of funds, and no matter how intelligently and economically the appropriation has been expended, it has been impossible to do little more than maintain a fair state of repair, leaving little means for new installation or progressive work.

After an interview with the Inspector in charge of the repairs and supplies at the Police Department, and also personal knowledge of the condition of the station-houses in The City of New York, all the additional work, alterations and repairs noted in a general way are necessary and should be made in order to place the buildings in clean, sanitary and comfortable condition, but, in my opinion, only \$82,000 of the amount, \$175,000, requested could properly be chargeable to a bond account, namely:	\$50,000 00

Sir—I request that your Board recommend to the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, that the salaries of certain members of the clerical and uniformed forces of this Department be fixed at the amounts specified in the accompanying resolution.

Inviting attention to the fact that these increases in pay to employees of the Department of Street Cleaning in the uniformed force were recommended in 1902, in the shape of a bill which was forwarded to Albany, and in 1903 in the same form, which bill, being coupled with the request for the placing of the cognizance and control of the sprinkling and the sanding of the streets with the Department of Street Cleaning, was defeated, it is now deemed wise to submit this same measure under the provisions of section 56 of the Charter. In each of the cases where this increase of pay is recommended by the Department of Street Cleaning, these recommendations are made for long and faithful service and added responsibilities.

This recommendation includes the creation of a new position for an additional Apothecary at \$1,200 a year, so that the total increase in the salaries in these thirteen places is \$6,750.

I would recommend further that inasmuch as at the present time there is no grade in the position of Stenographer and Typewriter in this Department between the compensation of \$1,050 per annum and \$1,500, grades be established for annual compensations of \$1,200 and \$1,350.

As this recommendation was deemed wise in 1902 and concurred in in 1903 and in 1904, it has become more distinctly wise in 1905, because of the greatly increased amount of work which is thrown upon the various members of both the clerical and uniformed forces. The amount of labor is shown by the greatly increased amount of material handled and removed and the additional number of miles of streets swept, and the accounting incident to the purchasing of all material by public letting, together with the natural growth of the Department, renders it not only desirable but a just compensation for the service rendered.

Sir—In regard to the request of Commissioner Woodbury, of the Department of Street Cleaning, that the salaries of certain employees in the uniformed and clerical

forces of that Department be fixed at amounts specified in the resolution accompanying said request, which matter was referred to me for investigation, I beg to report as follows:

Excerpts from the Greater New York Charter.

Section 536 of the Greater New York Charter reads in part as follows:
" * * * The annual salaries and compensations of the members of the uniformed force of the Department of Street Cleaning shall not exceed the following:
" Of the General Superintendent..... \$3,000 00
" Of the Assistant Superintendent..... 2,500 00
" Of the Master Mechanic..... 1,800 00
" Of the Superintendent of Final Disposition..... 2,000 00
" Of the Assistant Superintendent of Final Disposition..... 1,500 00
" Of the District Superintendents, each..... 1,800 00 "

The position of Superintendent of Stables, whose present salary is \$2,000, is also included in the uniformed force, although not mentioned in the Charter. This position, I am told, was created by Civil Service Commission, and resolution of the Board of Aldermen, approved by the Mayor.

Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter reads in part:

" * * * It shall be the duty of the Board of Aldermen, upon the recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to fix the salary of every officer or person whose compensation is paid out of the City Treasury, other than day laborers and teachers, examiners and members of the supervising force of the Department of Education, irrespective of the amount fixed by this act, except that no change shall be made in the salary of any elected officer or head of Department during his tenure of office."
" District Superintendent in Charge, Borough of Brooklyn..... \$3,000 00
and " District Superintendent in Charge, Borough of The Bronx..... 2,500 00 "

The title of these positions appearing upon the pay-rolls and recognized by the Civil Service Commission is "District Superintendent," and the affix "In charge, Borough of _____" is given by the Commissioner, in accordance with that portion of Rule 6 of the Civil Service Commission, which reads as follows:

" To define more exactly the duties of particular positions, or to fix such positions in the peculiar organization of a Department or office, appropriate sub-titles, or "office titles," may be employed, in the discretion of the head of such Department or office or of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; but such sub-titles need not appear either on the roster or on any pay-roll."

The number of District Superintendents is 21 and their salaries at present are \$1,800 per annum each, both of which are fixed by section 536 of the Charter.

From the foregoing rule, and in view of the fact that the pay-roll of District Superintendent can legally be passed by the Civil Service Commission at any salary fixed in accordance with section 56 of the Charter, it, of course, follows that the number of District Superintendents in Charge, Borough of Brooklyn or Borough of The Bronx, when salary is fixed, is entirely within the discretion of the Commissioner.

From the Commissioner's request, addressed to his Honor the Mayor, as Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it appears, however, that the promotions under this title contemplated at the present time, are for but one District Superintendent in Charge, Borough of Brooklyn, from \$1,800 to \$3,000, and one District Superintendent in Charge, Borough of The Bronx, from \$1,800 to \$2,500, or, in other words, a total increase of but \$1,900.

Apothecary, Proposed Salaries, \$1,200 and \$1,500.

According to the Civil list there is but one Apothecary in the Department of Street Cleaning. He was appointed on October 4, 1899, and his present salary is \$900. I am unable to find any other Apothecary employed by the City under that title. According to letter of Commissioner Woodbury "This recommendation includes the creation of a new position for an additional Apothecary at \$1,200 a year. * * * * *

Typewriting Copyist, Proposed Salary, \$1,350.

Comparatively speaking there are not many Typewriting Copyists in the City's service. Those in the Finance Department receive salaries of \$750 per annum, and those in the Tenement House Department receive salaries of \$750 and \$900.

Stenographer and Typewriter, Proposed Salaries, \$1,200 and \$1,350.

According to letter of the Commissioner there are at present no salaries in the Department of Street Cleaning for Stenographer and Typewriter between \$1,050 and \$1,500. By establishing grades at the salaries asked the Commissioner will be enabled to make increases or promotions of \$150 or \$300 each instead of \$450.

The salaries of Stenographers and Typewriters in other City Departments range from \$750 to \$1,500 per annum.

In Conclusion.

An examination of the salaries account of the Department of Street Cleaning indicates, and I am also informed by Deputy Commissioner Gibson, that the appropriation as made for 1905 is sufficient to provide for the proposed promotions.

In submitting this report I desire to say that, while the statements contained herein are accurate, they cannot, in my judgment, be used as an absolute guide in determining whether or not a salary should be fixed, as requested. For instance, this report shows that there are no Law Clerks in the employ of the City who receive a salary of \$3,300, nevertheless there may be and no doubt are employees of the City whose work is similar to that of the Law Clerk in the Department of Street Cleaning, and whose salaries are as large and possibly larger than \$3,300, but whose position is classified under a different title. On the other hand, it is possible that no member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can tell, from his own knowledge, just what the duties of Law Clerk in the Department of Street Cleaning are.

Therefore the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has to depend to a very large extent upon the intelligence and integrity of the head of the department making the request.

In his letter to his Honor the Mayor Commissioner Woodbury states:

"In each of the cases where this increase of pay is recommended by the Department of Street Cleaning these recommendations are made for long and faithful service and added responsibilities."

Assistant Engineer.

The position of Assistant Engineer has been in existence in the Department since 1895 and has always been filled, with the exception of a short period in 1902, when the then incumbent of the position was promoted to that of Superintendent of Parks. The present incumbent was appointed from an eligible list on September 17, 1900, as Inspector of Masonry, and his pay fixed at \$4 per diem. He entered an examination for promotion to the position of Assistant Engineer, passed the examination and was certified to the Department for appointment August 21, 1903, and his pay fixed by former Commissioner Young at \$5 per diem. In consideration of the additional service rendered by him during the illness of the Superintendent of Parks, and in view of the fact that the pay of the Assistant Engineer has usually been \$2,400 per annum, his pay was increased on January 1, 1905, to \$6.57 per diem—practically \$2,400 per annum—which amount he is now being paid.

Rodman.

The present incumbent was transferred to this Department on June 13, 1903, from the Rapid Transit Commission at \$3.30 per day. He subsequently passed a number of Civil Service examinations of a higher grade, and was certified to various subdivisions of the municipal government, the appointments being declined (one of which was to the Aqueduct Commission at the rate of \$1,800 per annum with the title of Assistant Civil Engineer) upon my promise to increase his pay and make it \$1,500 per year. His pay was subsequently, on February 18, 1905, fixed at \$4.11 per diem, an equivalent of \$1,500 per annum, the amount which he now receives.

Stenographer.

The present Stenographer was appointed to this Department on June 1, 1902, as Confidential Stenographer to Commissioner Young at \$1,050 per year. Her name at that time was on an eligible list of Stenographers and was certified to the Borough President's office and the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. She declined appointment. On July 1, 1904, she resigned the position of Confidential Stenographer and was appointed by me from the eligible list at \$4 per diem, which amount she is now being paid, approximately \$1,500 per annum.

Telephone Operator.

The present incumbent was certified by the Civil Service Commission and appointed by me March 1, 1904, at the rate of \$2 per diem, which amount she is now being paid.

Keeper of Menagerie.

The present Keeper of the Menagerie was certified to this Department under the above title by the Civil Service Commission and appointed by Commissioner Young April 1, 1902, at the rate of \$3.50 per diem, which amount he is now being paid.

Stationary Engineer.

The present incumbent was appointed from an eligible list by Commissioner Young under date of June 29, 1903, and his pay fixed at the rate of \$3.50 per day, which amount he has been paid ever since.

Second Grade Clerk.

The present incumbent was appointed Office Boy under date of June 11, 1901, and his pay fixed at eighty-four cents per day. He passed an examination for promotion to Junior Clerk September 27, 1902, and was appointed to that position at \$1.25 per day, which was increased October 5, 1903, to \$1.75 per day. On August 6, 1904, he was appointed by me to the position of Second Grade Clerk after passing a Civil Service examination, and his pay was fixed at \$3 per day, the amount which he now receives.

This request is based upon my belief that it is impracticable to have this work done by contract at public letting. It is advisable to have the work done at shops located in the vicinity of the park stables to save time and in order that the use of the horses may be least interfered with.

The matter being one of importance, I will appreciate it if you will secure for this matter the earliest attention.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

ORIGINAL ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE relating to the removing of snow and ice from the sidewalks in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and the duties of the Corporation Counsel and the Street Cleaning Department in collecting the penalties for the violations of this ordinance.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter any person, persons, estate, estates, corporation or corporations owning or having vested title to any lot or building or buildings within the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, only where the streets are paved with improved pavement, shall cause to be removed within twenty-four hours from the sidewalk, or walks in front of any such lot or lots, building or buildings, all falling of snow or forming of ice on such sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings.

Sec. 2. Hereafter any person or persons, estate, estates, corporation or corporations owning or having vested title to any land, lands, building or buildings, failing to remove the falling of any snow, or the forming of any ice on the sidewalk or walks in front of any lot or lots, building or buildings, within twenty-four hours, shall be subject to the penalty of the sum of five dollars for each and every day said snow or ice remains on such sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Street Cleaning Department of The City of New York to cause all sidewalks in front of any lot or lots, building or buildings to be cleaned of all snow and ice twenty-four hours after the falling of any snow or the forming of any ice on said sidewalk or walks, in front of any lot, lots, building or buildings, within the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, only where the streets are paved with improved pavement.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Street Cleaning Department to cause to be made a list of the names of the owner or owners, or if the names of the owners cannot be ascertained, the street number, if any, or in case there is no street number the block and section number, or an accurate description by street or avenues on which said lot, lots, building or buildings are located; said list shall immediately be sent to the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York.

Sec. 5. The Corporation Counsel of The City of New York shall immediately cause to be filed in the Department of Taxes and Arrears a statement showing the amount due and costs of the penalty for the violation of this ordinance; and it shall be the duty of the Collector of Taxes of The City of New York to collect said penalty and costs against each and every owner of any lot, lots, building or buildings within the boroughs hereinbefore mentioned.

Sec. 6. The amount due for the penalty and costs for the violations of this ordinance shall remain a lien on any lot, lots, building or buildings until paid; any streets and avenues opened according to law and title thereto vested in the Corporation of The City of New York, shall be affected by this ordinance.

Sec. 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AMENDED ORDINANCE.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the removal of snow and ice from the sidewalks in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and the duties of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning with respect thereto.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Every owner, agent or lessee, having charge of any building or lot within the Boroughs of Manhattan or The Bronx shall, within four hours after the fall of any snow shall have ceased, and within four hours after the formation of any ice, cause such snow and ice to be removed from the sidewalks in front of such premises; provided that when such snow shall have ceased falling or such ice shall have been formed between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and five o'clock in the following morning, it shall be deemed a compliance with this ordinance if such snow or ice shall be so removed before nine o'clock of such following morning.

Every twenty-five front feet or fraction thereof shall be deemed a lot within the meaning of this section.

Sec. 2. Every such owner, agent, or lessee, who shall fail to remove such snow and ice within the time provided in section 1 of this ordinance, shall be liable to a penalty of three dollars for each and every such failure, except as hereinafter provided in section 3 of this ordinance, such penalty to be recovered in an action by The City of New York.

Sec. 3. Whenever the snow or ice upon such sidewalk shall be so congealed that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, such owner, agent, or lessee shall within the time designated in section 1 hereof, cause the sidewalk to be strewn and kept strewn with ashes or sand, and shall as soon thereafter as the weather may permit, thoroughly clean such sidewalk, under the penalty of two dollars for each and every failure to comply with the provisions of this section.

Sec. 4. Whenever any such owner, agent or lessee shall fail so to remove such snow and ice, as hereinbefore provided, it shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning forthwith to cause such snow and ice to be removed from such sidewalks.

Said Commissioner shall thereupon ascertain and certify to the Comptroller of The City of New York the expenditure incurred in the removal of such snow and ice from the sidewalk in front of each particular lot, and the amount of such expenditure shall be repaid to the fund from which the payments therefor were made, whenever a deficiency exists in said fund by reason of such expenditure.

Said Commissioner shall also, as soon as practicable after such removal of snow and ice from such sidewalks, certify to the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York the amount of his expenditure with respect to each piece of property, with a description of said property, as assessed on the last preceding assessment-roll, together with the name of the owner, agent or lessee having charge thereof, wherever it is practicable to obtain such name.

The said Corporation Counsel is hereby authorized and directed to sue for and recover from any such owner, agent or lessee the amount of such expense, together with the costs of the action.

Sec. 5. All amounts collected as penalties for the violation of this ordinance and for the expenses referred to in section 4 of this ordinance shall be placed to the credit of the Department of Street Cleaning, to cover any deficiency arising from the expenditure incurred by said Commissioner in removing the snow and ice from such sidewalks.

Sec. 6. The provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to any streets or avenues not opened according to law, or the title to which is vested in the Corporation of The City of New York.

Sec. 7. All ordinances or parts of ordinances conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to which was referred on April 25, 1905 (Minutes, page 241), the annexed communication and resolution in favor of granting to the New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company the right to lay, maintain and operate two railroad tracks in Eleventh avenue and West Thirty-ninth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed terms and conditions, as fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, are equitable, and they therefore recommend that the said resolution, as contained in said communication, be adopted.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment having received from the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to a resolution of such Board adopted December 20, 1904, and approved by the Mayor December 30, 1904, a proposed consent of the corporation of The City of New York to the use of a part of Eleventh avenue and of West Thirty-ninth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and operating thereon two railroad tracks by the New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, does hereby, pursuant to the Greater New York Charter, fix the terms and conditions of the proposed consent, and the money value of such privilege or rights proposed, as follows:

I. Said consent shall be for a term not exceeding ten years from the granting of said consent, said consent being revocable at the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen, and by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as hereinafter provided.

II. The New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first five years the annual sum of \$1,560.60.

During the second five years the annual sum of \$1,638.68, after which the consent, unless sooner revoked, shall expire by limitation.

III. The resolution granting such consent or right should be in substance, as to the terms and conditions of such consent, in the words and figures following:

Resolved, That the consent of the Corporation of The City of New York be and the same is hereby given to the New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, a corporation, to lay, maintain and operate two (2) railroad tracks in Eleventh avenue and West Thirty-ninth street, as shown and indicated upon the map marked "Map showing proposed tracks in Eleventh avenue and West Thirty-ninth street, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, to accompany the application of the Butchers' Dressed Meat Company for the right to construct and operate the same. Scale 1"-50', New York, January 31, 1905. New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, by Arthur Bloch, President," copy of which is annexed hereto, and which is made a part hereof, upon the following terms and conditions:

First—Said consent shall be for a term not exceeding ten years from the granting of said consent, provided, however, that the same may be canceled and annulled upon six months' notice in writing to the New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, its successor or assigns, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the said company, its successor or assigns, in and upon the said streets and avenues, shall cease and determine.

Second—The New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, its successor or assigns, shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York the following sums of money:

During the first five years the annual sum of \$1,560.60.

During the second five years the annual sum of \$1,638.68; after which the consent, unless sooner revoked, shall expire by limitation.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year, provided, however, that the first payment shall be only that proportion of \$1,560.60 as the time between the approval of this consent and November 1 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Third—Upon the revocation or termination by limitation of this consent the said company shall forthwith remove the plant and property, with its appurtenances, from the street, and the surface of the street shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface or pavement. In default of the performance of this condition by the said company, its successor or assigns, the proper local authorities may cause such tracks, property and plant to be removed from the street aforesaid, and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described, at the expense of the said company, its successor or assigns, and such expense shall be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fourth—The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever either by the acts of the New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, its successor or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successor in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The said railroad tracks may be used and operated by any motive power other than overhead electrical power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, and subject to such ordinances of The City of New York now in force, or which may be hereafter adopted.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad tracks shall be limited to four and the speed of the engine and cars shall never exceed six miles per hour, and no car shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of any open street at any time, and no freight shall be loaded or unloaded from said cars while within the limits of any such street, excepting between the points marked A and B and E and F, as shown more fully on said map.

Failure to comply with any of the above provisions shall make the company liable for a penalty of fifty dollars for each offense.

Sixth—The railroad tracks constructed under this consent shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise, and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Seventh—Such railroad tracks shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad tracks of the said company, its successor or assigns, shall be maintained in good and safe condition throughout the terms of this consent.

Eighth—Such railroad tracks shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

Ninth—The New York Butchers' Dressed Meat Company, its successor or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the pavement of the roadway, required to be laid by it, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street, and in that event, the said company, its successor or assigns, shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Tenth—The said company, its successor or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the tracks, the rails of its tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow.

Eleventh—Said company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property and to the street and the sewers therein by reason of the construction or operation of said railroad tracks, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or property on account of this consent.

Twelfth—This consent is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth—The said company, its successor or assigns, shall commence the construction of the railroad tracks under this consent and complete the same within one year from the day of the approval of this consent by the Mayor, and on or before May

1, 1906, otherwise this consent shall be forfeited forthwith, and without any proceedings, either at law or otherwise, for that purpose; provided, however, that such time may be extended by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a period not exceeding six months.

Fourteenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the said company, within thirty days after its approval by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or in securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this consent, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charge for the consent, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality or construction of the railroad tracks. In case default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company.

In case of any drafts so made upon the security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000); and in default thereof the consent hereby given may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Fifteenth—This consent shall not become operative until said company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this consent fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the approval of this consent by the Mayor.

Sixteenth—The compensation herein reserved shall commence from the date of the approval of this resolution by the Mayor.

Seventeenth—The consent hereby granted is revocable at the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to public hacks and hackmen.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Article I.—Public Hacks and Hackmen.

Section 1. Any vehicle kept for hire shall be deemed a public hack, and a vehicle intended to seat two persons inside shall be deemed a cab, and a vehicle intended to seat four persons inside shall be deemed a coach, and the term hackman shall be deemed to include owner or driver or both.

Sec. 2. None but licensed hacks shall use the designated public hack stands in the City. The owner of any hack not intended to use the public stands and having the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises, in the discretion of the Mayor or the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, may be specially licensed and permitted to use temporarily a portion of the street in front of said premises as a stand, and shall be confined to carrying passengers from said premises.

Sec. 3. The owner of hacks specially licensed shall, in addition to the lawful fees hereinbefore provided, pay annually an additional fee of \$25 for each hack allowed any stand other than a public hack stand, and no other licensed hackman shall come upon or use said stand.

Sec. 4. The legal rates of fare, of which an official copy shall be furnished by the Bureau of Licenses and carried by every licensed hackman, shall be as follows:

Mileage Rates Charged for General Driving.

Cabs—

For one mile or any part thereof.....	\$0 50
For each additional half mile or part thereof.....	25
For any stop over five minutes in a trip, for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof.....	25

Coaches—

For one mile or any part thereof.....	1 00
For each additional half mile or any part thereof.....	50
For any stop over five minutes in a trip, for every fifteen minutes or fraction thereof.....	40

Hourly Rates.

These hourly rates are to apply only to shopping or calling, and shall not include park or road driving, nor driving for more than three miles from the starting point.

Cabs—

For one hour or any part thereof.....	\$1 00
For each additional half hour or part thereof.....	50

Coaches—

For one hour or any part thereof.....	1 50
For each additional half hour or any part thereof.....	75

Sec. 5. Ferriage and bridge tolls in all cases to be paid by the parties using the vehicles.

Sec. 6. Twenty blocks north or south to constitute one mile; seven blocks east or west to constitute one mile.

Sec. 7. Every hack shall be provided with a suitable lamp on each side and shall have securely fastened across the middle of the outside of each lamp a metal band

not less than two inches in width, out of which the official number of the license shall be cut after the manner of a stencil plate, the component figures of such numbers to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and the style of the whole to be approved by the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. Every licensed hack shall have the official number of the license legibly engraved or embossed upon a metal plate and affixed inside, as designated and approved by the Mayor or Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, and no licensed hack shall carry or have affixed to it, inside or outside, any number except the official number as aforesaid.

Sec. 8. Every licensed hackman, immediately after the termination of any hiring or employment, must carefully search such hack for any property lost or left therein, and any such property, unless sooner claimed or delivered to the owner, must be taken to the nearest police station and deposited with the officer in charge within twenty-four hours after the finding thereof, and in addition, a written notice with brief particulars and description of the property must be forwarded at once to the Bureau of Licenses.

Sec. 9. Every licensed hackman shall have the right to demand payment of the legal fare in advance, and may refuse employment unless so prepaid, but no licensed hackman shall otherwise refuse or neglect to convey any orderly person or persons upon request anywhere in the City unless previously engaged or unable so to do. No licensed hackman shall carry any other person than the passenger first employing a hack without the consent of said passenger.

Sec. 10. All vehicles for hire shall be licensed and the owner thereof shall pay the sum of two dollars with his original application as the license fee for each and every vehicle so kept for hire, and one dollar for each vehicle for annual renewals.

Sec. 11. Failure to pay the lawful rate of fare, where no agreement has been made, or to pay the agreed amount where an agreement has been made, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding ten dollars or by imprisonment for not more than ten days or both.

Article II.—Public Hack Stands.

Section 1. Any duly licensed hackney coach or cab shall stand while waiting for employment at any of the following places and for the periods of time hereafter provided:

Stand No. 1—South Ferry, foot of Whitehall street, along the Park.
 Stand No. 2—Broadway, around Bowling Green.
 Stand No. 3—In Barclay street, west of Washington street.
 Stand No. 4—In Murray street, between Washington and West streets.
 Stand No. 5—In Broad street, from Stock Exchange to Beaver street; one line in centre of street.
 Stand No. 6—At Fulton Ferry, along the Market side, south and east.
 Stand No. 7—Broadway, from north side of Beekman street, to Chambers street, and Chambers street, from Broadway to west side of New Court-house, Park side.
 Stand No. 8—In Canal street, west of Washington street.
 Stand No. 9—In Chatham square.
 Stand No. 10—North, west and south sides of Union square.
 Stand No. 11—North, west and south sides of Madison square.
 Stand No. 12—The vacant squares, junction of Broadway and Sixth avenue, Thirty-second and Thirty-fifth streets.
 Stand No. 13—On Fourth avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, each side of the cut to the tunnel.
 Stand No. 14—At the junction of Broadway and Seventh avenue on the squares, Forty-third to Forty-seventh street.
 Stand No. 15—On the north side of Fortieth and south side of Forty-second streets, from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue.
 Stand No. 16—On Fifty-ninth street, north side, from Fifth avenue to a point 100 feet east of Eighth avenue.
 Stand No. 17—At all ferries.
 Stand No. 18—At all passenger steamboat landings, fifteen minutes before the usual time of arrival of such passenger steamboats.
 Stand No. 19—At all theatres and other places of public amusement, fifteen minutes before the conclusion of the performance.

Stand No. 20—At all railroad depots, five minutes prior to the arrival of passenger trains, licensed owners and drivers may solicit passengers without their vehicles, except that at the Grand Central Depot such hackmen shall not stand on the sidewalk more than three feet within the curb.

Stand No. 21—Broadway, opposite St. Paul's Church, from 5 P. M. until sunrise.
 Stand No. 22—On all street corners, from 10 P. M. until sunrise.
 Stand No. 23—South side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, between Ninth and Manhattan avenues.

Stand No. 24—North side of One Hundred and Forty-fifth street, from the corner of Eighth avenue three hundred feet east.

Stand No. 25—North side of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, to extend a distance of one hundred feet west of Eighth avenue.

Stand No. 26—North side of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, from the corner of Eighth avenue three hundred feet east.

Stand No. 27—West side of Third avenue, near the Fordham station of the New York and Harlem Railroad, extending southerly about one hundred feet from the southerly intersection of Pelham avenue.

Stand No. 28—Every elevated railroad station in The City of New York shall be deemed a public cab stand, and public cabs and coaches shall be and are hereby authorized to stand on the street corners at such places.

Stand No. 29—Park avenue, from Sixtieth street to Sixty-first street, and Seventy-second to Seventy-third street.

Stand No. 30—Fifth avenue, Sixtieth to Sixty-second street, on west side of avenue, and Seventy-first to Seventy-second and Seventy-second to Seventy-third streets, on west side of avenue.

Stand No. 31—Fifth avenue, Eighty-first to Eighty-second street, and from Ninety-first to Ninety-first street, on west side of avenue.

Stand No. 32—Sixty-third street, from Broadway to Columbus avenue, north side.

Stand No. 33—From Sixty-third to Sixty-fourth street on Broadway, west side.

Stand No. 34—Sixty-sixth street, between Broadway and Columbus avenue, south side.

Stand No. 35—Sixty-fifth to Sixty-sixth street on Broadway, east side; Amsterdam avenue, Seventy-second to Seventy-third street, on west side.

Stand No. 36—South side of Seventy-third street, between Broadway and Amsterdam avenue.

Stand No. 37—From Seventy-ninth to Eighty-first street on Columbus avenue, east side.

Stand No. 38—On Eighty-first street, from Columbus avenue to a point one hundred feet east of Columbus avenue.

Stand No. 39—Sherman square, north side of Seventieth street, from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway.

Stand No. 40—West side of Broadway, from Seventieth street to Seventy-first street.

Stand No. 41—Amsterdam avenue, from Seventieth to Seventy-first street, east side.

Stand No. 42—All Subway stations.

Stand No. 43—North side of Fifty-eighth street, west of Fifth avenue and the Plaza Circle, facing north.

Sec. 2. That not more than two cabs or coaches shall stand at any such station (meaning thereby the uptown or downtown station), and they shall not impede or obstruct proper access to and from the stairways at such stations.

Article III.—Penalties.

Section 1. Any person violating any of the provisions hereof, except those of Article I., section 10, upon conviction thereof by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses, either upon confession of the party or by competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not less than one dollar, nor more than ten dollars, and in default of payment of such fine within five days the license of such person may be revoked.

Article IV.—Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances, etc.

Section 1. Conflicting ordinances repealed. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance, including section 6 of Article IV. of the ordinance in relation to Rules of the Road, adopted by the Board of Aldermen and approved by the Mayor on December 14, 1903, are hereby repealed.

Article V.—When to Take Effect.

Section 1. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS, RESUMED.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Trustees, College of The City of New York:

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President of the Board of Aldermen, New York

City:

Dear Sir—The undersigned, a committee of the Board of Trustees of the College of The City of New York especially in charge of this matter, respectfully ask you to submit to the Board of Aldermen and recommend for passage, the resolution, a copy of which is appended.

The Board of Trustees of the College desire, in the interest of the beauty of the Great Hall of the College, that the contractor shall be permitted, in lieu of certain woodwork, to substitute a mural and decorative painting of an allegorical or otherwise imaginative character, in portions of the Great Hall. You will perceive, and it will be clear to the Board of Aldermen, that a competitive letting of a contract for a work of sheer art and imagination such as this is simply impossible. The City and the College need to find the artist of high character and then to have him design the work. The principal part of the work is in the artistic or imaginative idea; the mere manual execution of it, although done and necessarily done by the artist himself, or under his direction, is in value a small part of the work.

So with reference to an organ. There are but few organ builders in the country competent to make an organ such as it is necessary to have. The organ must be of a particular character, with special arrangements and the like. The question of price is not the all-important question. It is the question of the character, tone and other musical or aesthetic qualities of the organ. The committee in charge of the work ought to be permitted to make their own examination of the work of different organ builders and then to assign the work to the builder of the highest class organs of the kind suitable for this Great Hall. We earnestly trust that the Board of Aldermen will permit us to dispense with competition, proposals and bids in the case of these two items.

And we beg, Mr. President, to point out that the cost of these two items, as limited by the resolutions, is but an insignificant fraction, less than two (2) per cent. of the total cost of the buildings, and that other than these two items the work upon the buildings has been entirely upon the basis of competitive bidding.

Sir—I request that your Board, pursuant to section 546 of the Charter, approve of the purchase, by the issue of bonds, as therein provided, from Thomas G. Holland and John L. Holland, composing the firm of Holland Brothers, of No. 588 High Bridge road, corner of Tiebout avenue, for the use of this Department, of all that lot, piece or parcel of land in the Borough of The Bronx bounded and described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street and the southeast corner of Tiebout avenue, running thence 174 44-100 feet to the corner of Stevens place; thence southerly 114 18-100 feet; thence westerly 52 70-100 feet; thence northerly 42 9-100 feet; thence westerly to the line of Tiebout avenue 100 feet, more or less; thence northerly along Tiebout avenue 70 feet, more or less, to the point or place of beginning, together with whatever rights the owners may have to the centre lines of Tiebout avenue, East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street and Stevens place; together with the three-story brick stable, wagon shed and blacksmith shop thereon erected.

The property above mentioned, which it is desired to purchase, is the same which is now held under a lease from the same parties for a term of ten (10) years from October 1, 1904, at the annual rental of \$4,000, payable quarterly.

It is desirable to purchase the said property for the following reasons: First, it is conveniently situated for the stable purposes of our Department in that part of the Borough of The Bronx. Second, the increase of land value in the Borough of The Bronx, owing to the great number of improvements, public and private, will make it much more difficult for this Department at the expiration of this lease to obtain a suitable stable.

The owners say that the property has been recently appraised by the Harlem Savings Bank at \$60,000, which they deem a conservative estimate of its value. They now offer to dispose of the property to The City of New York for \$56,000, and they have accompanied their offer by a table intended to show a saving to the City by its purchase of the land now instead of continuing to hold the property for ten (10) years under a lease.

Sir—Thomas G. Holland and John L. Holland, doing business under the firm name of Holland Brothers, at the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, erected a stable on East One Hundred and Eighty-ninth street, between Tiebout avenue and Stevens place, in the Borough of The Bronx, and the City agreed to pay for a ten years' lease of the property the sum of \$4,000 annually. The lease was entered into October 1, 1904, and has about nine years and six months yet to run.

Messrs. Holland Brothers desire to dispose of this property to The City of New York and the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication under date of December 15, 1904, requests the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the acquisition of the property, and the issue of Corporate Stock for the payment thereof. The price at which the property was originally offered to the City was \$56,000. The price at which Messrs. Holland Brothers, in a communication under date of April 10, 1905, offered to sell to the City was \$53,000, and this price, while not excessive, is, in my opinion, full value for the property.

Taking the principal sum of \$53,000 and computing interest thereon at 4½ per cent, which is the City borrowing rate, plus 1 per cent, for Sinking Fund purposes, and adding to these figures the sum of \$700 for taxes, which the City would lose when it becomes the owner, the total interest carrying charges would be \$3,085. Deducting that from \$4,000, the sum the City pays annually for rent, would leave \$915 net for the City. In other words, at the expiration of the term of the lease, the City would be \$9,115 dollars better off as owner than it would be as tenant.

I would therefore respectfully recommend that the request of the Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning be approved, and that a resolution be adopted authorizing the acquisition of this stable for the Department of Street Cleaning, and that a resolution also be adopted, authorizing the issue of Corporate Stock in the amount of \$53,500, which will cover the cost and expenses of the acquisition of the property and the examination of title.

Sir—The President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication under date of March 29, 1905, requests that the plot on One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, from Belmont avenue to Crotona avenue, of 15.140 lots, be placed on the calendar for the next meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that, if possible, the two plots submitted by him in a communication under date of March 23, 1905, be acted upon.

The matter of the acquisition of sites for a storage yard in the Borough of The Bronx has been under discussion and examination for a long time past. The site originally selected by the President of the Borough of The Bronx was reported upon adversely by this office on account of there being an enormous amount of rock on the property. This office submitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in a communication dated December 10, 1904, alternative sites, but these were declined by him in a communication dated December 17, on the ground that they were entirely inadequate for the purpose of a corporation yard for his borough. He then submitted three sites and transmitted sketches thereof showing their locations.

Of the three sites selected by the President of the Borough of The Bronx and transmitted to this office, Site No. 1, located on Webster avenue and Park avenue, north of East One Hundred and Eightieth street, comprised 34,959 city lots, the asking price of which was in the vicinity of \$85,000. Site No. 2, bounded by East One Hundred and Eighty-fourth and East One Hundred and Eighty-seventh streets, Webster avenue and Park avenue, comprised about 60 city lots, and no price has been put upon this for the reason that the owners do not care to sell. Site No. 3 is really composed of two sites, one containing 18.70 lots, located on the corner of East One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street and Hughes avenue, and the other, comprising 15.14 lots, on Belmont avenue, East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street (Tremont avenue) and Crotona avenue, the price of the two parcels being in the vicinity of \$130,000.

On or about June 10, 1903, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution assigning part of a piece of property on White Plains road, acquired for the Board of Education, to the Police Department, part to the Fire Department, and the balance to the President of the Borough of The Bronx. This is in the upper part of The Bronx, and would have nothing whatever to do with the present location, and the only reason it is mentioned at this time is because, although having been assigned some time ago, it is not now occupied by the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, have authorized leases for various departments under the control of the said President, the rentals for which leases amount to \$9,000 annually. Three of these leases are for storage yard purposes for the President of the Borough, within a radius of one mile of the Borough Hall, and approximate 37,750 square feet, or about 15 lots, the annual rental of which is \$1,540. The rentals for the other parcels located in various parts of the Borough of The Bronx for the purpose of offices for the several heads of departments amount to \$7,460.

For the sake of comparison of the areas of storage yards in the five boroughs, I desire to submit the following:

In the Borough of Manhattan the City is the owner of a parcel of land (acquired under the Charters of 1686 and 1730) containing in area..... The City leases two other parcels of land containing in area.....—for which it pays in annual rent \$8,100.

In the Borough of Brooklyn there are leased for storage yard purposes three parcels of land containing in area approximately.....—the annual rental of which is \$1,510.

In addition to this the City assigned to the Borough President a piece of property, acquired under a tax sale, on DeKalb avenue, containing in area

In the Borough of Queens there are three large storage yards, the actual dimensions of which we have been unable, up to the present moment, to find, but the annual rental paid is \$1,290.

One of these parcels is located at Jamaica, one at Elmhurst and one in Long Island City.

From the above statement it will be seen that Site No. 1 on Webster avenue, which the President of the Borough of The Bronx submits, containing 34 City lots, or approxi-

mately 87,500 square feet, would be larger than the total area of the sites of the storage yards under the control of either of the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and Queens. For all purposes, Site No. 1 is, in my opinion, the best of the three submitted by the President of the Borough of The Bronx, for the following reasons:

1. It is in one parcel, and the latest information that I have is that it can be acquired at private sale.

2. It is more centrally located than the site shown as No. 3 by the President of said Borough, which contains two plots separated by a full block, and which would have to have a double set of Watchmen patrolling it. It is at least \$40,000 cheaper.

Some time since a communication was transmitted to the President of the Borough of The Bronx asking how many of the leased parcels of land would be surrendered to the City, which were not required for future use, in case the City purchased the storage yard desired by him. The answer was so indefinite that if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the acquisition of a site for the use of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, it should be with the understanding that when such site has been acquired all of the storage yard leases are to be surrendered.

I would respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the request of the President of the Borough of The Bronx for the acquisition of a storage yard site for his Borough; that they select site No. 1 on Webster avenue and Park avenue, north of East One Hundred and Eightieth street, and that the Comptroller be authorized to acquire same at private sale at a price not exceeding eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000).

No. 1813.

Whereas, The Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners for The City of New York did on or about the twenty-first day of July, 1902, enter into a certain contract with Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the construction and operation of a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, the routes and general plan of which were adopted by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners by its resolutions adopted on the twenty-fourth day of January, 1901, and later approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York and by the Appellate Divisions of the Supreme Court, both in the First and Second Departments; and

Whereas, The said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York did, by resolutions of April thirteenth, 1905, modify and amend the said Routes and General Plan as follows:

Resolutions of April 13, 1905.

Whereas, This Board did, on the 24th day of January, 1901, adopt certain Routes and General Plan for a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, a copy of which is hereto annexed entitled "Copy Routes and General Plan adopted 24 January, 1905"; and

Whereas, The said Routes and General Plan were afterwards duly approved by the municipal authorities of The City of New York, and were duly consented to by Commissioners appointed by the Appellate Divisions of the Supreme Court both in the First and Second Departments, which consents were duly confirmed by the said Appellate Divisions, in lieu of the consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along the said routes; and

Whereas, Thereafter, and on or about the 21st day of July, 1902, The City of New York did by this Board enter into a certain contract with Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the construction and operation of the said rapid transit railroad; and

Whereas, It is the interest of The City of New York, and, in the opinion of the said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, it is likewise in its interest as such contractor, and the said Company desires that said Routes and Plan shall be changed in the respect hereinafter mentioned, but without other change in the said Routes and General Plan.

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as in this resolution hereinafter mentioned the said Routes and General Plan heretofore adopted by this Board be, and they hereby are, modified as follows:

1. By striking out from the said Routes and General Plan the words

"For the whole of the route above described, including each of the branches and loops aforesaid two parallel tracks."

2. By inserting in the said Routes and General Plan, instead of the words thus struck out, the following words, to wit:

"For the portion of the route above described beginning at a point in the Borough of Brooklyn in Joralemon street opposite the Kings County Court House near the junction of Joralemon street with Fulton street and running thence along Fulton street to the end of the said route at or near the intersection of Flatbush avenue with Atlantic avenue, there shall be four tracks substantially parallel and placed on substantially the same level, except at the following points where provision is to be made for connections with certain subways or tunnels which are expected to be hereafter constructed and which are expected to run as follows, that is to say: First northwesterly under Fulton street from its junction with Joralemon street, Second northwesterly from Flatbush avenue under the proposed extension of Flatbush avenue toward the Manhattan Bridge, Third northeasterly from Flatbush avenue under Lafayette avenue, and Fourth southerly from Flatbush avenue under Fourth avenue. At and near each of the said points, at which provision is now to be made for future connections, one or more additional tracks may be constructed as a part of the railway herein described, and any one or more of the tracks of said railway may be depressed below the remaining tracks as far as shall be found necessary in order to avoid grade crossings, but not exceeding twenty feet. Along the whole of that portion of the route above described which lies under Flatbush avenue there may be an additional or fifth track for use as a siding. And for the remainder of the route above described, being all of the said route lying westerly from the Kings County Court House both in the Borough of Brooklyn and in the Borough of Manhattan, and including each of the branches and loops aforesaid, there shall be two parallel tracks."

3. By inserting after the words

"No wall of the tunnel or part thereof shall" the words

"except along the southerly side of Fulton street, between Bond street and Flatbush avenue, and"

so that the whole sentence shall read as follows, to wit:

"No wall of the tunnel or part thereof shall, except along the southerly side of Fulton street, between Bond street and Flatbush avenue, and except at the stations, station approaches, curves and places of access to subsurface structures as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five (5) feet of the exterior line or side of a longitudinal street of the route."

And it is further

Resolved, That whereas this Board has duly made the inquiries and investigations necessary or proper in the premises, and has determined that the modifications aforesaid of the said routes and general plan is necessary for the interests of the public and of The City of New York and should be established as hereinafter provided, this Board does hereby determine and establish the said routes and general plan as hereby modified, subject to the consents and approvals to be first obtained as hereinafter mentioned.

And it is further

Resolved, That the said modification of the routes and general plan shall take effect only upon and after the following consents thereto and approvals thereof shall be duly had, to wit:

1. The consent of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, contractor, and of its sureties, as follows: Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The National Surety Company, the Aetna Indemnity Company, and Empire State Surety Company.

2. The consent of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York or of such other local authorities as may have the control of the portions of Joralemon street, Fulton street and Flatbush avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, above mentioned.

3. The consent of the Mayor of The City of New York.

4. The consent of the owners of a majority in value of the property along streets or such portions of streets as are included in the portion of routes by these resolutions proposed to be modified as aforesaid; or, if such consents cannot be obtained, then, in lieu thereof, the determination of three Commissioners to be appointed by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court in the Second Department, duly confirmed by the said Appellate Division.

And it is further

Resolved, That this Board hereby adopts the drawing now produced and entitled "Proposed Four Track Subway showing Two Track Connections with Extensions on Fourth Avenue, Lafayette Avenue, Fulton Street and Flatbush Avenue Extension," as showing in substance the modification hereby adopted.

Copy Routes and General Plan Adopted January 24, 1901.

The centre line of the route shall commence at a point in the Borough of Manhattan at or near the intersection of Broadway with Park row, being the point of commencement of the rapid transit railroad now under construction upon the routes adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners of The City of New York, by resolutions of the 14th day of January and 4th day of February, 1897; and such centre line shall run thence under Broadway and Bowling Green to State street; thence under State street and Battery Park to Whitehall street, and thence under and across Whitehall street and South street to the East river; thence under the East river to the Borough of Brooklyn at a point in Joralemon street, between the East river and Furman street; thence under Joralemon street to Fulton street; thence under Fulton street to Flatbush avenue; thence under Flatbush avenue to a point at or near its intersection with Atlantic avenue. The route shall also include a branch or loop, the centre line of which shall begin at the point which shall be found most convenient in Broadway, between Bowling Green and Exchange place, and shall run thence under Broadway to Bowling Green, and thence under Bowling Green to State street; thence under and across the line of State street to Battery Park; thence under Battery Park to Whitehall street; thence returning under Whitehall street, Battery Park and State street to Broadway.

The route shall also include suitable tracks and connections in the nature of loops under the City Hall Park and around the City Hall in the Borough of Brooklyn. Wherever the route passes from one street to another, or from the street to the river, or from the river to a street, the route may pass under private property so far as may be convenient for the purposes of the curve or grade of the railway.

The said general plan of construction hereby adopted is as follows:

For the whole of the route above described, including each of the branches and loops aforesaid, two parallel tracks placed on the same level except that, wherever required by special necessities of surface or subsurface structures, or other special or local necessities, or for the purpose of avoiding grade crossings, either track may be depressed below the other track to a depth of not more than fifty feet; but the limitation as to level of the two tracks shall not apply to the portions of the route under the East river. The tracks shall be standard gauge, that is to say, of a width of four feet eight and one-half inches between the rails.

The tracks may at any point of the route (or of the branches or loops therein included) be placed in the same tunnel; or there may be a separate tunnel for each track, as shall be most convenient; and there shall be a width in the tunnels for each track not exceeding fifteen feet, except that at stations, switches, turnouts, curves and cross-overs the width may be increased, provided, however, that the tracks shall be placed under the central part of the longitudinal street of the route, so far as may be practicable and convenient. No wall of the tunnel or part thereof, shall, except at the stations, station approaches, curves, and places of access to subsurface structures as hereinafter provided, be within a distance of five (5) feet of the exterior line or side of a longitudinal street of the route. The roof of the tunnel when under a street shall be as near the surface of the street as grades and street conditions will conveniently permit. The tunnel shall not be less than thirteen feet high in the clear. Wherever necessary to the proper support of a street surface the roof of the tunnel or tunnels shall be of iron or steel girders, with brick or concrete arches, supported by iron or steel columns and masonry walls, or the roof shall be a masonry arch, or the whole of the lining may be of iron. Adjacent tracks shall be connected by necessary and suitable switches and connections and an additional track for siding accommodations may be constructed not to exceed in length one-quarter of a mile for each mile of roadway; and wherever along any part of the route it shall be necessary for the proper maintenance or accommodation of pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures, the width of the tunnel may be enlarged on either or both sides by an additional width not to exceed fifteen feet, provided always that the limits hereinbefore provided as to longitudinal streets of the route shall be observed. All or any pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures may be placed in suitable galleries to be constructed within the additional width hereinbefore permitted. At each cross street where accommodation for pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be those provided within the tunnel, the tunnel may, in order to provide convenient access to the same, have within the limit of the sides or exterior lines of such cross streets or such lines produced, an additional width on each side of the route not to exceed fifteen feet, provided always that the limits hereinbefore provided as to longitudinal streets of the route shall be observed. Pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall, at any part of the said route, be removed and disturbed only when necessary for the construction and operation of the tunnel, and if removed or disturbed shall be placed under the streets in such manner and in such location that the use and service thereof shall not be permanently impaired. Such pipes, wires, sewers and other subsurface structures shall be left or shall be so arranged as to give free access for their repair or alteration and for the placing with them, so far as there may be space, of new pipes, wires, sewers, and other like structures, and for making connections between the same and abutting buildings at any time. Stations and station approaches shall, so far as practicable, be at the intersection of streets, and shall be built under streets or through private property to be acquired for the purpose, or both under streets and through private property as aforesaid. The streets under which stations or station approaches shall be built may include cross streets; but no part of any cross streets shall be used for a station or station approach at a distance greater than seventy-five feet from the exterior line or side of the street of the route. The word "street," wherever used herein, shall include an avenue, park, or public place.

The general mode of operation shall be by electricity or some other power not requiring combustion within the tunnels, and the motors shall be capable of moving trains at a speed of not less than forty miles per hour, exclusive of stops. The manner of construction shall be by tunneling or open excavation.

Whereas, The said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York did thereafter on the eighteenth day of April, 1905, present to this Board a copy of said resolutions of April thirteenth, 1905, and the modification and amendment of the routes and general plan of the Rapid Transit Railroad as therein set forth, and this Board having, by resolution duly adopted, fixed a day not less than one week and not more than ten days after the receipt of such plans and conclusions therein contained for the consideration thereof, and having duly considered the same,

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, by a vote of a majority of all the members of said Board, does hereby approve the said modification and amendment of the routes and general plan and the plans and conclusions therein contained, and does hereby consent to the construction and operation of the railway or railways in accordance with the modification and amendment of the routes and general plan, as set forth in the said resolutions of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York of April thirteenth, 1905, and The City of

New York does hereby approve such modification and amendment and such plans and conclusions, and consents to such construction and operation.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Headquarters Fire Department, City of New York, }
New York, January 6, 1905.

Meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission held at the Headquarters of the Fire Department, City of New York, Friday, January 6, 1905. Deputy Fire Commissioner Churchill in the chair.

Present—Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery.

On motion of Commissioner Montgomery, seconded by Commissioner Sherry, the following resolution was taken up for consideration, and it was

Resolved, That sections 46 and 47, Part 7 of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 46. Licenses may be granted by the Fire Commissioner after survey, authorizing the sale of kerosene oil at retail, provided that no quantity of said oil greater than one barrel shall be stored or kept in any building occupied in any part thereof as a dwelling.

Sec. 47. For a retail license the Fire Commissioner shall collect a fee of ten dollars. Retail licenses for the sale of kerosene oil may be transferred as to place after survey, but are not transferable from one individual to another.

A RETAIL LICENSE WILL BE REQUIRED FOR EACH WAGON AND FOR EACH BOAT FROM WHICH KEROSENE IS SOLD TO CONSUMERS, OR FROM WHICH THE MAIN BUSINESS IS THE DELIVERING OF KEROSENE TO CONSUMERS.

Adopted, Commissioners Piser, Montgomery and Sherry voting in favor thereof.

On motion of Commissioner Sherry, seconded by Commissioner Piser, the following resolution was taken up for consideration, and it was

Resolved, That section 69, part 2 of the Municipal Explosives Commission's Regulations be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 69. Retail dealers may be licensed to carry a stock of black powder and of smokeless powder in such quantities of each, or of both, as the Fire Commissioner may deem fit, but in no case may said license permit the carrying of more than fourteen pounds of black powder, and more than one hundred pounds of smokeless powder.

All powder shall be kept outside the walls of the building in a fire-proof inclosure, located to the approval of the Fire Commissioner; or

In a receptacle which can be flooded from the street, located and having water connection approved by the Fire Commissioner; and not more than fourteen pounds of the powder may be kept in a light metal receptacle properly locked, plainly marked POWDER, and located not more than ten feet from and in a clearway from the entrance from the street, but no powder is to be kept in such receptacle except the same be in metal cannisters of a capacity not larger than one pound.

All receptacles or places where powder is kept shall at all times be kept securely locked except when actually necessary to obtain access to its contents. On the front of each of such establishments, not more than seven feet above the sidewalk, shall be displayed a sign not less than 18 inches long and 10 inches high, to be approved by the Fire Commissioner, worded "Licensed to Sell Gunpowder."

In no case can black blasting powder, or other blasting ammunition be allowed to be carried for sale or for use except upon the filing of a bond and the issuance of a license therefor as provided for elsewhere in these Regulations.

Adopted, Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

On motion of Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Montgomery, it was

Resolved, That a new section be added to Part VII. of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission, to be known as section 39 (b), and to read as follows:

Sec. 39b. No motor vehicle or other power-producing apparatus carrying or containing any inflammable fluid shall be stored or kept in any building where a permit is not in force from the Fire Department, authorizing the storage of such vehicles or apparatus in explicit terms.

Carried, Commissioners Sherry, Piser and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

On motion of Commissioner Piser, seconded by Commissioner Sherry, it was

Resolved, That section 78, Part II., of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 78. The sale of black sporting powder, excepting to individuals over twenty-one years of age, for personal use, in rifles, shot guns or other small arms, to military organizations, licensed individuals, firms engaged in shell loading, licensed manufacturers of fireworks, owners of vessels for saluting purposes, or for shipment beyond the limits of the City, is prohibited.

Adopted, Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery voting in favor thereof.

Commissioner Piser moved that sections 10 and 40 of Part VII. of the Regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 10. In the transportation of naphthas through the streets of the City, no load shall be carried which is in excess of the equivalent of the contents of twenty-five barrels of a capacity of fifty-five gallons each, and no naphtha shall be delivered except in original containers, save in delivery from tank wagons as provided for in sections 9 and 40 of this part of these regulations.

Sec. 40. Immediately upon receipt of naphthas for filling tanks in such stations, the containers shall be taken from the wagon and not opened until they are alongside and ready to be emptied into the tank, but no connection shall be made until the container in which naphtha is delivered shall be unloaded from wagon and placed alongside intake of tank.

Laid over.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with Mr. Ogden, of the New York Board of Underwriters, in reference to proposed amendments to sections 10 and 40 of Part VII. of the Regulations.

Adjourned to Friday, January 13, 1905.

MUNICIPAL EXPLOSIVES COMMISSION.

Headquarters Fire Department, City of New York, }
New York, January 13, 1905.

Meeting of the Municipal Explosives Commission held at the Headquarters of the Fire Department of The City of New York, Friday, January 13, 1905. Present—Commissioners Piser, Sherry and Montgomery.

Commissioner Montgomery was elected Chairman pro tem.

A communication from the Fire Commissioner, inclosing a report from Assistant Fire Marshal Prial, on the fire that occurred on December 5, 1904, at 12:48 P. M., at Nos. 136 to 148 West Thirty-ninth street, in premises occupied as an automobile storage station, together with a communication from the Fire Marshal recommending that:

"In view of the many destructive fires caused by the ignition of gasoline vapor, I respectfully recommend that no gasoline be used or stored where there are gas jets, furnaces, stoves or flames of any kind, that would supply the spark necessary for ignition; also that no gasoline be filled from tanks except into safety cans where it is to be distributed in small quantities for the filling of automobile cars, trucks or vehicles," was read.

The Secretary was directed to return the papers to the Fire Commissioner and to advise him that amendments to the regulations were now before the Commission, covering the subject matter of the communication, that perfection and final action on the same had been postponed on account of proposed conference between this Commission and the Board of Underwriters to be held soon after the 18th inst.

Applications for supplementary permits from James B. Horner, J. B. Colt & Co., Lehn & Fink, Townes & James and Kirkman & Son were laid over for further consideration.
