Resolved, That the President of this Borough cause publication of notice of public hearing to be given by this Board on the 20th instant upon the proposition that this Board recommend to the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, that the improvement of said avenue as contemplated be carried out to completion.

Resolved, That the request of Messrs. Warrin & Connors, owners of lands along Main avenue, Grove street, Toledo avenue, Irving place and Medina place, in Elmhurst, Second Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York, between the points fully stated in their petition, to be granted permit to grade, macadamize and flag fronting along same to the full extent therein at their own expense and cost, as submitted for the approval of this Local Board of said borough, at its meeting held on April 6, 1900, be and the same is hereby granted, and the desires of the petitioners recommended to the prompt and favorable action of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York, as such improvements as contemplated would be to the best interests of all concerned.

Whereas, We, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, in meeting held this April 6, 1900, deeming it essential to the protection of property and life that public buildings, school-houses and institutions of the many kinds existing in this borough should have electric fire-alarm system therein, in connection with the nearest stations of the Fire Department; therefore

Resolved, That such recommendation be and is hereby made to the Local School Board, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, etc., the Health Board, the Commissioner of Charities and the Deputy Fire Commissioner.

Resolved, That this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, in meeting assembled this 6th day of April, 1900, does hereby recommend to the Municipal Assembly of The City of New York, that it give prompt and favorable consideration and action to the desires of the owners of premises on both sides of Dock street, from River street to the East river, to be permitted to put shelter over said street, and also place an office at foot of Pier street in the width of fifteen (15) feet, all being in First Ward, this borough.

Also,

Whereas, There has been submitted to this the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, City of New York, at meeting held this 6th day of April, 1900, a petition of owners of premises along Fifteenth street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, in College Point, now in Third Ward of aforementioned borough, to have the city water main extended therein; and

Whereas, Said application meets our approval; therefore

Resolved, That the same be and is hereby recommended to the prompt and favorable consideration and action of the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York.

Also,

Whereas, The Germania Real Estate and Improvement Company and others, owners of a large tract of land on Germania Heights, in Second Ward, Borough of Queens and City of New York, have petitioned for eleven fire-hydrants to be erected along same at points shown on map attached to their application; and

Whereas, From inspection caused to be made, it appears that in order to make complete the requirements other than several improvements which said company made at its own expense, the said fire-hydrants are essential towards making said lands marketable for building purposes, from which large additional revenue in the way of increased values for taxation will accrue to the City; therefore

Knab, in relation to repairs required to the dock at the foot of Bayside avenue, Whitestone, Borough of Queens, was taken from the table, placed on file, and the Secretary directed to again request the Corporation Counsel to advise the Board as to the ownership of said premises.

The communication from the Panama Railroad Company requesting that permission be granted for the assignment of the lease of Pier, new 57, North river, was taken from the table, placed on file, and

On motion, by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Cram and Murphy, Commissioner Meyer voting in the negative, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Barent H. Lane, or the Terminal Warehouse Company, to assign to the Panama Railroad Company, so much of the wharfage and storage as may arise, accrue or become due in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, at Pier, new 57, North river, under and by virtue of the indenture of lease of said pier dated February 15, 1891, between the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York by the Board of Docks as party of the first part, and Barent H. Lane, as party of the second part. It being understood and agreed that this resolution shall be of no force or effect unless the Panama Railroad Company shall file in this office a written agreement assuming all the obligations and conditions contained in said indenture of lease, and shall also furnish a bond thereon in double the sum of the annual rental of said pier, the sureties on said bond to be approved by the Board of Docks, and said agreement and bond to be approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief, recommending that one of the new piers to be constructed in the vicinity of Pike slip, East river, be shelled when completed, was tabled for one month.

The communication from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, advising that it has acquired title to the land and land under water between Sixty-fifth and Seventy-second streets, North river, formerly leased to it by this Department, and that it will hereafter refuse to pay any rental or compensation for such property, was referred to the Corporation Counsel for advice as to what action the Board should take in the matter.

The application of Alexander M. White for permission to construct a frame workshop 35 by 50 feet on the bulkhead at the foot of Twenty-fourth street, Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to the Treasurer.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection:

No. 19803, submitting cost of replacing oak fender on the pier foot of One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, where damaged by the transfer boat "Kaper," amounting to \$30.00, for collection from G. D. Kaper & Brothers.

No. 19809, submitting cost of replacing the fender and fender-chocks on the pier foot of One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, where damaged by transfer boat No. 11, amounting to \$34.85, for collection from the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company.

No. 19843, submitting cost of taking up and relaying pavement to permit repairs to water-pipe leading to Pier, new 42, North river, amounting to \$19.44, for collection from the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Standard Oil Company of New York, to construct a crib extension at its works, westerly of Bradley avenue, Newtown creek, Long Island City, in accordance with plans submitted as amended.

From the Department of Street Cleaning—

The action of the Secretary in transmitting the same, with requisitions to the Finance Department for payment, approved.

The President gave notice, in accordance with article 17 of the By-laws, that at the meeting of the Board, to be held Friday, May 4, 1900, he would move to amend section 2 of article 1 of the By-laws to read as follows:

"Section 2. A public meeting shall be held on Friday of each week at 2 o'clock P. M., except during the months of June, July, August and September, when meetings shall be held on the first Monday of each month at 2 o'clock P. M."

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company to remain in occupancy of the southerly half of the bulkhead at the foot of West Sixtieth street, North river, the permit to commence May 1, 1900, and to continue during the pleasure of the Board; compensation to be charged therefor at the rate of two hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable quarterly in advance to the Treasurer. It being understood and agreed that this permit is subject to all the terms, covenants and conditions of the indenture of lease of said premises dated April 25, 1898, between The City of New York, acting by the Board of Docks as party of the first part, and the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company as party of the second part.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Department of Health, held May 16, 1900, the following amendment to section 194 of the Sanitary Code was adopted:

Resolved, That, under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health, the following additional amendment to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Sec. 194. Spraying upon the floors of public buildings and of railroad cars and of ferry-boats, and upon any station, platform or stairs of elevated railroads, is hereby forbidden, and officers in charge or control of all such buildings, cars, platforms, stairs and boats, shall keep posted permanently in each public building and each railroad car and on each station platform of elevated railroads, and in each ferry-boat, a sufficient number of notices forbidding spraying upon the floors and stairs of buildings, conductors of cars and employees upon ferry-boats and station platforms shall call the

attention of all violators of this ordinance to such notice.

And it shall be the duty of all persons or corporations manufacturing signs or foolscotting the business of printing, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, in the City of New York, to provide, and they are hereby required to provide, proper receptacles for spraying, in proportion of one to every two persons employed by them, and that said receptacles be disinfected and cleaned at least once during each working day. That a copy of the second paragraph of this section be kept posted permanently in a conspicuous place in all cigar manufactories and in printing offices where ten or more persons are employed.
