#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 2, 1886 :

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,328. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 493. During the past week 292 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port 78 permits

Officer of the Port, 78 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits. There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 7 permits. There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks, 72 permits. At premises where contagious diseases were reported 58 visits were made, and 17 disinfections and 5 functions were performed.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 50 visits were made, and 17 disinfections 5 fumigations were performed. The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 2. The number of vaccinations performed was 1,167, of which 293 were primary and 874 revac-

cinations

There were seized and condemned 8,870 pounds of meat and 100 pounds of fish, 405 pounds of bologna and 88,886 pounds of dried currants.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 42, the number of analyses of same made was 1, and the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 19. There were disinfected by the Special Disinfecting Corps, privies, 515; yards, 510; cellars, 515, and streat cutters. 12 miles and street gutters, 12 miles.

The certificates of 594 births, 65 still-births, 280 marriages, and 677 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 2, 1886. This shows a decrease of 86 births, and an increase of 17 still-births, 23 marriages and 62 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885 there was a decrease of 65 births, and an increase of 15 still-births, 75 marriages and 134 deaths, Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 2; typhoid fever, 5; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 10; rheumatism and gout, 3; cancer, 2; heart diseases, 9; marasmus, tabes, mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; surgical operations, 1; drowning, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 1; diphtheria, 6; croup, 4; whooping cough, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 3; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 10; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 13; aneurism, 1, meningitis and encephalitis, 8; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and ner-vous system, 24; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 14; premature and preternatural births, 5; suicide, 1.
