vision for the quarter ending January 31, 1895.

WORK OF CONSTRUCTION UNDER NEW PLAN.
NORTH RIVER.
CLEANING PAVEMENT—The pavement on new made land between Pier "A" and West
Tenth street, North river, has been cleaned, from time to time, as required, under resolution of the
Roard May 12 1802 Board May 12, 1892.

BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

PILING AND WOODWORK—Cap and decking was laid and fastened, and 2 batches of concrete were mixed and placed in rear of wall to back up granite.

STONE FILLING—Cobble was discharged between caps, and rip-rap was deposited in rear

PILING AND WOODWORK—Transverse caps were made, placed and fastened, and cap decking was laid and fastened. 110 pieces of granite were set, and backed up with 284 batches of concrete; 20 pieces of coping were set; backing-logs were made, placed and fastened and joints in creative project.

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BULKHEAD-WALL PROPER.

MASONRY—Mud was pumped from rock bottom; 11 batches of concrete in bags were mixed and deposited on rock foundation; 8 batches of concrete in mass were mixed and placed on top of 1,250 00 concrete in bags; 13 concrete blocks were set on wall foundation and chain holes were filled with

concrete in bags; 159 pieces of granite were set and backed up with 248½ batches of concrete; 33 pieces of coping were set; backing logs were placed and fastened; joints in granite were pointed, and rip-rap was deposited in rear of wall.

REMOVING OLD WORK—Old piles were cut off at about low water and removed.

EARTH FILLING—6,264 truck and 1,538 cart loads of earth filling were received from Thomas Smith, and same were placed in rear of wall. Total received to date, 49,314 loads.

West Fifty-seventh Street Section—Resolution of the Board, August 1, 1889.

EARTH FILLING—554 truck and 212 cart loads of earth filling were received and placed in rear of wall between West Fifty-fifth and West Fifty-sixth streets, which completed the filling at that point.

Yellow pine timber was transferred from Pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street to this section and placed on the bulkhead preparatory to framing and placing on the new bulkhead-wall.

"D," "E," "F," "H," "L," "K," "L," "M," "N," "O," "P," "R," "S" and "U"; 5 divers' scows, "A," "G," "N," "S" and "U"; 5 divers' scows, "A," "G," "N," "S" and "T"; boring-machine "Woodcock"; steam launch "Inspector"; 2 naphtha engine launches, Nos. 1 and 2; 28 yawl boats, I skiff, 2 batteaux, I row-boat and 5 sounding boats; 2 sets of landways. one 30 feet and one 45 feet high; I set inclined 50 feet pile-driver ways.

Various materials and supplies for the use of floating property have been received and expended in part, and the remainder has been stored for future use. Miscellaneous.

Various pieces of work have been done at West Fifty-seventh Street Yard for the use of floating property and for other work, such as hanging fenders, straightedges, ladders, pike poles, etc. The force of the Department have also been engaged in filing saws, spinning oakum, pitch, pumping out scows and in general care of floating property.

Bulkhead, One Hundred and Thirty-eighth to One Hundred and Fortieth Street, H. R. 4,345 loads of material were received under Secretary's Order No. 11226, and same were placed behind the above bulkhead. Total received to date, 80,350 loads.
