It is absurd to assert that a heavy truck should pass over the groin of any man, and subsequently the hind wheels of the same truck pass over the foot of the same man, and that he could then get up, walk some distance and telephone for an ambulance. The fact of his being on duty and being injured would have some weight with me, but when he violates the rules deliberately and does not ask advice of any of the officers in his precinct, it is prima facie evidence that he knows more of the law than the Captain. The report of the Inspector is approved unless some other evidence is shown by which the officer can moderate the force of the facts as stated. I am always in favor of giving an officer injured in the discharge of his duty full pay, but in this case I believe the officer misrepresents the entire proceeding. Let the matter be thoroughly investigated, and if there is any evidence that this man was injured while in the absolute discharge of his duty so that he was detained at home, I will re-examine it."

On reading and filing report of the Committee appointed June 19, 1901, to prepare a plan for patrolling the City of New York by dividing the patrol force into three platoons, with an explanatory chart showing the tours of duty of platoons and sections pursuant to such plan, it is

Ordered, That the plan and chart submitted by the Committee be and is hereby adopted, and shall go into effect on the day of August, 1901.

Ordered, That the following rule be adopted, to be known as Rule No. 51, in the proposed Book of Rules, to provide a system of patrolling by three platoons:

A. The patrol force of each precinct shall consist of three platoons, known as the first, second and third platoons, and each platoon shall be divided into three sections, to be known as the first, second and third section of each platoon respectively.

The first platoon will go on patrol duty the first month daily from 8 A. M. until 4 P. M. (as indicated on the chart in red), when they will be relieved by the second platoon, who will perform patrol duty for one month daily from 4 P. M. to 12 midnight (as indicated on the chart in red). They in turn will be relieved by the third platoon, who will go on patrol duty daily from 12 midnight until 8 A. M. (as indicated on the chart in red).

These tours will continue in that order until the first of the month.

At the expiration of each tour of patrol duty (as above indicated) the platoon will be excused from duty and permitted to go home.

Two sections of each platoon upon being relieved from patrol duty will be permitted to remain at home for 10 hours (until it is time for them to resume patrol). The other section will return to the station-house 4 hours after the expiration of their tour of patrol duty and remain in reserve for 8 hours, when they will again be excused for 4 hours and resume patrol duty at their designated hour (as indicated on the chart in red).

Each of the three sections will perform reserve duty, rotating daily thus: The first day the first section of the first, second and third platoons, each performing 8 hours reserve, will cover that reserve for the 24 hours (as indicated on the chart in blue).

On the second day the second section of the first, second and third platoons, each performing 8 hours reserve, will cover that reserve for 24 hours (as indicated on the chart in blue).

On the third day the third section of the first, second and third platoons, each performing 8 hours reserve, will cover that reserve for 24 hours (as indicated on the chart in blue).

On the fourth day the first section of the first, second and third platoons, will again perform the reserve for that day and rotate as per chart.

These tours of duty will continue from the first to the last day of the month.

On the last day of the month, for the purpose of changing both patrol and reserve under this system, the first platoon, which performs patrol duty from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M., does not come on patrol until 12 midnight of the first of the month following (calendar time), as indicated on the chart in red.

For the purpose of changing the reserve tours each month, the platoon doing the tour of patrol from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. on the last day of the month will cover twenty-four hours reserve with their three sections.

Four hours after the expiration of their tour of patrol duty, one section (the section whom it would be to perform reserve duty in the rotating order), will return and perform reserve duty from 8 P. M. to 4 A. M., when they will be relieved by another section (the section whom it would be to perform the next tour of reserve in rotating order), who will perform the reserve from 4 A. M. to 12 noon. They in turn to be relieved by the other section of said platoon who will cover the last tour of reserve (from 12 noon to 8 P. M.), as indicated on the chart in blue.

The second platoon on the last day of the month would perform the tour of patrol duty from 4 P. M. to 12 midnight when they would be excused for 8 hours, returning at 8 A. M. and performing the first tour of patrol duty the following day (from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M.) as indicated on the chart in red.

The third platoon which performed the tour of patrol duty from 12 midnight to 8 A. M. on the last day of the month, at the expiration of that tour of patrol duty would be excused for eight hours and return at 4 P. M., and perform that eight-hour tour of patrol duty (from 4 P. M. to 12 midnight), as indicated on the chart in red.

This effected complete change of patrol and reserve duty and brings them in the position designated on the second day of the month on the accompanying chart.

These tours continue for one month when the change is made in the same manner. The platoon performing patrol from 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. cover the twenty-four hours reserve, and the two other platoons each performing eight consecutive hours of patrol duty to be excused for eight hours at the expiration of their respective tours of duty and again resume patrol.

The third month the change is made in a similar manner, and at the end of the third month it has formed a complete cycle, and they return to the position they were in on the first month.

It is to be understood that under this system there will be no "night off" or excusing of sections for any reason except in extreme emergency.

This chart, it will be noticed, is drawn indicating every hour of the twenty days.

It shows the various tours of the platoons and sections on patrol and reserve for three (3) days, at which time they alternate to the first position again. It also shows the change on the last and first day of the month.

The red on this chart denotes the hours of a platoon on patrol.

The blue denotes the hours of a section on reserve.

The black spots denote the hours of the platoon or section off duty.

Ordered, That the first part of Paragraph M, of Rule 51, be and is hereby abolished.

The second part of Paragraph M, Rule 51, is hereby amended to read as follows: "They shall, under the direction of the Police Commissioner and Inspector of the Borough and District, divide their platoons into patrol posts or tours, and number the same, and from time to time designate the Patrolman who are to patrol the same."

Ordered, That the part of amended rules be corrected to conform in the above and same be submitted to the Commissioners for his action.
