MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 1174.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor,
October 14, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I have the honor to acknowledge the resolution adopted by your Honorable Board at its last meeting, asking me to take such steps as might seem to me wise to avert from the City the dangers of a coal famine.

In the present situation of affairs it has seemed to me that the first thing to be done was to make available to the fullest extent all the substitutes for anthracite coal that can be commanded. In furtherance of this policy, I am able to say that the Board of Health will not enforce its smoke ordinance while the present difficulty of getting anthracite lasts. The Board of Health will continue to act as adviser in cases of individual complaint, as to how the smoke nuisance may be lessened; but it will give public notice before it resumes the aggressive enforcement of its ordinance. This course will make soft coal available for the large consumers, and will thus make it possible for householders who use coal in small quantities to get such anthracite as comes to the market. They can, of course, use soft coal, also if they please. The measures taken by the coal companies for placing anthracite coal at the command of small consumers are a matter of public knowledge.

I am able to add that the action of your Honorable Board, in allowing various Departments of the City, which are large consumers of coal, to buy without public letting, will be effective in relieving danger in those quarters. Similar action, however, in behalf of the Fire Department is also imperatively needed. The various relief societies are being equipped to give such assistance as is usual. In a word, the situation in the City at the moment is less disturbing than it was.

I am obliged to say, however, with all the earnestness I can command, that the public interest requires the settlement of the coal strike at the earliest possible moment. Nobody can imagine the wide outreaching hardship already springing from existing conditions; nor can anybody overestimate the seriousness of the consequences, if a settlement of this controversy is not speedily reached. In the name of The City of New York, I ask all who have power to relieve the existing situation to remember how many people are obliged to suffer as long as the regular mining of coal is interrupted.

Preamble and resolutions relating to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company's proposed franchise, presented at the meeting of the Board of Directors, Manufacturers' Association, September 8, 1902:

Whereas, The Pennsylvania Railroad Company has made application to the City for a franchise granting it the privilege of extending its lines into and making a terminal in the city; and

Whereas, This is a project that would be of incalculable advantage to the City as well as to that railroad, and we believe this proposal has been made in due form of

law and on a basis of liberality and fair dealing on the part of the railroad corporation; therefore be it

Resolved, That we urge on the Mayor and other City officials concerned, on the Board of Aldermen and on the Rapid Transit Commission, that they should meet the proposal in a like broad-minded spirit and should offer every facility consistent with the interests of the City for the carrying out of this great work; and

Resolved, That there should be no insistence on the insertion of extraneous stipulations, such as those concerning hours of work or wages, for we believe it would be a public calamity if such should be allowed to defer or defeat a measure of such far-reaching and great benefit; and we regard with disapproval any endeavor to introduce such in this proposed contract, being in our judgment inimical at once to the best interests of the City and of labor.

To the Honorable President and Members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

At the last regular meeting of the Local Assembly it was resolved in the matter of the request of the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for a tunnel across New York that, in justice to the public of this city, the said franchise ought to contain the following provisions:

First—The term of grant not to exceed twenty-five years.

Second—Compensation to the City to be a fixed amount for every car passing through the tunnel, whether conveying passengers or freight, instead of an annual lump sum.

Third—The employment of resident citizens only.

Fourth—An eight-hour workday.

Fifth—The payment of the prevailing rate of wages.

Sixth—Arbitration of all disputes that may arise between employers and employees.

The undersigned committee has been appointed to bring this to your attention, and herewith states its reasons why these terms should be embodied in the proposed grant:

A franchise for the use of public property for a period beyond that of one generation at a stated annual sum based on what we consider its present and immediate future value is to rob a coming generation of that which rightfully belongs to it, for its own use and control. In justice alike to grantor and grantee the franchise value should be determined in a manner equitable to both and adjustable to commercial and economic conditions as they develop.

With the growing belief that public utilities should be subject to public control and operation it is a possibility that before the expiration of the term for which the franchise is desired one of two things might occur.

Condemnation and purchase of enterprises controlled by individuals or corporations which partake of the nature of public utilities or are such.

Government establishment of similar enterprises.

Acquisition of such property or granted rights through condemnation would create a financial obligation so large that it would be impossible to discharge it in this generation, and it would create a burden to be borne by those that come after us.

Government undertakings regardless of existing corporate or individual investments of a like nature would result in financial ruin to corporate and individual interests and would be unjust.

With a vast army of unemployed in our midst who now are a charge on the community or likely to become one it is imperative that we prevent the employment of non-residents, who would be engaged solely because they would sell their labor cheaper.

With the increased cost of living in this city the prevailing rate of wages barely suffices to provide the necessities of life. Non-residents working for less would be unable to provide for existence after the completion of the tunnel and would greatly increase the already large number of impoverished unemployed.

Eight hours' labor per day to enable toilers to have sufficient leisure in which to develop their intellectual, moral and social faculties, so that they may share in the gains and honors of advancing civilization.

Arbitration of differences, in order that the bonds of sympathy between employers and employees may be strengthened and strikes rendered unnecessary.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting resolution:

No. 1178.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment,
The City of New York,
New York, October 6, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—At the meeting of this Board, held on September 26, on motion of the Mayor, the following resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in favor thereof:

"Resolved, That in the judgment of this Board it is desirable that the President of the Borough of Queens have authority to expend four thousand dollars, without public letting, in addition to the amount already authorized to be expended, for the construction of a sewer in Lincoln avenue, Fourth Ward, Borough of Queens."

The proposed sewer in Lincoln avenue passes under a conduit supplying water to the Borough of Brooklyn, and the extra expense is made necessary in order to modify the plans for the sewer so as to meet the requirements of the Department of Water Supply, in order to protect the conduit from damage. The matter has been investigated by the Commissioner of Water Supply, the Engineer of Sewers for the Borough of Queens, under the direction of the President of the Borough, and the Engineer of this Board, who have reported that the change of plans is necessary and the sum of \$4,000 is a reasonable one. I inclose, for the consideration of your Honorable Body, a form of resolution approving this expenditure.

Dear Sir—This Department requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to appropriate an additional sum of eighty three thousand dollars (\$83,000) for the purpose of defraying the cost of the erection of three permanent bath houses in the Borough of Manhattan. The amount of three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$325,000) heretofore appropriated for the acquisition of sites and the construction of the buildings is not sufficient to permit the award of the three contracts for the construction of the bath houses for which bids were received on October 7.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000) for the purpose of providing means for the construction and equipping of interior public baths and the acquisition of sites therefor, in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 13, 1902, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount and for the purposes therein specified.

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000), to provide means for the construction and equipping of interior public baths and the acquisition of sites therefor in the Borough of Manhattan, and that when authority shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of eighty-three thousand dollars (\$83,000), the proceeds thereof shall be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Laws and Legislation—

No. 1100.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on September 9, 1902 (Minutes, page 881), the annexed resolution and ordinance in relation to the discharge of fireworks, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed ordinance to be necessary.

They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the discharge of fireworks in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. No person shall fire, discharge or set off in The City of New York any rocket, cracker, torpedo or other fireworks, or thing containing any substance in a state of combustion unless a permit to do so shall first have been issued by the Fire Commissioner or his deputies under such restrictions as the said Fire Commissioner or his deputies may deem necessary for the protection of life and property, except that general permission to discharge fireworks shall not be denied on Independence Day, July 4, of each year.

Sec. 2. Each and every violation of the provisions of the foregoing section shall be punishable by a fine of not more than five dollars (\$5), and in default of payment of such fine, by imprisonment in the City Prison until the same shall be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed one day.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Report of Committee on Public Education—

Nos. 964, 1106—(G. O. 212).

The Committee on Public Education, to which was referred on July 22, 1902, the protest of the National Historical Museum No. 964, and to which also was referred on September 18, 1902, the communication of the Manufacturers' Association of New York No. 1106, would respectfully report:

That two public hearings have been held to which our fellow citizens had been invited; that no person appeared in favor of the proposition suggested by the Manufacturers' Association, while many influential and prominent residents of the City, both ladies and gentlemen, were present, and enthusiastically advocated the retention and preservation of the old Hall of Records, the "most striking monument" now standing in The City of New York.

The building in question is without doubt of great historical interest; about it cluster many hallowed memories; here men struggled, suffered, endured and died for the very principles of liberty which we, their children, enjoy.

This Committee is unanimous in its judgment that the old Hall of Records must not be demolished; that it must be preserved as a memorial of those days when a nation was born and of the place where many of its defenders were imprisoned and died.

We therefore recommend the adoption of the following:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York emphasizes its action and vote passed by this body at its session May 6, 1902.

That we recommend to the Commissioner of the Sinking Fund the necessity of preserving the old Hall of Records, as public sentiment is strongly opposed to its destruction.

That we urge that it remain on the very spot on which it now stands, but if said Commissioners shall find it impossible to comply with this request and necessity compels its removal from its exact present site, and as the Subway Commission has offered to remove it at its own expense, not exceeding six thousand dollars, we recommend that, if removed, it shall be to some nearby place on the City Hall Park, preferably to the northeast corner, which is now occupied by the fire engine house, and that when removed it be leased to the National Historical Museum upon the terms and for the purposes set forth in the resolution previously adopted by this body.

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed authorization to be proper. Whatever happens, the Department will need to purchase coal for the next six weeks without public letting. In cold weather about 300 tons a week is needed for Manhattan and The Bronx, 70 for Brooklyn and Queens, and 28 for the fireboats, when their services are not needed in putting out fires; \$36,000 should provide coal enough for six weeks.

They therefore recommend that the said substitute resolution and ordinance be adopted.

I know of no negotiation pending for the acquisition of a site for a hook and ladder company in the vicinity of Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue.

This site on the southerly side of One Hundred and Fiftieth street, 200 feet west of Cortlandt avenue, upon which it is proposed to erect a new engine house, is owned by the City, having been acquired for \$3,000 by deed dated March 22, 1894.

As stated by the Commissioner, the present quarters of Engine Company No. 41, located at No. 2801 North Third avenue, stands partly upon leased ground. The building is old and in very poor repair. The lot is only about 47 feet deep and not suitable for a new building and will be abandoned when the house in One Hundred and Fiftieth street is completed.

The Commissioner having expressed his willingness to defer the acquisition of a site for a hook and ladder company in the vicinity of Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, and new quarters for Engine Company No. 41 being necessary, I think the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can properly authorize the transfer as requested by the Fire Commissioner.

At the last meeting of your Honorable Board a resolution was considered to enable the City to take, by condemnation, certain land at the junction of Fourth avenue and Astor place, the effect of which would be to widen Fourth avenue at this point, where it is now much congested. The resolution received a majority vote, but not the necessary four-fifths vote which is required to make it effective.

The City is obliged to provide a right-of-way for the Rapid Transit tunnel at this point, where the tunnel turns from Lafayette place into Fourth avenue. The City can meet this obligation in only two ways: (1) By condemning the easement underground, under the Rapid Transit Act; or, (2) by the adoption of the resolution now pending before your Board, the effect of which will be to make the City the owner of the land both on the surface and underground.

It is the belief of the Comptroller and myself that it will cost the City almost as much to secure the easement underground as it will to buy the property in fee. By taking title to the property, however, the City not only secures the right of way for the Subway but it also widens Fourth avenue where it is much congested.

The Rapid Transit contractor has agreed to contribute \$75,000 to the purchase of the fee, as an offset to what he would be obliged to pay for the easement alone.

I cannot help hoping that, with this statement before the Board the necessary majority can be had for the resolution now pending. It has been passed, unanimously, by the Local Board, and is before your Board with the favorable report from the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to which it was referred. It will be apparent, I am sure, that the only sufferer from the failure to enact the resolution will be the City itself, and the only gainers will be the individual property owners, who will be in a position to make the City pay for an easement a very large part of what it would have to pay for a title to the land itself. In the meanwhile, if the City gets only an easement, the conditions upon the surface are not improved; if it acquires the title Fourth avenue will be widened importantly at a point where such widening is very desirable.

That, in pursuance of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, the following resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted by that Board on the 11th day of July, 1902, be and the same hereby is approved, viz.:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York, in pursuance of the provisions of section 442 of the Greater New York Charter, deeming it for the public interest to alter the map or plan of The City of New York, by locating and laying out Shell road from Avenue X to Canal avenue, and extending West Sixth street from Neptune avenue to Sheepshead Bay road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, does hereby favor and approve of the same, so as to lay out and extend the aforesaid street as follows:

The laying out of Shell road consists in laying out a street 70 feet in width from Avenue X southerly to Canal avenue, covering and widening the existing Shell road; the lines of Shell road to be connected with West Sixth street at Canal avenue.

No. 974.

The Committee on Railroads, to whom was referred on July 31, 1902 (Minutes, page 371), the annexed petition of Milliken Brothers for permission to lay four tracks across Shore road, Borough of Richmond, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they therefore recommend that the annexed resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Milliken Brothers, their heirs, executors, administrators, lessees and assigns to lay, construct and maintain four sets of tracks, as more particularly set forth upon the accompanying diagram, over and across the Shore road (otherwise known as Richmond terrace),

in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, from their lands on the north to their lands on the south side of said thoroughfare, the said tracks to cross those of the Staten Island Electric Railroad Company, which company makes no objection thereto, and the said tracks, after continuing over lands owned by the said Milliken Brothers, to connect at the southerly end thereof, with the tracks of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company; the said tracks to be used only for the purpose of facilitating the movement of merchandise of the said Milliken Brothers, in cars over said tracks, provided that, where necessary, all property owners in front of whose premises tracks are to be laid shall previously have given consent thereto; and provided further that the tracks to be laid shall be of a pattern approved by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and to be laid and maintained flush with the surface of the roadway, so as not to interfere with the free use thereof by the public; all the work of laying the tracks, paving between the tracks and two feet outside the outside rails thereof, and maintaining the said pavement in good order to the satisfaction of the President of the Borough of Richmond to be done at the expense of the said Milliken Brothers, under the direction of the President of the Borough of Richmond; the permission hereby given to continue only during the pleasure of the Board of Aldermen.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The petition of Milliken Brothers respectfully shows:

I. That your petitioners are a copartnership firm, composed of Edward F. Milliken and Foster Milliken, engaged in the business of manufacturing structural and ornamental iron and steel work of all descriptions for bridges, buildings and roofs, and having their principal office and place of business at No. 11 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, New York City.

II. That your petitioners are desirous of erecting a plant for the use of their said business on land (on which they have acquired options) situated at Howland Hook, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, and shown on the accompanying map. That said land extends from the right of way of the Rapid Transit Railroad Company on the south to the bulkhead line of Newark Bay on the north, and thus lies on both sides of the Shore road (also known as Richmond terrace).

III. That it is necessary for your petitioners' said business, if they are to erect a plant on the land aforesaid, that four railroad tracks be constructed, connecting with the tracks of the said Rapid Transit Railroad Company, at the south, and extending over the land of your petitioners, across said Shore road (or Richmond terrace), to their shops and the water front on Newark Bay, and that it would be impossible for petitioners to operate a plant on said land without such tracks. That the options for the purchase of said land are expressly conditioned, on the part of petitioners, that leave be obtained to lay said tracks. That the points on the said Shore road (or Richmond terrace), between which your petitioners desire permission to cross the same with their said tracks, are as follows: On the east, a point about two hundred and sixty-six (266) feet westerly (measured along the northerly line of said Shore road) from the westerly side of Holland avenue, as laid out, as the same would be if extended northwardly across said Shore road; and on the west, a point about one thousand (1,000) feet westerly from the point above described, measured along the northerly line of said Shore road, the said points being within the limits, on the northerly side of said Shore road, of the land mentioned in paragraph II. herein on which your petitioners have acquired options.

IV. That the said Shore road between the points aforesaid is little used for general traffic, and that said tracks would not, as your petitioners are informed and believe, be detrimental to any interest, but that, on the other hand, the erection of the plant proposed by your petitioners, as aforesaid, to which the said tracks would be a necessity, would be a positive benefit to the surrounding neighborhood and the said Borough of Richmond. That, except where they cross the said Shore road, the said tracks will be wholly on the land of your petitioners. That, in crossing the said Shore road, the said tracks would have to cross the tracks of the Staten Island Electric Railroad Company, which company, as your petitioners are informed and believe, does not object to the laying of the four tracks across the said Shore road, as aforesaid.

V. Wherefore your petitioners pray, and make application to the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for your consent, leave and permission, to be granted to your petitioners, their heirs, executors, administrators, lessees and assigns, to construct and maintain four tracks, and operate cars thereon, across the Shore road (otherwise known as Richmond terrace), in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, New York City, the said tracks to be laid at places convenient to the said business of your petitioners, but to be within and between the points described in paragraph III. herein and approximately at the points indicated on the accompanying map, and, except where they cross the said Shore road, to be wholly on the land of your petitioners. The said tracks to be laid at grade and to cross the said Shore road and the tracks of the said Staten Island Electric Railroad Company at grade, the motive power to be used thereon to be steam or electricity, and your petitioners to repair and restore the highway after the said tracks have been laid.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on July 31, 1902 (Minutes, page 387), the annexed communication from the President of the Borough of The Bronx requesting an issue of \$15,000 special revenue bonds for funds for "Surveys, etc.," respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed appropriation to be necessary. The Bronx Valley is not provided with any outlet for its sewer system, and it seems inevitable that such facilities must be provided at no distant date. The situation presents unusually difficult engineering problems, and will require a large amount of preliminary surveying and field work.

They therefore recommend that the annexed resolution be adopted.

Resolved, That, in accordance with subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and they are hereby requested to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$15,000 to provide for surveys and investigations in connection with the sewer outlet for the upper part of The Bronx watershed near the north line of the City.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on October 7, 1902 (Minutes, page —), the annexed resolution, being No. 1141, in favor of requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$12,000 for the purchase by the Board of Elections of twenty voting machines, and No. 1140, authorizing the Board of Elections to incur an expenditure of said amount for the purpose of entering into a contract for the purchase of twenty voting machines without public letting, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe that both of the said resolutions are proper and recommend their adoption.

The object of these resolutions is to permit a more extended experiment by The City of New York in the use of voting machines than has ever before been made. The matter of voting machines is not a new one to the Board of Aldermen of The

City of New York. Your Committee believe that the sentiment of the Board is strongly in favor of their use and consequently in favor of making experiment to a considerable extent at this election.

In 1899 the Legislature passed a bill, to wit: Chapter 466 of the Laws of 1899, for a Commission to pass upon voting machines, to legalize their use in elections in the State and several have been so legalized.

Buffalo has used voting machines in the last three elections, as has Ithaca, Syracuse, Elmira, Auburn, Poughkeepsie, Oswego, and a number of other cities have used them during the last two. Rochester, Utica, and some others have used them during the last four. Fifty or more other cities and towns of the State used them for the first time last year. Congress, by Act approved February 11, 1899, has authorized their use in Congressional elections. The testimony in regard to them seems to be universally in their favor. Those who opposed them now favor them, and Republicans and Democrats alike testify in their favor. They do away entirely with votes lost by illegal or ignorant marking of the ballot. They undoubtedly aid the ignorant voter. At the same time they are perfectly secret, and no method to defeat their accurately recording the vote has yet been discovered.

Despite the closeness of some of the campaigns in different towns and cities of the State, they have done away with all contests on the ballots. Had they been used in this City last year, this Board's Committee, which had to spend so much time in looking over the ballots in the Twenty-Sixth Assembly District, would have been saved many hours of drudgery. In addition to their absolute accuracy, the machines have the great advantage of promptitude. As soon as the polls are closed the machines are opened, and there on the sheet, all totaled, is the vote of the election district. In Buffalo last year the whole vote of the City was tabulated within an hour after the polls closed, and the extras, fifteen minutes later, told the result of the election.

Voting machines were used as an experiment in one election district in New York City last year, viz: the Eighteenth Election District of the First Assembly District of Kings. Within fifteen minutes after the closing of the polls the result in that election district was known everywhere.

The use of machines will ultimately result in considerable economy of election expenses. The permission to the Board of Elections to purchase machines for the experiment this year without public letting is necessary, if the experiment is to be made at this election. Nothing can be lost by such permission for the reason that only legalized machines can be used, and the prices are well known. Larger machines being required for use in The City of New York and elsewhere, the machines referred to will cost somewhat more than machines purchased for other places.

They therefore recommend that the said resolution and ordinance be adopted.

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and authorizes the Board of Elections to incur an expenditure, not exceeding twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) for the purpose of entering into a contract for the purchase of twenty (20) voting machines, and that authority is hereby given to said Board of Elections to enter into said contract, without public letting, with the expression contained in said contract that the machines shall first be furnished for trial for use at a general election, and that the same are not to be purchased unless found to be satisfactory after due trial at said election.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000) for the purchase by the Board of Elections of 20 voting machines for The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. The President of each Borough may in his discretion cause the streets within his borough, or any part or parts thereof, to be properly sprinkled with water from the public supply or other source, during such part of each year as he may deem to be necessary for the health and comfort of the public; provided, however, that no such sprinkling shall be done at the expense of the City.

Sec. 2. Any resident citizen experienced in street sprinkling may make written application to the President of a Borough for authority to sprinkle the streets and avenues of such borough, accompanied by evidence satisfactory to such President of the fitness and ability of the applicant to perform such service, and evidence of the desire of a reasonable number of the occupants of premises in such borough that such sprinkling ought to be done. And thereupon such Borough President shall, upon receiving a bond as hereinafter provided, enter into a contract on behalf of the City with such applicant, for the sprinkling of the streets and avenues of such borough with such water as may be conveniently available for the purpose.

Such contract shall specify the part of each year during which such sprinkling shall be done, which shall not begin earlier than the first of March nor be continued later than the thirtieth of November; the period of time it shall remain in force, which shall not be more than ten years; the amount to be paid to the City, which shall not be less than \$25 per month for each vehicle that shall be employed using, in such service, water from a public supply, and a license fee of the same amount as is or may be required to be paid by public truckmen for each such vehicle not using water from a public supply; and the times when and the manner in which all such payments shall be made; and such reasonable regulations relative thereto and to the conduct of said business as to such Borough President shall seem meet.

Such contract may also specify a price or prices beyond which such contractor shall not exact payment from any person soever for any such sprinkling service; and it may also require that the contractor shall obligate himself to sprinkle any street or avenue or part thereof on due request and agreement to pay for the service at regularly established rates by owners or occupants of premises adjoining upon any street or avenue in such borough, provided, however, that such request be made in writing subscribed by at least 25 per cent. of such owners or occupants of a continuous series of not less than 200 feet of premises abutting on any such street or avenue.

Sec. 3. As a condition precedent to the execution and delivery of a contract as hereinbefore provided the applicant shall execute and deliver to such Borough President a bond in an amount and with surety or sureties to the satisfaction of such President, and conditioned that such obligor shall make the payments as in such contract provided, and will at all times abide by and perform according to the terms of such contract and indemnify against, and hold harmless, the said City from all liability for any or all acts or omissions of the obligor, his agents and other employees.

Sec. 4. The powers and authority hereby conferred shall not be exercised at any time or in any such manner as to encroach upon any rights now possessed by any person soever relative to street sprinkling in either or any of the boroughs of said city.

The Twelfth Election District is bounded by and within East River, the southerly side of Hoyt avenue, from East River to Boulevard; the westerly side of Boulevard, from Hoyt avenue to Remsen street; the westerly side of Remsen street, from Boulevard to Main street; the northerly side of Main street, from Remsen street to Grand avenue; the northerly side of Grand avenue, from Main street to Fulton street, and the northerly side of Fulton street, from Boulevard to East River.

The Thirteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Hoyt avenue, from the Boulevard to Van Alst avenue; the westerly side of Van Alst avenue, from Hoyt avenue to Newtown avenue; the southerly side of Newtown avenue, from Van Alst avenue to Marc place; the westerly side of Marc place, from Newtown avenue to Grand avenue; the northerly side of Grand avenue, from Marc place to Main street; the easterly side of Main street, from Grand avenue to Remsen street; the easterly side of Remsen street, from Main street to Boulevard, and the easterly side of Boulevard, from Remsen street to Hoyt avenue.

The Fourteenth Election District is bounded by and within the westerly side of Debevoise avenue, from Berrian's Creek to Newtown avenue; the northerly side of Newtown avenue, from Debevoise avenue to Van Alst avenue; the easterly side of Van Alst avenue, from Newtown avenue to Hoyt avenue, and the northerly side of Hoyt avenue, from Van Alst avenue to East River; East River, Flushing Bay and Berrian's Island.

The Fifteenth Election District is bounded by and within Berrian's Creek, Flushing Bay, the westerly side of Kouwenhoven street, from Flushing Bay to Potter avenue, the southerly side of Potter avenue, from Kouwenhoven street to Steinway avenue; the westerly side of Steinway avenue, from Potter avenue to Vandeventer avenue; the northerly side of Vandeventer avenue, from Steinway avenue to Debevoise avenue, and the easterly side of Debevoise avenue, from Vandeventer avenue to Berrian's Creek.

The Sixteenth Election District is bounded by and within Flushing Bay; westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Flushing Bay to Flushing avenue; the northerly side of Flushing avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Steinway avenue; the easterly side of Steinway avenue, from Flushing avenue to Potter avenue; the northerly side of Potter avenue, from Steinway avenue to Kouwenhoven street and the easterly side of Kouwenhoven street, from Potter's avenue to Flushing Bay.

The Seventeenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Flushing avenue, from Steinway avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Flushing avenue to Broadway; the northerly side of Broadway, from Old Bowery Bay road to Steinway avenue, and the easterly side of Steinway avenue, from Broadway to Flushing avenue.

The Eighteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Vandeventer avenue, from Debevoise avenue to Steinway avenue; the westerly side of Steinway avenue, from Vandeventer avenue to Broadway; the northerly side of Broadway, from Steinway avenue to Lockwood street; the easterly side of Lockwood street, from Broadway to Grand avenue; the easterly side of Marc place, from Grand avenue to Newtown avenue; the southerly side of Newtown avenue, from Marc place to Debevoise avenue; and the easterly side of Debevoise avenue, from Newtown avenue to Vandeventer avenue.

The Nineteenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Broadway, from Lockwood street to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Broadway to Jackson avenue; the northerly side of Jackson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Freeman avenue; the northerly side of Freeman avenue, from Jackson avenue to Lathrop street; the easterly side of Lathrop street, from Freeman avenue to Pierce avenue; the northerly side of Pierce avenue, from Lathrop street to Lockwood street and the easterly side of Lockwood street, from Pierce avenue to Broadway.

The Twentieth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Rapelye avenue to Woodside avenue; the westerly side of Woodside avenue, from Jackson avenue to Middleburg avenue; the northerly side of Middleburg avenue, from Woodside avenue to Dickenson avenue; the westerly side of Dickenson avenue, from Middleburg avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the westerly side of Old Bowery Bay road to Hunter's Point avenue; the northerly side of Hunter's Point avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to the canal; line through the centre of the canal, from Hunter's Point avenue to Thompson avenue, and the east side of Rapelye avenue, from Thompson avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Hunter's Point avenue, from the canal to Calvary Cemetery road; the easterly boundary line of Calvary Cemetery to Newtown Creek, Newtown Creek and the canal.

The Twenty-second Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Thompson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Betts avenue; the westerly side of Betts avenue, from Thompson avenue to Maurice avenue; the northerly side of Maurice avenue, from Betts avenue to Newtown Creek; Newtown Creek and the easterly side of Calvary Cemetery road and Old Bowery Bay road, from Newtown Creek to Thompson avenue.

The Twenty-third Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Old Bowery Bay road to Train's Meadow road; the westerly side of Train's Meadow road, from Jackson avenue to Woodside avenue; the westerly side of Greenpoint avenue, from Woodside avenue to Shell road; the northerly side of Shell road, from Greenpoint avenue to Betts avenue; the easterly side of Betts avenue, from Shell road to Thompson avenue; the northerly side of Thompson avenue, from Betts avenue to Old Bowery Bay road; the easterly side of Old Bowery Bay road to Dickenson avenue, the easterly side of Dickenson avenue to Middleburg avenue; the southerly side of Middleburg avenue to Woodside avenue and the easterly side of Woodside avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-fourth Election District is bounded by and within East River, Flushing Bay; northerly side of Jackson avenue, from Flushing Creek to Old Bowery Bay road, and the easterly side of Old Bowery Bay road, from Jackson avenue to East River.

The Twenty-fifth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Train's Meadow road to Junction avenue; the westerly side of Junction avenue, from Jackson avenue to Cook avenue; the northerly side of Cook avenue, from Junction avenue to Thompson avenue; the northerly side of Thompson avenue, from Cook avenue to North Side Division Long Island Railroad track; the southerly side of North Side Division Long Island Railroad track, from Thompson avenue to Broadway; the easterly side of Broadway, from North Side Division Long Island Railroad track to Woodside avenue; the northerly side of Woodside avenue, from Broadway to Train's Meadow road, and the easterly side of Train's Meadow road, from Woodside avenue to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-sixth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Jackson avenue, from Junction avenue to Flushing Creek; the westerly side of Flushing Creek, from Jackson avenue to the centre line of North Side Division Long Island Railroad; the northerly side of North Side Division Long Island Railroad, from Flushing Creek to Junction avenue, and the easterly side of Junction avenue, from the North Side Division Long Island Railroad to Jackson avenue.

The Twenty-seventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of the North Side Division Long Island Railroad track, from Junction avenue to Flushing Creek; the westerly side of Flushing Creek, from centre line of the North Side Division Long Island Railroad to Horse Brook; the northerly side of Horse Brook, from Flushing Creek to the division line of the land of D. Morrell Boroughs and Henry Euler; the easterly side of said division line to Court street, and the easterly side of Court street, from division line of the land of D. Morrell Boroughs and Henry Euler to the centre line of the North Side Division of Long Island Railroad.

The Thirty-third Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, from Newtown Creek to the Bushwick Branch Long Island Railroad; the southerly side of the Bushwick Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Metropolitan avenue to Mount Olivet avenue; the southerly side of Mount Olivet avenue, from the Bushwick Branch of the Long Island Railroad to a line through the Baker estate, and westerly side of the line through the Baker estate, from Mount Olivet avenue to William street. the westerly side of William street, from above line to a direct line on the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery to Woodward avenue; the westerly side of Woodward avenue, from a point midway between DeKalb street and Stockholm street to Harmon street; the northerly side of Harmon street, from Woodward avenue to a line dividing the former City of Brooklyn and Town of Newtown and along above mentioned line, from Harmon street to Metropolitan avenue.

The Thirty-fourth Election District is bounded by and within the westerly side of Fairview avenue, from Gates avenue to the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery; thence westerly to the easterly side of Woodward avenue, at a point midway between Stockholm street and DeKalb avenue; thence southerly on the easterly side of Woodward avenue to Harmon street; the south side of Harmon street to the line dividing the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown, and above mentioned line from Harmon street to Gates avenue; thence to Fairview avenue.

The Thirty-fifth Election District is bounded by and within the easterly side of Fairview avenue from Gates avenue to the southerly side of Linden Hill Cemetery, to William street; thence easterly in a direct line through the Baker estate from William street to Mount Olivet avenue; the southerly side of Mount Olivet avenue from line through the Baker estate to Fresh Pond road; the westerly side of Fresh Pond road from Mount Olivet avenue to Gates avenue (or Magnolia street); the northerly side of Gates avenue (or Magnolia street) from Fresh Pond road to Fairview avenue.

The Thirty-eighth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Metropolitan avenue, from Fresh Pond road to the westerly boundary of Lutheran Cemetery; the westerly side of the line of Lutheran Cemetery south to the house of Rossinan, from Metropolitan avenue to Myrtle avenue; the westerly side of the highway leading to Cypress Hills Cemetery, from Myrtle avenue to Cooper avenue; the northerly side of Cooper avenue, from the highway leading to Cypress Hills Cemetery to Fresh Pond road; the westerly side of Fresh Pond road, from Cooper avenue to the line of the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown; westerly and northerly along said line from Fresh Pond road to Cooper avenue; the southerly side of Cooper avenue, from the former division line of the City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown to Cypress avenue; the easterly side of Cypress avenue, from Cooper avenue to the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad; the southerly side of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Cypress avenue to Fresh Pond road, and the easterly side of Fresh Pond road, from the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad to Metropolitan avenue.

The Fortieth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Myrtle avenue, from the division line of the former City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown to the centre line of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad; the westerly side of the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad, from Fresh Pond road to Cypress avenue; the westerly side of Cypress avenue, from the Manhattan Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad to Cooper avenue; the northerly side of Cooper avenue, from Cypress avenue to the former division line of the City of Brooklyn and the Town of Newtown, and the easterly side of said line, from Cooper avenue to Myrtle avenue.

The Third Election District is bounded by and within Long Island Sound, Powell's Cove, the westerly side of the Boulevard, from Powell's Cove to Eighteenth street; the southerly side of Eighteenth street, from the Boulevard to Whitestone avenue, the westerly side of Whitestone avenue, from Eighteenth street to Seventh avenue; the northerly side of Seventh avenue, from Whitestone avenue to Twenty-first street; the easterly side of Twenty-first street, from Seventh avenue to Sixth avenue; the northerly side of Sixth avenue, from Twenty-first street to Fifteenth street; the easterly side of Fifteenth street, from Sixth avenue to Fifth avenue; the northerly side of Fifth avenue, from Fifteenth street to Twelfth street; the easterly side of Twelfth street, from Fifth avenue to First avenue; the southerly side of First avenue, from Twelfth street to Thirtieth street; the easterly side of Thirtieth street, from First avenue to Avenue C; the easterly side of College avenue, from Avenue C to Long Island Sound.

The Fourth Election District is bounded by and within Long Island Sound; the westerly side of College avenue, from Long Island Sound to the centre line of Thirtieth street and Avenue C; the westerly side of Thirtieth street, from Avenue C to First avenue; the northerly side of First avenue, from Thirtieth street to Twelfth street; the westerly side of Twelfth street, from First avenue to Fifth avenue; the northerly side of Fifth avenue, from Twelfth street to Flushing Bay, and Flushing Bay.

The Fifth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Fifth avenue, from Flushing Bay to Fifteenth street; the westerly side of Fifteenth street, from Fifth avenue to Sixth avenue; the southerly side of Sixth avenue, from Fifteenth street to Twenty-first street; the westerly side of Twenty-first street, from Sixth avenue to Seventh avenue; southerly side of Seventh avenue, from Twenty-first street to Twenty-third street; the westerly side of Twenty-third street, from Seventh avenue to creek; centre line of creek, from Twenty-third street to Flushing Bay, and Flushing Bay.

The Sixth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Seventh avenue, from Twenty-third street to Whitestone avenue; the westerly side of Whitestone avenue, from Seventh avenue to First street; the southerly side of First street, from Whitestone avenue to Willett's road; the easterly side of Willett's road, from First street to Whitestone road; the westerly side of Whitestone road, from Willett's road to Broadway; the northerly side of Broadway, from Whitestone road to Flushing Creek; the centre line of said creek, from Broadway to Twenty-third street, and the easterly side of Twenty-third street, from Flushing creek to Seventh avenue.

The Seventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly line of Broadway, from Flushing Creek to Main street; the westerly side of Main street, from Broadway to Amity street; the northerly side of Amity street, from Main street to Flushing Creek, and Flushing Creek.

The Eighth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Broadway, from Main street to Parsons avenue; the westerly side of Parsons avenue, from Broadway to Amity street; the northerly side of Amity street, from Parsons avenue to Main street, and the easterly side of Main street, from Amity street to Broadway.

The Ninth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Amity street, from Main street to Parsons avenue; the easterly side of Parsons avenue, from Amity street to Broadway; the southerly side of Broadway, from Parsons avenue to Sanford avenue; the northerly side of Sanford avenue, from Broadway to Jamaica avenue; the easterly side of Jamaica avenue, from Sanford avenue to Main street, and the easterly side of Main street, from Jamaica avenue to Amity street.

The Tenth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Amity street, from Flushing Creek to Main street; the westerly side of Main street, from Amity street to Jamaica avenue; the westerly side of Jamaica avenue, from Main street to Hillside avenue; the northerly side of Hillside avenue, from Jamaica avenue to Flushing Creek; thence westerly and northerly along centre line of said creek to Amity street.

The Eleventh Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Hillside avenue, from Flushing Creek to Jamaica avenue; the easterly side of Jamaica avenue, from Hillside avenue to Sanford avenue; the southerly side of Sanford avenue, from Jamaica avenue to Broadway; the southerly side of Broadway, from Sanford avenue to Cemetery lane; the westerly side of Cemetery lane, from Broadway to Fresh Meadow road; the westerly side of Fresh Meadow road, from Cemetery lane to a line dividing the former towns of Flushing and Jamaica; thence along said town line, from Fresh Meadow road to Flushing Creek; thence northerly and easterly along centre line of said creek to Hillside avenue.

The Twelfth Election District is bounded by and within the southerly side of Broadway, from Cemetery lane to Whitestone road; the easterly side of Whitestone road, from Broadway to Bayside road; the southerly side of Bayside road, from Whitestone road to Bell avenue; the easterly side of Bell avenue, from Bayside road to stream running through land of J. W. Harway; thence easterly along said stream to Little Neck Bay; Little Neck Bay, from above mentioned stream to Little Neck Creek; along centre line of Little Neck Creek, from Little Neck Bay to Alley road, the westerly side of Alley road, from Little Neck Creek to Rocky Hill road; the northerly side of Rocky Hill road, from Alley road to the line dividing the former towns of Flushing and Jamaica; from Rocky Hill road to Fresh Meadow road; the easterly side of Fresh Meadow road, from said town line to Cemetery lane, and to the easterly side of Cemetery lane, from Fresh Meadow road to Broadway.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
