APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending November 17, 1877.

Resolved, That this Board respectfully requests the State Legislature to make atonement for the neglect of the last Republican Legislature and perform its plain duty and reapportion this State, so that this city, being honestly represented in the State Legislature, the necessary bills to secure economy in municipal administration may be passed.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 30, 1877. Approved by the Mayor, November 12, 1877.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to licensed cartmen and truckmen, residing in the City of New York, to deposit their carts or trucks, between the hours of 5 o'clock P. M. and 9 o'clock A. M. daily, and all day on Sundays, and legal holidays in the centre of all the wide slips or wide places fronting on West street, on the North river, provided that a space of thirty feet of roadway on each side of said slips is kept free and unobstructed for public travel; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 30, 1877. Approved by the Mayor, November 12, 1877.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John M. Toucey to lay a five-inch wrought-iron pipe in Sixty-fifth street, from Eleventh avenue to First avenue, to Thirty-fifth street to the East river, or to Sixty-third street to the East river, and across the East river and Blackwell's Island, from or near Sixty-third street, East river, to the opposite shore, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, upon condition that the said John M. Toucey shall annually pay to the Chamberlain of the City of New York, the sum of five cents for each square foot of pipe used by him during the preceding year.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 30, 1877. Approved by the Mayor, November 12, 1877.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Daniel J. Terry, to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewelk in front of No. 122 Washington street, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 30, 1877. Approved by the Mayor, November 12, 1877.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to John C. Donnelly to place and keep an ornamental lamp-post and lamp on the west side of Third avenue, 95 feet north of Fortyninth street, provided the post shall not exceed in dimension the size prescribed by ordinance, the work to be done and gas supplied at his own expense under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council,

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 30, 1877. Approved by the Mayor, November 12, 1877.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby requested to report to this Board at his earliest convenience, the cost of converting the structure used as a distributing reservoir at Forty-second street and Fifth avenue into armories for the use of some of the regiments of the National Guard, together with a statement of the number of regiments that can be thus supplied with armories and drill-rooms.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, October 30, 1877. Approved by the Mayor, November 12, 1877.

Resolved, That Commissioner of Public Works be and is hereby requested to cause the roof of Jeflerson Market to be repaired and made water-tight; also that the ceilings and walls of the tenements in the market building recently damaged by reason of the roof leaking, be repaired; the expense to be charged to the appropriation for "Public Buildings, Construction and Repairs."

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to De La Vergne & Burr, upon the payment of the usual fee for constructing vaults, to connect premises Nos. 225 and 232 West Eighteenth street, by a covered way as shown in annexed diagrams, provided the same be constructed without interference with the public use of said street, or interference with the sewer, water or gas pipes, and that the said De La Vergne & Burr shall be liable for any injury or damage to any public or private property occasioned thereby, during or after the construction of such covered way; the work to be done at their own expense under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS, November 13, 1877.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—459 deaths were reported as having occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 10, 1877, this is an increase of 12 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 46 more than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending November 3, was 440, which is 34.8 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.13 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,082,692.

The principal increase during the past week has been in the developmental and violent classes, the former showing an increase of 12, and the latter 15, as compared with the preceding week; compared with the week ending November 3, this week shows an increase of 3 deaths from croup, 4 from typhoid fever, 5 from puerperal diseases, 3 from intemperance, I from cancer, I from phthisis, 6 from pneumonia, 7 from diseases of the heart, 9 from Bright's disease and nephritis, 3 by suicide, 5 by drowning, 3 from erysipelas, 3 from inanition, cyanosis and atelectasis 4; and premature and preternatural births, I; and a decrease of I death from diphtheria, I from whooping cough, 4 from diarrhœal diseases, 10 from bronchitis, 4 from marasmus and scrofula, I from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4 from malarial fevers, 2 from aneurism, I from cirrhosis and hepatitis, and 4 from entertis, gastritis and peritonitis.

There were 259 deaths from the following diseases during the week, which are 56.42 per cent. of the total number of deaths reported, viz.: Phthisis pulmonalis, 79; pneumonia, 40; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 40; Bright's disease, 30; diphtheria, 24; diarrhoeal diseases, 23;

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 89 were in institutions, 247 in tenement-houses, 105 in houses containing 3 families and less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 12 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 85 on the first, 125 on the second, 78 on the third, 49 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, and 2 on the sixth; 456 were residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents; 56 were stated to be single, 113 married, 54 widowed, and the condition of 236 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 448 deaths and still-births, or 91.15 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 188; City (pauper burial-ground, undenominational), 67; Greenwood (undenominational), 43; Lutheran (undenominational), 66; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 17; Evergreen (undenominational), 23; Woodlawn (undenominational), 15; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 5; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 4; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 2; Washington (undenominational), 4.

The distribution of deaths for the week ending November 3, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 6; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 11; Sixth, 12; Seventh, 20; Eighth, 22; Ninth, 13; Tenth, 15; Eleventh, 31; Twelfth, 28; Thirteenth, 10; Fourteenth, 13; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 22; Seventeenth, 26; Eighteenth, 24; Nineteenth, 71; Twentieth, 26; Twenty-first, 24; Twenty-second, 28; Twenty-third, 13; Twenty-fourth, 5.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 10, was 45.5 degrees Fahr., the mean read ing of the barometer was 30.022, the mean humidity was 76, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,388, and the amount of rain-fall was 2.81 inches, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
