"Tank House"—4 stories high; stairway from first to fourth floors, extending from platform; imperfect horizontal exits on second and third floors to "Glue Works"; also second and third floors to "Rendering Building"; fourth floor to "Rendering Building."

New Beef House—5 story building; fire wall divides this building, which has two openings on all floors; two stairways from first floor to roof, one in northeast corner and one in southwest corner; imperfect horizontal exits 2d, 3d and 4th floors leading to "Ham House" and "Rendering Building"; also exit from fourth floor in the form of a bridge leading to fireproof stairway in "Welfare Building."

Recommendation: Exit to be provided from second and third floors of "B" building, adjoining the Shipping Building, viz.: southeast corner of "B" building, giving access to platform along easterly side of said buildings. Openings to be 2 feet by 6 feet, non-fireproof doors.

Premises affected, (4) Dunkirk, Lark and W. 3d sts.; appellant, Marsh-Burgess Co. 4—Enclose elevator 5 feet 6 inches high on all sides not used for loading. Hand hoist from cellar to second floor used for freight only; tell tale chains suspended from one edge; no capacity notice posted; enclosure does not extend entire width of shaftway and space between bars is 6 inches or more; operator must stand outside of enclosure to operate car; enclosure about 5 feet from floor on side hoist rope is located; exterior wall of building form other two sides; shaftway unguarded in cellar; vertical sliding self-closing gates provided at sides of enclosure first and second floors.

Recommendation: Place bars forming enclosure closer together, not more than 2-inch spaces; tell tale chains to be provided on other side of car; capacity notice to be posted and substantial railing provided at shaftway in cellar; enclosure first and second floors to be extended full width of shaftway.

Premises affected, (5) Frankfort; appellant, Union Fork and Hoe Co. 4—Arrange exit doors to stairway to open outwardly; three-story non-fireproof factory building; open lots; part of building sprinklered; no combustibles; no fire alarm; eight to ten persons occupy second floor; exits, one interior stairway constructed of combustible material enclosed with brick partitions with sprinkler heads inside of enclosure; second floor doorway opens in; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on each floor not remote from stairway. (Since issuance of orders plans have been filed in the Engineering Division for the erection of a fire escape, and said fire escape has been placed on the easterly wall.) In addition to main stairway there are two auxiliary stairways.

Recommendation: That self-closing doors be permitted on second floor while not more than fifteen persons are permitted on second floor.

Premises affected, (6) Garden City, Franklin st.; appellant, Doubleday-Page & Co. 12—Cease employing more than 199 persons on second floor. (Acceptance of horizontal exits to provide additional occupancy) "U" shaped, two-story and basement fireproof building; main wing 350 feet by 75 feet and left wings 200 feet by 75 feet; all wings sprinklered on all floors except the second floor; main and right wing which are used for office purposes; left wing of second floor sprinklered, used for factory purposes; 90 males and 10 females employed; 100 males and 150 females employed in office portion of second floor; three interior stairways. That is: Main wing, 60-inch open stairs; right wing, 46-inch enclosed fireproof stairs; left wing, 48-inch enclosed fireproof stairs; 312 persons occupy the second floor and may be increased to 330; printing establishment in which all packing cases are manufactured for own use, and all publications bound that are issued. A 6-inch fire wall separates left and main wings; this wall is continuous from basement but ends under ceiling of second floor; two openings in said wall, one leads to composing room and is provided with a fireproof self-closing sliding door, the other is a distant 35 feet, has hinged door leading to stencil room. Composing room, stencil room and lead melting department are located in left wing, which is sprinklered and where the 48-inch enclosed stairway is located. There is another opening which is boarded up, same being located in the wall which separates the composing room from the main outside wall of the left wing; the lockers are located here, but there is a three-foot passageway between the lockers and the wall from composing room, which passageway leads to main building wherein is the open stairway. An enclosed stairway located in right wing is also accessible from main wing.

Recommendation: Provide two horizontal exits as per Sec. 79-f-9 in wall where the present two openings are; existing walls between horizontal exit and the new one to be provided in stencil room to be fireproofed; present horizontal exit with one fire door to be accepted.

Premises affected, (7) Gloversville, 113 Wood-side ave.; appellant, G. Levor & Co., Inc. 13-3 approved exits from tannery division; 14-4 approved exits from tannery (main building). 15—Door to stair hall west end of storehouse, 1st floor, to open out. 16—Area of sky-lights at least one-quarter area of shaft. 33—Safe and direct means of egress to street from center stairs. 12-3 legal exits from storehouse.

Plans for storehouse submitted and approved; plans for other two sections submitted but not approved; unapproved plans showed fire wall from cellar to roof wherein horizontal exits were to be located, but buildings are erected with fire walls wherein are placed horizontal exit, and said fire walls are not continuous; that is, no walls on first or ground floor; horizontal exit in "A" building not located remote from stairway; exits, one fireproof enclosed stairway at southeast corner of building known as "Tannery"; fireproof enclosed stairway along southerly wall of "Tannery" (last mentioned stairway accessible from each side of the fire wall); horizontal exit on each floor at northerly and southerly end of fire wall dividing the 130-foot and 75-foot sections; horizontal exit at northerly end of fire wall dividing the 75-foot and 70-foot sections; a fireproof enclosed stairway in northwest corner of "Tannery"; horizontal exit in wall between "Tannery" and "Storehouse"; which horizontal exit is adjacent to last mentioned stairway; fireproof enclosed stairway at northwest corner of "Storehouse."

Storehouse is 3 stories high, Tannery 3 stories high; buildings sprinklered; occupancy, 2d floor 154, 3d floor 60, making 214 above the 1st floor; horizontal exits equipped with sliding and hinged doors which are self-closing; horizontal exits to comply with law should be in walls extending continuously from basement or cellar to roof.

Recommendation: Treat premises as one building and accept present exits as compliance with 12, 13, 14; waive order No. 15 on condition that there be ample means of egress to street on ground floor other than exit from bottom of this stairway; waive order No. 16 for skylights three-quarters area of shaft, there being other means of egress to street; waive No. 33.

Premises affected, (8) Gloversville, Kingsboro ave.; appellant, Fulton County Silk Mills. 3—Provide three legal exits from each floor. 4—Prohibit occupancy. 5—Construct water closets as per Code, 2-story and attic and 3-story and attic wooden building erected prior to Oct. 1, 1913; 3-story brick building erected prior to

Oct. 1, 1917; 3-story brick building erected subsequent to Oct. 1, 1913; occupancy of building, 55; 29 above first floor, 5 above second floor; exits, at east end of wooden building a wood enclosed stairway from first to second floors; unenclosed wooden stairway from third floor to attic; in the brick portion along the northerly wall is a wooden enclosed stairway from first to third floors; along the easterly wall of the new brick portion is a wood enclosed stairway from first to third floors; between brick and wooden portion of building is a horizontal exit adjacent to stairway. Water closets installed since adoption of new Code and do not comply with same; they are in sanitary condition, but floors are not of waterproof material; side walls not waterproofed to a height of 4 feet and angles of floors and walls not coved.

Recommendation: Accept the following exits: Wooden stairway to be provided at easterly end of building extending from second floor to foot of present stairway from third floor to attic; this stairway to be 30 inches wide and properly hand-railed. As second means of exit from wooden part provide horizontal exit at each floor, same to be so located as to give access to stairway between frame and brick portions, a doorway to be provided at fourth or attic floors, non-fireproof, and stairway to be carried to roof with bulkhead; horizontal exits to be accepted with but one fire door, if fusible link be so located that same will fuse from action of flames on either side of the wall; accept stairways in new brick portion if same be enclosed with fire-resisting partitions, as per rule 506-a, all openings therein to be provided with self-closing firedoors opening outwardly so as not to obstruct the passageway. Water closets to be accepted as are, and order No. 5 waived.

Large furniture factory; nearly all of the buildings being but one story high; one three-story building; never more than two men employed on second and third floors of this building; building sprinklered; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy of first floor, 102, one above first floor, one above second floor; from third floor there is an iron stairway that leads straight out from building onto first story roof, from which roof there is a counterweighted stairway. It further appearing that each of the appellants has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to be heard at this time, and place, if he desired to appear, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard, therefore.

Be it resolved that the Commission grant the variations set forth above with the understanding that said variations be effective only during the time that the conditions remain as of this date.

First—The said right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate said railroad tracks shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until October 28, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The time within which such application for renewal must be made is of the essence of this contract, and a failure of the Company to present its application within the time fixed shall be considered as an election on the part of the Company not to take advantage of the renewal privilege and as a relinquishment of its right to such renewal, in which event the franchise shall terminate on the last day of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day nine (9) months before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the parties hereby agree that the annual rate for the renewal term shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained and agreed to by any two of such appraisers shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The entire expense of such appraisal shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for this right and privilege during the original term of this contract expiring October 28, 1934, the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) From the date when the annual charge commences as hereinabove provided until October 28, 1924, the annual sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the succeeding term of five (5) years, the annual sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

During the last term of five (5) years, the annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000).

The annual charges shall commence on the date upon which the Company obtains the permission and approval of the Public Service Commission, as required by Section 53 of the Public Service Commission Law. The Company hereby agrees to file its application with the Public Service Commission for such permission and approval within ten (10) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

The annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding; provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date when the annual charges commence as hereinabove provided and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments herein provided for shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any railroad or railway company providing for payment for railroad or railway rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby

granted shall not be assigned or transferred, either in whole or in part, whether by consolidation, merger, reorganization or otherwise, or leased or sublet in any manner, either in whole or in part, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation, merger or reorganization of corporations or otherwise, unless, in addition to obtaining the above consent of the Board, the proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company shall file with the Board an instrument under seal, agreeing to assume and be bound by each and all of the terms and conditions of this contract and agreeing to waive any more favorable conditions created by its charter or any statute relating to the consolidation, merger, or reorganization of corporations or otherwise.

The filing of such agreement shall constitute a condition precedent to the passing to or vesting in such proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company of the rights and privileges granted hereby, or of any portion thereof, or of any right, interest or property therein.

In case of the failure of such proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company to file such agreement within sixty (60) days after the date on which such succession in title is to take effect, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited, or the consent of the City provided for herein may be revoked by resolution of the Board.

Paving and repairing of the streets.

Protecting the City's structures during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized.

Protecting the Company's tracks, appurtenances or other structures during the performance of any public work or as may be required on account of the changing of the lines or grades of the streets.

Or with any other provision of this contract

which may affect the repair, protection and maintenance of the streets or of the City's structures within the streets.

The City shall have the right to cause the work to be done or the defect remedied and to reimburse itself for the cost of such work by deducting such cost, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(b) Should the Company, within ten (10) days after the demand has been made upon it, fail to pay to the City the cost of any alterations to the sewerage or drainage systems occasioned by the construction, maintenance or operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, or fail to repay to the City any damages caused to persons or property which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of the construction, maintenance or operation of the said tracks and bridge or viaduct, or by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company in connection therewith, the City shall have the right to collect such costs or damages, with interest, by deducting the amount of the same, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(c) Should the Company fail to pay to the City the annual charges required to be paid by this contract, within the time fixed for the payment thereof, the City shall have the right to collect the amount of such charges, with interest, by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller without further or other direction.

(d) Should the Company fail to comply with the provisions of this contract, or with the orders of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, then the Company

may be required to pay to the City, as liquidated damages for each breach or violation, the following sums:

For failure to maintain the tracks and bridge or viaduct in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for each day during which the default or defect remains.

For failure to comply with any other provision of this contract as to which liquidated damages are not fixed herein, the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day during which such failure or default shall continue.

All of such sums may be collected by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

The procedure for the collection of such liquidated damages shall be as follows:

Whenever the Board shall have knowledge of any such breach or violation on the part of the Company, the Board shall give notice to the Company, specifying the nature of such breach or violation and the amount of liquidated damages which it is proposed to collect therefor, and directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the service of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be required to pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, the Board shall forthwith direct the Comptroller to collect such liquidated damages by deducting the amount of the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

(e) In case of any deductions from the security fund pursuant to this contract, either for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or for amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company, or for liquidated damages herein provided, or for liquidated damages, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Comptroller, deposit with the Comptroller a sum, either in money or securities, sufficient to restore such security fund to its original amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), and in default thereof, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by the City.

(f) Should the right and privilege hereby

granted be forfeited pursuant to the provisions of this contract, or should such right and privilege be relinquished upon the dissolution of the Company as herein provided, the security fund hereinabove provided for shall be forfeited to the City as liquidated damages for failure of the Company to perform this contract pursuant to the terms hereof.

(g) No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this subdivision shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

The provisions for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company or for the collection by it of the annual charges, or of liquidated damages, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice to the Comptroller, deposit with the Comptroller a sum, either in money or securities, sufficient to restore such security fund to its original amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), and in default thereof, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by the Comptroller.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or any official of the City acting under the powers herein reserved, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by resolution of the Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the tracks and bridge or viaduct constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring this right and privilege forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Fifteenth—Free and uninterrupted access to

and passage over Western Avenue shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and thereafter, unless otherwise directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and no car shall be allowed to stand upon said railroad

or viaduct or the mode of protection of or

changes in all subsurface structures required by such construction, reconstruction, repair or

removal of such tracks and bridge or viaduct or

bridge or viaduct, and the mode of protection of or

changes in all subsurface structures required by such construction, reconstruction, repair or

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the construction, maintenance and operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company shall repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract contained shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. Nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to limit in any way the police power now vested in or hereafter to be delegated or granted to the City by the State of New York.

Section 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, hereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed, and the party of the second part, by its officers, hereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed the day and year first above written.

WHEREAS, By contract dated October 21, 1910, the City granted to the Company the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate conduits of a maximum outside diameter of twelve (12) inches in and under the surface of the streets in certain districts in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

City of New York will make application to the Supreme Court that all parcels of real estate laid down on said above recited maps wholly or in part in the fire district of Gilboa, and all parcels of real estate laid down on said maps above recited where the claimants allege an enhancement by reason of water power thereon, including any claim the Gilboa Water Co. may have, shall be assigned by the Court to the present Schoharie Reservoir and Shandaken Tunnel Commission which is now appraising real estate in said fire district and has jurisdiction over certain claims for water powers in connection therewith.

Further, to prevent any conflict of jurisdiction between the Commission herein applied for and the Schoharie Reservoir and Shandaken Tunnel Commission already appointed, and to obviate, so far as possible, disproportionate awards and harmonious decisions, the Court will be asked to assign to the Commission herein applied for, all the telephone and telegraph companies' claims, whether for loss of business or for rights of way or easements, leaving to the Commission hereto fore appointed the determination of nothing in connection with the telephone and telegraph claims except the value of the Pierce and Peasee telephone building in Gilboa.

Also at the same time and place the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York will make application to the Supreme Court to approve the substitution for all rights of way and highways existing on the lines of the maps filed in the County Clerk's Office at Schoharie on the 31st day of January, 1917, the 19th day of March, 1917, the 29th day of May, 1917, and the 30th day of July, 1917, in the County Clerk's Office, County of Greene, on the 26th day of January, 1917, the 26th day of May, 1917, in the County Clerk's office of Delaware, the 31st day of January, 1917, and the 28th day of May, 1917, and the County Clerk's office of the County of Ulster on the 26th day of January, 1917, of the highways as prepared and laid down on the map prepared by the Board of Water Supply of the City of New York pursuant to chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905 as amended. All of which substituted highways are on real estate embraced in the above recited maps.
