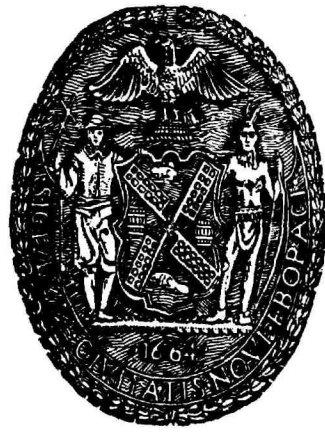

STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

Resolutions Adopted.
Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has submitted to this Commission the following requests for variation of law, made by the parties named herein, whereby appeal is made from

a strict compliance with the orders issued by the Division of Inspection (the granting of which would necessitate a variation of law); and Whereas, the Division of Factory Inspection has had a reinspection made in each case, and in accordance with the reports submitted, recommends as follows:

Premises affected, (1) Amsterdam, 41-53 Spring st.; appellant, Inman Mfg. Co., Inc. 3—Additional exit. 4—Prohibit occupancy. Box Shop, Dept. E. Three-story nonfireproof factory building; open lofts; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarms; 17 above the 1st floor; 2 occasionally above the 2d floor; one interior stairway; doors to which open out but are not self-closing; safe egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on 3d floor; horizontal exit consists of opening to two-story roof, and thence down ladder, giving access to stairway at northerly end.
Recommendation: Acceptance of present exit while occupancy remains unchanged.

Premises affected, (2) Amsterdam, 41-53 Spring st.; appellant, Inman Mfg. Co., Inc. 3—Machine shop. 9—Prohibit occupancy. 10—Second approved means of exit. Three-story building; divided lofts; no sprinkler; no combustibles; 62 in building, 24 above first floor, 14 above second floor; exits, one interior stairway in three-story part from first to third floors; one interior stairway in two-story brick part extending to first floor; no egress from roof; from third floor there is a 24-inch wooden stairway extending to roof and thence iron stairs to roof of adjoining building; an 18-inch iron stairway at opposite end of building extending to roof of two-story building only.
Recommendation: Accept as second means of exit from third floor the iron stairway on the westerly end of building, and from third floor to roof if a stationary iron ladder be placed from the second floor to lower two-story roof, and the wooden stairway from east end of third floor to pattern storage room roof and from thence to roof of foundry entrance, provided a railing be placed between iron stairway last mentioned and corner of building, and that wooden stairs be placed from easterly window on south of second floor to foundry entrance roof, said stairway to be provided with proper handrail; signs 8 inches high, reading "Exit," to be placed at all exits on second and third floors.

Premises affected, (3) Buffalo, 745 William st.; appellant, Jacob Dold Packing Co.; Associated Mfrs. & Merchants. File No. 92605, June 1, 1916, orders 1-8, re exits. File No. 92606, May 17, 1916, orders 1-8, re exits. This company occupies a group of buildings 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 8 stories in height, all of which are sprinklered, and all connected by imperfect horizontal exits provided with hinged refrigerating or hinged iron doors, not self-closing. If an exit be provided on second and third floors at southeast corner of "B" building where said "B" building adjoins the shipping building, which will give access to the platforms extending along the easterly side of said buildings, said openings to be provided with non-fireproof doors 2 feet wide by 6 feet high, I would suggest the acceptance of the following exits:

Recommendation: Along the easterly side of the buildings are platforms extending full length of building, taking in the second and third floors, at the northerly end of which is an outside stairway from the 3d floor to the ground. Along the westerly and southerly sides of these buildings there are also provided platforms with stairways extending from third floor to ground.
Packing Can Shop—3 stories high; opening on easterly side at second and third floors leading to platforms; also three openings on west leading to platforms; an imperfect horizontal exit leading to smokehouse adjoining. No stairway in this building, but there is in the smokehouse. Smokehouse—3 stories high; has opening on east to each platform; opening on west to each platform; along the westerly wall a stairway from first to third floors; on second and third floors imperfect horizontal exit leading to shipping room; also to packing can shop.

Shipping Building—3 stories high; imperfect horizontal exit on each floor, leading to smokehouse; opening on westerly side leading to each platform; no stairway.
Cold Storage Building—3 stories high; imperfect horizontal exit, leading to building adjoining on the west, also imperfect horizontal exit leading to three-story building adjoining on the north; no stairway.
Cold Storage Building—Imperfect horizontal exit leading to building adjoining on the south.
Cold Storage Building—6-story building, with imperfect horizontal exit leading to building adjoining on the east; an opening on the first, second and third floors to platforms leading along the southerly side of buildings and openings in fire wall leading to building adjoining on the north.

Cold Storage Building—6 stories high; opening in fire wall leading to building adjoining on the south and building adjoining on the north.
Cold Storage Building—6 stories high; an opening in the fire wall leading to the building adjoining on the south; an auxiliary stairway to basement from first floor; imperfect horizontal exit to building adjoining on the west; also imperfect horizontal exit to building adjoining on the north.
Cold Storage Building—6 stories high; imperfect horizontal exit leading to building adjoining on the south; also leading to buildings adjoining on the east and on the north.
A four-story building with access at each end from the second and third floors to the platform on the west and an imperfect horizontal exit to the six-story cold storage building adjoining on the east. No stairway.
Sausage Factory—4 stories high; imperfect horizontal exit leading to the cold storage building on the west also leading to an office building on the north; opening on second and third floors leading to platforms on the east. No stairway.
Three-story Office Building (northeast corner)—Imperfect horizontal exit leading to factory on south; imperfect horizontal exit to office building on west; imperfect fire escape on William st. side; stairway along the westerly wall from first to third floors.

Two-story Office Building—Stairway in southeast corner from second floor to roof; imperfect horizontal exit in easterly wall; also in southerly wall, and in westerly wall leading to "Cooler."
The Cooler—Stairway from second floor to roof; imperfect horizontal exit in easterly wall, also in westerly wall and in southerly wall.
Four-story Building—Bridge from fourth floor to building on the south; imperfect horizontal exit on the east to "Cooler"; also imperfect horizontal exit to building on the west and stairway from first to fourth floors along the westerly wall; imperfect horizontal exit in southerly wall to six-story Cold Storage Building.

Three-story Building—Imperfect horizontal exit in easterly wall; imperfect horizontal exit in westerly wall leading to "Ham House"; no stairway.
"Ham House"—5 stories high; stairway along easterly wall from first to fifth floors; imperfect horizontal exit in easterly wall; on 1st, 2d, 3d and 4th floors imperfect horizontal exit to building adjoining on the west.
"Glue Works"—3 stories high; imperfect horizontal exit in easterly wall leading to Boiler House; imperfect horizontal exit in westerly wall leading to "Tank House."
"Rendering Building"—3 stories high; imperfect horizontal exit leading to boiler house; also on third floor leading to roof of boiler house;

imperfect horizontal exit in westerly wall leading to "Tank House"; also northerly wall leading to new Beef House.

"Tank House"—4 stories high; stairway from first to fourth floors, extending from platform; imperfect horizontal exits on second and third floors to "Glue Works"; also second and third floors to "Rendering Building"; fourth floor to roof of "Rendering Building."

New Beef House—3 story building; fire wall divides this building, which has two openings on all floors; two stairways from first floor to roof, one in northeast corner and one in southwest corner; imperfect horizontal exits 2d, 3d and 4th floors leading to "Ham House" and "Rendering Building"; also exit from fourth floor in the form of a bridge leading to fireproof stairway in "Wellfare Building."

Recommendation: Exit to be provided from second and third floors of "B" building, adjoining the Shipping Building, viz.: southeast corner of "B" building, giving access to platforms along easterly side of said buildings. Openings to be 2 feet by 6 feet, non-fireproof doors.

Premises affected, (4) Dunkirk, Lark and W. 3d sts., appellant, Marsh-Burgess Co. 4—Enclosed elevator 5 feet 6 inches high on all sides not used for loading. Hand hoist from cellar to second floor used for freight only; telltale chains suspended from one edge; no capacity notice posted; enclosure does not extend entire width of shaftway and space between bars is 6 inches or more; operator must stand outside of enclosure to operate car; enclosure about 5 feet from floor on side hoist rope is located; exterior wall of building from other two sides; shaftway unguarded in cellar; vertical sliding self-closing gates provided at sides of enclosure first and second floors.

Recommendation: Place bars forming enclosure closer together, not more than 2-inch spaces; telltale chains to be provided on other side of car; capacity notice to be posted and substantial railing provided at shaftway in cellar; enclosure first and second floors to be extended full width of shaftway.

Premises affected, (5) Frankfort; appellant, Union Fork and Hoe Co. 4—Arrange exit doors to stairway to open outwardly; three-story non-fireproof factory building; open lot; part of building sprinklered; no combustibles; no fire alarm; eight to ten persons occupy second floor; exits, one interior stairway constructed of combustible material enclosed with brick partitions with sprinkler heads inside of enclosure; second floor doorway opens in; no egress from roof; imperfect horizontal exit on each floor not remote from stairway. (Since issuance of orders plans have been filed in the Engineering Division for the erection of a fire escape, and said fire escape has been placed on the easterly wall.) In addition to main stairway there are two auxiliary stairways.

Recommendation: That self-closing doors be permitted on second floor while not more than fifteen persons are permitted on second floor.

Premises affected, (6) Garden City, Franklin st., appellant, Doubleday-Page & Co. 12—Cease employing more than 199 persons on second floor. (Acceptance of horizontal exits to provide additional occupancy) "U" shaped, two-story and basement fireproof building; main wing 350 feet by 75 feet and left wings 200 feet by 75 feet; all wings sprinklered on all floors except the second floor, main and left wing which are used for office purposes; left wing of second floor sprinklered, used for factory purposes; 90 males and 10 females employed; 100 males and 150 females employed in office portion of second floor; three interior stairways. That is: Main wing, 60-inch open stairs; right wing, 46-inch enclosed fireproof stairs; left wing, 48-inch enclosed fireproof stairs; 312 persons occupy the second floor and may be increased to 330; printing establishment in which all packing cases are manufactured for own use, and all publications bound that are issued. A 6-inch fire wall separates left and main wings; this wall is continuous from basement but ends under ceiling of second floor; two openings in said wall, one leads to composing room and is provided with a fireproof self-closing sliding door, 48 inches by 35 inches, has a hinged door leading to stencil room. Composing room, stencil room and lead melting department are located in left wing, which is sprinklered and where the 48-inch enclosed stairway is located. There is another opening in the wall which separates the composing room from the main outside wall of the left wing; the lockers are located here, but there is a three-foot passageway between the lockers and the wall from composing room, which passageway leads to main building wherein is the open stairway. An enclosed stairway located in right wing is also accessible from main wing.

Recommendation: Provide two horizontal exits as per Sec. 79-19 in wall where the present two openings are; existing walls between horizontal exit and the new one to be provided in stencil room to be fireproofed; present horizontal exit with one fire door to be accepted.

Premises affected, (7) Gloversville, 113 Woodside ave.; appellant, G. Levor & Co., Inc. 13—3 approved exits from tannery division. 14—4 approved exits from tannery (main building). 15—Door to stair hall west end of storehouse, 1st floor, to open out. 16—Area of skylights at least one-quarter area of shaft. 33—Safe and direct means of egress to street from center stairs. 12—3 legal exits from storehouse.

Plans for storehouse submitted and approved; plans for other two sections submitted but not approved; unapproved plans showed fire wall from cellar to roof wherein horizontal exits were to be located, but buildings are erected with fire walls wherein are placed horizontal exit, and said fire walls are not continuous; that is, no walls on first or ground floor; horizontal exit in "A" building not located remote from stairway; exits, one fireproof enclosed stairway at southeast corner of building known as "Tannery"; fireproof enclosed stairway along southerly wall of "Tannery" (last mentioned stairway accessible from each side of the fire wall); horizontal exit on each floor at northerly and southerly end of fire wall dividing the 130-foot and 75-foot sections; horizontal exit at northerly end of fire wall dividing the 75-foot and 70-foot sections; a fireproof enclosed stairway in northwest corner of "Tannery"; horizontal exit in wall between "Tannery" and "Storehouse"; which horizontal exit is adjacent to last mentioned stairway; fireproof enclosed stairway at northwest corner of "Storehouse."

Storehouse is 3 stories high. Tannery 3 stories high; buildings sprinklered; occupancy, 2d floor 154, 3d floor 60, making 214 above the 1st floor; horizontal exits equipped with sliding and hinged doors which are self-closing; horizontal exits to comply with law should be in walls extending continuously from basement or cellar to roof.

Recommendation: Treat premises as one building and accept present exits as compliance with 12, 13, 14; waive order No. 15 on condition that there be ample means of egress to street on ground floor other than exit from bottom of this stairway; waive order No. 16 for skylights three-quarters area of shaft, there being other means of egress to street; waive No. 33.

Premises affected, (8) Gloversville, Kingsboro ave.; appellant, Fulton County Silk Mills. 3—Provide three legal exits from each floor. 4—Prohibit occupancy. 5—Construct water closets as per Code. 2-story and attic 3-story and attic wooden building erected prior to Oct. 1, 1913; 3-story brick building erected prior to

Oct. 1, 1917; 3-story brick building erected subsequent to Oct. 1, 1913; occupancy of building, 55; 29 above first floor, 5 above second floor; exits, at east end of wooden building a wood enclosed stairway from first to second floors; unenclosed wooden stairway from third floor to attic; in the brick portion along the northerly wall is a wooden enclosed stairway from first to third floors; along the easterly wall of the new brick portion is a wood enclosed stairway from first to third floors; between brick and wooden portion of building is a horizontal exit adjacent to stairway. Water closets installed since adoption of new Code and do not comply with same; they are in sanitary condition, but floors are not of waterproof material; side walls not waterproofed to a height of 4 feet and angles of floor and walls not coved.

Recommendation: Accept the following exits: Wooden stairway to be provided at easterly end of building extending from second floor to foot of present stairway from third floor to attic; this stairway to be 30 inches wide and properly hand-railed. As second means of exit from wooden part provide horizontal exit at each floor, same to be so located as to give access to stairway between frame and brick portions, a doorway to be provided at fourth or attic floors, non-fireproof, and stairway to be carried to roof with bulkhead; horizontal exits to be accepted with but one fire door, if fusible link be so located that same will fuse from action of flames on either side of the wall; accept stairways in new brick portion if same be enclosed with fire-resisting partitions, as per rule 506-a, all openings therein to be provided with self-closing fire doors opening outwardly so as not to obstruct the passageway. Water closets to be accepted as are, and order No. 5 waived.

Premises affected, (9) Bergen; appellant, Curcio Bros. Co. 2—2 legal exits. 3—Prohibit occupancy. 3 and 2-story nonfireproof building; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarm; building used for canning vegetables; occupancy of building, 159; 65 above the first floor, 2 above the second floor; at time of inspection there was one interior stairway from second to third floors, located along the southerly wall; an exterior stairway along the westerly wall from first to second floors; an exterior stairway on the easterly side of building extending from first to second floors; since inspection the interior stairway on westerly side of building has been extended to the third floor. There is also an exterior stairway on two-story addition extending from second floor to ground. From foot of present interior stairway there is a direct passageway leading to exterior stairway on two-story addition.

Recommendation: Accept as first means of exit present interior stairway second and third floors, and exterior stairway on two-story addition. As second means of exit, exterior stairway from third floor to ground and from second floor to ground on either side of building.

Premises affected, (10) Buffalo, Foot Churchill st.; appellant, Curcio Bros. Co. 2—Acceptance of stairway 40 inches wide in new building. Building erected Oct. 1, 1913, originally as a one-story structure with an open iron stairway; since then a mezzanine floor has been built therein and offices arranged with three unenclosed stairways; since then a 40-inch stairway has been enclosed.

Recommendation: Acceptance of present enclosed stairway 40 inches wide on condition that stairway coming down into workroom be enclosed and fireproof passageway to street provided.

Premises affected, (11) Johnstown, 21 South-Market st., rear; appellant, S. E. Trumbull & Co. 2—Additional exit. 3—Prohibit occupancy. 3-story nonfireproof building with divided lefts; sprinklers; 3 women and 1 man employed on second floor of wooden part; 1 man employed occasionally on first floor; no fire alarm; one stairway along southerly wall of wooden part; opening in brick wall on first and second floors between wooden and brick buildings; these openings not provided with doors; fire escape adjacent to stairway in wooden section, and fire escape is also accessible to brick section, 48 inches by 35 inches; stairway in brick portion extends from first to third floors; there are 13 employed on second floor in both sections.

Recommendation: Waiver of orders while not more than 4 persons are employed on third floor of wooden part and not more than one on third floor of brick part; if occupancy increases, proper exits to be provided.

Premises affected, (12) Syracuse, 510 Kirkpatrick st.; appellant, Cathedral Cattle Co. 4—A. 3-story nonfireproof building; open lot; no sprinklers; no combustibles; no fire alarm; occupancy of building, 30; 14 males and 2 females above first floor; one occasionally above second floor; exit, one interior stairway, doors to which open out but are not self-closing.

Recommendation: Accept a ladder from roof of two-story part to stairway roof and thence to ground, with doorway opening from three-story part to roof of two-story part.

Premises affected, (13) Whitesboro; appellant, Quigley Furniture Co. Acceptance of present exits which do not conform to Sec. 79-9. Large furniture factory; nearly all of the buildings being but one story high; one three-story building; never more than two men employed on second and third floors of this building; building sprinklered; no fire alarm signal system; occupancy of first floor, 102, one above first floor, one above second floor; from third floor there is an iron stairway that leads straight out from building onto first story roof, from which roof there is a counterweighted stairway. A person going from the roof from the west end of the building could travel about 400 feet over the New York east side is another roof about 150 feet long; one stairway in the southerly end of building.

Recommendation: Accept present interior stairway and a doorway on to roof from north-east corner of the second floor leading to the roof to the east and second at northwest corner of building leading to roof to the west, with access to drop stairway leading from said roof, and exemption from fireproofing openings alongside of stairway; doors to roof to be nonfireproof.

Premises affected, (14) Gloversville, 16 Alexander st.; appellant, Unique Glove Co. Re exits in three-story addition. The existing building measures 24 feet by 30 feet, is two stories and attic high with a stairway in the southwest corner. The addition measures 35 feet 6 inches by 18 feet and is to be three stories in height. The building is of wood construction, and the wall of the existing building is to be taken down so as to make one floor area. There is no sprinkler installed. The occupancy of the present building is 24 on the second floor and one on the third. The occupancy of the proposed building will be 35 on the first floor, 42 on the second and 40 on the third.

Recommendation: Erect a nonfireproof stairway in the northwest corner of the addition and a nonfireproof stairway in the southeast corner of the existing building, said stairways to be at least 44 inches wide, to be enclosed with fire-resisting partitions consisting of metal lath covered with Portland Cement in accordance with the Industrial Code rules, the exterior walls of the building, however, to be permitted as part of the enclosure, the windows in said enclosure to be of non-fireproof construction inasmuch as the building is isolated and there is no fire hazard. Said stairways to extend to the third floor. All openings in said enclosure to be fitted with standard fire doors opening outwardly so as not to obstruct the stairway, with direct egress to

the outer air at first floor. The present interior stairway is to be removed.

AND it appearing that there are practical difficulties and unnecessary hardships in complying with the strict provisions of the law and the rules and regulations of the Industrial Code on the premises noted herein, and that in granting the variation in each case the spirit of the law and of the rules and regulations will be observed and public safety insured; and

It further appearing that each of the appellants has been notified that he would be given an opportunity to be heard at this time and place if he desired to appear, and such of the appellants who appeared having been heard, therefore

Be it resolved that the Commission grant the variations set forth above with the understanding that said variations be effective only during the time that the conditions remain as of this date.

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on June 1, 1917, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as June 29, 1917, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "Brooklyn Times" and the "Evening World," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the

terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate this day of 1917, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, and the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board) and The Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, WITNESSETH:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate five (5) standard gauge railroad tracks over and across Western Avenue, in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, the center line of the northerly four of said five tracks to be approximately one thousand five hundred and thirty (1,530) feet northerly from the center line of Washington Avenue; said five tracks to connect the terminal yard of the Company, located on either side of Western Avenue.

All as shown on a map entitled: "Map showing proposed tracks across Western Ave., Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, City of New York, to accompany the petition of April 25th 1917, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

—Signed by W. H. Averell, General Manager, and Wm. B. Redgrave, District Engineer; which map is attached to and made a part of this contract.

SECTION 2. The grant of this right and privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company.

First—The said right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate said railroad tracks shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until October 28, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty (20) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The time within which such application for renewal must be made is the essence of this contract, and a failure of the Company to present its application within the time fixed shall be considered as an election on the part of the Company not to take advantage of the renewal privilege and as a relinquishment of its right to such renewal, in which event the franchise shall terminate on the last day of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall reach such agreement on or before the day nine (9) months before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the parties hereby agree that the annual rate for the renewal term shall be determined by three disinterested persons selected in the following manner:

One disinterested person shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested person shall be chosen by the Company; and the third shall be a third disinterested person, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained and agreed to by any two of such appraisers shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate thereafter prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The entire expense of such appraisal shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for this right and privilege during the original term of this contract expiring October 28, 1934, the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) From the date when the annual charges commence as hereinafter provided until October 28, 1924, the annual sum of five hundred dollars (\$500).

During the succeeding term of five (5) years, the annual sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$750).

During the last term of five (5) years the annual sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000). The annual charges shall commence on the date upon which the Company obtains the permission and approval of the Public Service Commission, as required by Section 53 of the Public Service Commission Law. The Company hereby agrees to file its application with the Public Service Commission for such permission and approval within ten (10) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

The annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding; provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date when the annual charges commence as hereinafter provided and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments herein provided for shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any railroad or railway company providing for payment for railroad or railway rights or franchises at a different rate.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby

granted shall not be assigned or transferred, either in whole or in part, whether by consolidation, merger, reorganization or otherwise, or leased or sublet in any manner, either in whole or in part, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or assigning of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation, merger or reorganization of corporations or otherwise, unless, in addition to obtaining the above consent of the Board, the proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company shall file with the Board an instrument under seal, agreeing to assume and be bound by each and all of the terms and conditions of this contract and agreeing to waive any more favorable conditions created by its charter or any statute relating to the consolidation, merger, or reorganization of corporations or otherwise. The filing of such agreement shall constitute a condition precedent to the passing to or vesting in such proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company of the rights and privileges hereby granted, or of any portion thereof, or of any right, interest or property therein. In case of the failure of such proposed successor in title to the rights of the Company to file such agreement within sixty (60) days after the date on which such succession in title is to take effect, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited, or the consent of the City provided for herein may be revoked by resolution of the Board.

Fifth—Upon the termination of the original term of this contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination or forfeiture of the right and privilege hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and other property of the Company constructed or existing pursuant to this contract within the streets shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at any time preceding the date upon which this contract shall terminate, the Board shall so order by resolution and give notice to the Company the Company shall, upon the termination of this contract, remove any and all of its tracks and other property constructed or existing pursuant to this contract and the said streets shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall commence and complete the construction of the tracks and appurtenances herein authorized within three (3) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise this right and privilege shall cease and determine.

Seventh—The tracks hereby authorized shall be constructed and maintained across Western Avenue upon a bridge or viaduct. The Company shall pay the entire cost of the construction and maintenance of such tracks and bridge or viaduct and in addition shall pay the following:

(a) The cost of the protection of all surface and subsurface structures which shall be in any way disturbed by the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of such tracks, and the bridge or viaduct.

(b) All changes in sewer or other subsurface structures made necessary by the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the said tracks and the bridge or viaduct including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures.

(c) The replacing or restoring the pavement in said street which may be disturbed during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks, and the bridge or viaduct.

(d) The inspection of all work during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks, and the bridge or viaduct, as herein provided, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eighth—Before the work of construction, reconstruction, repair or removal shall be begun the Company shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Richmond and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Company shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon it by these officials, as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent with the provisions of this contract. The Company shall submit to these officials working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of said railroad tracks and the bridge or viaduct, and the mode of protection of or changes in all subsurface structures required by such construction, reconstruction, repair or removal.

Ninth—The bridge or viaduct to be constructed under this contract shall, subject to the approval of the President of the Borough of Richmond, be constructed in a single span from house-line to house-line, and there shall not be any supporting columns erected in the street. Such bridge or viaduct shall have a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the surface of said street at the center line thereof and shall have drip pans placed under the same for the entire width of the street. The said tracks and bridge or viaduct shall be constructed, maintained and operated at the expense of the Company, subject to the supervision, control and inspection of the proper authorities of the City who have jurisdiction over such matters under the Charter of the City or under this contract.

Tenth—Should the grade or lines of Western Avenue be changed at any time during the term of this contract, whether original or renewal, the Company shall, at its own cost and expense, change or reconstruct the said bridge or viaduct under the supervision of the proper authorities of the city so that there shall be at all times a vertical clearance of not less than sixteen (16) feet above the surface of the street at the center line thereof, and that no portion of the piers or abutments of said bridge or viaduct shall encroach within the lines of said street as changed.

Should Western Avenue be widened, the Company shall make no claim for, nor shall it be entitled, as against the City, to any compensation or damages by reason of the taking of any portion of the piers or abutments of the bridge or viaduct in condemnation proceedings.

Eleventh—Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over Western Avenue shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and thereafter, unless otherwise directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and no car shall be allowed to stand upon any said railroad tracks within the limits of said street.

Twelfth—This right and privilege is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordinances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights and privileges hereby granted, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the

sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), either in money or securities to be approved by the Comptroller, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all the terms and conditions of this contract and for its compliance with all the orders of the Board and of the officials of the City acting under the powers herein reserved. From the said fund deductions may be made as hereinafter provided.

(c) Should the Company, within such time after notice as may be herein prescribed, or where no time is prescribed, within such time as the Board or the proper official of the City may hereafter prescribe, fail to comply with the provisions of this contract or with the orders of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, relating to:

Having and repairing of the streets.
Protecting the City's structures during the construction, reconstruction, repair or removal of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized.

Protecting the Company's tracks, appurtenances or other structures during the performance of any public work or as may be required on account of the changing of the lines or grades of the streets.

Or with any other provision of this contract which may affect the repair, protection and maintenance of the streets or of the City's structures within the streets.

The City shall have the right to cause the work to be done or the defect remedied and to reimburse itself for the cost of such work by deducting such cost, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(b) Should the Company, within ten (10) days after the demand has been made upon it, fail to pay to the City the cost of any alterations to the sewerage or drainage systems occasioned by the construction, maintenance or operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, or fail to repay to the City any damages caused to persons or property which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of the construction, maintenance or operation of the said tracks and bridge or viaduct, or by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company in connection therewith, the City shall have the right to collect such costs or damages, with interest, by deducting from the amount of the same, with interest, from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller upon the direction of the Board.

(c) Should the Company fail to pay to the City the annual charges required to be paid by this contract, within the time fixed for the payment thereof, the City shall have the right to collect the amount of such charges, with interest, by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for. Such deduction shall be made by the Comptroller without further or other direction.

(d) Should the Company fail to comply with the provisions of this contract, or with the orders of the Board or of the officials of the City herein named or referred to, then the Company may be required to pay to the City, as liquidated damages for each breach or violation, the following sums:

For failure to maintain the tracks and bridge or viaduct in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for each day during which the default or defect remains.

For failure to comply with any other provision of this contract as to which liquidated damages are not fixed herein, the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day during which such failure or default shall continue.

All of such sums may be collected by deducting the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

The procedure for the collection of such liquidated damages shall be as follows:

Whenever the Board shall have knowledge of any such breach or violation on the part of the Company, the Board shall give notice to the Company, specifying the nature of such breach or violation and the amount of liquidated damages which it is proposed to collect therefor, and directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day, not less than ten (10) days after the service of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be required to pay such liquidated damages in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, the Board shall forthwith direct the Comptroller to collect such liquidated damages by deducting the amount of the same from the security fund hereinabove provided for.

(e) In case of any deductions from the security fund pursuant to this contract, either for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company, or for the collection by the City of the annual charges herein provided, or of liquidated damages, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice by the Comptroller, deposit with the Comptroller a sum, either in money or securities, sufficient to restore such security fund to its original amount of two thousand dollars (\$2,000), and in default thereof, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by the City.

(f) Should the right and privilege hereby granted be forfeited pursuant to the provisions of this contract, or should such right and privilege be terminated upon the dissolution of the Company as herein provided, the security fund hereinabove provided for shall be forfeited to the City as liquidated damages for failure of the Company to perform this contract pursuant to the terms hereof.

(g) No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this subdivision shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

The provisions for the reimbursement of the City for work done by it or amounts expended by it on behalf of the Company, or amounts paid by it to any person by reason of any act or default of the Company or for the collection by it of the annual charges, or of liquidated damages, are and shall be in addition to the City's right as herein reserved to forfeit the right and privilege hereby granted.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board or any official of the City acting under the powers herein reserved, the right and privilege hereby granted may be forfeited by resolution of the Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the tracks and bridge or viaduct constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring this right and privilege forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Nothing herein contained shall affect in any way the right of the Company to apply to a court of competent jurisdiction for a review of any action of the Board forfeiting the right and privilege hereby granted.

Fifteenth—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the construction, maintenance and operation of the tracks and bridge or viaduct hereby authorized, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company shall repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Section 3. Nothing in this contract contained shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Section 4. Nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to limit in any way the police power now vested in or hereafter to be delegated or granted to the City by the State of New York.

Section 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

This contract, made and executed in duplicate, this day of 1917, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, and the Merchants Refrigerating Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses: WHEREAS, By contract dated October 21, 1910, the City granted to the Company the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate conduits of a maximum outside diameter of twelve (12) inches in and under the surface of the streets in certain districts in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, for the purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, upon certain conditions therein fully set forth; and

The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate certain conduits with the necessary branches and extensions therefrom, leading directly into private property, for the sole purpose of supplying refrigeration to consumers, provided that except as hereinafter specified in this section, no conduit be of a greater outside diameter than twelve (12) inches, including insulation or other covering; the same to be constructed and operated only beneath the surface of such streets, avenues and highways situate within the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, as are included within the districts bounded and described as follows:

Section 1 of said contract is further amended by adding to said section, at the end thereof, the following new paragraph:

In the following locations the Company shall have the right to construct, maintain and operate a conduit of an outside diameter, including insulation and other covering not to exceed 35 x 20 inches:

In Jay street from the center line of Staple street to a point about 92 feet west of the westerly line of Staple street with one connection to abutting buildings.

In Franklin street from a point about 197 feet east of the easterly line of Greenwich street to the center line of Washington street, with four connections to abutting buildings.

In Washington street from the center line of Franklin street to a point about 20 feet south of the southerly line of North Moore street, with two connections to abutting buildings.

Section 2. Subdivision Second, Clause (b) is amended to read as follows:

(b) From October 21, 1910, to May 15, 1913, an annual sum which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than eight hundred dollars (\$800).

From May 15, 1913, to October 21, 1915, an annual sum which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than one thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,600).

From October 21, 1915, to October 21, 1917, an annual sum which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400).

From October 21, 1917, to October 21, 1920, an annual sum which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than three thousand dollars (\$3,000).

From October 21, 1920, to October 21, 1925, an annual sum which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than three thousand five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

The gross receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts of the Company and of any subsidiary of the Company and of any purchaser of refrigeration from the Company for purposes of resale from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

Section 2. Subdivision Second, Clause (c), first and second paragraphs, are hereby amended to read as follows:

(c) An annual payment for each linear foot of conduit constructed within the limits of the streets (excepting, however, conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business), as follows:

For conduits of outside dimensions, including insulation and other covering, not exceeding 12 inches in diameter, twenty-five cents (25 cents).

SECTION 2. It is mutually understood and agreed that, except as expressly provided herein, nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to affect in any manner the provisions of the contract entered into between the City and the Company, dated October 21, 1910, as amended by said resolution adopted April 24, 1913, approved by the Mayor April 28, 1913, and by said contract dated May 15, 1913; and the Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in such contract of October 21, 1910, as modified by said resolution and by said contract as further modified by the provisions of this instrument.

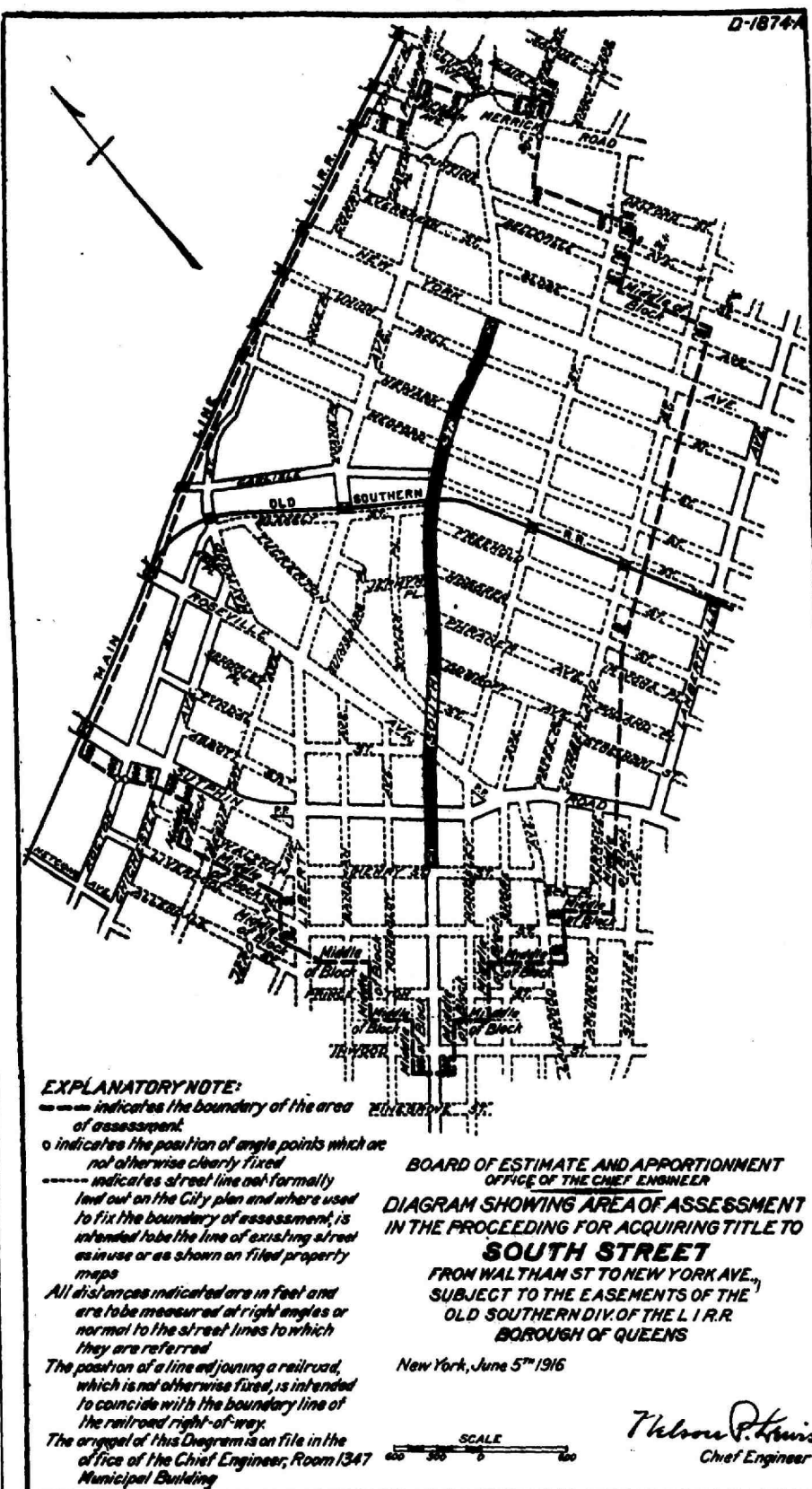

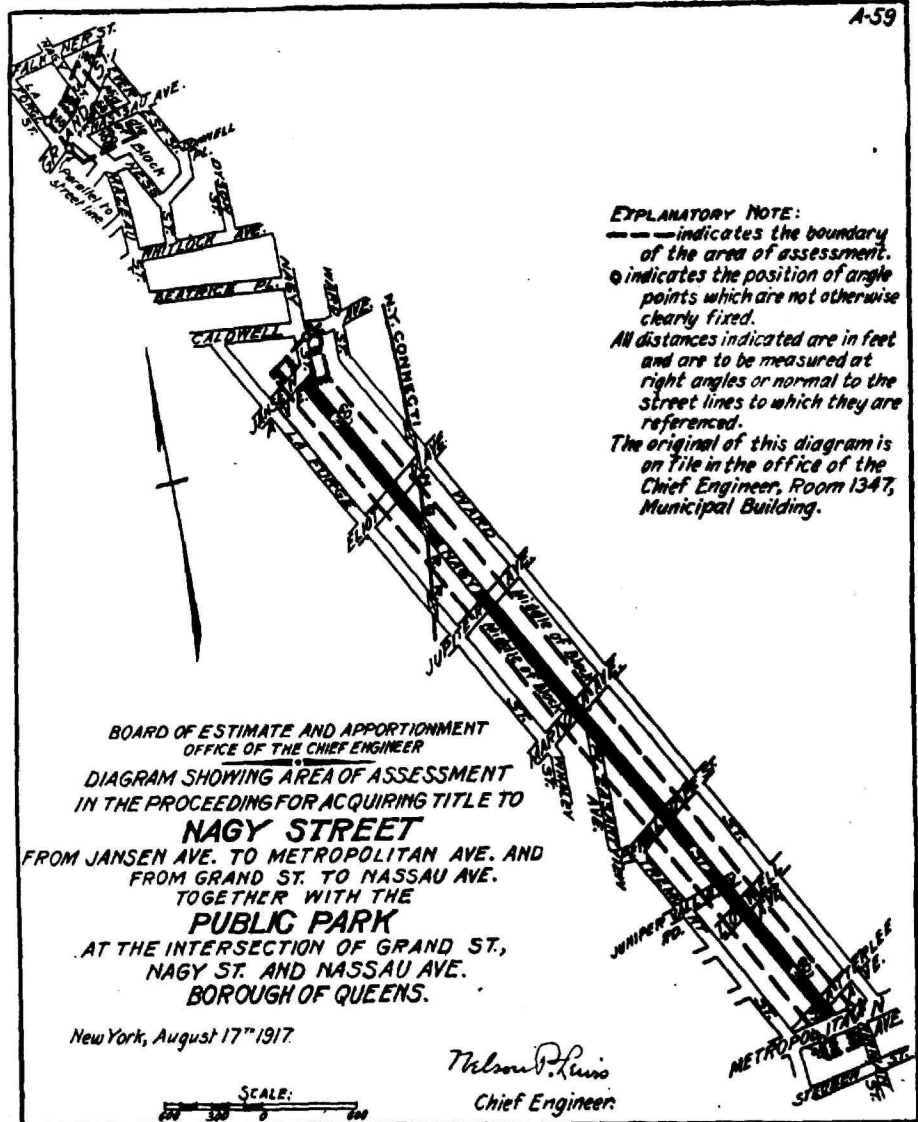

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in full of the purchase price of the buildings, etc., to the Comptroller of the City of New York, for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either of any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at the time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of the Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, or the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished.
