

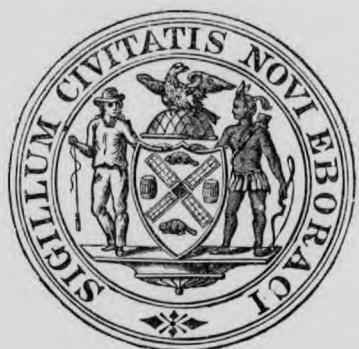

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 114 were in institutions, 396 in tenement-houses, 125 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 175 on the second, 116 on the third, 87 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth; 665 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 12 non-residents; 86 were stated to be single, 153 married, 75 widowed, and the condition of 363 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 677; still-births, 65; bodies in transitu, 12; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 74 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 594 burials; 280 marriages; 65 still-births; 677 deaths; 12 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 127 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage, and 62 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 2, 1886, was 61.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.877, the mean humidity was 71, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,061, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph.D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 640 deaths and still-births, or 86.25 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 31; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 252; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 89; Greenwood (undenominational), 26; Lutheran (undenominational), 99; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 23; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 21; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 11; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Macphelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 12; Washington (undenominational), 13.

The actual mortality for the week ending September 25, 1886, was 608; this is 26 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 16.4 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.82 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,449,136.
