The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 25, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,575, as follows, viz.: 21 public buildings, 680 tenement-houses, 166 private dwellings, 47 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 1 pier, 11 fat and lard rendering establishments, 13 manure dumps, 1 public sewer, 1 tannery, 1 dumping ground, 48 sunken and vacant lots, 52 yards, courts, and areas, 61 cellars and basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 179 privies and water-closets, 52 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 3 dangerous chimneys, 25 violations of the Code, together with 13 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 660.

During the past week 130 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

61 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the

Health Officer of the Port.

159 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 21 houses, 21 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 2,263 priviy-sinks, 359 cellars, 173 yards, courts, and areas, 525 garbage-boxes, and 11134 miles of street gutters.

During the week ending Saturday, August 25, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 596 burial permits for city deaths, 26 for bodies in transitu, and 37 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 596 deaths, 115 marriages, 505 births, 37 still-births, 26 applications for transit permits, and 51 returns from coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, and 21 of death were issued from this Bureau.

Sir—596 deaths were reported to have occurred in the City of New York during the week ending Saturday, August 25, being a increase of 43 deaths as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 24 more than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending August 18, 1877, was 583, which is 7 below the average for the corresponding weeks of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.08 per 1,000 persons living of the population, which is estimated at 1,079,326.

There was a decrease during the past compared with the previous week of 2 deaths from scarlatina, 1 from typhus fever, 1 from puerperal diseases, 1 from pneumonia, 1 from hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1 from Bright's disease and nephritis, 1 from malarial fevers, 7 from inanition and want of breast-milk, 2 from rheumatism and gout, 1 from aneurism, 1 from cirrhosis and hepatitis; and an increase of 1 from measles, 4 from diphtheria, 3 from membranous croup, 3 from whopping-cough, 5 from diarrhoeal diseases, 2 from cancer, 2 from bronchitis, 12 from diseases of the heart, 5 from diseases of the heart, 3 from diseases of the heart, 5 from diseases of the preparent during the past week was 1.8 degrees Fahr, higher than the week preceding, and 3.8 degrees higher than during the past week was 1.8 degrees Fahr, higher than the week preceding, and 3.8 degrees higher than during the corresponding week of 1876.
