Carpenters' Work.

At Third District Prison—Repaired ten wooden bunks and overhauled mess table.

At Fourth District Prison—Two new windows put in cells on second tier, two windows in office rehung; material used, two new window frames, 16-inch by 9-inch; two panes of glass, 16-inch by 9-inch; four hinges, two dozen screws and one-half hank of sash cord.

At Fifth District Prison—Glazing; eight panes of glass, 16-inch by 15-inch, put in windows of male and female prison, two pounds putty; iron gates on entrance to male prison boarded up; also put in new sash and two panes of glass therat; new wire sash cord put in four windows, male prison.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison (by paid labor)—Erection of new Croton supply tank, with all necessary connections to water main and suction pump; testing boiler by New York Police Department Boiler Inspection, registered as boiler No. 2-2341, Certificate No. 7319.

At Third District Prison (by paid labor)—Eight closets on male side of prison overhauled and put in order; installing of a new range, together with a new 63-gallon hot water boiler and hood to correspond; three new stone washtubs, together with new sink and faucets put in; a new galvanized iron smokestack 10 feet high was attached on chimney, prison kitchen.

At Fourth District Prison (by unpaid labor)—Put on new 5½-inch brass faucet on washtray in kitchen and two ½-inch brass faucets in cells on first tier. In course of construction, installing of a new toilet and plumbing system throughout the prison.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Construction of an entire new toilet and plumbing system throughout the prison, to wit: Removed all the old basins, closet bowls, defective closet traps and all piping to the hub connections in each cell, numbering thirty-nine (39), and the same received new fixtures, waste and vent connections. The Keepers' cell, No. 1, was fitted with a flushometer, and all fixtures, therat connected with the new waterline; removed the present closet and fixtures in Matrons' toilet and room; refitted with a new closet and bath complete with fixtures, including sewer vent and hot and cold water connections. In course of construction new steel tank, 36 inches in diameter by 60 inches long and made of 3½-inch shell and 5½-inch heads, with manhole and hand hole in same, riveted and caulked and is tested to 300 pounds hydrostatic pressure, and the same rests on heavy cast iron saddles in kitchen. This tank has 2-inch tapping on bottom for draw-off connections; also a 2½-inch tapping in head to receive the suction line 2½-inch to pump, with pipe fittings, galvanized gate and check valves for the suction connection to pump.

The required number of tappings on top of shell of the tank to receive the various Croton water lines coming into the building with a full size gate valve placed on each line just before entering the tank. The pump is of a 300 gallons per minute pumping capacity; a house of cypress, of 2½-inch material, put together with six heavy iron hoop bands fastened with lugs (adjustable), is set up, and all necessary Croton supply connections to tank and to overflow and house supply connections are made.

Recapitulation of Work Done.

First tier, female prison, seven closets.

Second tier, female prison, eight closets.

Third tier, male prison, seven closets.

Fourth tier, male prison, eight closets.

Fifth tier, male prison, eight closets,

making a total of thirty-eight closets, with flushometer and all connections complete.

Installing of a new shower bath on first tier, female prison, to wit: One two-compartment slate bath stall; back partition is full width of cell, 78 inches high, with a 4-inch by 1-inch slate cap running across the entire back; the end side partitions are 36 inches deep by 78 inches high; the centre partition has the bottom cut out half-moon shape and is of the same width as the end partition, but only 54 inches high; the floor slab is 2 inches thick, 36-inch width of the cell, and is countersunk with a 5-inch drain to the centre, fitted with a heavy brass strainer; the thickness of all partitions is 1¼ inches, and carry across the top of the front side a 1¼-inch galvanized pipe with centre drop to support the centre partition, flanged to the two end partitions for the purpose of hanging canvas curtains; the same are so fastened so they can be removed at will. There was furnished and connected to these stalls two 5-inch ball joint shower heads, hot and cold water controlling valves and hot water thermometers. The floor slab of these bath stalls are set down in the cell floor within ½ inch above the floor level, and at the door entrance to cell is fastened an angle iron across, 1 inch above the floor level, ready to lay a sanitary floor to a grade. In Matron's room is installed one siphon jet closet complete with heavy post hinge seat of quartered oak, with flap and slate floor slab, connected with a flushometer; also there is installed one 20-inch enameled iron roll rim basin, with brackets, rubber plug and chain, two nickel-plated self-closing basin cocks, nickel-plated trap and connections, also one 5-foot enameled iron roll rim bathtub with a No. 4 ½-inch double bath cock, with standing overflow and waste connections. In place of the present iron barred door at the Matron's toilet room a 1½-inch clear white pine door with pane bottom and fitted with a ground glass sash is substituted.

This entire work has been done under the supervision of the Supervising Inspector of the Department.

Painters and Kalsomines.

At Second District Prison—Renovating and painting the interior of prison; material used, 1,200 pounds of white lead, 30 pounds of chrome green, 10 pounds drop

black, 10 pounds prussian blue, 25 gallons raw oil, 25 gallons turpentine, 5 gallons liquid dryers, one wall brush, 3 pound brushes and six sash tools.

At Third District Prison—The ceilings of the prison received two coats of white paint and the whole interior of prison, male and female department, received two coats of pea green; the water tank on top received two coats of white paint; the outside of prison building received a coat of light yellow; the lintels on the outside of the building received a coat of dark brown; the cells on the male and female side of prison, fifty-four in all, received a coat of pea green; the dado in each of the fifty-four cells was touched up with a coat of dark brown; the fifty-four toilets on male and female side of prison were also touched up with a coat of asphaltum; the lintels in each of the fifty-four cells on male and female side of prison were brightened up with a coat of light brown; material used, 400 pounds white lead, 15 gallons raw oil, 15 gallons turpentine, 5 gallons dryers, 20 pounds chrome green, 10 gallons asphaltum, 15 pounds lamp black and 5 pounds prussian blue.

At Fourth District Prison—The ceilings of twenty-nine cells received a coat of whitewash, the ceiling of kitchen was painted; material used, 35 pounds white lead, 1 gallon turpentine, 1 gallon raw oil, 1/2 gallon liquid dryers, 1 pound brush, 1 whitewash brush, 1 barrel finishing lime, 5 pounds ultramarine blue.

Masons' Work.

At Third District Prison—The brick chimney on Matron's quarters was torn down and rebuilt and one chimney was pointed up; the brick chimney on prison kitchen was overhauled and pointed up; material used, 1 barrel Portland cement.

Miscellaneous Work.

At Fifth District Prison (paid labor)—Repairs to Van No. 4, two new pole chains, two bolts; put on woolskin on horsecollar; bridle repaired, new point on collar chambered in two places.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, laundry and cleaning done in all the prisons by unpaid prison help.

General Storehouse—85 dozen brooms to General Storehouse; 105 dozen brushes to General Storehouse.

Penitentiary—10½ dozen brooms to Penitentiary Storehouse; made 9½ dozen brushes for Penitentiary, 8 dozen brooms to Penitentiary Hall Keeper, 4 dozen brooms, Miscellaneous; 1 dozen brushes, Miscellaneous.

Cot and Canvas Department.

General Storehouse—Made 100 canvas cot bottoms, 67 inches by 20 inches.

Penitentiary—Made 75 canvas cot bottoms, 70 inches by 20 inches.

Steamboat "Minnahanock"—Made 3 canvas covers, 16 feet by 8 feet.

Penitentiary—Repaired 29 cot bottoms.

Cutter's Department.

City Prison—Made 650 towels, 6 tablecloths.

Second District Prison—Made 100 pillow ticks, 100 pillow cases, 48 checkered spreads, 50 pair ticking pants.

Third District Prison—Made 48 hand towels, 48 checkered spreads, 50 pair ticking pants.

Fourth District Prison—Made 12 chemises, 12 men's shirts, 12 roller towels, 12 pair ticking pants, 60 pillow ticks, 2 tablecloths.

Fifth District Prison—Made 36 chemises, 60 hand towels, 3 tablecloths.

Steamboat "Massasoit"—Made 24 unbleached shirts, 6 bleached sheets, 6 bleached tablecloths.

Warden's House—Made 2 hand towels.

Penitentiary Hospital—Made 7 duck pants, 6 duck coats.

Penitentiary—Made 365 shirts, 300 pants (winter), 190 pants (summer), 200 hats, 150 vests, 150 pants, 34 spreads, 60 pillow cases, 16 chemises, 15 caps, 11 table cloths, 10 pair gloves 25 sheets. Repaired 150 coats (winter), 70 pants (winter), 20 vests (winter), 186 outgoing suits.

Goods Cut for Different Institutions.

Riker's Island—4 tablecloths, 4 yards long; 8 tablecloths, 2 yards long; 72 huckaback hand towels.

Hart's Island—72 bleached sheets, 72 pillow cases, 72 huckaback hand towels, 3 bleached tablecloths, 500 hats, 1,600 pair pants.

Paint Shop.

For Penitentiary.

General—Greenhouse painted, glazed and finished; shops painted, bars, windows and cornices; 110 stakes or plants supporters painted for garden improvement; washhouse, skylight painted; one large glass put in and glazed in mess hall; one bureau scraped, varnished and polished for Matron; one large light of glass put in church window, 34 by 44; seats and tables scraped and painted in prison mess hall; two signs lettered and painted for Penitentiary grounds; fire escapes leading to shops painted; iron picket fence connecting shops painted; eighteen chimneys and cornices painted; tiers in three prisons, North, South and West, finished; tiers in female prison continued; repainting tiers in female and boys' prison; painting lookout house and woodwork connecting mess hall; stairs, walls, leading to paint shop, painted and varnished; eighteen sinks in prison painted; storeroom ceiling painted; sixteen sinks painted in

prison hall; one hardwood wardrobe finished for Matron; eighteen tubs painted in old and west prisons; washhouse boilers, furnace, windows and bars of building painted; Warden's office repainted; stormhouse and picket fence at greenhouse painted; gates leading to blacksmith shop painted; one gate leading to tinshop painted; glass put in at various places in prison amounting to twenty-seven lights; paint shop painted and kalsomined; female prison, ceiling, walls and woodwork painted; greenhouse painted and puttied over; fourteen fire buckets painted for shoe and paint shops; ceilings and walls washed and kalsomined in boys' prison; window frames painted in new building; gates and window bars painted in new prison; lights of glass put in at various places in female prison, amounting to twenty-eight lights.

Fourth District Prison—One armchair scraped and varnished, two chairs scraped and varnished.

Central Office, No. 148 East Twentieth Street—One rocking chair repaired, two window shades repaired.

Steamboat "Minnahanonck"—Repaired one chair and setting bench.

Administration Building—One weather door stained, one table scraped and painted, one lounge repaired.

Penitentiary Hospital—Made five hair pillows, ten wire frames painted, two cushions covered.

Female Dormitory—Made one hair mattress, four hair pillows.

Keeper's Roster—Three signs lettered.

Garden—Three skylights painted.

Warden's Resident—Three waterclosets painted and varnished.

Steamboat "Massasoit"—Twelve buckets painted and lettered, one bench stained and varnished.

Keepers' Dining-room—Ten wire frames painted.

Keepers' Quarters—Twelve rooms painted, made twenty-five hair pillows, eight hair mattresses made over.

Third District Prison—One chair repaired and painted.

Carpenter Shop.

Bake Shop—One dough carrier, 5 feet by 2 inches; made one weighing board, 2 feet by 11 inches wide, 5 feet by 9½ inches long; one dough bin, 2 feet by 10 inches wide, 12 feet by 8 inches long, legs on side; one wash tub, 2 feet by 6 inches wide, 3 feet by 6 inches long, 2 feet by 6 inches high; baker's bin, 7 feet high, 14 feet long, 1½ feet attached (extending in height); repaired weighing board, toilet, ash run, dough carrier, dough carrier, bread locks on closets, dough carrier, dough carrier; thirty-two lag screws in large dough box, repaired two straight edges, 7 feet by 9 inches wide; forty-five peals.

Penitentiary Hospital—Made one box, 2 feet long; one box, 3 feet long, 20 inches wide, 15 inches deep, with cover; one medicine chest, 2 feet high, 1½ feet wide, 7 inches deep; carved table, 3 feet high.

Mess Hall—One ice box, 10 feet long, 6 feet high, 5 feet wide; bronze padlock on ice boxes; two wood strainers, nine bread trays, ten straight edges, 4 feet by 2 inches; four soup ladles, 5 feet by 3 inches. Repaired door, window, two soup ladles, 3 feet long; drilled twenty holes in bread closet; board, 3 feet by 16 inches wide for floor; repaired cup box, 4 pot handles, hinges on old ice boxes, bread cutter, 3 bread trays, ice box; put sash cord in ten windows, two dozen cup holders and covers, thirty knives for bread box.

Matron's Quarters—Made one board, 14 feet square; four 40 inches long, two 33 inches long by 1½ square for bedstead; 1 box, 2 feet long, 14 feet wide, 16 feet high; repaired door.

Women's Prison—Repairing large and small windows, two chairs and 2 horses.

Stone Shed—Twelve straight edges, 6 feet long; twelve straight edges, 3½ feet long; twelve straight edges, 4½ feet long; edges, 8 feet long.

Keepers' Quarters—One box, 3 feet by 6 inches long, 2 feet wide; eleven screens; one box, 4 feet by 6 inches long, 3 feet wide, 19 feet high; 1 box, 2 feet long, 10 feet wide, 10 inches high; repairing two windows, locks on lockers, three windows, one screen, one closet, locker.

Gardener—Made 100 stakes, 3 feet long; repaired two rakes; put new bottom in flower box.

Blacksmith Shop—One box, 1 foot long, 1½ feet wide; double door for shop, 10½ feet high; 8 feet by 9½ inches; average, 4 feet by 5 inches wide, with connecting small entrance door; new floor in toilet, 8 feet long, 4 feet wide. Repaired locker, 4-feet boards for belfows, two boards, 6 inches long, 3 inches wide; mould, 2 inches by 3 inches; five blocks for driller.

Boiler room—Two boxes, 2 feet by 6 inches wide, 18 inches deep; two new heavy runs, 5 feet high, 13 feet long. Repaired pail, box, 2 feet by 6 inches by 18 inches deep; bulkhead for coal, 4 feet by 6 inches high, 12 feet long; repaired three horses.

Penitentiary Storehouse—Three new hinge staples; repaired meat cart and sharpened two cleavers; made two 1-inch plugs, 6 inches long; repaired ten meat saws, locks for storehouse; three new hinges for doors; seventy knives sharpened.

Keeper's Kitchen—One meat board, 2 feet by 3 inches long, 15 feet wide; one box, 2 inches square; repaired door; sharpened 150 knives.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner:

Sir—I herewith most respectfully submit the quarterly report for this institution for the months of July, August and September, 1906, regarding the work done by prisoners, outside of that performed by mechanics in the completion of contracts in course of fulfillment.

The more able bodied of the men have been actively employed in excavating earth for the foundation of the new ice plant building, which material has been carted to the narrowest part of the island for filling in and enlarging the area; a large quantity of sand has also been dug and carted, to be used for building purposes.

The carpenters have laid 15,000 feet of yellow pine flooring, made 20 new benches 16 feet long, put in 29 new sashes and 66 new sash cords, put new beams in toilet room, made 6 new doors, repaired stoops and ventilators, repaired ice house doors and stalls in stable, besides other necessary repairs where required.

Made one 12-foot ladder, two wheelbarrows, six ironing boards, one clothes closet, three cutting tables, 12 feet long each.

Three barges laden with ice, two (2) with brick, two (2) with lumber, and one (1) with cement have been unloaded, and the material carted to the requisite points.

On the farm, the operations usual for the season have been carried on, and men have been constantly employed in digging and storing vegetables. Besides the usual burying of the dead in the City Cemetery, new trenches have been dug for current needs and also in readiness for the coming winter.

The roads throughout the island have been kept in good repair, and extensions made for the better accommodation of traffic.

The work of loading and unloading freight, carting supplies, tending horses and all the general service required has been rendered as usual by the prisoners.

The inmates less capable of work have been kept busy in the stone shed or in the trimming of lawns and grounds.

The female prisoners have been employed in the laundry (particulars of the work being shown among the accompanying tables) or in the cleaning out of the different buildings of the institution.

Tinsmiths.

Head Keeper's Residence—Made new tin roof on veranda, repaired roof of office and hot water boiler, made one galvanized iron pan for range 4 feet by 1½ feet, repaired two milk cans and one water leader, extended soil pipe 4 feet, put in new cistern in water closet, sharpened and repaired four lawn mowers, made 24 feet of galvanized iron water leader.

Keeper's Apartments—Repaired and cleaned heater pipes and made 10-foot 4-inch water leader.

Boatman's House—Repaired seat on water closet and hot water boiler, put screens on two doors, cleaned waste pipe of wash tub and repaired six cooking pots.

Ice House—Made 10 foot 4 inch galvanized iron water leader.

Paint Shop—Made 10 foot 4 inch galvanized iron water leader.

Carpenter Shop—Made 10 foot 4 inch galvanized iron water leader.

Prisoners' Kitchen—Repaired and cleaned drain and waste pipe of sink, made two 38-inch galvanized iron covers for stewing kettles, made two 5-gallon pails, four 2-quart dippers and repaired twelve tin pails.

Keeper's Kitchen—Made one tin bread box, 42 inches by 18 inches by 18 feet; one stew can, 12 inches by 8 inches; one 12-quart milk can, one drying pan, 20 inches by 14 inches; repaired hot water boiler and six coffee pots.

Dormitory No. 1 and No. 2—Repaired four water closets and cleaned waste pipe of sinks, made two lead screens for sink, cleaned and painted 30-foot smoke stack.

Launch "Mohican"—Repaired four oil pumps, made one guard rail and one 12-inch funnel.

Plumbers.

Repacked water feeders and gave three boilers a general overhauling. Cleaned the drain pipe coming from the kitchen to the mess hall and lined one ice refrigerator.

Painters.

Hospital Building—Painted ten rooms and also the entire outside of building; used 300 pounds white lead, 15 gallons boiled oil and 10 gallons turpentine.

Keeper's Apartments—Painted the entire outside of building and veranda; used 250 pounds white lead, 8 gallons turpentine and 15 gallons raw oil.

Head Keeper's Apartments—Painted veranda, 40 feet long, with two coats of paint; used 50 pounds white lead, 2 gallons turpentine, 5 gallons raw oil.

Ice House—Painted the entire outside of building, including the window bars; used 300 pounds white lead, 10 gallons turpentine, 10 gallons raw oil, 2 gallons asphaltum.

Storehouse—Painted the entire outside of building, 105 feet by 33 feet; used 500 pounds white lead, 15 gallons turpentine.

Boatman's House—Painted six rooms; used 25 pounds white lead, 2 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons raw oil.

Painted and scraped six dark cells; used 20 pounds white lead, 1 gallon turpentine.

Shoemakers.

Repaired 235 pairs of men's shoes.

Carpenters.

Made 150 running feet of fence for chicken coop, one tail board for cart, one wooden horse, 10 feet by 12 feet; 110 feet cornice moulding, one new stoop at office, two flights of stairs, three steps each; one clothes closet, one ice box, one railing, 12 feet by 4 feet, with one stoop of two steps for veranda; one cross tree for cart, new flooring put on in four stalls at stable, three window frames, one mantelpiece and bracket, one shelf and bracket, two doors and door jambs, one towel rack and roller and four brackets.

Repaired seventeen doors and nine window frames, put in five lights of glass, repaired two closets and floor of kitchen, also floor of launch "Mohican."

On the farm were raised 2,937 ears of corn, 100 bushels of tomatoes, 1,250 heads of cabbage, 211 bunches of radishes, 128 bushels of string beans, 30 bushels of butter

beans, 32 bushels of lima beans, 113 bushels of beets, 404 quarts of turnips, 264 heads of cauliflower, 179 quarts of green peas, 293 quarts of carrots, 516 heads of lettuce, 308 bunches of asparagus, 405 bunches of parsley, 50 bushels of onions, 67 heads of spinach, 150 quarts of parsley, 3 dozen thyme, 150 bushels of tomatoes, 3 dozen celery, 37 quarts of sprouts, 21 bushels of beet tops, 11 pumpkins, 155 barrels of potatoes, 300 quarts of strawberries.

By prisoners employed at outdoor labor 400 tons of manure and 1 barge of ashes was unloaded; loaded 2 barges with sand for building purposes on Blackwell's Island, repaired 20 feet sea wall 8 feet deep and 7 feet high.

The roads and walks have been kept in proper repair.

An average of 9 men, in charge of a Keeper, was daily employed sprinkling chloride of lime on the filled-in grounds for the Street Cleaning Department. The daily average census during the quarter has been 91, employed as follows:

Six stablemen, 2 farmers, 4 painters, 2 carpenters, 1 plumber, 1 tinsmith, 1 shoemaker, 9 Street Cleaning Department, 10 in prison kitchen, 20 utility men, 35 at outdoor work.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully submit herewith report of transactions connected with the New York City Reformatory of Misdemeanants, for third quarter, ending September 30, 1906.

On July 1 we had a total census of one hundred and sixty-one (161) inmates. There were twenty (20) commitments during the month of July and thirty-five (35) released on parole; during the month of August there were forty-three (43) commitments and thirty-six (36) released on parole; and during the month of September there were twenty-two (22) commitments and twenty-five (25) released on parole, leaving a total census September 30 of one hundred and fifty (150) inmates.

The spiritual welfare and scholastic education of the inmates was provided for same as during the previous quarter. In fact, their industrial work has been the same, except that we now have a school in tailoring, which was but recently established, and in this employment eight inmates have cut and made 146 nightshirts and repaired 150 pair of pants.

Inmates engaged in painting have painted entire outside of Warden Tooher's residence with two coats of white paint and two coats of white enameling; also all doors, windows, piazzas, roof and chimneys and three inside rooms; two rooms and windows in Keeper Bartell's house, and bathroom and tub in Keeper Barrett's house; Dormitory No. 4, entire exterior of building with one coat each of red metallic and Venetian red, also roof and all windows and three rooms and kitchen with three coats of paint each.

In Branch Workhouse Annex—Doctor's room, Teacher's room, three sleeping rooms, laboratory, two halls and three toilet rooms.

Inmates have also laid 2,940 square feet of cosmocrete sidewalks, 945 square feet of curb and gutters and 3,773 square feet of cement flooring in basement of workshop.

Individual motors were installed to machines during this quarter, and 561 pairs of men's shoes and 150 pairs of women's shoes have been made, and 291 pairs of women's uppers have been cut, sewed and prepared for lasting.

We have not accomplished much in the knitting industry, owing to the fact that most of the machines are out of order, but with what were in condition we have made 27 dozen pairs of socks and stockings.

Many of the inmates have been engaged in hauling sand, stone and cement; also in excavating for flooring in basement of workshop.

With these different branches of industry we have been able to keep all the inmates employed in some kind of work during this quarter, and the effect has been quite perceptible in their merit marks.
