

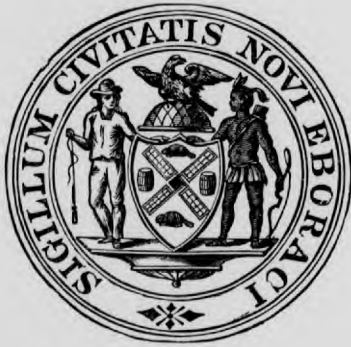

REPORTED MORTALITY * for the week ending February 14, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending February 7, 1885.

SIR—There were 724 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, February 14, 1885, which is a decrease of 51, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 30 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending February 7, 1885, was 736, which is 60.0 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.70 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,381,537.

AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 78 Tribune Building, Wednesday, February 11, 1885, at 3 o'clock P. M.

Commissioners present—The Mayor, the Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners James C. Spencer, William Dowd, and C. C. Baldwin.

Also, Chief Engineer Church, Assistant Chief Engineer Fteley and Consulting Engineer Davis; also, Chief Engineer Birdsall and Consulting Engineer Adams of the Department of Public Works.

The minutes of the stated meeting of the 4th instant were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported the examination and audit of bills included in vouchers Nos. 500 to 506; and, on motion of Commissioner Dowd, the said vouchers were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee on Construction submitted a report dated February 9, 1885, which was laid over for consideration in Executive Council, and thereafter taken up and acted upon in sections, as follows:

1st. The Committee recommended that authority be given to employ certain laborers and to purchase implements and tools at a cost of not over \$200, for making soundings in Manhattan valley and in the Central Park, as requested in a communication addressed by the Chief Engineer to the said Committee, and dated February 9, 1885.

On motion of Commissioner Dowd, it was

Resolved, That authority be given to the Chief Engineer, in conjunction with the Committee on Construction, to employ sixteen laborers and three overseers, for making soundings by trial pits and sounding rods in the streets south of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, and in Central Park, for the purposes described in the above-named report of the Chief Engineer, and to purchase the necessary implements and tools therefor at a cost not exceeding \$200.

2d. In relation to the appointment of assistants to the Division Engineer on Division No. 7 (south of the Harlem river), as requested by the Chief Engineer in his report of January 28, 1885, referred to this Committee, and in his supplementary report to the Committee, dated February 9, 1885, the Committee recommended the appointment of the following persons to the positions and at the compensation named for them respectively; said compensation to commence with the date of entrance upon the discharge of their duties under this appointment, viz.:

William R. Warfield, as Assistant Engineer, at the rate of \$1,800 per annum.

Alexander C. Chenoweth, as Transitman, at the rate of \$1,500 per annum.

Henry N. Hamilton, as promoted from Chainman to Leveler, at the rate of \$1,200 per annum.

Herbert C. Alden, as Rodman, at the rate of \$75 per month.

Charles G. Douw, as Chainman, at the rate of \$60 per month.

—and the Committee also recommend the appointment of Frederick E. Waldron as Chainman (in place of Henry N. Hamilton, promoted), at the rate of \$60 per month.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin these recommendations were approved, and the above-named appointments made by the Commissioners.

3d. The Committee recommended the purchase of the following instruments and tools for the use of the Engineers of the Seventh Division, at a cost not exceeding the following sum, viz.:

One transit, at.....	\$240 00
One level, at.....	155 00
One leveling rod, at.....	16 00
Lining rods and minor tools, at.....	50 00

Total.....\$461 00

4th. The Committee recommended renting a floor in a building in One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, near Eighth avenue, for headquarters of the Engineers of the Seventh Division, for the term of three years, from the 1st of May next, at a rental of not to exceed \$480 per annum, and an appropriation of \$300 for proper heating apparatus, furniture, stationery, and fittings for said headquarters.

On motion of Commissioner Spencer, these recommendations were also approved by the Commissioners, and the Secretary was directed to prepare lease of said floor, to be approved by the Committee of Finance and Audit, and executed by the President of the Commission.

The Committee on Construction then reported progress in the matter of the application of O'Brien & Clark and Heman Clark for additional shafts; and conference was held in relation thereto with the Counsel to the Corporation, after which the matter was laid over for further report and future action.

The Secretary presented communications from the Comptroller, giving notice of the issuance of warrants for payment of vouchers not certified by the Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal, as follows:

—which communications were read and ordered placed on file, and proper entry thereof made upon the books of this Commission.

Chief Engineer Church presented a communication dated February 11, 1885, informing the Commissioners of the declination of William A. Brackenridge, appointed Transitman January 21, 1885, and recommending the appointment of Judd A. Lockwood in the place of Mr. Brackenridge.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, this communication was referred to the Committee on Construction for report.

The Commissioners then received a delegation from the Central Labor Union of New York, who delivered a written communication in relation to the object and scope of their association, and Messrs. William McCabe, John T. Keeny and others of the delegation were heard with regard to the employment of skilled labor upon the New Aqueduct.

The Commissioners held an Executive Council for conference upon matters connected with right of way lands, and then adjourned.

The following assessments lists received from the Board of Assessors, with communications dated December 30, 1884, were presented by the Comptroller, viz.:

2. Sewer in Lexington avenue, between Eighty-fifth and Eighty-sixth streets.
3. Sewer in Avenue A, between Ninety-second street and Harlem river.
4. Sewer in Seventy-third street, between First and Third avenues.
5. Sewer in Ninety-second street, between Avenue A and First avenue.
6. Sewer in Beekman street, between Water and South streets.
7. Sewer in Seventieth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, from end of present sewer west of Ninth avenue.
8. Sewer in West Tenth street, between Greenwich and Sixth avenues.
9. Flagging sidewalks on west side of First avenue, between Fifty-sixth and Sixty-fourth streets, and on the east side between Fifty-ninth and Sixtieth streets, and between Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets.
10. Receiving basins on the west side of Eighth avenue, between Seventy-seventh and Eighty-first streets.
11. Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, between Eighth avenue and Avenue St. Nicholas.
12. Flagging in One Hundred and Nineteenth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues.
13. Sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, between Eighth avenue and Avenue St. Nicholas.
14. Flagging in Sixty-eighth street, between First and Second avenues.
15. Flagging in Fifth avenue, east side, from Sixty-sixth to Sixty-seventh street, and on north side of Sixty-sixth street, from Madison to Fifth avenue.
16. Flagging parts of sidewalks on both sides of Eleventh avenue, between Fifty-eighth and Fifty-ninth streets, and on north side of Fifty-eighth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, etc.
17. Sewer in Spring street, between Broadway and Mercer street.
18. Flagging in Fifth avenue, east side, from Sixty-seventh to Sixty-eighth street, and on south side of Sixty-eighth street, from Madison to Fifth avenue.

19. Flagging in One Hundred and Eighteenth street, between First and Second avenues.
20. Sewer in Front street, between Broad and Whitehall streets.
21. Receiving basins on northeast and southeast corners of Fourteenth street and Avenue A, and on southeast corner of Goerck and Stanton streets.
22. Sewer in Third avenue, east side, between Eighty-eighth and Eighty-ninth streets.
23. Paving Eighty-ninth street, between Avenues A and B, with granite-block pavement.
24. Sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, between Eighth avenue and Avenue St. Nicholas.

25. Receiving basin and sewer connection at the northeast corner of Alexander avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street.

26. Sewer and appurtenances in One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, between Brook and St. Ann's avenues, with a branch in St. Ann's avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-sixth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets.

27. Sewer and appurtenances in Washington avenue, between East One Hundred and Sixty-ninth and East One Hundred and Seventieth streets.

28. Flagging sidewalks, setting curb and gutter stones and laying cross-walk on the south side of One Hundred and Fifty-first street, from Courtland to Morris avenue.

29. Sewer in Fifth avenue, east side, between Thirteenth and Fourteenth streets.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form and no objections having been filed, on motion they were severally confirmed, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for sewer in Fourth avenue, east side, between Eighty-second and Eighty-third streets, and objections of Cornelius O'Reilly, referred to the Board of Assessors at meeting of December 9, 1882, to await the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, in the matter of the assessment for regulating and grading Lexington avenue from Ninety-sixth to Ninety-seventh street, in which a similar question is presented, were submitted by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of January 15, 1885.

After hearing Mr. O'Reilly, in opposition to the assessment, it was on motion ordered that the said assessment list, with the objections, be referred back to the Board of Assessors for the purpose of ascertaining the amount assessed for the sewer in Eighty-second street on Mr. O'Reilly's property, situated in the rear of his lots on Fourth avenue, known as Ward Nos. 2 and 3.

The assessment list for regulating and grading Lexington avenue from Ninety-sixth to Ninety-seventh street, with objections of Helen Knickerbocker, filed by John C. Shaw, attorney, referred to the Counsel to the Corporation at meeting of November 3, 1882, for examination as to the correctness of the principle adopted by the Board of Assessors for the distribution of the assessment, was presented by the Comptroller, the same having been returned by the Counsel to the Corporation, with the following communication, v. z. :

Hon. EDWARD V. LOEW, Chairman, Board of Revision and Correction of Assessment Lists :

SIR—I return herewith the assessment list for the regulating and grading of Lexington avenue, from Ninety-sixth to Ninety-seventh street, and the communications accompanying the same. This list was handed to one of my assistants by Mr. Andrews upon his retirement from office in June last, and my attention was called to it for the first time to-day. From the letter accompanying the list it seems that it was transmitted to Mr. Whitney on November 6, 1882, for his opinion upon the objections made thereto by Helen Knickerbocker to the distribution of the assessment.

Section 867 of the Consolidation Act of 1882, which is a re-enactment of chapter 308 of the Laws of 1861, directs that assessment lists presented to the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessment Lists for confirmation, shall be either confirmed or sent back to the Board of Assessors for revision and correction within thirty days from the date of such presentation, and if not confirmed or sent back, they should be deemed to be confirmed at the expiration of thirty days from the time they shall be presented for confirmation.

Taking as a guide the date of the letter from the Secretary of the Board of Assessors to the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessment Lists, it would appear that this assessment list was presented to the latter board for confirmation on the 7th day of January, 1882. The letter requesting an opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation bears date November 6, 1882.

I am of the opinion, therefore, that under the section of the Consolidation Act above referred to, the assessment was confirmed by operation of law before the opinion asked for was requested.

In this view of the matter, it is unnecessary for me to discuss the merits of the objections to the distribution of the expense of the improvement.

E. HENRY LACOMBE, Counsel to the Corporation.

On motion, the said assessment list was declared to be confirmed by operation of law on February 6, 1882, under section 1 of chapter 308 of the Laws of 1861, and the title thereof was directed to be entered in the record of the titles of assessments confirmed, kept in the office of the Bureau of the Clerk of Arrears, all the members of the Board voting in the affirmative.
