DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held November 8, 1882.

Present—Commissioners Vanderpoel and Voorhis, Absent—The President.

On motion, Commissioner Voorhis took the chair.

On motion, the reading of the minutes of the previous meetings was dispensed with.

A report from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2766 in reference to the prem-

s on the water-front, between Seventy-seventh and Seventy-eighth streets, East river, was received,

ad, and, On motion, laid on the table to await action.

The following communications were received, read, and, On motion, placed on file, action being taken, where necessary, as stated, to wit: From the Counsel to the Corporation:

Ist. In reference to and enclosing summons, complaint, etc., for verification by the Comissioners in the matter of the application of the Mayor, etc., against the Union Ferry Company or an injunction order, to restrain said company from proceeding with the work at Wall street cry, in violation of the rules and orders of this Department. The Secretary stating that the papers and been verified by the Commissioners and returned to the Counsel to the Corporation on the 3d stant, the action was approved.

2d. Transmitting form of lease to the Iron Steamboat Company of Pier, new 1, North river, proved as to form.

3d. In reference to the matter of Mahony Brothers against the Mayor, etc., for a writ of pernptory mandamus. 4th. Requesting copies of the minutes of the Board of April 14 and October 17, 1880, in refer-

ice to platform, between Forty-ninth and Fifty-first streets, East river. Secretary directed to rnish copies of same as requested.

From the Department of Public Works-In reference to making the pavement on West street,

hen relaid or repaired, to conform to the grade of the pavement laid by this Department.

From Wyckoff, Seamans & Benedict—In reference to the use of the Remington Type

From East River Ferry Company, lessees—Enclosing check for rent of premises at Thirty-burth street, East river, and in reference to the title of said company thereto.

From S. L. Merchant & Co.—In reference to testing a barrel of cement, and as to the pay-nent of the charge therefor. Secretary to advise that the money be paid to the Treasurer of the loard, and that the cement be then delivered at the Department Yard at Gansevoort street, North

From William L. McConkey, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that the pavement at Pier, East river, required to be repaired. The repairs having been ordered on November 1st inst. be made by the Engineer-in-Chief jointly with Mr. Doyle, no action was necessary.

From William Livingstone-In reference to the enjoyment of personal privileges in the raughtsmen's room.

From Department of Street Cleaning—Requesting the use of the dumping board at Seventy-hird street, East river, while repairs are being made to the dumping board at Forty-sixth street, East river. Secretary directed to advise that the Board will grant permission for the Department of Street Cleaning to use the same; but that the same is, in their opinion, unsale, and it has been etermined to remove the same, and if the Department of Street Cleaning desired to use it, that epartment should make it safe for use before doing so, it being unsafe and dangerous in its present

From Edward W. Candee—Requesting permission to drive eight or ten piles at the bulkhead between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, East river. Application granted. Work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From S. W. Lewis & Co.—Requesting permission to place spruce plank over the pavingtones on the bulkhead, between Piers 8 and 9, East river. Application denied.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting amount of work done during the week ending October 21, 1882.

2d. Reporting as to repairs required to Piers 51, 51½, and 52, East river, and the bulkheads etween. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to repair the east half of Pier 51, and the bulkead between Piers 51 and 52, East river, with the force of the Department; the other work to be done by contract.

3d. Reporting that repairs were required to the bulkhead at foot of Corlears street, East river. The Secretary stating that by direction of the President the Engineer-in Chief had been ordered to do the work, his action was approved.

do the work, his action was approved.

4th. Reporting as to repairs required to the Pier at Bethune street, North river. Secretary directed to notify the lessees to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work and charge the cost thereof to them.

5th. Reporting as to improving the water-front at foot of Seventy-fifth street, East river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for building a bulkhead and platform at foot of Seventy-fifth street, East river.

6th. Reporting in reference to repairing the Pier at Fifty-seventh street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to close the central approach to the pier.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2757, as to repairs required to the bulkhead between Pier 54 and Corlears street, East river. Secretary directed to notify the owners to repair the same within ten days, under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, or this Department will do the work at their cost and expense.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2690, that the office and store-house at Christopher street, North river, had been removed to the Gansevoort street yard.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 2669, that he had superintended the repairs made to the bulkhead between Piers 26 and 27, East river. From James Fitzpatrick, Corporation Wharfinger-Reporting that John Keating had worked without laying down a platform. Secretary directed to transmit report to the Counsel to the Corporation, for collection of the penalty imposed by Rule 7 of the Rules and Regulations.

From John Butler, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that the bulkhead at Sixty-first street, East river, was in a very bad condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report

From W. L. McConkey, Corporation Wharfinger—Reporting that Pier 5, East river, was in a dangerous condition. Engineer-in-Chief to be directed to examine and report thereon.

The communication from the Department of Street Cleaning, requesting that some eight ieces of old timber be delivered to that Department, to be used in repairing the bulkhead at

Thirty-eighth street, East river, was,
On motion, taken from the table, and, with the report on Secretary's Order No. 2734, from the Engineer in Chief, as to the delivery of the material as ordered, which was received and read, was ordered on file.

A communication from the Comptroller of the City, in reference to the penalties imposed on John Kelly, for delay in completing his contract for building the bulkhead between Seventy-eighth street and Seventy-ninth street, North river, was received, read, and,

On motion, placed on file, and the following resolution in relation thereto, offered by Commissioner Voorhis, was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That in accordance with the suggestion and request made by the Comptroller of the City, in reference to the penalty imposed on John Kelly, for delay in completing his contract for building the bulkhead between Seventy-eighth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river, this Board do hereby certify that the Corporation of the City have not suffered any loss or damage by reason of hereby certify that the Corporation of the City have not suffered any loss or damage by reason of delay on the part of the said contractor in completing his contract.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, reporting the completion of the Pier at Fortysixth street, North river, by the contractor, was, On motion, taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution in relation

thereto unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That this Board hereby certify to the Comptroller that the failure of John Gillies to complete the work within the time stipulated therefor, under his contract for building the Pier at

West Forty-sixth street, North river, dated June 10, 1882, has not caused the Corporation to sustain any loss or damage whatsoever, the pier having been virtually completed and in use by the public prior to the date of expiration of said contract.

The President, to whom was referred the communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, suspending Daniel Brodie, watchman, for being off post on October 29th, ult., reported thereon, and recommended that the action of the Engineer-in-Chief, in suspending the said watchman for one week, be approved; and,

On motion, the report was received and the recommendation adopted.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 2394, submitting specification and form of contract for repairing the Pier at Twenty-third street, East river, was, On motion, taken from the table and placed on file, and the following resolution in relation, thereto was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract for repairing the Pier at Twenty-third street, East river, as prepared by the Engineer-in-Chief, be and are hereby approved and adopted subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and that the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed, and proper advertisements inviting bids for doing the said work, inserted in the papers designated by law.

The Secretary stated that by direction of the Commissioners he had transmitted to the Counsel to the Corporation the bids received from James D. Leary on the 2d instant, for repairing the bulkhead at Seventeenth street, East river, and at Fifth street, East river, together with the communication received on the 3d instant from the said Leary in respect thereto, stating that the bids made by him therefor were transposed, and requesting that the bids made by him be declared irregular, for his opinion in respect thereto. The action of the Secretary was,

On motion, approved.

Mr. Thomas Patten and Henry E. Harland appeared before the Board and were heard in reference to the removal of the bulkhead north of Seventy-fourth street, East river, as ordered by the Board, and requested that further time be granted to Mr. Patten to remove the same. The Board informed Mr. Patten that they would grant reasonable time to him to have the work done, but that part of the bulkhead at the foot of the street should be taken away at once so to permit the progress of the work to be done by the Department at that place.
