No. 480.

Veteran Corps of Artillery, New York—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$200, to Provide for Services of Artillery Corps Band and Drum Corps on Decoration Day, May 30, 1918.

The Veteran Corps of Artillery of the State of New York, Commandants' Office, Armory, Park Avenue and 34th Street, New York City, May 3, 1918.

Hon. ALFRED E. SMITH, President, Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Dear Mr. President—On Memorial Day of the Grand Army of the Republic, May 30, 1918, his Honor the Mayor and other officials of the City will review the parade from Soldiers' Monument, Riverside Drive, Borough of Manhattan.

It has been customary, on particular request of the Memorial Committee, G. A. R., for the Veteran Corps of Artillery of the State of New York to have a guard of honor at the reviewing stand as peculiarly appropriate to the occasion, this historic corps being, by law, a "separate and distinct corps" in the organized active militia of our State from the lately federalized National Guard, and preserved, with its "accustomed privileges," in every militia organizing act of Congress from May 8, 1792, to the the National Defense Act of June 3, 1916, both inclusive. * * *

The reviewing stand at Soldiers' Monument, Riverside Drive, on Memorial Day usually accommodates two thousand guests, including many United States, State and City officials and foreign consuls general and others distinguished in public life, and the seating of these takes time.

The necessity of having a band there with the guard of honor to play while waiting arrival of the regular army, navy, militia and civic associations in the parade, and the drum corps to receive properly a President of the United States, a Governor, a Commanding General, a foreign officer of rank, has made it incumbent on the corps to assume every year such expense to do honor to the occasion in our great imperial republican city.

We have, as you can see, been at so much individual corps expense during the year now closing in our City's service to do its behests, that I beg that you now take over this Memorial Day expense and appropriate \$200 for the corps' band and drum corps service, and trust that this requests will be favorably considered.

The appropriation sought this year by the Memorial Committee of the Grand Army of the Republic is totally distinct from that preferred above and has nothing to do with it.

I take pleasure in saying, however, that although their request this year is larger than that of last year, made unavoidable by increase in cost of labor and material for reviewing stands, I have gone carefully over the request of those honest and patriotic G. A. R. Veterans and trust they will be accorded what they ask.

Department of Health—Request for Authority to Make Repairs to the Steamboat "Franklin Edson," Without Public Letting.

City of New York, Department of Health, Office of the Secretary, April 30, 1918.

Hon. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk, Municipal Building, New York City:

Dear Sir—Under date of February 1st, 1918, the U. S. Steamboat Inspection Service ordered that the Department steamboat "Franklin Edson" be placed in dry dock for examination prior to issuing of license. After considerable difficulties, owing to rush of government work, a dock was finally secured in Hoboken, N. J. After docking of boat and further inspection by the U. S. Inspector, the following items of repair were ordered done before certificate of inspection could be issued by the U. S. Steamboat Inspection Service:

- "Three approved fire extinguishers.
- "Lock nut to be placed on drip pipe between guards on starboard side as explained.
- "Office to be notified when this vessel is on dry dock in order that further examination of hull may be made.
- "Lower corner in back of port furnace (as marked) to be reinforced by approved welding.
- "Star port furnace in lower corner in back end to be reinforced by same process.
- "Joint on bottom blow to boiler to be renewed, outside shell to be painted, also scale removed inside of boiler.
- "Engineer's report on fusible plugs to be sent to this office."

It was not anticipated that the work involved would exceed \$1,000, and furthermore, no definite estimate was obtainable, either from the Tietjen and Lang Company, at whose plant the boat was docked, or from other shipyards, as they all had more work than they could possibly handle. The boat was urgently needed at that time for transporting sailors suffering from contagious diseases from the Navy Yard and other cantonments to the various hospitals of the Department of Health, and as the time for the use of the dry dock was limited to six days, the firm was requested to proceed with the work under the direction of the U. S. Inspector. The cost of this work when completed amounted to \$1,220.18.

As this is in violation of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, which provides that no work shall be done in excess of \$1,000 without public letting, and as this was entirely unforeseen, the Honorable Board of Aldermen is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the expenditure of \$2,500 for necessary repairs to the Department steamboat "Franklin Edson" without public letting, this sum to include additional repairs that will be ordered by the U. Sir—Under date of April 2, 1918, this Department requested the Honorable Board of Aldermen to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$250,000 to dispose of ashes, street sweepings and rubbish deposited on the marginal streets adjacent to the City's dumping boards, amounting, approximately, to 251,000 cubic yards.

On March 22, 1918, a contract was entered into by the City with Jacob Fradus Contracting, Inc., to dispose of this material at ninety cents (90c) per cubic yard, but before entering into this contract the estimated amount of material to be disposed of was reduced by eliminating Delancey Street location, which approximated 12,000 cubic yards, thereby reducing the estimated amount of material to be disposed of to about 239,000 cubic yards, at ninety cents (90c) per cubic yard, or \$215,100.

This contract has been registered on the books of the Department of Finance as No. 49,382 and temporarily charged to the Account No. 2388.

In view of the above facts I would recommend that my request for special revenue bonds be reduced to read \$215,100, instead of \$250,000 formerly requested.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On April 26, 1918 (Cal. No. 193), your Board referred to its Committee on Finance and Budget a communication from the West End Association requesting that the Corporation Counsel be provided with funds necessary for a proper presentation of the City's various contentions in litigation now pending having for its object the suppression of the acid fumes which certain industrial works in New Jersey along the Hudson River emit and which are carried over the City of New York, and particularly affect the western and central portion of the Borough of Manhattan. The Corporation Counsel appeared before the Board and orally joined in the request, suggesting an appropriation of \$25,000. The fumes in question are unquestionably the cause of much annoyance and distress to residents and property owners, particularly in the region above referred to. Your Committee is advised that conditions became serious as far back as the spring of 1913. Continuous efforts have been made from that time down to the present by the West End Association and other residents and property owners to obtain relief from the noxious gases in question. Temporary abatement of the nuisance has occurred at different times, but matters appear to be worse now than for a long time past. This is not only a great hardship to those who are compelled to inhale the fumes and gases in question, but it will inevitably result in great depreciation of property values and the practical ruin for residential purposes of some of the choicest localities in the Borough of Manhattan. The locality affected is improved with the highest type of private residences and apartment houses, which are heavily assessed and on which the property owners for many years have paid large sums in taxes.

The appropriation now sought is for the purpose of enabling the Corporation Counsel to make the proper presentation of the technical side of the subject. The State Health Commissioner has said that it will be necessary to prove the source and the extent of the nuisance and the means, if any, by which it may be abated. This will include a chemical analysis of the air in the region affected at various times and places, and also of the fumes and gases complained of, as well as of the products of the various companies. It involves the use of expert testimony upon the various aspects of the subjects thus to be presented.

The Committee, at its session of April 29, 1918, determined to recommend that an appropriation of \$10,000 be made available for the purpose and that such appropriation be made under the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the Charter.

Resolution Requesting the Court House Board to Improve the Court House Site on Lafayette Street.

By Alderman Haulbert—

Whereas, The City of New York is the owner of certain premises located on Lafayette, Leonard, Baxter, Park, Duane and Pearl Streets and City Hall Place, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, which were purchased for the purpose of having erected thereon a new County Court House for New York County; and

Whereas, The City has been the owner of a portion of said premises since March 1st, 1913, and the remaining portion since May 6th, 1915, and since acquisition thereof nothing has been done to improve said premises, same being vacant and unemployed, bringing no income to the City, but on the contrary, have been the source of tremendous expense, and incidentally by reason of the present condition of the premises are an eyesore in a locality where land is extremely desirable and valuable; and

Whereas, The City paid for said premises the sum of \$12,031,562.36, for which amount up to December 31st, 1917, corporate stock was allotted; and

Whereas, The estimated annual interest at four per cent. on said sum amounts to \$481,262.49, and the estimated taxes lost through City ownership of the premises amounts to \$600,000; and

Whereas, That inasmuch as the proposed new court house will not be erected for many years to come, owing to the City's impoverished financial condition, considering the enormity of the interest bearing charges and taxes lost per annum, which, together amount to about half a million of dollars, by reason of the City ownership of said site, both of which have to be paid and stood for by the taxpayers of The City of New York, and further considering the high tax rate for the ensuing year; therefore be it

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

1. That the Court House Board of The City of New York be and it hereby is respectfully requested to take any and all necessary and proper measures, as it may deem proper and advantageous to the people of the city, not in conflict or inconsistent with any legislative, judicial or other act relating to the use of said site, either to improve said site for the purpose of temporarily housing some of the City Departments, Boards, Commissions or other municipal bodies, to house which large sums of rent are being now paid by the City to private owners, or to lease said site of parts thereof to private parties for adequate rent, upon proper terms and for periods which will not interfere with the original purpose for obtaining said site, or to take such other steps or measures in the matter which will produce revenue to the City, and thereby assist in reducing the enormous carrying charges of the premises in question.

2. That the said Court House Board be and it hereby is respectfully requested to proceed with all convenient speed in the aforesaid matter, for the purpose of alleviating to some extent, if possible, the financial burden of the taxpayers of The City of New York, and also, to advise the Board of Aldermen of its contemplated action in the matter.

Gentlemen—Would respectfully request your permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, wheat flour and flour substitutes for the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Correction in an amount not to exceed \$231,851, to be subdivided as follows:

\$176,298.50 for purchase of wheat flour.

\$55,552.50 for purchase of flour substitutes.

Due to the Government taking over control of output of all flour it has been impossible to have merchants contract for it. In fact, this Committee has experienced considerable difficulty in obtaining quantities even in the open market, purchases having to be made according to supply any flour merchant might have on hand and be willing to dispose of.

According to Government regulations, 25 per cent. of flour substitute must be mixed with 75 per cent. of wheat flour in making bread. Flour substitutes are practically barley, rice, corn and rye flour.

The President's report was presented stating that the following committees had been appointed since the last regular meeting March 11:

Submission 2330—Transverse Road at 101st Street: Commissioners Bacon (chairman), O'Brien and Guerin; appointed March 23, 1918. City Hall Cupola: Commissioners Bacon (chairman), de Forest, Quinn and Lockwood; appointed April 2, 1918.

Submission 2331—Kings County Court House Tablets: Commissioners Quinn (chairman), Bacon and Lawrence; appointed April 16, 1918.

Submission 2332—Gunnison Memorial Window: Commissioners Lockwood (chairman), Healy and Lawrence; appointed April 16, 1918.





Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen and the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be at the condition of the property as of the date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb level at that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood, to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and each of them, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further.

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or her name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate. The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department. No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
