Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their Office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, October 10, 1894, at 3 o'clock P. M.

The Construction or Executive Committee presented the following communication, received from the Chief Engineer :

NEW YORK, October 10, 1894.

To the Honorable the Committee on Construction :

GENTLEMEN—Several houses, occupied by the contractors, remain in Basin "M." They should now be removed, and I respectfully recommend that the Secretary be directed to sell the same at auction, to be removed on or before November 20, 1894.
