PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 4795.

Foremen and Assistant Foremen, Local Union No. 42, Headquarters, 166-170 East 60th street, New York City, New York, October 22, 1913.
Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, Member of Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—I take the liberty of writing to you as one of the members of the Laws and Legislation Committee of the Board of Aldermen, in regard to "Ordinance No. 4670," which provides as follows:

"An Ordinance in relation to the employment of Foremen and Assistant Foremen in the several Departments of Highways in The City of New York.

"Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

"Section 1. On and after January 1, 1914, all Foremen, with the title of Foremen or Assistant Foremen, in the employ of the several Departments of Highways of The City of New York, shall be employed on a per annum basis. Those with the title of Foremen shall be compensated at a rate not less than \$1,200 per annum, and those with the title of Assistant Foremen shall be compensated at a rate of not less than \$1,050 per annum, and in each instance to be paid monthly.

"Sec. 2. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby authorized to make such apportionment of moneys to the respective Departments of Highways as may be necessary to carry the provisions of this ordinance into effect.

"Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"Which was referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation."

We call your attention to the very low salary received by the Foremen and Assistant Foremen employed by The City of New York and their great responsibility and the valuable service they render to The City of New York. We feel The City of New York should at least pay their skilled employees as good as the contractors doing work for the City, and instead the City pays their Foremen and Assistant Foremen a very low wage for the work they have to perform, and to substantiate this, we call your attention to the report of Comptroller Metz, who was appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to investigate, and who submitted his report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at City Hall, Monday, October 18, 1909, which is as follows:

The Comptroller presented the following report referring to the request of the President of the Borough of Manhattan that the Foremen and Assistant Foremen on the payrolls of his Department be changed from a per diem to a per annum wage, and commending that the compensation of the Foremen and Assistant Foremen in the Bureaus of Buildings, Highways and Sewers be fixed as follows:

On October 8, 1909, the above matter was referred to the Comptroller.

"Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, October 21, 1909.

"The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Gentlemen—In the matter of a request made by the President of the Borough of Manhattan that the Foreman and Assistant Foreman on the payrolls of his Department be changed from a per diem to a per annum wage, which was referred to me for consideration, I submit the following:

"It is my opinion that the question of changing per diem employees to a per annum basis should not be confined to any one Department, but that all City employees paid a per diem wage should be considered, to determine the actual increased cost such action would mean to the City.

"A report showing the number of per diem men in all the City offices and departments, giving the number of days each worked during the previous year, or a general average paid to each class of labor, would necessitate an examination of the weekly payrolls of a number of the City departments for one year, which, owing to the rush in my Department, caused by the labor necessary in preparing the Budget for the year 1910, I have been unable to make.

"From an examination made in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, I find that in 1908, after deducting Sundays, holidays and inclement weather, the average amount earned by the Foreman and Assistant Foreman was much below the allowance made for their services in the Budget of that year.

"I submit below a statement showing the effect such a change as contemplated would have had upon the payrolls for the Bureau of Highways, under the jurisdiction of the President of Manhattan, for the year 1908, using only the Foreman and Assistant Foreman as a basis.

"This shows an increased cost to the City of about 25 per cent., but it is only applicable to the Bureau of Highways, as in the Bureau of Buildings and the Bureau of Sewers the per diem employees generally work the full number of days provided for.

"The Foreman and Assistants in the Bureau of Highways are giving the City valuable services at a moderate wage, and it is in my opinion only fair that the City should pay them upon a per annum basis, for they are called upon by night as well as by day in cases of emergency, and in an emergency case inclement weather is not used as an excuse to lay them off.

"In view of these facts, I would recommend favorable consideration of this matter and recommend that the Foreman and Assistant Foreman in the Bureaus of Highways and Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, be paid upon a per annum basis, their yearly compensation to be fixed by allowing them 300 working days at their present per diem rate, and the adoption of the resolution hereunto attached. "The following resolution was offered:
"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the grades of positions in the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Buildings and the Bureau of Sewers, in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, in addition to those already existing therein, as follows:

"Which was adopted by the following vote:

"Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond—16."

Owing to the concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and their favorable action, we ask your Committee to report this bill for passage to the Board of Aldermen, and if you desire any more facts in the matter, we would ask the courtesy of a hearing so we can present positive proof of a convincing character to have this bill enacted in the law.

Hon. O. GRANT ESTERBROOK, Member of Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:
 Dear Sir—We take the liberty of writing you as one of the Committee on Law and Legislation of the Board of Aldermen, City of New York, in regard to Ordinance No. 4083 which was referred to the Committee on Law and Legislation and which bill provides for Pavers and Rammers employed by the City of New York to be employed not less than 250 days per annum.

As you no doubt are aware, the great agitation going on for many years and is at present in trying to get legislation for good roads, streets and avenues, and it is admitted by the best expert authority on road building that the cities of the first class in the State of New York are allowing its roadways, avenues and streets to become neglected by not doing the necessary repairs that is required to avoid danger and liability to the city and to maintain the streets, avenues and roadways in proper and safe condition and this can only be done by employing skilled and competent mechanics in road building such as pavers and rammers to keep the roadways, streets and avenues in proper repair.

In many cases the fault and conditions of the roadways and our streets is the fault of those in charge of the department who does not ask the required amount of money to be appropriated to keep sufficient men employed to do all the necessary repairs and the records of the department will show that in many cases where those in charge of the department of streets, avenues and roads did not employ the men even for the period of time they were allowed the appropriation to employ the men for and thereby allowing the streets to become in some instances impassable and other streets and avenues in very dangerous condition while they had the money to maintain the same in proper condition and what will substantiate the above is the fact that in the last seven years they were removed from office, heads of department on charges made by civic bodies in relation to the condition of streets and the same civic bodies were in a way responsible for the condition of streets as they would protest against sufficient money being appropriated to maintain our streets and then charge the heads of department with neglect.

It is a well-known fact that the roadways, streets and avenues of our city are an important part of our government and should be kept in proper condition for use of the public. As the Corporation Counsel of the City of New York can testify in view of the many actions instituted against the City for damages accruing through the condition of the streets which could be kept in proper condition and avoid all this litigation if the men were employed a sufficient number of days to repair the streets. The pavers and rammers are a body of men who give faithful service to the City for the compensation that they receive and under the Civil Service regulations, these men have to pass a competitive examination which consists of an examination of their physical construction and then must demonstrate their ability to be able to perform the work of paving and ramming by working at the trade of paving and ramming and accurately paving a certain given space and ramming a certain given space within a limited time under the supervision of an examiner appointed by the Civil Service Commissioner and in the failure of a man not being able to perform the work, he is rejected as unfit. When a man makes an application to become an employee of the City he is under the impression that the City will so employ him if he is a per diem man for as many days as is possible for him to work and hence they accept the appointment but find out to their disappointment that the City only employs them at their own discretion and for no set or given time and in many cases where the men are employed as per diem men, they are started to work in the morning and in many instances worked until half-past-nine was knocked off and only allowed an hour and a half for their time. Unless suspended from the department or given an official notice of their services not being required, they must report every morning for work and hang around until they are put to work and in the event of them not starting to work for a few hours or a day, they receive no compensation for the time lost. You will realize that these men are heavily handicapped as they are in a position that they cannot look for more steady employment because of the fact that the City requires them to report for work every day and thus leaves them anticipating that they will be engaged to work and in view of their employment by the City, no contractor will engage them when they are idle as the contractor feels that as soon as the work will start up with the City that the men will leave them and go to work with the City. There is every good reason why this bill should be passed as it will bring to the City competent and skilled men in their respective calling by employing them under a condition which it is possible for a man to exist and to have the work performed in a practical and workmanlike manner.

This bill has been indorsed by organized labor of the City of New York. The above named International Union and organized labor asking justice to the pavers and rammers employed by the City and for the protection of our streets, avenues and roads so necessary repairs can be made, favorable action by your committee on this bill and the same to be reported to the Board of Aldermen, City of New York for passage, and I can assure you we will sincerely appreciate your action.

We draw to your attention a bill, No. 1176, was introduced in the State Legislature of New York on February 17, 1913, along the lines as this resolution calls for, and was unanimously passed by the Assembly and sent to the Committee on Labor and Industry of the Senate, which committee reported the same favorable to the Senate, and it was placed on the calendar of the Senate for final passage. Owing to the lack of time to reach the calendar in the Senate, the day for adjournment having arrived, the Senate adjourned without taking action.

We ask favorable action on this measure by your honorable committee, or send a date for a hearing.

 COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.
 The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communications from the Corporation Counsel.

No. 4797.

Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, October 22, 1913.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—On November 12, 1912, your Honorable Board passed a resolution by which the Comptroller was authorized to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of \$6,000, the proceeds whereof to be used by the Corporation Counsel for the purpose of supplying furniture and fittings in the new quarters assigned to the branch office of the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, located in the Assembly at No. 153 Pierrepont st., in said borough, all obligations contracted for thereunder to be incurred on or before December 31, 1912. This resolution was received from his Honor the Mayor November 25, 1912, without his approval or disapproval thereof, and the same took effect as if he had approved it.

On or about January 9, 1913, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution approving of a schedule for a special revenue bond appropriation made to the Law Department for the year 1912, as follows:

"Law Department, Purchase of Furniture and Fittings, Special Bond Allowance, \$6,000."

Subsequently, and on the 4th day of February, 1913, said resolution was amended by your Honorable Board so that the time for incurring obligations thereunder was extended to July 1, 1913.

Subsequently, and on the 13th day of March, 1913, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment passed a resolution amending the foregoing resolution and extending the time within which obligations contracted for thereunder may be incurred by striking out the words and figures "December 31, 1912," and inserting in lieu thereof the words "July 1, 1913."

Supplies and furniture were purchased pursuant to the foregoing resolution, and there now remains a balance of \$299 of the fund appropriated.

For the completion of the furnishings of the office of the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Borough of Brooklyn, it is necessary that desk lights should be furnished for the various Assistants and other employees of the office. An estimate has been made of the cost of these fittings, and \$150 will cover the entire cost of the same, together with their installation.

I request your honorable body to further amend the original resolution of November 12, 1912, by extending the time within which obligations may be incurred, payable out of the above fund, to December 31, 1913.

The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, Borough Hall, New Brighton, New York City, October 25, 1913.

Gentlemen—I send to you herewith proposed amendment to an ordinance now in force in this borough, "governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof," which I desire to have enacted.

ORDINANCE governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:
 Section 1. Sections 11, 12 and 13 of an ordinance governing connections with sewers, certain uses of the public streets and the making of openings in pavements and the restoration thereof in the Borough of Richmond, approved July 27, 1903, amended April 17, 1906, are hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor:

Section 11. Inspection Fees for Backfilling Trenches.

Fees for the inspection of the backfilling of any trench in a city street or highway shall be as the Borough President may establish from time to time.

Section 12. Sewer Inspection and Fee shall be made under the supervision of a city inspector of sewer connections. The fee for such inspection shall be \$3, as provided by the general ordinance approved May 6, 1913.

Section 13. Fees, Restoration of Pavement.

Fees for the restoration of pavement shall be as the Borough President may establish from time to time.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Public Charities:

No. 4799.

Department of Public Charities of The City of New York, foot of E. 26th st., October 27, 1913:

Re: Acquisition of Site for Addition to Cumberland Street Hospital, Brooklyn.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held June 26, 1913, adopted the following resolution, which was concurred in by the Board of Aldermen on July 15 and approved by the Mayor August 5:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding forty-five thousand dollars (\$45,000) to be used as follows: Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the purchase of property adjoining Cumberland Street Hospital, Borough of Brooklyn, and twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) for the remodeling of buildings thereon under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

The site referred to is fifty feet adjacent to the south side of the present Cumberland Street Hospital, which piece of property extends from Cumberland st. to Carlton ave., fifty feet wide, adjoining the present Cumberland Street Hospital, situated 109 Cumberland st., Brooklyn. The metes and bounds of this property are as follows:

"Beginning at a point on the easterly side of Cumberland st. distant 312 feet 3 inches northerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the said easterly side of Cumberland st. with the northerly side of Myrtle ave.; running thence easterly at right angles to Cumberland st. 200 feet to the westerly side of Carlton ave.; running thence northerly along the westerly side of Carlton ave. 50 feet; running thence westerly at right angles to Carlton ave. 200 feet to the easterly side of Cumberland st.; running thence southerly along the easterly side of Cumberland st. 50 feet to the point or place of beginning; together with all the right, title and interest, if any, of the parties of the first part, of, in and to the streets or avenues in front thereof to the centre thereof."

The Real Estate Bureau connected with the Department of Finance had an option on this property and it was thought it could be bought at private sale. The owners, however, now refuse to sell it at the prices agreed upon and we are advised by the Corporation Counsel that request should be made to your Board to select by ordinance, for municipal purposes under the care and jurisdiction of this Department, the property described above.

I would therefore respectfully request that your Board adopt an ordinance authorizing the acquisition of this property.

City of New York, Department of Finance, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, October 9, 1913.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On September 24, 1913, the Board of Trustees of the Normal College requested establishment of the following grades of positions:

Janitor, compensation, \$9,380; number of incumbents, 1; to take effect September 15, 1913.

Elevator Attendant, compensation, \$750; number of incumbents, 2; to take effect October 1, 1913.

In connection therewith we report as follows:

A new building is ready for occupancy. The rate suggested for the Janitors is computed on the same basis as the rates for Janitors of public schools. The present rate for the Janitor of the Normal College is \$5,000 per annum.

The Elevator Attendants are to operate elevators which carry students in a seven-story building. The rate for Elevators in public buildings in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Queens is \$900 per annum.

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

Gentlemen—I transmit herewith certified copies of three resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 23, 1913, relative to the issues of corporate stock, as follows:

Calendar No. 18A. Amending resolution adopted July 17, 1911, which authorized the issue of \$15,000 corporate stock to provide means for the construction of a zebra house yard in the New York Zoological Park, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, by reducing said amount to \$7,481.68.

Calendar No. 18B. Authorizing the issue of \$7,518.32 to provide means for the construction of a hospital building to be located in the service yard in the New York Zoological Park, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

Calendar No. 19. Authorizing the issue of \$25,000 corporate stock to provide means for the purchase of cases, bookshelves, etc., for equipment, and for construction of permanent improvements for the American Museum of Natural History, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond.

Dear Sir—Our roofs are in bad condition. So many leaks and breaks have developed during the past week that it will require a considerable sum of money to repair the same. Something must be done immediately; much damage has been done already; many books have been ruined; expensive ceilings marred, and, unless we make repairs, we may have to close our main reading room because the plaster ceiling will certainly fall, softened as it is by water. Likewise our electric plant is threatened with destruction. Whenever it rains we have to cover the machinery, which often forces us to shut down.

I am doing my best to avert a disaster, and I recommend that Commissioner Stover be acquainted with the facts in the case and be requested to secure at least \$3,000 to make repairs before winter. Respectfully,

The Borough Presidents, Contracts and General Powers.

Section 91. The President of each Borough shall present and report to the Corporation Counsel all encroachments on the streets or avenues in The City of New York which may be brought to his notice or take such other action thereon as may be prescribed by ordinance in relation thereto. He shall appoint on all contract work of regulating, grading and paving and sewer connections a competent Inspector [of contract work] with the title of Inspector of Public Works connected with his department [in all cases] where he may deem the public service requires such Inspector. All Inspectors with the title of Inspector of Regulating, Grading and Paving and Inspector of Sewer Construction are hereby constituted Inspectors of Public Works with the title of Inspector of Public Works. In all cases where an assessment shall be levied for any improvements the amounts paid for inspection on any contract work connected therewith shall be assessed and collected with the other expenses of such improvement, except where the Inspector's wages are legally chargeable to the contractor.

Hon. COURTLANDT NICOLL, Chairman Committee on Laws and Legislation, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Honorable Sir—I take this means to call your attention to resolution No. 3850 presented by the Honorable Alderman Weil, relative to amending Section 91, Article 1 of chapter 5 of part 1, of the Code of Ordinances, which was referred to your Honorable Committee on Tuesday, June 3, 1913, and would request your Honorable Committee to make a favorable report on same for the following reasons:

First—That the present inspectors of Regulating, Grading and Paving and Inspectors of Sewer Construction have been employed by the City of New York for the past 10, 15 and in some cases 25 years, and have proven satisfactory during that period. These Inspectors have attained their positions through open competitive Civil Service examinations and have given the greater part of their lives, as well as their practical experience, to make the City what it is to-day and during the past three years there has been a movement on foot to replace these practical men who have gained their knowledge from apprentice bricklayers, stonemasons, pavers, foremen and in some cases superintendent with technical graduates from technical schools of Boston, Mass.

Second—The reason for the request for change of title is: That Commissioner Frothingham of the Borough of Manhattan, created the title of "Inspector of Public Works" in 1911 and requested the Civil Service Commission to hold an examination for said position notwithstanding the fact that the Committee on Salaries and Offices of the Board of Aldermen that was in office at that time refused to report the resolution out of said Committee after it had been passed by the Board of Estimate and

Apportionment, and it died on the 31st day of December, 1911, when the term of the last Board of Aldermen expired.

On information I received, the object of creating the position of Inspector of Public Works by Commissioner Frothingham, as expressed by himself before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, was that he wanted said title because it gave him the power during the inclement weather during the winter months to have Inspectors of Public Works do inspection work in other branches of the Inspection Service, which did not give him power under their present titles.

The result of said examination that was held was so technical that only ten of the present employees of his department were successful, and these men have diplomas as Civil Engineers.

The list comprised of technical men who would only accept appointment to get a practical knowledge at the expense of the City, and after this was obtained would go out in the field to command more salary than that which is offered by the City in said positions.

I claim that the City will have to pay more money to these men than that which is paid to the present Inspectors of Regulating, Grading, Paving and Sewer Construction, who do identical the same work and give the following reasons:

Out of the first one hundred names that have been certified for Inspectors of Public Works from the list only ten have accepted at the salary offered—\$1,200 per annum, and the other 90 refused on account of insufficient salary, which has necessitated the appointing of Inspectors of Regulating, Grading and Paving from the existing list to temporary appointments.

The title of Inspector of Public Works was only an office title up to November, 1912, when your Honorable Board of Aldermen was passing on additions to the budget in blanket form this title was included so that the title of Inspector of Public Works should become a recognized title notwithstanding the fact that your Honorable Board was passing on a financial matter at the time.

I have been informed the men holding the title of Inspectors of Regulating, Grading and Paving and Inspectors of Sewer Construction will all be thrown out of employment next fall pursuant to Section 1543 of the Greater New York Charter if they have not got the title of Inspector of Public Works.

This is an injustice, as the present Inspectors have given the greater part of their lives to the City and I point with pride to the streets, viaducts, bridges, subways and numerous other improvements that have been accomplished by the practical Inspector, who have always lived in the City and are not residents of the technical schools of Boston and Massachusetts, whom the present heads of the departments are so anxious to have replace the present incumbents.

I make this request in behalf of the United Inspectors' Association of Public Works of the City of New York, who wish to go on record as being in favor of this resolution, and pray your Honorable Committee to make a favorable report and advocate its final passing before the main body of the Board of Aldermen.

During the period of such vacation, or in the event of the enforced absence of such physician by illness, or other justifiable cause, the Coroner is hereby authorized and empowered to employ a competent physician, resident in the Borough, in manner as provided by the rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, to perform the duties of Coroners' Physician during such vacation or other absence.

Sec. 3. The compensation of the physician so employed shall not exceed the ratable proportion of the annual salary paid to the regular Coroners' Physician for the period so employed, and shall be paid out of the contingent fund of such Coroners, if such fund be sufficient; otherwise, by the Comptroller of The City of New York out of such funds as may be available, upon proper vouchers and requisition of the Coroner.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. In pursuance of the provisions of section 231 of the Municipal Court Act (chapter 580, Laws of 1902), as amended by chapter 541, Laws of 1910, section 231a, of said act as amended by chapter 541, Laws of 1910, and section 231b of said act as amended by chapter 690, Laws of 1913, it is hereby directed that the sum of two dollars (\$2) be allowed each trial juror for each day's necessary attendance by him as such juror, at a term of any Municipal Court of The City of New York, held within The City of New York; provided, however, that no such juror shall be so paid for attendance on any day on which he shall be excused from service.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the hours of duty of the uniformed force of the Department of Correction of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Commissioner of Correction of The Department of Correction of The City of New York shall divide the Keepers and Matrons of the Department into three platoons. No one of such platoons, nor any member thereof, shall be assigned to more than one tour of duty; such tour of duty shall not exceed eight hours of each consecutive twenty-four hours, nor more than eight hours of reserve of each consecutive seventy-two hours, excepting only that in case of extraordinary or unusual emergency, or for the purpose of changing tours of duty, so many of said platoons or of the members thereof, may be continued on duty for such hours as may be necessary.

Reserve Duty.

Sec. 2. Keepers and Matrons of this Department, while on reserve duty as mentioned in the first section of this ordinance, shall not be required to render any service except in case of emergency, and shall be free to retire for sleep during reserve duty in the institution to which they are assigned for duty, subject to call in case of emergency.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect January 1, 1914.

ORIGINAL.

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the hours of duty of the uniformed force of the Department of Correction of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Within sixty days after this ordinance takes effect the Commissioner of Correction of The Department of Correction of The City of New York shall divide the Keepers and Matrons of the Department into three platoons. No one of such platoons, nor any member thereof, shall be assigned to more than one tour of duty; such tour of duty shall not exceed eight hours of each consecutive twenty-four hours, nor more than eight hours of reserve of each consecutive seventy-two hours, excepting only that in the case of extraordinary or unusual emergency, or for the purpose of changing tours of duty, so many of said platoons or of the members thereof, may be continued on duty for such hours as may be necessary.

Reserve Duty.

Sec. 2. Keepers and Matrons of this Department, while on reserve duty as mentioned in the first section of this act, shall not be required to render any service except in case of emergency, and shall be free to retire for sleep during reserve duty in the institution to which they are assigned for duty, subject to call in case of emergency.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS, RESUMED.

Alderman Downing asked and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

Whereas, It is proposed by the Police Commissioner to remove the Police Headquarters of Brooklyn and Queens from its present location in State st., Brooklyn, to the new 150th Precinct Station House in Poplar st.; and

Whereas, There is universal complaint from the citizens of all sections of Brooklyn and Queens in regard to locating said Headquarters in Poplar st., which is not only an undesirable neighborhood, but also dangerous owing to the lack of lighting facilities and owing to its being situated in a deserted neighborhood, adjacent to the waterfront; and

Whereas, The cost of removing the electric wiring from the State st. building to the building in Poplar st. would involve a heavy expense to the city of \$10,000 or more, which would be a waste of public money, since it is proposed to make the Poplar st. building only a temporary home for said Headquarters; and

Whereas, A large amount of valuable time of the patrolmen and officials of the Police Department and of citizens and business men generally will be wasted in going to the new site, which is located in a most inaccessible part of the Borough, instead of being centrally located; and

Whereas, The proposed new Headquarters building is as yet unfinished and will be too small and inadequate when completed, owing to its never having been intended for any other purpose than a Station House; and

Whereas, It will be an offense to the civic pride of the citizens of Brooklyn and Queens to have this small building set aside for such a purpose; be it hereby

Resolved, That it is recommended to the Mayor and Police Commissioner of The City of New York that they take no further steps in regard to removing the Police Headquarters of Brooklyn and Queens from State st., in the Borough of Brooklyn, to the proposed location in Poplar st., until this matter is more fully investigated and it is also recommended that they retain the present building until a permanent and suitable building, centrally located, can be provided for the use of said Police Headquarters. Which was adopted.

MESSAGES FROM THE MAYOR.

Gentlemen—I transmit herewith a letter which I have received from Frederic R. Coudert, the President of the National Highways Protective Society, in which attention is called to the fact that on Tuesday last another child was run over and killed by one of the United States Mail wagons, this being the eighth person killed by a mail wagon this year.

There can be little doubt of the absolute necessity of amending the City Ordinances so as to prevent the continuance of this reckless driving; and I respectfully recommend, therefore, that your body communicate with the Corporation Counsel and secure his advice as to the extent of your powers in regulating the speed and conduct of these wagons in our city streets, and that the ordinances be amended accordingly. Hon. ARDOLPH KLINE, Mayor of The City of New York, Mayor's Office, New York:

My Dear Mr. Mayor—As President of the National Highways Protective Society, I wish to call your attention to a condition of affairs which calls for immediate remedy.

I saw by Tuesday papers that another child was run over and killed by one of the United States Mail wagons. This is the eighth person killed by a mail wagon this year.

Upon examining the Ordinance you will find that the provisions regulating the speed and conduct of vehicles in our city streets and intended to protect the public, especially except from their operation United States Mail wagons. There is, of course, no federal law governing them in their transit through our highways and thus the public is left wholly at the mercy of the individual who happens to be driving these vehicles, and who, at the present, is unfettered by any of the rules and regulations applying to others.

This is an anomalous and unnecessary state of affairs. There does not seem to be any reason for exempting these vehicles from the ordinary police laws and ordinances of the State of New York while they are on the State's highways. I am convinced that the exception in the ordinance must have been due to a misconception of the powers of the local authorities over highway traffic.

There is nothing in the Constitution of the United States or the Federal laws requiring that United States Mail wagons should be allowed to rush through our streets like juggernauts exacting their tribute of blood. The fact that they are engaged in the Federal service should not exempt them from the ordinary local regulations, applicable to all alike.

Our Society has placed the matter before the Department of Justice, but we are, of course, met with the fact that the City's own ordinance exempts these vehicles. The Department, I believe, would be inclined to assist, as far as it may be in its power, in assuring that the mail wagons shall not violate local regulations.

Under these circumstances I am sure you will feel it your imperative duty to call upon the Board of Aldermen to amend the ordinance by striking out the exception relating to United States Mail wagons, etc., and thus place them upon the same footing with other vehicles and within the purview of the regulations made for the prevention of accident and the punishment of reckless and dangerous driving.

I trust, Mr. Mayor, that this question, involving as it does the safety of life and limb of our people, will meet with your early and earnest attention, and I feel sure that you will appreciate the action of the Society in calling to your attention this deplorable situation and the need for an immediate remedy. That having examined the subject, it believes the proposed change to be a wise provision and one which when inaugurated will prove a substantial saving to the City by creating a fund for the purchase of real estate, obviating the necessity of a new bond issue and thus saving the interest on a second installment of bonds, when a prior issue has still a number of years to run.

It, therefore, recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 53 of article 3 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, and section 76 of article 4 of the same part, in relation to the sale of real estate belonging to the Sinking Fund.

Be it Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 53 of article 3 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 53. All moneys heretofore received and hereafter to be received from the following sources are hereby pledged and appropriated to and constitute and form a fund called the Sinking Fund of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt, until the whole of the stocks of The City of New York shall be finally and fully redeemed, namely:

1. For commutation of quit-rents on grants.
2. For quit-rents arising from such grants as were issued prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and four.

3. The net proceeds of all sales of real estate belonging to the corporation when sold (.), except when the same are made payable to a fund, the purpose of which is restricted to the purchase of other real estate, as provided by the Charter of The City of New York.

4. The net proceeds of all bonds and mortgages payable to the corporation when collected (.), except when the said bonds and mortgages are part of the proceeds of the sale of real estate and the proceeds thereof are deposited in a fund, the purpose of which is restricted to the purchase of other real estate, as provided by the Charter of The City of New York.

5. For licenses to pawn brokers and dealers in the purchase or sale of second-hand furniture, metals or clothes.

6. For hackney-coach licenses and street vaults.

7. For exclusive occupation of private wharves, basins and piers.

8. For market fees and market rents.

9. The proceeds of all bonds and mortgages which may have or shall become the property of the corporation, in pursuance of the ordinance creating the fire loan stock of The City of New York.

10. The building included in the establishment called the Almshouse, at Bellevue, together with the lots of land and water rights attached thereto when sold, and the rents when leased.

11. Such portions thereof of the annual taxes levied in The City and County of New York as may be collected for the redemption of the floating debt stock of The City of New York and the fire indemnity stock of The City of New York.

12. All such other sources of revenue or sums of money as the said corporation shall hereafter think proper to appropriate to said fund.

Sec. 2. Section 76 of article 4, of part 1, of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to the Sale of Real Estate Belonging to the Sinking Fund, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 76. Whenever any real estate shall have been sold pursuant to the preceding sections of this article, it shall be the duty of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, or a majority of them, to give a certificate, under their hands, that the same has been sold pursuant to the provisions of this article, and upon the production of such certificate and the evidence that the proceeds of such sale have been paid into the treasury to the credit of the sinking fund for the redemption of the city debt (.) or such other appropriate fund as provided by the Charter of The City of New York, it shall be the duty of the Mayor of the City and the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen to execute proper conveyances of such real estate under their hands and the seal of the city corporation.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, June 30, 1911.

"To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

"Gentlemen—On June 6, 1911, the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to establish, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, the grade of Gardener in Charge at \$115 per month and Gardener at \$90 a month, the grades to apply to all boroughs and the compensation to be paid semi-monthly on the first and fifteenth day of each month. In connection therewith we report as follows:

"The matter of fixing grades for Gardeners employed in the City parks was taken up recently by the Comptroller on the request of the Gardeners' and Florists' Union. As a result of an examination the Comptroller addressed a communication to the Secretary of the Union, stating that in his opinion the matter was one of departmental administration, and advising the Union to confer with the Park Commissioners.

"We are of the opinion that the request for the establishment of the grades for Gardeners should emanate from the Commissioners of Parks of the several boroughs.

"We therefore return herewith the resolution and the communication from William Dihn, secretary of a special committee of gardeners of Greater New York, and suggest that they be referred to the Commissioners of Parks for such action as they may deem necessary and proper. Respectfully,

"WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller; JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen, Select Committee."

And, Whereas, In a communication addressed to the Secretary of the Special Committee of Gardeners, Superintendent Zartman, of the Department of Parks for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, under date of June 27, 1911, said:

"In reply I beg to say that I have long realized that the Gardeners of this Department are not compensated in accordance with the work furnished, and you can rest assured that I will do all in my power to secure adequate payment for these men."

And, Whereas, In a letter to the Secretary of the Special Committee of Gardeners, dated July 27, 1911, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, through its Secretary, Joseph Haag, said:

"At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held June 27, 1911, a report was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, referring to resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting the establishment of the Grades of positions of Gardener in Charge at \$115 per month and Gardener at \$90 per month, also to communication from the Secretary of a Special Committee of Gardeners in Greater New York, and stating that he is in favor of increasing the compensation of skilled men performing such work and will request an appropriation for this purpose in the Budget estimate for his department for the year 1912," and

Whereas, Notwithstanding the report of the Select Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and of the recommendation of both the Superintendent of Parks and the Commissioner of Parks, for the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, action has not been taken by either the Park Department or the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as requested by resolution of the Board of Aldermen dated June 6, 1911, therefore

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen urge the Department of Parks of The City of New York to incorporate in its Budget for 1914 estimates which will enable said department to pay its Gardeners \$90 per month, the grades to apply to all boroughs and the compensation to be paid on the first and fifteenth days of each month.

Resolved, That should the estimates of the Department of Parks for 1914 already have been submitted without such provision being contained therein, that the Commissioners of said Department be requested to submit a supplemental request incorporating said provisions; and

Resolved, That when such estimate or request is made by the Board of Park Commissioners to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment said Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby urged to provide the necessary funds to enable the Commissioners of Parks to adopt the schedule of salaries for the grades of Gardener in Charge and Gardener in Park Department herein specified.

AN ORDINANCE to Amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York in Relation to the Duties of the Clerk to the Board of Aldermen.

Be It Ordained, By the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Part 1, article 2 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof a new section, to read as follows:

Section 7a. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to the Board of Aldermen to have printed, within four days after the introduction thereof, five hundred copies of each ordinance introduced in the Board of Aldermen by any member thereof, which adds to, amends, alters or repeals the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York. All ordinances amending or repealing any existing law or ordinance shall, when printed, contain in brackets the part repealed, and the new part inserted, in italics. Each ordinance printed in accordance with the provisions of this section shall bear the name of the introducer, and the introductory number thereof, and briefly state the disposition made thereof upon its introduction.

A copy of each ordinance printed in accordance with the provisions hereof shall be delivered or mailed to the head of every Department and Bureau in The City of New York by the Clerk to the Board of Aldermen. The balance shall be retained by the Clerk to the Board of Aldermen for distribution, within his discretion, to persons desiring copies of the same; provided, however, that he shall always retain at least fifty printed copies until such time as the ordinance shall have been either enacted into law, or the term of the members of the Board of Aldermen during which it was introduced shall have expired.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

For goods, wares and merchandise, and/or household furniture (other than pianos) where a one-horse vehicle (including the driver thereof) is used, \$1.25 per hour; where a two-horse vehicle (including the driver thereof) is used, \$1.75 per hour; where any automobile, auto car, or other similar motor vehicle is used (including the operator thereof), \$3.50 per hour; for the service of each man in addition to the operator thereof, 50 cents per hour; time reasonably necessary for said vehicle to travel from office to place of loading or unloading, and return to office, to be included and charged according to rates herein prescribed.

In case any vehicle, while engaged in transportation of goods, wares or merchandise, and/or household furniture shall break down, or become disabled, no charge shall be made for the period of such disability.

2. For pianos, where the distance to be traveled is three miles or less, \$3; for each additional mile or part thereof, \$0.50; for transporting piano either up or down one or more flights of stairs, \$0.50 for each flight; for use of elevator, \$1 each way; for each use of a hoist, \$5 additional.

This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ENGINEERING BUREAU.

New Construction Work by Department Labor.

North River Pier Extensions—On March 1, 1913, the Secretary of War approved the Department's application for an extension to the pierhead line on the North River, between Pier "A" and Gansevoort Market. During the quarter active steps have been taken for extending the piers that come within this zone. Test piles have been driven in order to determine the character of the bottom, length of piles, etc., for these extensions.

Riprap has been deposited and active work is now in progress by the force of the Department for the extension to Piers 26, 28, 36 and 38. The extension to Pier 41 is under contract by the lessee. Other extensions will be started during the coming quarter, both by the Department and by the lessees.

Bulkhead Wall—Work is in progress on the bulkhead or river wall along the East River at the Corlears section, Yorkville section, Blackwells section, E. 90th st. section and E. 123d st. section, and some work has been done in connection with the wall at Whale Creek and the Gowanus section wall in Brooklyn.

At the 90th st. section, the bulkhead wall has been completed in order to furnish wharfage room for the asphalt plant now being erected under the supervision of the Borough President of Manhattan.

New Piers—Work is in progress at Pier 45, East River, near the foot of Jackson st. At the foot of Washington st., in Brooklyn, around the Manhattan Bridge tower, a new wharfage platform has been constructed. Work is now in progress on new piers at the foot of E. 38th and E. 47th sts. On the North River, a pier at W. 155th st. is being constructed, and a pier at W. 55th st. is being reconstructed.

Clearing the Marginal Street at W. 131st St.—In order to remove the unsightly obstructions to traffic which now exist and which have existed for years within the area of the Marginal st., south of W. 131st st., an agreement has been entered into by the City with the occupants and lessees of the coal structures whereby the City will assist in the removal of these structures to the bulkhead area between W. 132d and W. 133d sts. This will greatly improve traffic conditions in connection with the use of the W. 131st st. pier for North River steamboats.

Paving—Repairs to the pavement both granite and asphalt have been made at various parts of the water-front, the most important being that for the improvement of the passenger and team traffic in front of the W. 42d st. ferry, and in front of the new ferry terminal at 39th st., South Brooklyn.

New Construction Work Under Contract.

W. 46th St. Pier—In order to meet the demand for piers 1,000 feet in length and over on the North River, a new plan has been made by this Department and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a pier 1,000 feet in length, with a possible inshore extension to 1,200 feet at the foot of W. 46th st., and will form part of a proposed general plan for similar piers between W. 44th and W. 59th sts. During the quarter active steps have been taken by this Bureau looking to the construction of a pier at the foot of W. 46th st., 150 feet wide and 1,000 feet long.

Numerous test borings and test piles have been driven between W. 44th and W. 48th sts. for the purpose of developing the bottom and determining the quantity of materials ranging from mud to solid rock to be removed to a depth of 44 feet below mean low water.

A contract (No. 1383) has been prepared and awarded to Eugene Breymann for doing the necessary dredging to provide a slip on each side of this pier, with a depth of from 40 to 44 feet below mean low water. Detail plans, specifications, contract and estimate have been prepared for building this pier, and the specifications and contract are now in the hands of the printer. Maps and technical descriptions have been prepared by this Bureau for the use of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund in advertising and conducting this sale, which is announced for October 17, 1913.

South Brooklyn Ferry Terminal at 39th St.—Work under Contract 1294 for building a new ferry house and appurtenances at the South Brooklyn Ferry Terminal at 39th st., has been in progress. During the quarter the work has been advanced to a point where the traffic has been deflected from the old work to the new southerly ferry slip, both for teams and passengers. The second story waiting room has been in use for this purpose for about a month and the demolition and removal of the old structures have been completed, so that now the contractor has complete possession of the northerly ferry slip and its adjoining areas, so that the work of completing the remaining portion of the ferry house and terminal is well under way.

Dredging—Both maintenance and construction dredging has progressed as usual within the quarter.

Repair Work—Sundry repairs to piers, recreation buildings and bulkheads on the North and East Rivers, and in Brooklyn, have been carried on by Department labor. Repairs have been made by Department labor to various water-front structures for the Department of Correction, under requisition from that Department.

Permit Work—The work done by private parties and owners at numerous places along the water-front under permit from this Department has been supervised. Very respectfully,



NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto, will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of the City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, free or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrows, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the face of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested in him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath in writing of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve, as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be had there.
