## HOMELESS SERVICES GEARS UP FOR NINTH ANNUAL HOPE SURVEY ONE NIGHT, THOUSANDS OF VOLUNTEERS BAND TOGETHER

The Department of Homeless Services today began the countdown to the ninth annual Homeless Outreach Population Estimate (HOPE) survey on January 28, 2013. The survey estimates the number of individuals living on streets, parks and in other public spaces in New York City. New Yorkers are vital community partners who help survey the City's unsheltered population the night of the estimate. To register, please visit (<a href="www.nyc.gov">www.nyc.gov</a>).

Under Mayor Bloomberg, New York City in 2003 became one of the first cities in the nation to do a street survey to estimate project service needs and allocate resources for the street population while at the same time educating and engaging New Yorkers. A survey has since become a federal requirement for all cities wishing to drawn down funding for homeless services provided by the McKinney-Vento Act, which the City uses develop supportive housing; a key service model in the City's effort to reduce street homelessness. From its start with 1,000 volunteers in Manhattan only, the survey today covers all five boroughs with a record number of 2,925 volunteers last year. Identified by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) as a best practice method, New York City's HOPE survey is the largest of its efforts nationwide.

New York City has seen a 26 percent decline in street homelessness since 2005. The ratio of street homelessness individuals to the general population in the City – 1 to 2,506 – is one of the lowest in the country. New York City's street outreach operation has moved more than 3,500 chronically homeless individuals from the streets into transitional and permanent housing since redesign of the program in fall of 2007. With 24/7 outreach teams mobilized Citywide; specialized low threshold housing, with smaller, more private facilities and fewer regulations that the street homeless population is more likely to accept; and targeted funding to ensure that resources reach the individuals most in need, New York City is the national leader in investment in persons living on the street.

Street outreach teams' strongest partner remains the everyday New Yorker. By calling 311 when an individual on the street appears to be in need of shelter or assistance, especially during winter months, any New Yorker can dispatch a street outreach team to that person and help them move indoors. These critical calls can change, or even save, a life.
