#### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Thursday, Dec. 6, 1917, at 3:30 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Robbins, O'Keeffe, Farley, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Paulding and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities.

Dr. O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The Board of Aldermen at a recent meeting rescinded the resolution regarding the employment of non-citizens.

The Board of Aldermen also cut from our Budget for 1918 the following new positions which had been granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Assistant Pathologist, at \$1,200, Harlem, Fordham, Gouverneur. Investigator, Gouverneur. Ambulance Driver, Bellevue.

Gouverneur and Bellevue Hospitals have been posted as within the barred zones for enemy aliens. The limits at Bellevue are just east of the Information Office, so that it does not interfere with the admission of patients, the United States Marshal having stated to me that he would not interfere with people admitted to the hospital. Several German employees have left because of this restriction. A few remain who are working in the kitchen, which is outside of the zone.

On account of the poor quality of coal we are having great difficulty in maintaining sufficient steam in the wards to keep them at proper temperature, and operate the laundry and elevators.

The routine work has also been greatly handicapped by the unusual number of employees that have been dismissed since pay day for intoxication.

We have admitted to the hospital within the last few days 60 soldiers from Camp Mills with acute medical and surgical conditions. They are all comfortable and most of them are convalescing.

The contractors for painting and electric work at Gouverneur Out Patient Department are progressing satisfactorily, and the work will probably be finished in two weeks.

The Dock Department have undertaken the work of repairing the 29th Street Pier.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to use all proper precautions to comply with the Government regulations regarding the barred zone for enemy aliens, and it was also

Resolved, To present formally to the

United States Marshal the situation at Bellevue Hospital regarding the admission to the hospital of patients and visitors and the retention of enemy alien employees who are now employed in the kitchens and live in the dormitory, both of which are outside of the zone but within the Bellevue enclosure, and whether the foregoing situation is compatible with the President's proclamation of Nov. 16, 1917.

The Trustees direct that every effort be made to obtain a proper grade of coal for the hospitals of the department, and if necessary to have the requirements of the specifications changed to answer this purpose.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Dr. Brannan presented a tabulation of bids received at Bellevue Hospital on Dec. 5 for furnishing equipment for the new Out Patient Department at Gouverneur Hospital. After consideration, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, contracts were awarded to the low formal bidders, except as hereinafter noted. Bids received on lines 1 to 6, inclusive, 15, 16, 39, 40 and 51 were rejected on account of the high cost and the lack of competition. Bids were rejected on lines 24, 311, 314 and 322, on which there were tie bids; these articles to be purchased in the open market. Bids on line 306 were rejected, as there was only one bid. On the items on which no bids were received, and on which the expenditure will not exceed \$1,000, the purchase in the open market was authorized.

On the recommendation of the Medical Board and the Conference Committee the following nominations were approved and appointments made accordingly: Second Division—Ethan F. Butler as Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon in charge of Military Surgery; Rowland P. Blythe, Resident Surgeon from July 1, 1917; John Miller, Resident Physician from July 1, 1917; Jack V. Bohrer, Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon (from July 1, 1917), temporarily appointed for S. Everingham. Third Division—W. Howard Barber, Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon; Daniel J. Swan, Assistant Physician to Out Patients from July 1, 1917.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital returned the following names to the Executive Committee for renomination with proper credentials: H. Lambert Bibby, Assistant Physician to O. P., Pediatrics; H. Laurence Dowd, Assistant Physician to O. P., Pediatrics; Clarence D'Alton, Assistant Physician to O. P., Pediatrics; Albert M. Stevens, Assistant Physician to O. P., Pediatrics.

The Executive Committee was

requested on July 11 and again on Oct. 1 to furnish credentials for these men, but no reply has as yet been received.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Fordham Hospital, recommended the appointment of George Milani as Surgeon to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon to Fordham Hospital for the remainder of the year 1917, Dr. Milani being one of the candidates nominated by the Medical Board.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital, recommended the creation, for the duration of the war, of two positions of Provisional Adjunct Surgeons. After discussion, the report was approved and the places created, Herbert E. Stein being appointed to one of them.

The request of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for a readjustment of the time of service for internes and the recommendation that the service be for one year for the duration of the war was considered. For the purpose of uniformity throughout the department in considering the change from a two-year service, the Trustees authorized a sixteen months' service and such adjustment as may be necessary at Harlem Hospital to bring this about. The appointment of Ralph Hall Whitcher as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Pediatrics, was approved.

A letter was presented from Messrs. Jennings & John, contractors for the laying out of the ground at Harlem Hospital, requesting an extension of thirty days' to complete the work, on account of difficulty in obtaining material due to the freight embargo. This request was granted.

The work under the contract of James McCullagh, Inc., for the installation of additional plumbing fixtures in the new building for the Out Patient Department was accepted and final payment authorized.

Dr. Brannan referred to the desirability of authorizing the expenditure of the interest of the trust funds on deposit in the various accounts of the department for the purchase of toys for the children at Neponsit and the other hospitals of the department. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize this expenditure.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

Correspondence was presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries under date of Nov. 24 and 30, in regard to the

repairs to the pier at the foot of E. 29th st. The Department of Docks has ordered the engineer to undertake the work at once and requested the Trustees to prepare bills for payment as soon as submitted by the Dock Commissioner. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with this request.

A letter, dated Nov. 30, was presented from Rudolph Reimer, contractor for the delivery of coal to the Neponsit Beach Hospital for Children, asking for another extension of thirty days' time on his contract. This request was granted on account of the difficulty in obtaining the coal called for under the contract at the present time.

A letter was presented from the Mayor's Advisory Committee on War Service, regarding the method to be followed in dealing with the enlistment of City employees in military, naval or military service during the present war. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to comply with this procedure.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for Nov. 28 were presented. The report regarding the autopsies was noted, and the report that it is the sense of the Executive Committee that the medical care of poliomyelitis cases should be assumed by the Children's Medical Service was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for Dec. 1 were presented. The nomination of Gertrude Greenstein as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, Tuberculosis Clinic, and the recommendation that the position of Assistant Visiting Pediatrician be created and that Leslie Brown be appointed to the place were referred to the Conference Committee. The General Medical Superintendent was instructed to provide the equipment required for the X-ray service for which funds were allowed in the budget for 1918.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for Nov. 20 were presented. The report from Dr. Haynes regarding the great length of time required to secure repairs to hospital furniture was noted, a copy having been sent to each member of the Board of Trustees, together with a report relating thereto from the Assistant Superintendent of the hospital and from the Purchasing Agent.

From these reports it does not appear that there has been a delay of six months as stated. The Trustees in considering this complaint informed the members of the Medical Board that they desire to make every effort to obtain promptly all the supplies and equipment that may be required for the proper care of patients, and instructed the General Medical Superintendent to direct the superintendent of each hospital to mark "urgent" those requisitions for supplies or equipment, the need for which is of an urgent nature. The requisitions are to be followed up by the superintendent of that hospital within two weeks. If the Purchasing Agent cannot obtain these articles, or if they will be delayed, a report thereon shall be returned to the superintendent of the hospital, who, in turn, shall have the information conveyed to the person from whom the requisition originated, setting forth the reasons for the delay or the impossibility of obtaining the items. Should the physicians or surgeons under the jurisdiction of the Medical Board fail to obtain supplies and equipment promptly, they are to bring the matter to the attention of the General Medical Superintendent for presentation to the Trustees so that they may know of any delinquencies that may occur in the department. The foregoing procedure is to be adopted in all the hospitals of the department and each Medical Board so notified. The report regarding the long period of time which elapsed between the taking of samples of blood for Wasserman examinations and the receipt of a report from the Department of Health was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for proper attention.

A letter was presented from W. H. Stewart, asking for permission to increase the number of students in the Roentgen Department of Harlem Hospital from four to six. These students are officers in the United States Army and receive instruction in the New York School of Roentgenology. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this request was approved.

A communication was received from Charles A. Elsberg, Director of the Neuro-Surgical School of New York, presenting a request that the Trustees relieve Alfred S. Taylor from active duty at Fordham Hospital so as to give the necessary time to instruction in the Neuro-Surgical School, which is established pursuant to an order of the Surgeon General of the Army for the training of military surgeons in neuro-surgery. A letter relating thereto was also presented from Major Walter R. Parker, M. R. C. Dr. Brannan reported that he replied that in all probability the department will be able to comply with this request by rearranging the surgical service at Fordham Hospital, upon the receipt of a formal

request from Dr. Taylor for an indefinite leave of absence on account of military duty, at the same time naming the substitute who is to cover the service. It was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital and Dr. Taylor that the Trustees desire to co-operate with the government and believe that this arrangement can be accomplished.

A letter was presented from Irving T. Bush, Chief Executive Officer of the Board for the Port of New York, requesting information concerning the piers at the foot of E. 28th and 29th sts. The President reported that he had replied to this letter, stating that the Trustees wish to co-operate in every way, but that they do not believe the piers would be feasible in a commercial way, as they have not been so utilized since 1910, and invited him to send his representative to call in order to show how the piers are used and how it would be impossible to devote them for other purposes.

A letter, dated Nov. 23, was presented from Victor C. Pedersen, requesting the Trustees to make allowance for irregularities and lateness in attendance, as much of his time will be occupied on behalf of the Government. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was moved to request Dr. Pedersen to make application for a leave of absence, at the same time naming the man who is to cover his service.

A resolution, dated Nov. 13, was presented from the Board of Aldermen, authorizing an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$6,550 to meet the anticipated deficits. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resolution was ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made, seconded and carried.


