Vice-President Starin sent word asking to be excused on account of an important engagement.

Edward M. Shepard and Albert B. Boardman, counsel; William Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer, and George S. Rice, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

President Orr announced that a public hearing had been advertised on the matter of the station at One Hundred and Fourth street and Eighth avenue. The following spoke in favor of the construction of a station at that point: John C. Coleman, Langdon Ward, G. T. Lawrence, John Shriner, Philip L. Wilson, Samuel Green, H. E. Downey, Sol. Kohn, Mr. Berg. Letter of Philip Braender, with petition, was read, advocating a station. W. W. Niles, Jr., President of the Taxpayers' Alliance, and Col. J. A. Goulden, thought a station there unnecessary, and that it would interfere with Rapid Transit from the Bronx Borough. John B. McDonald, the contractor, gave his reasons against the construction of the station, and the Chief Engineer pointed out certain objections to it. No action was taken.

Counsel presented form of deed by the Subway Realty Company to the City of the easements at northwest corner Broadway and Forty-second street and reported it satisfactory to them. It was referred to the Chief Engineer for report. Counsel was authorized to have the title to the easement insured with the Title Insurance Company at an expense not to exceed \$150.

President Orr brought up the matter of the request of the contractor for authority to construct as extra work a third track from the north portal near Dyckman street to the terminus at Kingsbridge. On the suggestion of the Comptroller it was decided to obtain from the contractor a definite figure of the cost of the proposed addition before authorizing the work.

Section No. 3. From Station 107 to the terminus, to Messrs. Craniord & McNamee, of No. 215 Montague street, Brooklyn, who are to furnish all labor and materials, with the exception of the structural iron and steel and track.

POST OFFICE VAULTS.

Hon. A. E. ORR, President, Rapid Transit Board:

My Dear Sir—I have conferred with the contractors in regard to the communication of the Treasury Department dated November 19, in which the Treasury Department requests that the work along Park row be done, in so far as their vaults are concerned, under the following conditions:

"The beams over this portion of the basement are to be carefully shored up from the cellar level, and after shoring is in place a strong plank partition is to be erected within the shoring line.

within the shoring line.

"This partition is to be tightly constructed to keep out the weather and prevent drafts, and is to be covered on the outside with sheet asbestos in a manner satisfactory to the Chief Engineer and Superintendent of Repairs, United States Public Buildings.

"The partition is to have no doors or other openings, and the mechanics employed

on the work must remain outside the partition, the inner line of which is to set not more than 4 feet inside the present wall line."

This is the method that would have been followed anyway in the carrying out of our work, and I see no objection, if the Board desires, to the above conditions being accepted.

Letter of Alderman Herbert Parsons was read as follows:

December 1, 1902.

Hon. Alexander E. Orr, President of Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, No. 320 Broadway, New York City:

DEAR SIR—There is a question which I desire to ask the Commission in regard to the Pennsylvania iranchise. In Article VI. of the Terms, Conditions and Requirements, it is provided that the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners "may, wherever else local conditions make excavations from the surface necessary for efficient construction, grant the right to make such excavations from the surface, subject to such conditions as the Board may prescribe."

I desire to ask if amongst the conditions which the Board may prescribe will be one which will compensate the owners and occupants of abutting property for the occupation of the surface of the street and the excavation from the surface by the Railroad Company. It is frequently said that in such public improvements someone must suffer. Then, say I, let those who must suffer be as few as possible. The construction of the Rapid Transit Railroad in the Borough of Manhattan has ruined the business of many people. It is, to my mind, unnecessary and improper that they should have been visited with such ill fortune. Some compensation should have been given to them for the obstruction of and excavations in the street in front of their places of business. Along Fourth avenue, which, from Fourteenth street to Thirty-sixth street, is in my district, business has been greatly depressed. The smallest customers are those who have fared the worst. When the contractors built bridges it seemed always to be for the convenience of the stronger and not for the convenience of the smaller men. convenience of the smaller men.

The Pennsylvania Railroad will cut my district from Seventh avenue to Lexington avenue, on Thirty-first, Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets. It will undoubtedly be a great convenience to the City, and I am anxious that it should be adopted. I am unwilling, however, that the people whose houses and stores may be along the route should be hindered and obstructed without any compensation, and accordingly ask for some assurance that the Commissioners will impose such

conditions.

The general charge in this case is conduct prejudicial to the good reputation, order and discipline of the Department and wilful neglect of duty. The allegations of greatest importance are two, namely: First, the acceptance of certain materials of lower grade than those called for by the requisitions made by him, and lower than the grades contracted for by the Purchasing Agent in his purchases made under said requisitions; second, the allowing of overtime work paid for at double the ordinary per diem wages (said work being performed out of the ordinary hours) when such overtime work was not rendered necessary by any emergency, when the apparatus or material upon which the work was performed was not immediately or urgently needed for the preservation of life or property under the care of the Department. Around these two allegations are grouped the collateral ones of having made requisitions with the intent of accepting material lower in quality than that called for and thereby inferentially causing the payment by the Department of an excessive price for the quality which was received and used; also, that he did not cause to be kept complete records required by the Rules and Regulations of the Department; that he did not cause to be taken nor did he give receipts for apparatus or parts of apparatus received at or sent out of the Repair Shops, nor cause to be followed any method or system by which the cost of a large portion of the work done by the Repair Shops could be definitely ascertained; that he permitted false entries to be made in the books of the Repair Shops, and that he permitted property of the Department to be conof the Repair Shops, and that he permitted property of the Department to be converted to private use.

For a proper understanding of the facts presented at the hearing, a consideration of the system under which the Repair Shops was operated and the responsibility of the Chief of that Bureau is necessary. In the matter of purchases of material the method is briefly this: Upon ascertaining the necessity for material, the officer in charge of the shops makes requisition upon the Commissioner for its purchase. Such requisition states the amount, the quality and sometimes the cost of the materials to be purchased. If approved by the Commissioner the requisition passes into the hands of the officer designated to make the purchase. That official negotiates the purchase, agreeing with the seller as to the price and that he will deliver the quality specified in the requisition. The responsibility of the officer making the purchase ends here. The verification as to amount and quality rests with the officer in charge of the Repair Shops, to whom the material is delivered directly from the seller.

In the matter of the allowance of overtime work, the determination as to whether or not the same is justified by the emergency also rests with the officer in charge of the shops. It is also true that he has control of the character and amount of work done in the Repair Shops, whether new or repair work, subject to the orders of the Commissioner with regard to any specific article.

From the position occupied and the powers exercised by him, it follows that he must necessarily be responsible for the acts of his subordinates, subject to such faworable construction as may be reasonably allowed for the occasional receipt of defective material without his knowledge or the performance of unnecessary work by his subordinates without his authority. In other words, occasional errors such as these could be properly condoned, but a frequent recurrence of such acts cannot be construed otherwise than as indicating inefficiency, neglect or connivance, or all

Much evidence was presented upon the general character of the lumber which had been received during the past four years and made into the various parts of engines, hook and ladder trucks, hose carts, ladders and firemen's hook and axe engines, hook and ladder trucks, hose carts, ladders and firemen's hook and axe handles. A number of the wheelwrights employed in the shops testified with unanimity that they had been habitually obliged to use such material that was not only poor in quality but was so inferior as to be unfit for the purpose to which it was applied, even if the work was intended for ordinary service, and much less fit for the service of the Fire Department in view of the extraordinary exigencies and strain to which the apparatus of the Department is subjected. The conception of a fireman high upon the wall of a burning building riskipg his life to save that of another and finding his rotten scaling ladder breaking under his feet needs only to be mentioned to bring a thrill of horror to the mind and a vehement denunciation that such a thing should be possible. Independent testimony from an expert employed in selecting woods for one of the oldest and most prominent carriage factories in this city was ing woods for one of the oldest and most prominent carriage factories in this city was given to the same effect, his examination being based upon the material which he found in the shops, purchased prior to the time of Chief Ryan's suspension, and also from an examination of a large number (some scores of exhibits) of new materials, such as spokes, felloes and handles, or parts of broken apparatus which had been sent to the shops for repairs. He characterized the lumber of various kinds which he to the shops for repairs. He characterized the lumber of various kinds which he examined as poor and decidedly below the proper average, and said of the exhibits shown "as poor a lot as I ever saw." The witnesses for the defense testified to a much higher opinion of the material, but it appeared upon examination that each of them represented a firm or company which was in the habit of making sales of lumber to the Department, and that the special knowledge of each was limited to the kind of material which he furnished, and that his examination was, as a matter of fact, an examination of the material which had been supplied by those whom he represented. It was further shown that frequent and practically continuous complaints had been made by the workmen in the lumber shop to their foregan, and at other times to the

made by the workmen in the lumber shop to their foreman, and at other times to the General Foreman and to the Assistant Foreman and to Chief Ryan himself, the general result of which complaints may be summarized correctly in the statement "Do the best you can and let it go at that; mind your own business." It was also shown that in general no detailed inspection was made of material received. The requisitions were in every instance for first-class material, and when poor material was received and the City paid the price of the best no argument is needed to show

that the cost was exorbitant.

In the matter of overtime allowances the testimony shows that it was habitually of overtime allowances the testimony snows that it was habituary directed and granted, in the case of the wheelwrights, by Foreman Schmidt, acting sometimes on his own responsibility and sometimes upon that of the General Foreman. That it was known on all occasions, either before or after the fact, by Chief Ryan is shown by his certificates attached to the monthly payrolls in which such overtime was allowed, and in which he certified that it was proper and necessary. It was also further shown in connection with this class of overtime that a very large protyme was allowed, and in which he certified that it was proper and necessary. It was also further shown in connection with this class of overtime that a very large proportion of the whole was done upon work for which there was no immediate necessity and which could not be considered in any proper sense as emergency work. The evidence of this is found in the fact that in many instances the work taken up Saturday afternoon and pursued through Sunday, was laid aside on Monday and the ordinary routine resumed, the emergency work being again taken up upon the following Saturday and Sunday. To such an extent was this done that there are instances of wheels begun in February or March of the present year as emergency work which had not left the shops on the first day of June. Another class of alleged emergency work is that performed by the wrecking gang of three men, whose business it is to repair broken apparatus. Some of this work is necessarily done after regular hours and is properly emergency overtime work. The evidence, however, shows two facts: First, that excessive amounts of time were allowed in many instances for the performance of the work, and, second, that in the system permitted by Chief Ryan the three members of the wrecking gang regularly made their own unverified reports of the amount of time they had been employed: that in no instance were any one of the reports so made by them objected to by the General Foreman of the Shops, and that no means were taken by Chief Ryan or his subordinate officers to obtain a check upon or a verification of the accuracy of such reports, although the company journals of the various apparatus companies afforded a means of so doing, to a considerable upon or a verification of the accuracy of such reports, although the company journals of the various apparatus companies afforded a means of so doing, to a considerable extent. These men came and went, practically their own masters, and handed in on each following day the slip containing each man's individual statement of his time, all of which were regularly accepted and accredited to them. One result of this method was a very excessive cost of repairs, to which attention was called in the reports of the Commissioners of Accounts, which reports were made a part of the record. The fact of excessive cost is further shown by comparison with the cost of similar repairs which have been made, under similar conditions, by the wrecking gang of the Repair Shops since the suspension of Chief Ryan and the superintendence of the work by Capt. Fisher.

Taking up the method of conducting the business of the shops, in which is included the matter of defective and erroneous records, receipts for material and ap-

cluded the matter of defective and erroneous records, receipts for material and apparatus received and sent out, the mutilation of the books and other allegations of this character, the testimony shows that Chief Ryan was not responsible for the alleged mutilation, which was stated by a witness (one of the employees) to have been done by himself without wrong intent, and that the records contained in the mutilation were temporary memornada and unimportant. It was, however, shown that in certain instances false records had been made, notably in the case of one or more members of the wrecking gang in the matter of their time; that, in general, the entries regarding work done failed to describe fully and in detail, and often even the character of the apparatus for which the work was done, or of the work itself. This was especially noticeable in the matter of the overtime work in the shops, which, on account of its high cost and emergency character, should have been fully described in order that the necessity for it might be made apparent. It further appears that although receipts were given and taken for new material received from or returned to the contractor, that no given and taken for new material received from or returned to the contractor, that no receipts were given or taken in connection with the very large amounts of apparatus repaired and material delivered to the various companies, the record upon that subject relied upon by Chief Ryan being the report upon their six monthly returns of the Captains of such companies. But more important than the mere absence from the record of the details and character of the work done, is the fact that no attempt had been made to calculate the cost of any portion of the vast amount of new and repair work done in the shops, with the single exception of the cost of the overtime labor performed by the wrecking gang, and even in these entries the cost of the material used by them is not in any case estimated. The practice of keeping an account of the cost of piece-work of every description prevails generally in all shops of this character, in the hands of private manufacturers: its absence prevents the making of proper comparisons, or of checking and eradicating extravagance and excessive cost.

There remains for consideration the allegation of the conversion of the property of the Department to private use. pensation. It was further shown, and admitted by him, that he had allowed certain amounts of fire hose and nozzles to be taken from the shops for the use of a private individual or corporation, on whose premises the property still remains.

Various arguments are brought forward by the counsel for the defense in his brief, which will be considered. The first denies generally that conspiracy or connivance existed on the part of Chief Ryan in connection with the various acts of commission and omission with which he is charged, and counsel denies that conspiracy or connivance existed in any case, and asks the question, "If either did exist, with whom was it?" If conspiracy should be limited in its meaning to an act by which the guilty party personally profited, it is not shown in this case; but if the habitual permitting of wrongdoing in a Department under his sole charge, and where he held the dominant responsibility, where, from the facts as shown, the wrongdoing must have been within his knowledge, and where it is further shown that such wrongdoing was performed by his direct subordinates in some instances and condoned by them in many others, if this constitutes conspiracy and connivance, then those acts are found in the evidence, and the parties with whom such conspiracy or connivance existed were his immediate subordinates. It is impossible to conceive that the continuous acceptance of poor material and the impossible to conceive that the continuous acceptance of poor material and the allowance of excessive and unnecessary overtime to the extent of thousands of dollars in amount, and the irregularity of accounts by which employees established the amount of their own compensation, could have been so long conducted and permitted by his subordinates without his knowledge and tacit, if not direct, permission. It is further alleged by counsel that it is not shown that within the specified dates that any article or material of inferior quality was received and accepted. The Commissioner cannot agree with this analysis of the testimony. It is shown by the evidence that the supplies of lumber were recruited about twice a year, and while it is possible that certain isolated pieces of lumber for different purposes, now in the shops or incorporated as repairs in the apparatus of the Department, may have been purchased prior to the 1st of January, 1898, the conditions at the shops, the nature of the work and the testimony of the winesses indicate that the greater part of the lumber new or had at the shops and also that

ditions at the shops, the nature of the work and the testimony of the witnesses indicate that the greater part of the lumber now on hand at the shops, and also that which has been incorporated in the apparatus of the Department during the past two years, has been purchased since the beginning of Chief Ryan's responsibility. In the matter of the private work done for ex-Commissioner Scannell, and of the delivery of fire hose and nozzles to private parties, Chief Ryan placed himself squarely on the ground that he considered himself justified in performing any work for any purpose which, he was ordered by the Commissioner to perform. It is true that the Rules and Regulations give to the Commissioner the right to order the Chief of the Repair Shops to perform any work the Commissioner chooses, but they are also most explicit in making the Chief responsible that all materials and work shall be for "the exclusive use of the Department." In no proper sense can this be construed as legalizing the making of private harness and private vehicles for the Commissioner, or delivering Department property for private use. Chief Ryan has testified that he considered himself justified in obeying the orders of the Commissioner short of the committal of a crime, but, while he should obey the orders of the Commissioner, nevertheless it is no defense for a subordinate to allege this reason when the order was known by him to be illegal.

a subordinate to allege this reason when the order was known by him to be illegal.

The Charter makes the conversion of public property to private use a misdemeanor.

In touching upon the question of overtime, counsel limits his consideration to overtime granted in the last months of preceding years, testified to have been authorized by higher authority, and to the consideration of the overtime work of the wrecking gang; but he entirely omits the consideration of the relatively enormous amount of overtime work done, for illustration, during the first four months mous amount of overtime work done, for illustration, during the first four months of the present year, and done, practically continuously, upon every Saturday afternoon and Sunday of that time. These last items of over-work the Commissioner believes have been shown to be, in a great degree, not emergency work, and that it was granted rather for the sake of giving extra compensation to certain men than for the exigencies of the service.

It is further alleged, in defense of Chief Ryan in the matter of his failure to keep more complete records of the work in his Department, that there was a deficiency of clerical force. It was testified by the representative of the Commissioners of Accounts that there was not a sufficient clerical force to keep the complete system of accounts which he, the witness, would advise should hereafter be

plete system of accounts which he, the witness, would advise should hereafter be kept; but there is no doubt that a complete record of the character and details of the work done could have been made, and at least an effort to compute the cost of the items of work as they were performed. The evidence indicates that nothing of that kind was comprehended in the system conducted by Chief Ryan, or that any attempt was ever made to introduce it under his administration, although specifically called for by section 403 of the Rules and Regulations. The inference is inevitable that it was omitted, not on account of the absence of sufficient clerical

The Commissioner has gone over the voluminous evidence very carefully, and has given due attention to the brief submitted by the learned counsel for the defendant, and he has reached the conclusion that the defendant is guilty as charged. The Commissioner deeply regrets the action he feels compelled to take in connection with a softial property of the contract by the learned counsel for the defendant is guilty as charged. tion with an officer who has served so many years in the Department, but his consideration of the evidence leaves him no alternative. The finding is that Chief of Construction and Repairs to Apparatus Patrick F.
