The Clerk proceeded to read the Minutes of the Stated Meetings of January 7 and 9, 1918.

On motion of Alderman Smith, further reading was dispensed with, and the Minutes were approved as printed.

On motion of Alderman Haubert, the privileges of the floor were extended to Mr. William Delaney and Mr. Louis J. Zettler, and on further motion of Aldermen Kenney the same courtesies were extended to Mr. James A. Bell.

MESSAGES FROM THE MAYOR.

No. 59.

His Honor the Mayor—Recommending Adoption of an Ordinance to Provide for the Acquisition by the City of New York of Coal for the Preservation of the Public Health, Safety and General Welfare of the People of Said City.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, January 14, 1918.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I feel that your honorable body has had brought to its attention the

serious consequences to the life, health and welfare of the community resulting from the shortage of coal.

One of the reasons for it, which seems to be within the power of the City to remedy, is the question of distribution. Great quantities of coal are within sight of our people, but the City is lacking in the power to take it for general distribution. This it should be permitted to do without loss or inconvenience to the owners.

I would therefore recommend that your honorable body vest the power by ordinance to acquire surplus supplies, making provision for compensation to the owners, and providing further for its distribution through an agency of the government. Respectfully,

In connection with the foregoing message the Vice-Chairman offered the following ordinance and moved its adoption:

No. 59 (Ord. No. 2, G. O. No. 1)

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the acquisition by the City of New York of coal for the preservation of the public health, safety and general welfare of the people of said City.

Whereas, there is a great scarcity of coal and other fuel in The City of New York, caused by the lack of sufficient supply and the unnecessary hoarding thereof; and,

Whereas, said lack of coal has produced a condition of want and suffering, seriously menacing the public health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of said City; and,

Whereas, the foregoing conditions amount to a grave public emergency, necessitating the exercise of the power of eminent domain; now therefore,

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. The Mayor of The City of New York is authorized and empowered by and through such person or persons as he may designate for that purpose, to take and acquire in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, coal situated within the limits of said City by whomsoever the same may be owned or possessed, in such quantities and amounts as said person or persons so designated by him for such purpose may determine to be necessary for the preservation of the public health, safety, general welfare and the relief of the poor of the City, and which may be determined by said person or persons so designated by the Mayor to be unnecessary for the use of the person or corporation from whom the same may be taken and acquired.

Section 2. Upon the taking of such coal in the manner aforesaid, title thereto shall vest in The City of New York and the same shall be distributed in such manner as the Mayor may direct.

Section 3. Within 30 days after any such taking The City of New York, by its Corporation Counsel, shall apply to the Supreme Court in the First Judicial District, upon notice, to have said Supreme Court, without a jury, ascertain and determine the compensation which should justly be made by The City of New York to the owner or owners of the coal so taken. Such notice shall be personally served upon the owner or owners of said coal so taken as aforesaid 5 days prior to the making of the application by the Corporation Counsel; and in the event that personal service upon the owner or owners cannot be effected, said notice shall be given to such persons and in such manner as the Supreme Court shall direct. Said Supreme Court, without a jury, upon such application, shall ascertain and determine the compensation which should justly be made to the owner or owners of the coal so taken, and shall make an award therefor to such owner or owners who shall be entitled to enter a judgment against The City of New York for the amounts awarded as such compensation. Such judgments may be reviewed in the manner prescribed by law for the review of final decrees in condemnation proceedings, under Chapter XXI of the Greater New York Charter.

Section 4. The Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to settle and adjust in the manner prescribed by Section 149 of the Greater New York Charter, any and all claims which any owner or owners of coal may have against said City by reason of the taking of such coal as provided in this ordinance.

Section 5. Any person or persons designated by the Mayor to act under the provisions of this ordinance shall be freed from any personal liability for such acts as he or they may perform in carrying out the provisions of this ordinance, and the Comptroller of The City of New York is hereby authorized to execute a bond on behalf of The City of New York indemnifying and holding such person or persons free and harmless from any and all actions at law or suits in equity or special proceedings which may be brought against him or them to recover damages or to prevent him or them from enforcing the provision of this ordinance.

Section 6. This ordinance shall be liberally construed for the purpose of carrying into effect the objects and purposes specified in the preamble.

Section 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Objection being entered against immediately consideration, the paper was, on motion of the Vice-Chairman, made a General Order for next meeting.

Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor of the City of New York, City Hall, N. Y. City:

My Dear Mr. Mayor—It has occurred to me, on account of the scarcity of anthracite or hard coal, due to the war conditions, that it would be highly advantageous to repeal the City ordinance of the City of New York preventing the use of bituminous or soft coal within the city limits for family use and heating purposes. I am creditably informed that there are thousands of tons of bituminous coal stored at Communipaw and at Lambert Point, Norfolk, Va., mined from the Pocohontas Mines, which could be shipped by water much cheaper than by rail. I think that this suggestion would relieve the coal famine during the war.

This ordinance, if repealed, could be re-enacted after the war. I remain, yours respectfully,

Communication from Robert J. Hearne Relative to Lack of Control Over Public Truckmen and Expressmen (Supplemental to No. 16).

ALFRED E. SMITH, Esq., President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

Re Regulation of Public Truckmen.

Dear Sir—I have your letter of January 7, in reference to the above matter.

The subject is a very large one, and I believe a very important one, and that is the reason that I would not venture to propose any new ordinances or regulations until a Committee had obtained thorough information as to what the present day conditions are.

It is, of course, to be assumed that anybody who has lived in New York, and done business in it for many years, has general knowledge of what conditions are.

In a general way, the public truckmen and local expressmen in New York City are practically uncontrolled. They do as they please, charge what they please, and come and go as they please. There is no regulation whatever as to their rates or methods of doing business.

I think that rates should be established by law, just as for taxicabs. Incidentally, I may say that at the present time it is considerably cheaper to hire a taxicab to do any local delivery of packages than to hire a public truckman, and I need hardly say much more prompt.

At the present time a street car company or an omnibus company has to obtain a charter, has to fix rates, and its routes are laid out by law, but practically anybody can go into business and run a local express business, and go where he pleases and charges what he pleases.

I suppose the legal fiction is that it is a private affair, but I am unable to see that it is any more private than the carrying of passengers.

The immensely long haul necessary to take express matter from the lower part of the city to the upper end, or to outlying district in Brooklyn, is one great source of trouble, and I believe that in the near future some arrangement will be feasible, whereby matter will be carried in bulk by the street railroads, and redistributed locally. This is done to a limited extent by some of the larger local expressmen themselves, who carry the goods in bulk and redistribute them from distributing centers.

There is a fearful waste of time and money now occasioned by trucks having to go to various railroads to deliver freight. It would seem that some arrangement could be made whereby there could be collecting stations for freight to be taken to the railroads, and then the wagons going to the railroads would contain nothing but freight for one particular railroad, and vice versa, when it comes to distributing goods from the railroads, the wagons should only handle matter from one railroad.

As I stated in the beginning, the subject is an extremely large one, and the more it is looked into the more one sees possibilities of improvement. The great point is to make a beginning. Perfection will not be obtained at once, but almost any form of regulation would be better than the chaos that exists now. Yours very truly,

Section 1. Section 12 of article 2 of chapter 19 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "Railroads" and particularly relating to "Transfers," is hereby amended to read as follows:

§12. Transfers. Every car owned, operated, managed or controlled by a street surface railroad company in the streets or highways of the city shall carry throughout its route on the outside, in front and on top of each and every car so operated, a signboard or placard, upon which shall appear conspicuously the destination of the said car. Every such company shall carry for a single fare upon such car, without change therefrom, each and every passenger to any regular stopping place desired by him, upon said car's route, in the direction of the destination so designated; and for every violation of this section [the company so offending shall be liable to a penalty in the sum of \$100;] there shall be recoverable from the company so offending a penalty of \$100 in an action to be brought by each passenger in his or her name who has been aggrieved by a violation of this section; but this section shall not apply to a transfer made to a connecting line going in a different direction from that in which such car may be going, nor where by reason of any accident compliance with this section is rendered impossible.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances relating to snow and ice.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§21. Property owners' duties.

1. Must clear sidewalks.

Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within 4 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow, [and] ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of 4 hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or by the Borough President of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or of said Borough President of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow, [and] or ice, dirt [and] or other material; except that in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the City for the removal of snow, [and] ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground, shall be ascertained and certified by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice [and] or snow, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law.

The said Borough President shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property.

The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of said expense, [together with Three Dollars (\$3) penalty for each offense], and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for such offense not less than One Dollar (\$1) and not more than Three Dollars (\$3) or be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one day, or may be both fined and imprisoned.

An Ordinance to Repeal Section 155 of Article 11 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Oil Separators.

By Alderman Squiers—

AN ORDINANCE to repeal section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to oil separators.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to oil separators, is hereby repealed in its entirety, said section reading as follows:

[§155. Oil separators.

1. *When required.* No garage permit authorizing the storage of volatile inflammable oil shall be issued for any premises, storing more than 4 motor vehicles, which are not provided with an oil separator, trap or other similar apparatus attached to the house drain, for the purpose of preventing volatile inflammable oils from flowing into the sewer; provided, however, that the fire commissioner may exempt from the requirements of this section a garage draining into a short sewer line. (O. R. §376.)

2. *Oil receptacle.* The oil-receptacle of an oil separator shall not exceed 50 gallons capacity, and shall be emptied as often as may be necessary to prevent the oil from overflowing; and such oils as are recovered from the separator shall be removed from the garage within 24 hours after being taken from the separator. (O. R. §397.)

3. *Sewer connection.* Each oil separator shall be connected to the house drain, and shall be so arranged as to separate all oils from the drainage of the garage. (O. R. §396.)

4. *Waste oil.* All oils spilled on the floor of a garage shall be removed by sponging or swabbing, and poured into the drain leading to the oil separator. (O. R. §398.)

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution Calling Upon the Corporation Counsel for Report to the Board of Method and Procedure by Which the City Could Immediately Take Over the Properties Owned and Operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.

Whereas, Conditions of travel on the surface and elevated lines of the Borough of Brooklyn do especial violence to all standards of human decency; and

Whereas, Such conditions of travel not only continually and in special measure discommode, inconvenience and degrade those who are forced to use the said surface and elevated lines, but also and in equal measure place in jeopardy their very life and limb; and

Whereas, Such conditions grow steadily worse, creating a feeling of bitter resentment among all classes of the population in the said Borough of Brooklyn; therefore, be it

Resolved, By the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

(1) That the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York, by virtue of his position as legal advisor to the said Board, as provided for in section 255 of the City Charter, is hereby directed to ascertain each and every method and form of procedure consistent with the Federal and State constitutions, and with or without specific authority granted by the Legislature of the State of New York for that purpose, by which the said City could immediately take over the properties now owned and operated by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, and any or all of the subsidiary companies affiliated therewith, and by which the said City could own and operate the same for the sole benefit of the inhabitants thereof; and

(2) That the said Corporation Counsel is hereby directed to present a full report of his findings in this matter to the said Board within a period of six weeks from the date of the adoption of this resolution.

Which was referred to the Committee on Finance with instructions to communicate with the Corporation Counsel in the matter.

The Committee on Rules, appointed by resolution adopted January 7, 1918 (Minutes, page 6), with instructions to prepare and report the rules for the session of 1918 and 1919, respectfully

REPORTS:

That it has prepared rules for the session of 1918 and 1919, which are herewith submitted, and recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the following rules be and the same are hereby constituted the Rules of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for the years 1918 and 1919.

RULES OF THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

CHAPTER I.

Meetings.

1. The Board shall hold its regular meetings on Tuesday of each week at 1:30 o'clock p. m., unless otherwise ordered. Special meetings shall be called by the Mayor as provided in section 37 of the Charter. The Board may adjourn to a day other than that of a regular meeting, and notice thereof shall be mailed to each member by the Clerk at least twenty-four hours before the time set.

CHAPTER II.

Powers and Duties of the President.

2. The President, or in his absence the Vice-Chairman, shall take the chair at the hour of meeting. He shall call the Board to order, and, except in the absence of a quorum, shall proceed to business in the manner prescribed by these rules.

3. He shall preserve order and decorum. In case of disturbance or disorderly conduct in the lobby or gallery he may cause the same to be cleared. He shall decide all questions of order, subject to appeal, which appeal shall be decided without debate, except that the appellant may state the grounds upon which he bases his appeal. In the absence of the Vice-Chairman, he may substitute any member to perform the duties of the chair for that legislative day.

4. He shall assign to the Sergeant at Arms and Assistant Sergeants at Arms their respective duties and stations.

CHAPTER III.

Of the Vice-Chairman.

5. The Vice-Chairman, when acting as President, shall be invested with all the powers and duties conferred upon the President. When the Board shall go into Committee of the Whole the Vice-Chairman shall be the Chairman of such committee,

and in his absence the President shall call to the chair the member moving the resolution to go into the Committee of the Whole.

CHAPTER IV.

Order of Business.

1. Roll call.
2. Reading of the minutes.
3. Messages and papers from the Mayor.
4. Presentation of petitions and communications.
5. Communications from City, County and Borough officers.
6. Ordinances and resolutions.
7. Reports of special committees.
8. Reports of standing committees.
9. Special orders.
10. General orders.

Messages from the Mayor and communications or reports from City or Borough officers may, however, be received at any time. It shall also always be in order to call up for consideration a report from the Committee on Rules or from the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

CHAPTER V.

Rights and Duties of Members.

7. A member presenting a paper shall endorse the same as follows: If a petition, memorial or report to the Board, with a brief statement of the subject of its contents, adding his name; if a notice or resolution, with his name; if a report of a committee, a statement of such report, with the name of the committee and members presenting the same.

8. No member rising to debate, make a motion or present a petition or paper, shall proceed unless in his place, nor until he shall have been recognized by the President. While a member is speaking no other member shall disturb him in any manner whatever. Unless otherwise provided by law, ordinance or these rules, the roll shall not be called upon a vote unless two members demand it. If a *viva voce* vote has been taken upon any question and the result has been announced by the presiding officer, a division by roll call shall be ordered upon the demand of two members.

9. No member shall speak more than once on the same general question until every other member desiring to be heard upon the question shall have spoken. No member may speak upon any matter for more than ten minutes at any time, except by permission of the Board.

10. A member desiring to be excused from voting, or to explain his vote, may, when his name is called, make a brief statement, not occupying more than five minutes, of the reasons for making such request, or for voting in the manner he does. If he make a request to be excused, the question of excusing him shall then be taken without debate by a vote without a roll call, and if his request be not granted he must vote.

11. In case a number less than a quorum shall convene, those present are authorized to send the Sergeant-at-Arms for the absent members.

12. In all cases of absence of members during the session of the Board, or of the violation of any of these rules, the members present may censure or suspend the offending member in such manner or for such period as they deem just. No member shall leave during a meeting without permission of the presiding officer.

CHAPTER VI.

Duties of the Clerk.

13. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to have the journals containing the proceedings of each meeting printed and copies thereof and of the calendar provided for in rule 14, mailed to the President and other members within four days after such meeting. All reports of committees submitted shall constitute a part of the proceedings of each meeting.

14. He shall prepare and cause to be printed for each meeting a list in detail of all matters ready for consideration at such meeting. Said list shall be known as the calendar, and shall include all vetoes, messages from the Mayor and other City, County and Borough officials and departments that have been laid over for future consideration, special and general orders and any other matters which have been presented to the Board and which remain undetermined. In case any matters on the calendar of a particular meeting are not acted upon they shall be continued upon the calendar of the next meeting and of each succeeding meeting in their order of introduction until finally disposed of. The calendar shall state, in regard to any ordinance, or resolution, the vote required to pass it, and if it be a matter referred to in section 48 of the Charter, then also the day when the time limitation in said section contained will expire. The calendar shall state, as to any pending veto of the Mayor, the date of the regular meeting of the Board, at which it is required by section 40 of the Charter to reconsider and vote upon the ordinance or resolution so vetoed.

15. The certificate of the Clerk of the Board shall be attached to every proposed ordinance or resolution, to the effect that the same has been duly passed or is deemed to have been duly passed by a vote, as required by the provisions of the Charter of The City of New York, and he shall transmit the proposed ordinance or resolution to the Mayor.

16. He shall keep index records convenient for reference of all ordinances, resolutions, petitions and other matters introduced in or presented to the Board; together with a complete chronological record of all action taken thereon by the Board or any of its committees.

17. He shall furnish to each member copies of the regular rules of the Board, prepared and printed under the direction and supervision of the Committee on Rules.

CHAPTER VII.

Duties of the Sergeant at Arms and Assistant Sergeants at Arms.

18. The Sergeant at Arms and the Assistant Sergeants at Arms shall be in constant attendance upon the sessions of the Board, and under the direction of the presiding officer shall aid in enforcing order on the floor, in the gallery, in the lobbies and in the rooms adjoining the Aldermanic Chamber, and also see that no person remains on the floor unless entitled to the privileges of the same. They shall also place on the files of the President and other members before each meeting the journals containing the proceedings of the Board, the calendars provided for in rule 14, the approved papers and the proposed ordinances. They shall also discharge such other duties as are directed by the President or the Board.

CHAPTER VIII.

Committees and Their Duties.

19. The standing Committees shall bear the following titles, and shall be appointed by the Committee on Rules, subject to approval by a majority of all the members of the Board:

- Buildings.
- Codification.
- Finance.
- General Welfare.
- Labor and Industries.
- Markets.
- Privileges and Elections.
- Public Letting.
- Public Thoroughfares.
- Rules.
- Salaries and Offices.

State Legislation Affecting The City of New York.

20. The first named member of each committee shall be its Chairman. All vacancies in committees or in committee chairmanships shall be filled by the Committee on Rules, subject to approval by a majority of all the members of the Board. Resolutions calling for the appointment of special committees shall be referred to the Committee on Rules, and if said committee report favorably thereon, it shall embody in its report the names of the members who shall constitute such special committee. A committee shall not act upon any matter before it unless a majority of the committee be present. No matter shall be reported by a committee unless a majority of all the members of the committee shall have voted upon a roll call at a meeting of the committee in favor of the report. The Committee Clerk shall keep minutes and accurate records of the members present and the roll calls at every meeting of a committee, and such minutes and records shall be completed and open to public inspection, in the custody of the Committee Clerk, as a public record, within three days after each meeting. Meetings of a committee may be called by either the Chairman or a majority of the committee. A written notice of each committee meeting shall be mailed to the respective residence addresses of the members of the committee not later than three days prior to the time fixed for such meeting.

21. Committees shall report, in writing, on all matters referred to them with a brief statement of facts and their opinion in relation thereto, and a resolution or ordinance proposing the necessary action by the Board. The report itself shall not be subject to amendment. Every report shall state the time when the subject matter of such report was referred to the committee by the Board, and the action, if any, taken by the committee pursuant to any instructions of the Board. Every report shall lie over until the next regular meeting, unless otherwise ordered by a majority vote of all the members of the Board, except that unanimous consent must be given for the immediate consideration of matters governed by section 30 of the Charter. Consideration of a report at the meeting of its presentation, if ordered, shall be deferred until after all reports of other committees shall have been received and read.

22. A committee may be discharged from further consideration of any matter referred to such committee by a majority vote of all the members of the Board. No matter that has been referred to a committee shall be acted upon by the Board until the committee has reported thereon or has been discharged. A committee, however, to whom there shall have been referred any such matter as is specified in section 48 of the Charter, or any matter in regard to which any law or ordinance fixes a time limit for the consideration thereof by the Board, shall at the last regular meeting of the Board preceding the expiration of such time limit be deemed to be discharged from the further consideration thereof. A committee which shall have been instructed to report at a certain meeting shall be deemed to be discharged from further consideration of the matter referred to it unless it shall report at such meeting or shall receive from the Board a further extension of time to report.

CHAPTER IX.

The Introduction and Passage of Ordinances and Resolutions.

23. All enactments shall be by ordinances, so far as practicable.

24. Every proposed ordinance or resolution introduced shall, on its introduction, unless otherwise ordered, be referred by the presiding officer to a standing committee to consider and report thereon. At any time during the meeting of introduction, such reference may be changed by a majority vote of all the members of the Board.

25. There shall be two classes of unfinished business, known respectively as Special Orders and General Orders. Every report of a committee upon a request of the head of a City, County or Borough Department, which involves an exemption of a contract from public letting, or the issuance of special revenue bonds, shall be a Special Order for the next regular meeting after it is submitted. The Board may, by a majority vote of all the members of the Board, make any matter pending before it a Special Order for a stated time. All reports of committees not otherwise disposed of on the legislative day introduced, except those required by these rules to be placed on the list of Special Orders, shall be placed on the list of General Orders.

26. Except as provided in rules 25 and 28, Special Orders and General Orders shall be considered by the Board in the order in which they appear upon the calendar.

27. No ordinance or resolution shall be considered on the day of its introduction, except by unanimous consent. In the event of more than one request for immediate consideration, the same shall be considered in the order of introduction. In the event, however, of the receipt of a message from the Mayor recommending the enactment of an ordinance or the adoption of a resolution, the matters referred to in such message may be considered at any time by a majority vote of all the members of the Board, except that unanimous consent must be given for such consideration if such matters are governed by section 30 of the Charter. In the event of immediate consideration, the proposed ordinance or resolution shall be read section by section, and shall be subject to amendment and debate before being adopted. No ordinance or resolution which is amended shall be adopted until it has been printed as amended, except by the consent of two-thirds of all the members of the Board; unanimous consent, however, must be given if the amendment relates to the matters governed by section 30 of the Charter.

28. When a special order is under consideration, it shall take precedence of any other special order set for a subsequent hour of the same day, but such other special order may be taken up immediately after the previous special order has been disposed of. Any matter specified in section 48 of the Charter shall at the last regular meeting of the Board preceding the expiration of the time limit in said section be deemed to be a special order and shall take precedence of all other special orders.

29. When any proposed ordinance or resolution requiring the concurrence of two-thirds, three-fourths, four-fifths or five-sixths of the members, as provided in the Charter, is under consideration, such concurrence shall not be requisite, except on the question of its final passage.

30. All ordinances introduced shall be in writing, and shall be presented in duplicate. An ordinance amending or repealing any existing law or ordinance shall contain in parentheses the part repealed and the new part to be inserted underscored. When any such ordinance is printed in the Minutes, the part repealed shall be in brackets instead of parentheses, and the new part shall be in italics instead of being underscored. All ordinances presented, whether new or of an amendatory nature, shall state specifically the section, article and chapter of the Code of Ordinances to be added, added to, amended or repealed.

CHAPTER X.

Motions and Their Precedence.

31. When a question is before the Board, only the following motions shall be received, and such motions shall have precedence in the following order, viz.: (1) for adjournment; (2) for a call of the Board; (3) to lay on the table; (4) for the previous question; (5) to postpone indefinitely; (6) to postpone to a day certain; (7) to refer; (8) to amend.

The motion to adjourn, or for a call of the Board, or to lay on the table, shall be decided without debate, and shall always be in order. Upon motions not debatable no member shall be allowed to explain his vote or give his reasons for asking to be excused from voting.

32. All motions shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the President or any member of the Board, delivered to the clerk and read before the same shall be debated. Any motion may, by unanimous consent, be withdrawn at any time before decision or amendment.

If the matter in debate contains several questions which may be separately considered, they shall, at the request of any member, be separately voted upon.

A motion to postpone or refer shall, until it is decided, preclude all debate on the main question.

33. When a question has once been decided, it shall be in order for any member of the Board who voted in the majority to move for its reconsideration, and it shall be reconsidered upon majority vote of all members present and voting, except that no matter shall be reconsidered more than twice; but no motion for the reconsideration of any vote shall be in order after the proposed ordinance, resolution, message, report, amendment or motion upon which the vote was taken shall have gone out of the possession of the Board; and no motion for reconsideration shall be in order unless made on the same day on which the vote was taken, or on the legislative day next succeeding. But when a proposed ordinance or resolution shall have been recalled from the Mayor, a motion for reconsideration may be made at any time thereafter, and all resolutions recalling a proposed ordinance or resolution from the Mayor shall be regarded as privileged. No vote shall be reconsidered upon either of the following motions:

To adjourn.

To lay on the table.

CHAPTER XI.

Questions of Order.

34. When a roll call shall have been ordered, the absentees shall not be called more than once, unless requested by at least five members.

After two calls for absentees a motion to discontinue the roll call shall be in order and may be adopted by a majority vote.

35. All questions relating to the priority of business shall be decided without debate.

When the reading of a paper, other than a petition, is called for, and the same is objected to by any member, the question whether the paper shall be read shall be determined by a majority vote without debate.

CHAPTER XII.

Attendance of Quorum—Call of the Board.

36. Whenever any member raises the question as to the presence of a quorum, the presiding officer shall forthwith direct the clerk to call the roll, and shall announce the result, and such proceedings shall be without debate; but no member, while speaking, shall be interrupted by raising the question of absence of quorum,

and such question shall not be raised more often than once every hour, unless the absence of a quorum be disclosed upon a roll call. Whenever, upon a roll call, any member present refuses to make response when his name is called, it shall be the duty of the presiding officer, either upon his own motion, or upon the suggestion of any member of the Board, to request the member so remaining silent to respond to his name, and if such member fails to do so, the fact of such request and the refusal shall be entered in the journal, and such member shall be counted as present for the purpose of constituting a quorum.

37. For the purpose of securing the attendance of members a call of the Board may be ordered at any time, except that no such call shall be in order when the voting on any question has begun, unless it shall appear upon an actual count by the presiding officer that a quorum is not present. If demanded by two members, the roll shall be called upon a demand for a call of the Board, and, if a majority be recorded in the negative, a call of the Board shall not again be in order except by unanimous consent until an hour has elapsed.

CHAPTER XIII.

Miscellaneous Provisions.

38. The roll call of the Board shall be in alphabetical order, except that the Presidents of the Boroughs, the Vice-Chairman and the President of the Board shall be called last, and in the following order:

President of the Borough of Richmond, President of the Borough of Queens, President of the Borough of The Bronx, President of the Borough of Brooklyn, President of the Borough of Manhattan, the Vice-Chairman, and the President of the Board. The two latter officers shall be called by their respective titles instead of by their names.

39. The following persons only shall be admitted to the floor of the Aldermanic Chamber during its sessions:

1. The Mayor, his Private Secretary and Chief Clerk.
2. Heads of Departments, their Deputies and Secretaries.
3. Reporters of the Public Press.
4. The Employees of the Board and of the City Clerk's office.
5. Such other persons as may by resolution be granted the courtesy of admission to the floor.

40. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in "Reed's Rules" shall govern the Board in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the Board.

41. A rule of the Board may be altered, suspended or rescinded, or a new rule may be added, only by a majority vote of all the members. A motion to suspend, alter or rescind any rule or to add a new rule, shall not be in order without a unanimous vote of the Board, unless one week's previous notice in writing shall have been given to each member specifying the purpose of the proposed suspension, alteration, rescission or addition.

42. Except by unanimous consent a motion to adjourn shall not be put to a viva voce vote, but a roll call thereon shall be ordered.

Which was adopted.

Alderman Kenneally moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President declared that the Board stood adjourned until Thursday, January 17, 1918, at 1.30 o'clock p. m.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curbs in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building.
