

# HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, SANITARY BUREAU, SEVENTH DIVISION—VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY \* for the week ending April 11, 1885, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending April 4, 1885.

W. DE F. DAY, M. D., Sanitary Superintendent and Register:

SIR—There were 740 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 11, 1885, which is a decrease of 51, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 115 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1884. The actual mortality for the week ending April 4, 1885, was 818, which is 144.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 30.65 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,387,737.

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 108.1 That no cattle, with or without their young calves, shall be led or driven through or along any of the streets of the City of New York without a permit in writing from the Health Department, and in strict accordance with the routes hours, and conditions prescribed thereby; and no person shall lead, attempt to lead, or cause to be led any cattle otherwise than singly, one person with each, nor upon any sidewalks, provided, however, that sheep may be driven on routes prescribed for them, pursuant to the terms and conditions of the permits issued from time to time by the Board of Health.
