No. 684.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) to provide means for repaving streets and avenues in the Borough of Manhattan.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 15, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), to provide means for repaving streets and avenues in the Borough of Manhattan, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; provided, however, that no contract shall be made for repaving any street or avenue unless the Borough President having charge thereof submits to the Comptroller, with such contract, evidence showing that the original pavement on such street or avenue was laid at the expense of the abutting property owners, or by local taxation, or by bond issues paid by the locality before consolidation, unless the Board of Estimate and Apportionment shall otherwise determine upon presentation to it of the facts and circumstances affecting such street or avenue."

Resolved, That the sidewalk on the west side of Broadway shall be twenty (20) feet wide and the roadway thereof shall be fifty (50) feet wide, from West Two Hundred and Fortieth street to the northern line of the City, in the Borough of The Bronx.

No. 686.

AN ORDINANCE to promote public morality in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. No person shall expose, display, post up, exhibit, paint, print or mark, nor place or cause to be placed, any placard, poster, bill or picture of any show, exhibition, theatrical or other performance in or on any building, bill-board, wall or fence on any street, nor in or upon any public place, in The City of New York, which shall be of lewd, indecent, immoral, immodest, vulgar or suggestive character, calculated to debauch the public or shock the sense of decency or propriety.

Sec. 2. Any violation of the provisions of section 1 of this ordinance shall be deemed a minor offense, and upon conviction thereof, before a City Magistrate, shall be punishable by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than fifty dollars; or by imprisonment in the City Prison, or by both; but no such imprisonment, however, shall exceed a term of ten days.

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of twenty-one thousand one hundred dollars (\$21,100), to provide means for making additions and alterations to the buildings and present fire protection devices of Bellevue Hospital.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 29, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of Section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding twenty-one thousand one hundred dollars (\$21,100) to provide means for making additions and alterations to the buildings and present fire protection devices of Bellevue Hospital, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding twenty-one thousand one hundred dollars (\$21,100), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,  
 No. 61 Elm Street,  
 New York, September 27, 1905.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held on Wednesday, September 27, 1905, at 10 a. m. at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street.

All the Commissioners were present.

The minutes of the meeting held September 19 were approved.

The Committee on Transfers presented a report recommending that the following transfers be approved:

John Brady, from the position of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

John Peterson, from the position of Mechanical Draughtsman in the Aqueduct Commission, to a similar position in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Edward G. Love, from the position of Chief Inspector of Gas Tests in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, to that of Chief Gas Inspector.

John J. Berlinghoff, from the position of Junior Clerk (Grade D) in the Department of Finance, to a similar position in the office of the City Chamberlain.

Julia L. Cusack, from the position of Typewriting Copyist in the Tenement House Department, to that of Stenographer and Typewriter, she having been originally appointed from the eligible list for the latter position.

Joseph A. Kenney, from the position of Disinfector in the Department of Health, to that of Inspector of Sewer Construction in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, his name having been reached for original appointment to the latter position.

John D. Matheson, from the position of Transitman and Computer in the Department of Docks and Ferries, to a similar position in the Department of Finance.

The recommendation of the Committee on Transfers was adopted.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the transfer of Mr. Joseph F. McDonald from the position of Stenographer and Typewriter (fourth grade) in the Department of Finance to a similar position in the office of the Civil Service Commission having been consented to by Deputy and Acting Comptroller Stevenson, he is hereby appointed to the position of Stenographer and Typewriter (fourth grade) in the office of the Commission, to take effect October 1, 1905.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated June 30, with reference to the appeal of James S. Bolan, that he be given consideration in the coming examination for promotion to the rank of Sergeant in the Police Department for "honorable mention" received while he was a Patrolman. In view of the fact that the rules expressly declare that consideration in matters of seniority and record shall be confined to the grade of a candidate at the time of the examination, the Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Bolan and inform him that his request could not be granted.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 21, with reference to the letter of James C. White, candidate for Patrolman, in regard to his examination. The report of the Acting Chief Examiner stated that the candidate's complaint, that he could not hear the dictation in said examination, did not appear to have any merit, for the reason that the said dictation was given from six different points of the examination room, and two of the examiners who dictated were very close to the candidate. In view of the statements of the Acting Chief Examiner, the candidate's request for a rerating of his examination was denied.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 21, recommending that the second appeal of Victor R. Reichelt, candidate for promotion to Assistant Engineer in the Borough of Richmond, be denied, for the reason that the candidate had already been allowed a rerating on his seniority, and it being his opinion that the mark received by Mr. Reichelt on that part of the examination was as high a mark as he was entitled to. The appeal was denied.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 23, stating that the examination for promotion to the third grade, taken in December, 1901, by Miss Ruby G. Thompson, Stenographer and Typewriter in the Board of Education, was fully as difficult as any examination that could be set for her at the present time to qualify her for promotion to the fourth grade. In view of the foregoing statement, the Secretary was instructed to certify Miss Thompson's name to the Board of Education as eligible for promotion to the fourth grade without further examination by the Commission.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 20, with reference to a communication received from the Secretary of the Board of Education regarding the need for Janitor-Engineers in the new public schools. Mr. Conway stated in his report, first, that there was in existence an eligible list of eighty-five

names for the position of Janitor-Engineer from which the Board of Education might make appointments; secondly, that there was in existence an eligible list for Janitor, as well as a special list just established at the request of the Board of Education for the position of Janitor with a knowledge of heating and ventilating, from which appointments might be made. In view of the statements made in the aforesaid report, the request of the Board of Education that the Commission hold an examination for promotion to the position of Janitor-Engineer in that Department, to be open to those already in the service under the title of Janitor, was denied.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 26, with reference to the requisition of the Commissioner of Bridges for an eligible list from which to appoint one Inspector of Steel at \$1,650 per annum. Mr. Conway stated that the salary attached to the eligible list for the position of Inspector of Iron and Steel Construction was fixed at \$1,200 at the time of the examination, and therefore a certification could not be made for appointment at \$1,650 per annum, as requested by the Commissioner of Bridges. He recommended, however, that certification be made for appointment at \$1,200 per annum, and as the position of Inspector of Iron and Steel Construction is not now graded as to salary, the Commissioner would have the right to fix a different compensation after the appointee had served his probationary period and the appointment had become permanent. The Secretary was instructed to make certification in accordance with the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner.

A report was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 25, with reference to the request of Thomas J. Gleason, a Roundsman in the Nineteenth Precinct, that he be given credit for a "commendation" awarded him on the day following the examination for promotion to Sergeant, in which he was a competitor. After consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to communicate with the candidate and inform him that the Commission rates the records of candidates in promotion examinations up to the date of such examinations only, and that, as the award which he mentioned was made on the day after the examination for Sergeant, he could not be given credit for same in his rating on that examination.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the regulation of the Civil Service Commission restricting all examinations for positions in the civil service of The City of New York to residents of the State of New York, be and the same is hereby waived so far as it applies to the coming examination for the position of Assistant Engineer in the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated September 19, informing the Commission of the following action taken by that Board at its meeting of September 14:

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the exempt class in the City Magistrates' Court by including therein thirteen additional Probation Officers, one for each Court District in the First Division; returned without approval.

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the labor class, Parts I., II. and III.; approved, except so far as the same related to the position of "Sewer Laborer, office of the Borough President in each borough," and in regard to same suggesting that the Commission change the title to "Sewer Cleaner."

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the non-competitive class by including therein the position of "Attending Physician at the Tuberculosis Clinics of the Department of Health;" approved.

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part I., Group 11, by including therein the titles "Gas Inspector and Chief Gas Inspector;" approved.

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the competitive class, Part I., Group 11, by including therein the title "Deputy Inspector of Weights and Measures;" approved.

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the non-competitive class by including therein under the heading "Offices of the Borough Presidents and Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity," the title "Lighter of Markets;" approved.

Resolution, amending the classification of positions in the labor class by adding to Part I. the title "Stoker, Marine; by adding to Part II. the titles "Bridge Painter," "Engineman, Steam Roller" and "Water Tender Department of Docks and Ferries;" by striking from Part II. the titles "Bridge Mechanic" and "Lighter of Markets;" approved, except so far as the same relates to "Engineman, Steam Roller."

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to proceed at once with an open competitive examination for the position of Gas Inspector, and pending the establishment of the eligible list for that position, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity was authorized to appoint Mr. William R. Birdsley provisionally under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII, paragraph 3. The Secretary was also instructed to proceed with an examination for the position of Water Tender in the Department of Docks and Ferries, and on motion it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the labor class, Part I., as fixed by the Civil Service rules, be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following title:

"Sewer Cleaner, Office of the Borough President in each Borough."

The Secretary was instructed to forward a copy of the foregoing resolution to the Mayor for his approval.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated September 25, stating that that Board would consider the resolution of the Municipal Commission amending the classification of positions in the exempt class in the Department of Correction at a meeting to be held Thursday, September 28. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated September 22, transmitting copy of a letter addressed by him to Mr. Charles Goodman, a Topographical Draughtsman in his Department who left his service without giving him proper notice. The communications were ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Richmond, dated September 25, requesting that the records of the Commission be changed to show that Lorenz A. Cavo, a Stenographer and Typewriter, was dismissed for lack of work on August 1, 1905, instead of for "unsatisfactory services," as first stated. The request was granted.

The report of the Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class in the Department of Health, dated September 6, was approved on the recommendation of the Acting Chief Examiner.

A communication was presented from the Corporation Counsel, dated September 21, advising the Commission that it was empowered, by Justice Fitzgerald's decision in People ex rel. Coulter vs. Ogden, to certify the pay rolls of the four Chaplains in the Fire Department for services rendered from July 15, 1904, the date of their original appointment, to March 31, 1905, the date upon which the resolution placing their positions in the exempt class, was approved by the State Civil Service Commission. In accordance with the advice of the Corporation Counsel, the Secretary was instructed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the said pay rolls and to forward the same to the Department of Finance for audit.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the pay rolls of Martin J. Fogarty, a Painter in the employ of the Police Department for \$348, covering the months of June, July, August and September, and stated that Mr. Fogarty had been absent during that period on account of illness. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the Police Department and state that under the law the Civil Service Commission was without power to certify the pay roll of any "per diem" employee except for a term during which he has actually worked.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, dated September 21, stating that he had appointed Captain F. M. Gibson, Deputy Commissioner; Mr. A. DeWilde, Superintendent of Final Disposition, and Dr. John Rogers, Jr., Medical Examiner, a Board of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class in that Department. The appointments were approved.

A communication was received from Comptroller Grout, dated September 18, requesting that he be permitted to fill a vacancy in the third grade of clerkship in the City Paymaster's office by original appointment, it being impracticable to fill the same by promotion for the reason that there were no persons serving in the next lower grade of clerkship in that office, and for the further reason that none of the clerks in the other bureaus of the Finance Department were familiar with the work in the Paymaster's office. The request was granted.



A communication was presented from Comptroller Grout, dated September 22, requesting that Jacob Buchholtz, an Office Boy in his Department, be permitted to compete in the coming examination for promotion to Junior Clerk. The President stated that, in view of the fact that the candidate would have served six months in his present position on October 11, he had instructed the Record Clerk to notify him for the said examination. The action of the President was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated September 25, requesting that Wilfred A. Breen and William J. O'Connor, second grade Clerks, be admitted to the coming examination for promotion to the fourth grade clerkship in that Department, and that Thomas P. Everett, Junior Clerk (Grade B), be permitted to enter the examination for second grade Clerk. Those employees having served satisfactorily in the Department of Health for a number of years. After consideration of the matter the Secretary was instructed to notify all second grade Clerks to appear for the coming examination for promotion to the fourth grade and to admit all Junior Clerks in the Department of Health to the coming examination for second grade Clerk.

The Commission then ordered the Secretary to proceed with the following examinations for promotion, requests for same having been received at the office of the Commission during the months of July and August:

From seventh to tenth grade Bookkeeper (Office of the Chamberlain).

The request of the Secretary of the Fire Department that Miss Hettie R. Holstein, Stenographer and Typewriter, be examined for promotion from the third to the fifth grade was denied for the reason that the candidate was not promoted to the third grade until April 12, 1905.

The request of the Secretary of the Fire Department that an examination be held for promotion from Telephone Operator to Telegraph Operator was referred to the Acting Chief Examiner for a report and recommendation.

The request of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments that a non-competitive examination be held for a fifth grade Clerk in that Department to qualify him for promotion was denied, it appearing that there were a number of other clerks serving in the fifth grade who would be eligible to compete for such promotion.

A communication was presented from Deputy and Acting Comptroller Stevenson, dated September 26, requesting that the coming examination for promotion to Junior Clerk in the Department of Finance, which had been scheduled for October 4 be postponed for several weeks for the reason that the first two weeks of October are the busiest of any during the year in that Department. The request was granted, and the Acting Chief Examiner was instructed to fix a new date for the examination in the latter part of October.

A communication was presented from the Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the War Veterans and Sons' Association, dated September 13, requesting the Commission to amend the rule permitting transfers from one position to another in the labor class so that such transfers cannot be made when the name of a veteran appears upon the eligible list for original appointment to the position to which transfer is sought. The matter was ordered continued on the calendar.

The request of Nathan Trace, that his name be restored to the list for Rodman, was granted, it appearing from his communication that he did not receive the notice of appointment sent him by the Board of Water Supply on August 24, 1905.

The request of Moritz Wormser, that his name be restored to the list for Transitman was granted, he having declined appointment on the ground of "temporary inability" on April 13, 1905, and it appearing from his communication that he is now in a position to accept appointment.

The request of Morris Weinstein for a special examination for Draughtsman's Helper was denied, it appearing that he was granted a special examination by the Commission on June 22, for the reason that, through an error, he had not been notified for the original examination, but that he failed to appear for such special examination when notified.

The request of Miss Jennie E. Clarke that she be restored to eligibility for appointment as Typewriting Copyist at a salary of \$600 per annum was granted, it appearing from her communication that when she declined appointment at that salary on January 26, 1905, she had reason to believe that she could secure employment at a higher salary.

The requests of August Mossapp and James J. Thompson, candidates for the coming examination for Fireman, that they be permitted to correct the date of birth set forth on their applications, were granted, the proof submitted by them being sufficient to convince the Commission that the dates originally given by them were incorrect.

A communication was presented from Joseph Curren, Jr., dated September 20, protesting against the certification by the Civil Service Commission of the pay-rolls of the Board of Education unless his name appeared thereon, on the ground that he was suspended on August 16, 1905, pending a hearing of charges which had been preferred against him, but that up to the time of his writing no action had been taken by the Department of Education in the matter. The communication was ordered filed.

The request of Charles F. Nolan that his name be restored to the eligible list for Stationary Engineman was denied for laches.

The request of Eugene E. De Mandeville, candidate for the position of Stationary Engineman, that the spelling of his name be corrected on the records of this office was granted, it appearing from his letter that the same as it is now recorded (Mandeville) is incorrect.

A communication was presented from Louis Rabinowitz requesting that his name be restored to eligibility for appointment as Topographical Draughtsman in the Borough of Brooklyn, and stating that he declined appointment in that borough on March 13, 1905, on account of "insufficiency of compensation." It appearing that the President of the Borough of Brooklyn did not notify the Commission of that fact when reporting the disposition made of the names certified to him on March 13, 1905,

the Secretary was instructed to communicate with him and request him to notify the Commission whether the candidate's statement was correct.

The request of Edward J. McNerny that the examination which he took for promotion to the first grade of clerkship be construed to have qualified him for promotion to the second grade was denied.

A communication was presented from the Civil Service Reform Association, dated September 22, quoting a "minute" adopted by the Executive Committee of that Association at its meeting of Wednesday evening, September 20, to the effect that the sending of the letter with reference to the case of Hale vs. Worstell and McNamara by Assistant Secretary De Roode was fully authorized by the Civil Service Reform Association. The communication was ordered filed.

The request of E. Vallance that his name be restored to the list for Topographical Draughtsman was denied, he having failed to respond to a notice of appointment sent him by the President of the Borough of Richmond on December 29, 1904.

The request of Frank Willetts that he be restored to eligibility for appointment to the position of Rodman at \$960 per annum was granted.

An affidavit was presented from Walter H. Mulcahy, No. 197 Fulton street, Brooklyn, setting forth the fact that he was out of the city when notice of appointment was sent him by the Department of Street Cleaning on September 21, 1905, and that he therefore could not respond within the four days prescribed by the rules, and requesting that his name be restored to the eligible list for Automobile Engineman. The request was granted.

The request of Jeremiah T. R. Murray that his application for Patrolman be accepted was granted, he having accounted for several discrepancies in the statements set forth in the same to the satisfaction of the Commission.

The request of Arthur S. Brown that his name be restored to the list for Transitman and Computer was denied, the reasons given by him for declining appointment in the Aqueduct Commission being at variance with the statement of that Department. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Brown and suggest that he obtain a letter from the head of the Aqueduct Commission in substantiation of the facts set forth by him.

The request of George W. Campbell that his name be restored to the list for Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption was granted upon the presentation of a certificate from his physician to the effect that he is now in good health and able to fill any position to which he might be appointed satisfactorily, he having declined appointment to that position on account of ill health.

The resignation of Mr. Clifford T. Graham from the position of Monitor in the Civil Service Commission was accepted.

The request of Thomas F. Ward that his name be restored to the eligible list for Office Boy was granted on his statement that when he was offered appointment in the Department of Health on July 19, 1905, he was unable to leave his employers at the short notice given by that Department.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Friday, September 29, 1905, at 10 a. m.

## NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

## GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
