Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, March 2nd, 1915, at 3.30 P. M.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Sachs, Stern and Farley, Trustees. Excused—Mr. O'Keeffe, Mr. Robbins and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

The minutes of the meetings of February 16th and 20th, 1915, were held as read and approved.

Bills, amounting to \$54,098.60, were approved and forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: Dr. Spies, Admitting Physician at Federal Hospital, resigned, to take effect February 28th.

Mr. O'Neil, at Harlem Hospital, recovered from his operation, and left yesterday for a vacation of one month. Miss Malgren, the Assistant Superintendent of Training Schools, is designated as Acting Superintendent of the hospital.

The Thomas car bought by the hospital four years ago for the use of the Trustees and Superintendent, needs to be replaced. It is possible that sufficient funds can be obtained by transfer from other ac-

counts for this purpose, should you approve some action being taken in the matter.

I visited the Sea Beach Hospital at Rockaway Park yesterday afternoon, and received from Mr. Burritt, representative of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, the keys of the new hospital, and provided for a watchman and necessary firemen, pending our occu-

pancy of the building, which will probably be about April 1st.

The Tower Construction Company began work yesterday upon their contract for the power house, Harlem Hospital; the Interborough Decorating Company are just finishing their contract for painting L. and M.; the Wahle, Phillips Company, who have the contract for lighting fixtures, for these pavilions, have not yet begun placing the fixtures, although I am told they are nearly completed at their factory and expect to finish the contract within the specified time.

Water has been appearing in the basement of the Pathological Building; apparently there is some defect in the waterproofing. This matter has been called to the attention of McKim, Mead and White, and they promise an early report on the condition.

The boiler room at Gouverneur Hospital is very much in need of painting, and to do this work ourselves would necessitate the putting on of two additional painters as Hospital Helpers at \$25 each per month. Your authorization for these additional appointments is requested.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken on the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The resignation of Dr. Spies was accepted.

The designation of Miss Malghren as Acting Superintendent during the absence of Mr. O'Neil from Harlem Hospital was approved.

It was Resolved, To request authority to obtain a new automobile for the use of the Trustees and the General Medical Superintendent.

The appointment of a watchman and fireman to the Sea Beach Hospital, pending formal acceptance and occupancy of the building by this department, was approved.

The appointment of two additional hospital helpers (painters) at Gouverneur Hospital for one month was approved.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President presented a tabulation of bids received on February 23rd, at the joint opening of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals and the Departments of Charities, Health and Corrections for coffee, in the office of the General Purchasing Committee. On the recommendation of the Contract Clerk, as set forth in a letter dated March 2nd, on motion, duly seconded and carried, awards were made to the lowest bidder.

The President presented a list of bids received on February 2nd, for the reconstruction of the lighting system and fixtures in the main building of Harlem Hospital, as follows: Frank Nebeling, \$4,401; A. J. McCullough, \$4,495; E. J. Electric Company, \$4,625; Lord Electric Company, \$4,880. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to defer action on these bids.

The President referred to the formal acceptance of the new Sea Beach Hospital, which was constructed and equipped by the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, and offered to the City, in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 15th, 1912. While the subject was under consideration a telephone message was received from the Mayor, requesting the Trustees to defer formal action until the Law Department could determine the proper procedure to be followed. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to take no action at this meeting.

The Conference Committee of the four divisions of Bellevue Hospital presented a tabulation showing the attendance of physicians and surgeons to the out-patient department from October 1st to December 31st, 1914, and in view of the number of absences in several instances, after discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to defer action on all reappointments and to inquire of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board if they had taken into consideration such absences when making nominations for reappointments. Also what action was taken by the Committee to obtain regular attendance, and if they had a rule governing the number of absences allowed in a given period, and if not to formulate such a rule.

Reference was made to the subject of appointments to the places now vacant, as Consulting Neurologist on the Second Division and Visiting Gynecologist on the Fourth Division. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to defer action on these appointments until a plan for reorganizing the medical and surgical service of Bellevue Hospital was formulated.

COMMUNICATIONS.

The minutes of the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for February 24th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nominations of Dr. Rush C. Bauman and Dr. Charles H. Nammack as Assistant Surgeons to Out-Patients on the First Division, and Dr. John H. Richards as Physician to Out-Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician to the Sec-

ond Division were referred to the Conference Committees; the Corporation Counsel will be asked for an opinion on section No. 310 of the Penal Code and the form of blank to obtain permission to perform autopsies; the President and General Medical Superintendent were requested to confer with the Committee on Outlying Services on the advisability of placing the children's service on the same basis as that of the tuberculosis; the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to consider the advisability of using the upper floor of the dispensary building for the out-patient department as a whole, as soon as adequate space can be found for the Social Service and Clinical Records Departments; the resignation of Dr. William H. Braddock was accepted; the nomination of internes for the Fourth Division was considered, but action thereon was deferred until the Trustees receive a reply to their letter of February 17, sent to all the medical boards of the department, requesting information relative to the methods followed in conducting examinations for appointment to the house staff; the suggestion that the Trustees collect the money under the Workmen's Compensation Law, pending the decision of the Law Department, was considered, but action thereon was deferred until the legalities can be established by the Corporation Counsel.

A letter dated February 23rd was presented from Dr. George D. Stewart, the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board, relative to the special services of Bellevue Hospital. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Executive Committee to undertake the study for the reorganization of the medical and surgical administration involved in the rearrangement and redistribution of the special services, and present their plans and recommendations to the Trustees.

A letter, dated February 25th, was presented from the Law Department, asking the Trustees if they are in favor of or opposed to Assembly Bill No. 1035, amending subdivision No. 7 of section 692 of the charter, directing the Trustees to provide an ambulance service in the district from 125th Street to 96th Street, and Park Avenue to the East River. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the President, Dr. Brannan, Mr. Paulding and Commissioner Kingsbury.

A letter, dated March 1st, was presented from Mrs. Osborn, presenting a communication dated February 25th from a member of the City Visiting Committee relating to the revised plans for the kitchen of pavilions F and G. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the Building Committee for attention.

A letter, dated February 19th, was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting four resolutions adopted by that Board on that day, transferring funds from the office of the Borough President of Richmond and the Board of Elections to Bellevue and Allied Hospitals to meet the deficits in the appropriations for 1914, and amending the schedules affected thereby. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was ordered placed on file.

Five letters were presented from the physicians in the out-patient department of Gouverneur Hospital, explaining their tardiness and absences from the clinics. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these were ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

DEPARTMENT OF BRIDGES.

REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDED DECEMBER 31, 1914.

During this quarter, the usual thorough and systematic inspection of the forty-two bridges and their approaches was made; also the necessary repairs and replacements to same. The principal work, other than that of maintenance, was the completion of the subway connection at the Manhattan Terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge; the improvement of the Manhattan and Brooklyn Plazas of the Manhattan Bridge; the upper deck equipment of the easterly tracks of the Manhattan Bridge; the completion of the strengthening of the main span of the Williamsburg Bridge, and the completion of the outside platforms at the Bedford Avenue Station, on the Brooklyn approach of the Williamsburg Bridge.

The annual count of traffic over the four East River Bridges was made on November 5, beginning at 12:01 A. M., and continuing for twenty-four hours. The totals on all lines of traffic, as compared with the totals of the traffic count made on October 30, 1913, showed a reduction of 4.3 per cent. on the Brooklyn Bridge; an increase of 19.6 per cent. on the Manhattan Bridge; an increase of 4.4 per cent. on the Williamsburg Bridge, and an increase of 11.2 per cent. on the Queensboro Bridge. The total number of people crossing these four bridges on November 5th was 760,965 which, compared with the count made on October 30, 1913, showed an increase of 2.4 per cent.

BROOKLYN BRIDGE—The contract for the construction of the subway connection for the Manhattan Terminal of the Brooklyn Bridge was completed. When the tracks are laid in this subway connection, the elevated tracks on the bridge will be connected with the subway station under the Municipal Building and with the subway in Centre Street. This work also included the widening of the exit of the north roadway of the bridge into Park Row. The work of cleaning and painting the main bridge, approach structures, terminals, shops, warehouses and arches was continued. Repairs to the surface tracks on the structure were completed during the period. This consisted of removing the old underdeck planking and the chairs under rails; putting in new underdeck planking, spiking the rail flanges; repairing track bonds where necessary; putting in new tie rods and restoring the middle and upper deck planking. This work was done between 10 P. M. and 5 A. M., five nights a week, by a force of from 50 to 60 of the operating company's employees. The following improvements and repairs to buildings under the approaches of the bridge were made: the two upper stories of the front wall of brick building at 171-172 South Street were torn down and walls rebuilt; seventeen stalls in the stable at 278 Front Street were rebuilt and waterproofed; new stalls, a new concrete floor and new drains were also put in the Department stable in the Water Street yard. An entrance was made through the brick wall under the William Street stairs for access to vaults in Block G; new stairs and a concrete floor constructed; the walls whitewashed; new steel door constructed in partition wall at William Street, and sewer and water connections made—thus putting Block G in condition for occupancy by a tenant. A terrazzo floor was laid in the Women's Toilet at the New York Station; the plumbing completed; attendant's room reconstructed and the entire interior painted. A new room for laborers was constructed in the New York Station. Work was continued on the contract for changing the steam-driven air compressor in the Brooklyn Bridge power house into an electrically-driven one. This compressor supplies air to the Brooklyn and Manhattan Bridges.

MANHATTAN BRIDGE—*Manhattan Plaza*: At the end of the quarter 73 per cent. of all work involved in this contract was completed, showing an increase over last quarter of 7 per cent. The bulk of the work included in this 7 per cent. was on the West Colonnade, Arch Piers and Bridge Roadway. The bridge roadway is partially paved, enough to permit vehicular traffic, and after an inspection, the Commissioner of Bridges, accompanied by the Mayor, formally opened the roadway to traffic on October 20th. Work on this contract was suspended by the Contractor on October 29th. The area enclosed by temporary bridge loop tracks along Bayard Street is being filled in by the Underpinning and Foundation Company, so that the tracks may be relocated at a higher level; this filling in work is being done at no cost to the City, and is about 90 per cent. completed. *Brooklyn Plaza*: At this time 79 per cent. of all work involved in this contract has been completed, showing an increase of 9 per cent. since last report. The principal work accomplished during the quarter was the erection of the granite pylons; the erection of granite on the exterior walls along Jay Street, and the pavement of the bridge roadway and Flatbush Avenue Extension. The pylons are now being carved and rapid progress is being made thereon. The contractor has proceeded with the erection of the exterior walls along Jay Street. The permanent roadway across the Brooklyn Plaza was opened on October 20th, the same day that the permanent roadway across the Manhattan Plaza was opened. The flag staff situated at the intersection of Nassau Street and the center line of the bridge was erected on December 31, 1914. This staff has a bronze base and together with two bronze lamp posts on either side will make an imposing and patriotic appearance at the Brooklyn entrance. *Equipment of Easterly Tracks, Upper Deck*: The work included in this contract is 96 per cent. complete. This contract covers the installation of two tracks equipped for the operation of conduit electric railway surface cars. These tracks will be used by the Brooklyn and North River Railroad Company. The equipment includes the construction of rails, feeder cables, conductor bars, guard rails and gratings. This work is practically finished from the Manhattan abutment to Nassau Street, but that part of the contract included between the Manhattan abutment and Canal Street is delayed, awaiting the completion of elevated structure included in contract for the improvement of Manhattan Plaza.

WILLIAMSBURG BRIDGE—Plans are in course of preparation for the necessary changes in the Manhattan Approach, and for the spreading of the main cables at the end spans, in order to provide the necessary clearance for the operation of the new ten-foot wide subway cars over the bridge. The outside platforms of the Bedford Avenue Trolley Station were opened to the public on October 5th, the contractor's work being practically completed at that time. A count of traffic taken on November 5th showed that 20,115 people were using the station (outside and inside platforms) during the twenty-four hours. A section of test pavement, extending over 200 lineal feet of roadway, was installed on the North Roadway, on the main span, without any serious delays to traffic. New concrete wall was constructed at Bedford Avenue stairs, north side of south stairway. Foundations for roadway sweeping disposal chutes were started and 50 per cent. completed.

QUEENSBORO BRIDGE—Work on the contract plans and specifications for an additional elevator in the north tower of the east anchor pier was commenced, and the plans are near completion. The machinery of both elevators in the Queens anchor tower was overhauled and repaired. On October 17th, 5,414 passengers were carried, and on December 24th one car made 96 trips in one hour; these figures are the highest since the installation of the service. Electric lights and a gas heating equipment were installed in the public comfort stations on the footwalks of the Manhattan approach. The arc lamps for lighting the bridge roadway and machine shop were replaced by high power incandescent lamps. New safety treads were installed on the exit stairway, at Loops 2 and 3, of the Manhattan trolley terminal. Work on the foundations of the Rapid Transit Elevated Railroad on Queens Plaza and on the Queens approach were continued, and the erection of the steel superstructure was begun on October 26. Part of the south wall of the Queens approach was rebuilt. This work is being done by the Snares & Triest Company, under contract with the Public Service Commission.

HARLEM RIVER, MANHATTEN & BRONX BRIDGES—*Third Avenue Bridge*: Wiring and conduit work, in connection with changing the lighting system on the bridge, from arc lights to incandescent lights, was commenced; and the conduit work nearly completed during the quarter. On November 17th, the storeroom under the Manhattan approach of the bridge was taken by the Borough President (Manhattan), for use as a public market; this space is in addition to that previously assigned to the Borough President for temporary market purposes. *Macombs Dam Bridge*: One of the westerly approaches to Macombs Dam Bridge is the 155th Street Viaduct; this viaduct is under the jurisdiction of the Borough President of Manhattan. Funds were provided for this Department to proceed with certain necessary repair and painting work on this viaduct. Work was started on November 16, erecting scaffolds and shanties. On November 25th, fifty-five painters and fifteen riveters were appointed, and the work has proceeded rapidly. At the close of the quarter about 40 per cent. of the steel work was cleaned and painted. *Unionport (Temporary) Bridge*: The construction of this bridge was completed on November 5th by the Riverside Contracting Company. An order was placed for the completion of the easterly embankment approach to connect the bridge with East 177th Street. A part of the fill was deposited during the quarter. *New Office Building, 138th Street and Madison Avenue*: The cement plaster work on the exterior of the building was completed. A water line and electric conduit were run from the shops to the building.

BROOKLYN, QUEENS & RICHMOND BRIDGES—A contract was let to make additions and repairs to 508 lineal feet of the southerly approach to the Fresh Kills Bridge, in the Borough of Richmond; this contract covers the addition of five new lines of yellow pine stringers underneath the floor, and the laying of an underdeck flooring of three-inch yellow pine planks; this work is in progress. A trap door for snow removal purposes was constructed on the Flushing Bridge, and a new pipe railing was erected along the southerly side of the east approach to replace the old wooden railing. At the Ninth Street Bridge, the Coney Island & Brooklyn Railroad Company, in co-operation with this department, cut the apron plates at the center and on the approaches, and laid new rails in the tracks over the bridge and approaches. In connection with this improvement, Department employees built steel cantilever supports in place of the wooden supports formerly used under the ends of the rails; raised the apron plates to the plane of the roadway and repaired the shear locks and the rockers of the bridge. Similar steel cantilever supports were built under the rails on the Union Street Bridge; the center joint apron plates were raised and the shear locks reinforced with plates. Structural repairs and additions were made to the operating machinery of the Greenpoint Avenue, Metropolitan Avenue and Borden Avenue Bridges, and the fender repaired and armored with steel plate at the Washington Avenue Bridge.

MUNICIPAL BUILDING—Thompson-Stratton Company made satisfactory progress on the modified contract for the interior finish of the building. The work of installing the lighting fixtures was advanced to 83 per cent. complete, by the Edward Schroeder

Lamp Works. Approximately 80 per cent. of the work of painting the interior of the building, by Bernard Brindze & Company, was accomplished. The Art Metal Construction Company advanced to 60 per cent. complete the work to be done under the contract for metal railings, screens, counters, etc. Preparation of plans for a women's lunch room and for finishing the interior of the tower for office use was begun.



No person other than one who shall have graduated after a course of training of not less than two years' duration from a hospital training school for nurses shall practice as or hold himself or herself out to be or by any one held out or represented to be a trained, graduate or certified nurse, or use any letters, words, figures or device to indicate that such person is a trained, graduate or certified nurse.

Such right and privilege shall be valued as if the Company had not exercised the same for the said period of ten (10) years, and no allowance shall be made to the

Company in such valuation by reason of such exercise.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the routes herein authorized.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding five (5) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the routes herein authorized, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner.

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract unless the Board shall, during the original term of this contract, permit another company or an individual to operate stages or omnibuses over all or a portion of the routes herein authorized. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

- (a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.
- (b) During the first term of one (1) year a sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross receipts, but which sum shall not be less than five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the succeeding term of four (4) years an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500).

During the remaining term of five (5) years, an annual sum which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than two thousand dollars (\$2,000).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross receipts of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City and for the purpose of determining such gross annual receipts, the Company shall keep accurate accounts of all fares collected within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, hereinbefore described.

Fifth—At the termination or forfeiture of this grant, the City, at the election of the Board, shall have the right to purchase all or any part of the property of the Company used for the purpose of the operation of the stage or omnibus system hereby authorized at a sum equal to a fair valuation of such property, exclusive of any value which such property may have by reason of this contract.

If the Company and the City cannot agree upon a fair valuation of such property, then the valuation thereof shall be determined and fixed by three arbitrators selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board, and the two so chosen shall choose a third disinterested person. The decision under oath of any two of such persons, who shall be so selected, shall be final and conclusive.

If either the Company or the City fails to appoint an arbitrator as herein provided, or should the first two arbitrators fail to agree on the selection of the third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after the first two arbitrators shall be chosen, or if no two arbitrators so selected shall agree upon the valuation of such property within

sixty (60) days after the arbitrators shall be so selected, then such valuation may be fixed by a commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court on the application of either party.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents; and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Seventh—The Company shall commence operation within three (3) months from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor; provided that such period may be extended by the Board for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement of said operation shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement of such operation may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board, the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceeding.

Eighth—Nothing herein contained shall be construed as permitting the grantee to erect any structures whatever upon City streets, and the Company shall not construct or maintain any fixture or structure in the street unless especially authorized by resolution of the Board.

Ninth—All vehicles which may be operated pursuant to this contract shall comply with the following general requirements:

1. They shall be propelled by power generated or contained within the vehicle itself, but no power shall be used which will in its generation or use produce smoke or noxious odors sufficient in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives to constitute a nuisance.
2. The maximum weight, including fuel, water, oil or any other material or any accessories used in operation, shall not exceed nine thousand five hundred (9,500) pounds.
3. The seating space shall not be more than that sufficient to accommodate forty (40) adults.
4. The maximum width shall not exceed seven feet two inches (7'2").
5. The maximum height shall not exceed eleven feet eight inches (11'8").
6. The maximum length shall not exceed twenty-four feet (24').
7. They shall be designed and constructed in a manner which will permit ease and freedom of movement under all conditions.
8. The distribution of weight on axles, length of wheel base and other features of design shall be such as to avoid skidding as far as possible and shall be such as to permit easy steering and control.
9. They shall be fitted with brakes capable of stopping and holding the same under all conditions.
10. They shall be so constructed that the oil or grease cannot drop on the roadway.
11. All parts shall be so constructed that no undue noise or vibration shall result from operation.

Tenth—No stage or omnibus shall be operated pursuant to this contract unless there shall be painted thereon in letters sufficiently large to be clearly visible for a distance of seventy-five feet:

- (a) The name of the Company owning and operating such vehicle.
- (b) The number of the vehicle which is assigned to it upon receiving the approval of the Board or its authorized representatives.
- (c) The number of adults for which the vehicle has seating space.

Eleventh—No advertising signs shall appear on the outside of any stage or omnibus.

Twelfth—The destination of each stage or omnibus shall be plainly indicated on the front of the vehicle, and shall be illuminated at night.

Thirteenth—The number of passengers to be carried in any vehicle shall at no time exceed the seating capacity of the vehicles.

Fourteenth—The inclosed portion of all stages or omnibuses which are operated on said routes shall be heated during the cold weather in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force affecting surface railway cars or such laws and ordinances affecting stages or omnibuses as may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be in force, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Fifteenth—The inclosed portion of all stages or omnibuses operated on said routes shall be well lighted or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—Before any stage or omnibus is put in service it must be submitted to the Board or its authorized representatives and receive the approval thereof. If any vehicle which may be so submitted for approval shall not conform with the requirements herein or should any such vehicle for any reason be considered by the Board or its authorized representatives unfit for public use, then the Board or its authorized representatives may refuse such approval, in which case the Company shall not operate such vehicle. If after a vehicle shall have been so approved, defects develop which in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives render it unsuitable for public service, then the Board or its authorized representatives may require the withdrawal of such vehicle from service.

Upon being approved by the Board or its authorized representatives, each vehicle shall be given a number which shall not be changed so long as such vehicle shall be operated by the Company, unless and until the Company shall notify the Board that it proposes to change the number of the vehicle and of the new number which it is proposed to use.

Seventeenth—All vehicles operated pursuant to this grant shall be maintained in good and safe repair and in a manner which will in all ways

render the vehicle fit for public service. The Company shall permit the Board or its authorized representatives to inspect at all reasonable times any or all the vehicles used by the Company. If upon inspection any vehicle shall appear in the judgment of said Board or its authorized representatives to be unfit for public service, then the Company shall, upon notice, immediately withdraw such vehicle from service, and shall remedy the defect and notify the Board or its authorized representatives that the defect has been remedied before such vehicle shall be restored to service.

Eighteenth—All laws and ordinances affecting the operation of stages or omnibuses now in force or which may be in force during the term of this contract shall be complied with by the Company. The Company shall also comply with and enforce the carrying out of any orders or regulations which may be issued by the Board, designed for the protection of persons, of property or of the comfort and health of the public.

Nineteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon any stage or omnibus route herein authorized shall not exceed ten (10) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than ten (10) cents for one continuous ride from any point on any of the stage or omnibus routes hereby authorized to any other point on any said routes.

Twentieth—Stages or omnibuses shall be run on said routes at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes during the period of each day between 6 o'clock a. m. and 12 o'clock midnight, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by resolution of the Board.

Twenty-first—The Company shall, at its own expense, do anything and everything within its power to keep its vehicles in operation on regular schedules during the existence of snow and ice in the streets and avenues upon which the Company is hereby authorized to operate, and if it shall be necessary to remove such snow and ice to the side of the roadway in order to so operate, then such removal shall be done under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of Queens, but in no event shall snow or ice so removed be allowed by the Company to obstruct the crosswalks of any street.

Twenty-second—It is understood that the Company shall operate, pursuant to this contract, only the routes herein authorized, but should vehicular traffic be diverted from any portion of any of the streets or avenues upon which the Company is hereby authorized to operate because of fires, parades or because of any other event which will close the street to vehicular traffic temporarily, then the Company may use such other streets or avenues as are necessary to continue the operation. If, however, for any reason any of the streets and avenues in which the operation is hereby authorized shall be closed to vehicular traffic for a longer period than twenty-four hours, then the Company shall communicate with the Board or its authorized representatives and obtain authority for the operation upon other streets and avenues for the period during which said street or avenue may be closed.

Twenty-third—Should it be deemed advisable by the Board at any time during the term of this contract to require the Company to operate extensions to the routes herein authorized, additional route or routes in substitution for those herein authorized, and the Board shall so order, then the Company shall, upon notice by the Board, apply for a franchise or right to operate such extension, additional or substituted routes and accept a franchise therefor upon terms and conditions similar to those contained herein, and for a term expiring not later than the date of the expiration of this contract, provided that the Board shall not hereunder require the Company to extend its routes for a distance greater than one mile during any calendar year.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1 of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.
17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall keep accurate books of the performance of different types of vehicles and the different services rendered and the cost thereof, and shall at any time furnish the Board, or its authorized representatives, such information with respect thereto as shall be requested.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board or its authorized representatives, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Any false entry in the books of the Company or false statement in the reports to the Comptroller as to a material fact, knowingly made by

the Company, shall constitute such a violation or breach or failure to comply with the provisions herein contained as to warrant the forfeiture of the franchise.

Nothing herein contained shall affect in any way the right of the Company to apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for review of any action of the Board forfeiting the franchise or consent herein granted.

Twenty-eighth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages or at the option of the Board this contract may be forfeited upon ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the operation of the stage or omnibus routes authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the Company shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Thirtieth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, and the maintenance of vehicles in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract; and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the roadway, repair, maintenance or withdrawal from service of vehicles, the Company shall pay a sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each vehicle that shall not be properly heated, or lighted in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters, as fixed or liquidated damages, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the sums as fixed or liquidated damages in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed damages, or the whole amount of such damages is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such damages from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of one thousand dollars (\$1,000), and in default thereof this contract may be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. These provisions for the recovery of such damages are in addition to the right to forfeit the franchise conferred by Section 2, Subdivision Twenty-seventh of this contract.

Thirty-first—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company or if no such designation shall have been made, or if such designation shall have been made for any reason become inoperative, shall be made in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Thirty-second—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title" encountered in the routes hereinabove described and upon or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to operate stages or omnibuses.

Thirty-third—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.
