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
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COMMISSIONER'S MESSAGE

As I write this message to you, the City's troubled fiscal future continues to present the Mayor and our Depart-

ment with an enormous and daunting challenge. As yet, we do not know exactly what the impact on the Department will be as we help to balance the city's budget. But we know that we will do what it takes. For instance, in July we reduced our recycling program in order to save an estimated \$40 million a year. In that reduction, we stopped collecting all plastic and glass materials because they were not being recycled in the conventional sense.

What really was happening with plastics and glass was that because there were no local markets for either material, our recycling vendors were sending shredded plastic and crushed mixed glass to landfills where it was being used as daily cover material.

What was so disappointing was that they were doing so at nearly twice the cost of simply sending the tonnage directly to the same landfills as trash. Consequently, we suspended plastic recycling for one year and glass for two years.

The Department now sits on a task force that is helping to strengthen our recycling program.


In addition to the recycling cutbacks, we had to scale back supplemental litter basket collections and some other services. This is very serious business and now is the time for all of us to pull together in an unprecedented way to work more efficiently and more effectively. It might ultimately mean some very painful choices, but we will continue to support the Mayor and our city. That is what Sanitation has always done, and we will not disappoint New York.

On a brighter note, I am pleased to announce that this second edition of sanitation news contains highlights of some recent events that celebrated the Department for its dedication and professionalism in response to the World Trade Center attacks a year ago. We were saluted at a number of events including a barbeque with Mayor Bloomberg at Gracie Mansion, a luncheon hosted by Mission New York City, a tribute by the New York Stock Exchange and a family night at Shea Stadium with the New York Mets.

This is a tradition-proud agency that performs some of the most difficult assignments with which this City can challenge us day in and day out. It is rewarding to see how many new 'fans' we have.

ANGELO CIPOLLARO D.S.N.Y. HONORS ITS STRONGEST, AND BEST

At a recent awards ceremony held at the Borough of Manhattan Community College, Commissioner Doherty honored special Departmental units associated with the World Trade Center cleanup, announced the 2001 Employees of the Year Annual Winners, and cited an employee who served with the Department for 50 years.

Thirty employees from the Emergency Response Division and from the Fresh Kills Landfill Unit were awarded Unit Citations for their involvement in the nation's largest cleanup and recovery effort in the wake of the World Trade Center tragedy. In addition, Commissioner Doherty named the winners of the 2001 Employees of the Year competition. They were General Superintendent David Callery, Brooklyn North Borough Operations; Supervisor Thomas Fitzgerald, Bureau of Cleaning and Collection; Sanitation Workers Nick Comisa and Lawrence Reilly, Queens East 8; Thomas Dimino, Supervisor of Electricians, Bureau of Support Operations; and Elissa Werbin, Central Correspondence Unit, Bureau of Public Information and Community Affairs. Each winner received two commemorative plaques and a \$500 check.

Also, at the ceremony, Angelo Cipollaro, a mechanic in the Bureau of Support Operations who actually started his career as a Sanitation Worker in the 1950's, received a special 50-year service plaque and a Golden Apple Award for his half-century of outstanding service to the Department. Mr. Cipollaro recently retired.

D.S.N.Y. MEETS THE METS...


For those of you who could not attend the Mets/Atlanta Braves game on Saturday night, September 28th, the Department was honored by the Mets at the pre-game ceremony.

Thank you, Mets, for this wonderful tribute.


