

NEW COURT-HOUSE COMMISSION.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners for the Completion of the New County Court-house.

JULY 3, 1877. The amount of \$20,000 was certified to the Finance Department for payment to Messrs. Sinclair

& Milne, for completing the stonework up to ten feet above the first floor.

The contractors for the several works were directed to proceed with all practicable speed in the execution of their respective contracts, and, if possible, to complete during the vacation of the courts

all the interior and other portions of the works that would of necessity interfere with the business of

A representative of Messrs. Pearse & Lawrence, agents for the Globe Ventilator Company, Troy, New York, submitted a sample patent ventilator for inspection.

Repairs to the storm-doors to the entrance underneath the porch were ordered to be done.

Messrs. Sinclair & Milne having completed the stonework of the walls up to fifteen feet above the first floor, become entitled to a payment of \$20,000. That amount was certified to the Finance

Department.

The sum of \$3,000 was audited and requisition was made upon the Comptroller for the payment of same to Messrs. J. & W. C. Spears, that amount having become due to them when the brickwork of the extension was built up to the top of the second story.

The Chairman was directed to notify the Comptroller that the funds available for this Commission were nearly exhausted, and that the issue of more bonds is necessary to meet obligations accruing under the contracts already filed in the Finance Department.

Whereas, Many of the numerous "excursion" steamboats and barges that leave this city daily are overcrowded with men, women, and children to such a degree as to render them peculiarly liable to accidents, thus endangering the lives of thousands of our people; and Whereas, It is clearly in violation of the laws of the United States thus to permit overcrowded vessels to navigate the waters within their jurisdiction, and it appears to be the duty of certain officials of the United States to enforce these laws—a duty which in the port of New York is notoriously neglected, thus rendering it necessary that some other means should be taken to prevent this appalling danger to so many of our citizens; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and be is hereby respectfully requested to

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby respectfully requested to inform this Board at his earliest convenience if it is not now in the power of some local State or city authority to prohibit this reprehensible and dangerous as well as illegal practice of overloading "excursion" boats with people; also if it is not in the power of the Common Council, in the absence of any existing State law or municipal ordinance, legally to pass an ordinance that will prevent boats thus overcrowded from leaving any of the piers of this city.
