Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held November 19th, 1880. Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain, and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen. The minutes of the meetings held October 25th, 26th, 30th, and November 4th, 1880, were read and approved.
