From the Comptroller (69169)—Asking for dates and amounts of all payments made to the Department by Beadleston & Woerz for rental of salt water suction pipe through the bulkhead foot of Charles street, North river, and under marginal street in rear of same. Information furnished.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

1 (69275). Stating, in response to communication from this Department, that they have no record of the change of the title of William T. Brendlin from Mechanical Draughtsman to Draughtsman and as his title now conforms to the classification there is no reason for change. Advised that the change to Draughtsman was authorized May 21, 1902, and requested to notify this Department if the Municipal Civil Service Commission again contemplates having the title changed.

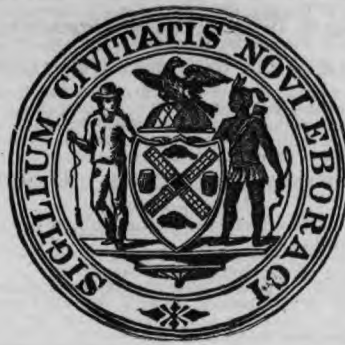

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
