Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A special meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Friday, July 3rd, 1914, at 10.45 A. M.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, Robbins and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused—Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe and Sachs.

Consideration was given to the minutes of the meeting held on June 23rd, at which no quorum was present, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, That these minutes be approved, and that the decisions therein be ratified and the proceedings adopted as part of the actions of this meeting, as follows:

An adjourned regular meeting of the

Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held in the staff room of Bellevue Hospital on Tuesday, June 23rd, 1914, at two o'clock.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Robbins and Stern, Trustees; and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities. Excused—Messrs. Farley, O'Keeffe, Paulding and Sachs.

The minutes of the meeting of June 12th were held as read and approved.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows: Dr. Hartwell requests that Dr. Seward Erdman, Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon on the Second Division of Bellevue Hospital, be permitted to act as Assistant Visiting Surgeon for a period of two weeks.

The Boylan Bill, which specifies that all municipalities shall provide hospital accommodation for drug habitues, becomes effective on July 1st. This bill states that public officers having control of county or city hospitals shall provide separate quarters for the treatment of all persons addicted to the use of habit-forming drugs, and that a magistrate may commit such persons to a county or city hospital.

There is at the present time no attending physician for the orthopedic department at Fordham Hospital, and within the last few days there has been occasion to use a Consulting Ophthalmologist at Gouverneur Hospital. It would seem desirable that some effort be made to fill these positions.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent, as follows:

Dr. Seward Erdman was authorized to act as Assistant Visiting Surgeon to the Second Division for a period of two weeks.

The General Medical Superintendent was directed to provide hospital accommodations for drug habitues in accordance with the Boylan Law, and to take up the matter with the Medical Board.

It was resolved, to request the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital to present a nomination for appointment to the orthopedic department of that hospital, and to inform the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital that the Trustees are ready to entertain nominations for appointment to the place of Consulting Ophthalmologist.

Reports of Committees.

The President reported, on behalf of the Building Committee, that consideration had been given to the suggestions made by Dr. Broadhead in his letter of May 29th for certain changes in the new ward wing at Harlem Hospital to care for the obstetrical service, and recommended, as this involved a change in the arrangement of the windows, to provide better light, that the General Medical Superintendent be directed to obtain estimates of the cost of making these alterations. This recommendation was adopted.

The Building Committee presented a letter received from the Fire Department under date of June 19th, stating that they were not equipped to supervise or carry out the structural changes to reduce the fire hazard in the old buildings of Bellevue Hospital, recommended in the reports of the Chief of the Fire Prevention Bureau and Messrs. Porter and Himmwright. The Committee reported that they had conferred with the Chief of the Fire Prevention Bureau and Mr. Porter, and were of the opinion that fire prevention measures were necessary. The Committee further reported that these reports agree in general, and that it is estimated that the cost of carrying out the recommendations contained therein would be approximately \$17,000, and recommended, in view of the letter from the Fire Department, that a request be made for funds in this amount. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, On account of the urgency of this matter, to request the Board of Aldermen to issue revenue bonds in the amount of \$17,000, in order that this work may be carried out as recommended.

The Bellevue Conference Committee of the Fourth Division recommended the promotion of Dr. Frederick W. Rice to the place of Physician to Out Patients on the children's service, subject to the approval of the President. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted.

Communications.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for June 3rd were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation that additional room be procured for the out-patient department, by either renting temporary quarters in the vicinity or erecting a portable structure in Gouverneur Slip, was referred to the President and General Medical Superintendent for investigation and report; the request that a Stenographer be furnished from Bellevue Hospital to attend the meetings of the Gouverneur Medical Board, and transcribe the minutes, was referred to the General Medical Superintendent with power; and it

Resolved, To request the Health Department to make inquiries and take such measures as are within their powers to prevent the erection of a stable directly opposite the hospital.

A letter dated June 16th was presented from the Dean of the University and Bellevue Hospital Medical College, requesting that Dr. George H. Wallace, recently appointed as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician to the Third Division, be excused from service in the dispensary, as that branch is attended to by Dr. Mackenzie of that division. It was moved, seconded and carried, to refer this to the Medical Board for recommendation.

A communication dated June 19th was presented from McKim, Mead and White, transmitting a letter from the John H. Parker Company offering to omit the passageways across the loggias on the fifth and sixth floors between pavilions L and M and L and K, and to make no charge or allowance for this alteration. This was referred to the Building Committee.

The President presented a letter which he had received from the State Charities Aid Association under date of June 22nd, relative to providing for the treatment of drug cases under the Boylan Law. As this matter had been discussed in connection with the report of the General Medical Superintendent, the communication was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated June 17th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on June 12th approving of final contract with J. H. Freedlander for services as architect for the alterations to the present building of Harlem Hospital and the alterations to the power house and ambulance station of that hospital. This communication was ordered placed on file.

A communication dated June 15th was presented from Dr. Herbert L. Wheeler, nominating dentists for Bellevue and Fordham Hospitals. These recommendations were approved and appointments made as follows: Dr. Lawrence Barnett, dental interne to Bellevue Hospital for one year, beginning July 1st, 1914; Dr. R. A. Rose, Dr. B. A. Burns and Dr. M. C. Ellenstein, Assistant Visiting Dentists to Bellevue Hospital; and Dr. George V. Kern, Assistant Visiting Dentist to Fordham Hospital.

New Business.

It was moved, seconded and carried, to appoint a Budget Committee, composed of the President, Mr. Paulding, and Mr. Robbins, to consider the Departmental Estimate for 1915.

The President designated Mr. Robbins to audit vouchers and examine bills for the Finance Committee in the absence of Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Sachs.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

Dr. George O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The death by drowning of patient Jennie Bedehen, which occurred on June 26th in ward 34, is reported with regret. The patient at about 5.30 went to the bathroom, apparently to take a bath, and a few minutes later was found in the tub with her face under the water. The case, with all information, was referred to the Coroner.

On June 27th Louis Lederer, a psychopathic case, while allowed in the yard for exercise, jumped from the fire escape but was uninjured except for a laceration of the face.

A letter was received from the Associated Out Patient Clinics, asking that provision be made for the care of a whooping cough class in the out patient department. This would require a special room with a separate entrance. At the present time these cases are isolated in the out patient department and examined and treated separately, and if their condition makes it seem advisable they are sent to the special ward for the treatment of these cases. The room, however, has no separate entrance from outside, and is used for other purposes.

At the School for Midwives the following pupils have completed their course of training, and authority is requested for the granting of the usual diplomas: Elizabeth Flusz, Mary Srahol, Lucy C. Kelz, Mary Flynn, Rachel Macphie, Nellie A. Norton, Mary L. Rampinelli and Gussie Goldenbaum.

A request has been received from Dr. Gregory for the appointment of the following doctors as internes on the staff of the alcoholic and prison service for a period of six months, beginning July 1st, 1914: Dr. David Hyman, Dr. Claude A. Symons, Dr. Stanley Eiss and Dr. George W. Pullen, Jr.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

It was resolved to direct the General Medical Superintendent to send a full report of all serious accidents to each member of the Board, and to file a copy thereof in the office of the Board.

It was resolved, to defer action on the

request of the Associated Out Patient Clinics, pending the receipt of a report from the General Medical Superintendent on the whooping cough cases brought to the hospitals of the department.

It was resolved, to award diplomas to the pupils for the School for Midwives named in the report of the General Medical Superintendent.

The request for appointments to the staff of the alcoholic and prison service was referred to the President with power.

Reports of Committees.

The Building Committee reported that they had inquired into the offer of the John H. Parker Company, referred to in a letter from McKim, Mead & White, dated June 19th, to omit the passageways across the loggias on the fifth and sixth floors between pavilions L and M and I and K, and recommended that no change be made, and that the work be finished in accordance with the specifications. This report was approved.

The Conference Committee of the First Division of Bellevue Hospital reported upon the nominations of Dr. Erdwurm and Dr. Whidden, and upon motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To promote Dr. Frand Erdwurm to the place of Assistant Visiting Physician, and to appoint Dr. Rae Wygant Whidden as Physician to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Physician to the tuberculosis service.

The Fordham Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Tracy L. Fisk as Assistant Physician to Out Patients, and, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and Dr. Fisk appointed accordingly.

The Committee on Officers and Employees reported that the requests for increases in the salary of Miss Casey, Miss Calligan and Mr. May had been taken up with the Budget Committee and would be included in the Departmental Estimate for 1915. This report was accepted.

The President reported that he had opened bids on June 15th for the supply of meats, poultry and fish from June 22nd to October 31st, and for the supply of eggs from September 1st to October 31st, 1914. The Committee on Supplies presented a tabulation of these bids, together with a letter from the Contract Clerk and Auditor under date of June 17th, and recommended that the lowest bid received for each line or class be accepted. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this recommendation was adopted.

The Budget Committee reported that they had prepared a preliminary estimate for the 1915 budget, relating to increases in salaries and new positions, but that they wished to present several matters of policy to the Board. It was moved, seconded and carried, on account of the volume of this report, to hold a special meeting of the Board for its consideration.

Communications.

A letter dated June 8th was presented from the Croker National Fire Prevention Engineering Company, offering to renew their contract for fire protection for a period of six months on the same terms and conditions as heretofore. In connection therewith a letter was presented from the Municipal Civil Service Commission dated June 24th, stating that the resolution adopted by that Commission on May 28th, excepting the Croker Company from examination, had been returned by the Mayor without his approval, and that the consent of the Board of Aldermen for the exemption of this contract from public letting was required. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Aldermen for permission to award this contract without public letting.

A communication dated June 30th was presented from George H. Epstein, transmitting an assignment by Joseph Di Benedetto to Virgil S. Rittenhouse and Benjamin Riesner of money due under his contract for the construction of the roof ward at Fordham Hospital. On motion duly seconded and carried, consent was granted to this assignment without guarantee as to amount and expressly subject to any claim, set-off or equity which The City of New York now has, or may hereafter have, against the moneys or any part thereof covered by said assignment.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for June 24th were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nomination of Dr. I. F. Frost as Assistant Physician to Out Patients on the Second Division was referred to the Conference Committee, and the resolution approving the request of the Third Division that Dr. George H. Wallace be excused from service in the out patient department was confirmed.

A letter was presented from McKim, Mead & White, dated June 23rd, estimating that the cost of erecting an iron fence with the necessary stone work along First Avenue, from the pathological building to the Catholic chapel of Bellevue Hospital would be \$4,500. This communi-

cation was referred to the Building Committee for investigation and report.

A letter dated June 23rd was presented from the State Board of Charities transmitting reports on the out patient departments of Harlem and Fordham Hospitals, placing the plant and management of both institutions in Class One, and calling attention to certain needs and defects, particularly the apparent neglect of four children in the out patient department of Harlem Hospital. The President stated that he had investigated this matter and presented a report thereon from Dr. H. D. Cohen under date of June 30th. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To refer these reports to the General Medical Superintendent with instructions to remedy the defects mentioned therein and to meet the needs as far as possible, and it was further

Resolved, To send a report of the President's investigation to the State Board of Charities.

A letter dated June 15th was presented from Dr. A. M. Shady, the physician in charge of the tuberculosis service at Harlem Hospital, presenting a statistical report on the night and children's tuberculosis clinics, and requesting that salaries be paid to the physicians in these clinics. This was referred to the Budget Committee.

A letter dated June 30th was presented from Dr. John H. Coughlin, Visiting Physician to Gouverneur Hospital, setting forth his views on the plan outlined by Dr. Huddleston for a change in the medical service of that hospital. It was moved, seconded and carried to consider this letter before taking definite action on the recommendations of Dr. Huddleston.

The President presented a communication that he had received from the Bureau of Standards of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, under date of June 22nd, and reported that he had attended a conference on the tentative specifications for salaries for the different grades of physicians in the professional and scientific service of the City, but that the standards did not directly affect this Department. This report was accepted and the communication ordered placed on file.

The President reported that he had received a letter dated June 8th from the Department of Street Cleaning, transmitting a plan for the creation of a model street cleaning district, which would involve the removal of the dump from the foot of East 30th Street, and that he had communicated with the Commissioner of that Department on June 30th, endorsing the proposed plan. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report of the President was approved and the letter ordered placed on file.

A letter dated June 22nd was presented from the Commissioner of Public Works, stating that surveys had been made of the drainage conditions and sewerage requirements in the vicinity of 29th Street and 1st Avenue, and that it had been decided to ask the Local Board to authorize the construction of additional basins. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication, having been acknowledged, was ordered placed on file.

A letter dated June 25th was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on June 19th transferring \$1,180 from the account entitled "Moneys available for permanent improvements for which corporate stock may lawfully be issued," to the account entitled "New Fordham Hospital, Improvements, Alterations, etc.," to provide for the payment of the claim of the L. J. Wadsworth Construction Company for a balance alleged to be due on their contract for the construction of a workshop at Fordham Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

Unfinished Business.

Commissioner Kingsbury reported that he had gone over the entire subject of taking over the new morgue, and had found that it would be necessary to have certain changes made in the pipes and a covering provided for the tunnel running from the pathological building to the pier at the foot of East 29th Street. Mr. Kingsbury stated that he would direct the Deputy Commissioner of Charities to take up these matters with the General Medical Superintendent and the architects, and on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

The President referred to the necessity of providing adequate accommodation for the increased number of patients who will be sent to the hospitals of the Department on account of the Boylan Law and the Workmen's Compensation Act, which became effective on July 1st. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to arrange the small rooms connected with wards A-1, A-2, A-3 and A-4 of Bellevue Hospital and whatever other wards may be needed, for the care of all drug cases, and the President and

General Medical Superintendent were appointed a committee to inquire into what additional facilities can be provided for the increased number of patients likely to come to the hospitals under the Workmen's Compensation Law.

New Business.

The President reported that on June 25th he had approved the request of the President of the Medical Board of Ford-

ham Hospital for the temporary appointment of Dr. Ivy A. Pelzman as a member of the house staff of that hospital, pending the nomination of an interne for this service. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the action of the President was approved.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was seconded and carried.

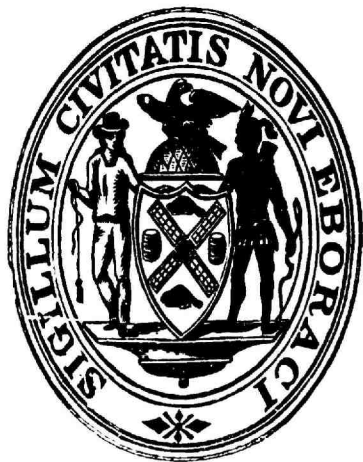

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Holmes Electric Protective Company has, by a petition verified May 31, 1912, applied to this Board for its consent and approval to the continuance of its business and the continued use and occupation of the streets of The City of New York for the maintenance and operation of its system of wires and cables connecting its offices with subscribers in the said City, so as to allow of the furnishing of burglar alarm signalling service; and

Whereas, Sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by Chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, and Chapter 467 of the Laws of 1914, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on June 6, 1912, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as July 11, 1912, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard and publication was had for at least two (2) days in the "Brooklyn Times" and "The Globe" newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Holmes Electric Protective Company and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Holmes Electric Protective Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Holmes Electric Protective Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates and charges, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract, made, and executed in duplicate, this day of 1914, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the HOLMES ELECTRIC PROTECTIVE COMPANY, a domestic corporation of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

SECTION 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate suitable wires or other electrical conductors under the streets and avenues within the Borough of Brooklyn for the purpose of electrically connecting signalling and communicating apparatus to be located on the premises of subscribers with recording apparatus located at some suitable point or points where such signals are to be received, and thereby maintaining and operating a burglar alarm signalling service system and for no other purpose whatsoever.

SECTION 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The said right and privilege to lay, construct, maintain and operate wires or other electrical conductors in conduits, and on bridges, for the purposes aforesaid, shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor to and until December 31, 1928, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for a further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of said right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal, it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the minimum sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the minimum sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers, and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event, be less than the minimum sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money:

1. The sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after

the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

2. For past use and occupation of the streets of the City, a sum at the rate of twelve thousand five hundred dollars (\$12,500) a year from December 29, 1911, to the date of the signing of this contract by the Mayor.

3. During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of Fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000).

4. During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) and which shall be equal to three and one-half (3½) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of Twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

5. During the remaining term of this original contract an annual sum which shall in no case be less than Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) and which shall be equal to four (4) per cent. of its gross annual receipts within the City, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of Twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

6. Such reasonable sum or sums as may be imposed by the Bridge Commissioner for the use of such bridge or bridges under his jurisdiction as he may permit.

The gross annual receipts of the Company mentioned above shall be deemed to include all receipts of the Company from its operations within the City of New York, excepting therefrom those receipts which accrue to it from its real estate and investments.

The annual charges shall commence from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the moneys due when this contract is signed by the Mayor shall be paid into the Treasury of the City within thirty (30) days immediately following such date, and provided further that the first annual payment thereafter shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and December 31 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before February 1 in each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payment for similar rights or franchises at a different rate and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose, unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof, or otherwise, exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the wires and equipment of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its wires and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Sixth—The Company shall construct, maintain and operate its electric system subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City, and in strict compliance with all laws or ordinances or departmental rules and regulations now in force, or which may be adopted, affecting companies operating electrical conductors in the City.

No construction or repair of said electrical system shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials. In any permit so issued, such officials may impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues and the proper restoration of the surface of such streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction, and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

Upon completion of any work of construction, the Company shall furnish to the President of the Borough a plan of such character as he may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structures erected, installed or constructed under this contract, and the location and dimensions of all sub-structures encountered during the progress of the work; the depth below the street surface of the new structures and of the substructures encountered must be shown, also their location with reference to the nearest curb-line and the nearest curb-line intersection.

The electrical and other equipment to be in-

stalled by the Company, whether the same be cables and wires, or apparatus, in any Department of the City or in private property, shall be constructed and maintained subject to the approval and under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Seventh—The plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and all appurtenances thereto, shall be constructed, maintained and operated in the latest approved manner and with the most modern and improved appliances, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to its plant, conduits, wires, conductors, connections, instruments and appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions or improvements are determined by the Board, after hearing, to be reasonable and necessary. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Eighth—All cables and wires of the Company laid pursuant to this contract shall be placed in ducts, conduits or subways (referred to in this paragraph as subways). In the Borough of Manhattan such subways shall be leased from the company or companies having control thereof under the provisions of law, or from the City, should it succeed to the rights of such company or companies. In the other territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by virtue of this contract, it may construct such subways as are necessary for the accommodation of its cables and wires, and no more. If the City shall construct or acquire subways for electrical conductors of the character or tension of those used by the Company, or similar companies, in any or all of the Boroughs in which it is authorized to operate by this contract, the Company hereby agrees to lay its wires and conductors in such subways and the City agrees to lease to the Company such space as may be necessary and available for the operation of the system hereby authorized. No cables or wires shall, in the future, be strung above the surface of the streets and avenues by the Company, and those at present in existence shall be removed and placed underground when and where required by the Board or the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Ninth—The use of any bridge under the jurisdiction of the Department of Bridges shall be at the discretion of the Bridge Commissioner and in accordance with such terms and conditions and upon such reasonable charges as he may prescribe.

Tenth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken by reason of this grant. Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets required on account of the construction or operation of the system hereby authorized, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to lay and maintain conduits shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly, or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move its conduits and its appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate be changed at any time during the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect its conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City officials having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The Company shall, upon request from any individual or corporation occupying or using premises in the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract, not in arrears to it for service already rendered, extend its wires to such premises and furnish burglar alarm service to such individual or corporation, provided that such premises are not more than one-half mile from any central office of the Company. The Board may require the Company to open additional central offices from time to time where it appears that there is a reasonable public necessity therefor.

Fourteenth—The Company shall file with the Board on the first day of February in each year a map or plan upon which shall be plainly and separately indicated the number of wires which were in use by the Company on December 31, preceding, and the streets in which the same are located, and also those which were put in use during the year preceding that date. It shall also file with the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, on or before the tenth day of each month, a map or plan of the locations in which wires have been placed by it during the preceding month.

Fifteenth—The rates to be charged by the Company shall not be in excess of the following, and it is agreed that the same may be altered or changed by the Board as hereinafter provided: (a) For burglar alarm service furnished to any bank, trust company, cooperative savings and loan association, building and loan association, mortgage loan or investment corporation, safe deposit company, personal loan association, stock brokers' office, insurance company or other financial institution, the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) a day for each circuit required to be used in furnishing such service.

(b) For burglar alarm service furnished to any other person or corporation other than those specified in Subdivision (a) above, the sum of fifty cents (50c.) a day for each circuit required to be used in furnishing such service.

(c) For watchman supervisory signal service a yearly rental of sixty dollars (\$60) for the first signal box installed and thirty dollars (\$30) for each additional box installed for the same subscriber in the same building or premises.

(d) For temporary burglar alarm service for which the telephone circuit connecting the telephone in the subscriber's premises with the central exchange of the telephone company is used, a monthly charge of seven and 50/100 dollars (\$7.50), provided such service is taken for at least two months.

(e) For temporary watchman service which it may be found necessary to furnish to any subscriber to any of the before mentioned classes of burglar alarm service or which may be required by any such subscriber, the sum of forty cents (40c.) per hour for each hour of such service actually furnished.

(f) For any other service furnished or to be furnished by the Company, the rates charged shall be reasonable and fair and before being put into effect shall be submitted to the Board for its approval.

Within thirty (30) days from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the

Company shall furnish to the Board certified forms of all the contracts used by it with subscribers for its various classes of service, and thereafter when any change shall be made in any such form of contract, a certified copy of the same shall be filed with the Board within thirty (30) days after the said change goes into effect. The Company shall also file with the Board on February 1 of each year a verified schedule of the rates charged by it for each class of service which it furnishes.

The Company agrees, upon request of any Board, Department or Bureau of the City or other government, the expenses of which are paid out of the City treasury, to furnish burglar alarm protection service to any and all buildings under the control of such Board, Department or Bureau, within the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate, subject to the provisions of this contract, at sixty-six and two-thirds per cent. (66⅔%) of the rates above authorized to be charged by it for whatever class or classes of service may be required.

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed, nor is the same intended to require the Company (except as specified in clause (d) above) to furnish burglar alarm service for any period less than one year, nor to install the equipment or apparatus which may be required by a subscriber without charge, but the Company may and it is hereby authorized to write its contracts for service on an annual basis and charge the reasonable and fair cost of value of such equipment and apparatus under such reasonable and general restrictions as it may see fit to impose. Provided, however, that this exception as to equipment and apparatus is not intended to nor shall the same apply to watchman supervisory service and the rate specified in subdivision (c) above, for such service, is intended to include each and every charge for installation, rental of instruments, service furnished and everything incidental thereto, except where temporary watchman service may be required, as specified in subdivision (e) above.

Sixteenth—During the term of this contract, or any renewal thereof, the Board shall have the power, by resolution, to regulate and fix the maximum and minimum rates to be charged by the Company in the City, provided such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Seventeenth—The Company shall not require nor receive from its subscribers any deposit or advance payment in excess of what is reasonably necessary to insure payment of current bills, and on such amounts so paid the Company shall pay interest at the statutory rate whenever such money is held for more than one month. Unpaid bills, unless due from its owner, shall never be charged against property, and no person not himself in arrears shall be denied service because any previous occupant of the same premises is in arrears to the Company for service.

Eighteenth—The wires of the Company shall be employed for no other purposes than those explicitly set forth herein, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate wires for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Nineteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the system authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or defaults of the Company.

Twentieth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions in the territory covered by this contract, or any part thereof.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company, specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of One hundred dollars (\$100) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—If for a period of three consecutive months the system of the Company shall not be operated, or if the same shall not be operated for a period of six months out of any consecutive twelve months, the Board may declare the right and franchise and this contract terminated without further proceedings at law or in equity.

Twenty-third—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account and shall, on or before February 1 in each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31, next preceding. Such report shall contain a statement of the gross receipts received from the operation of the system hereby authorized from all subscribers served by the Company in the City, together with such other information and in such form and detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-fourth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than February 1 of each year for the year ending December 31 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year, and the rate of same.
11. The names of the directors and officers elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
12. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
14. Number and location of premises served by the Company in the City, and central stations to which same are connected.
15. Total receipts of the Company for each class of business in the City.
16. Amounts paid by the Company for dam-

age to persons or property on account of construction and operation in the City.

17. Total expenses for operation, including salaries, in the City, and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of Thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privileges hereby granted, in default of which payment of the annual charges, the City shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund, after ten (10) days' notice to the Company.

In case of failure of the Company to comply with the terms of this contract relating to the filing of annual statements, furnishing of service to applicants as herein provided, the installation or maintenance of its structures and equipment, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any demand or direction of the Board or other municipal officials, made pursuant to the terms of this contract, or under the authority of any laws, ordinances or departmental regulations now or hereafter in force, in such case and in any of these events, the Company, except as hereinafter provided, shall pay to the City a penalty of Fifty dollars (\$50.) for each violation.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the provisions of this contract. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears, in the judgment of the Board, to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund, the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City.

Twenty-sixth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board, by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the portion of its system constructed and in use by virtue of this contract and located in the public streets and avenues shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company served in the same manner as a summons in an action in the Supreme Court to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-eighth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall, except as otherwise in this contract provided, be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or, if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-ninth—The words "streets and avenues" or "streets or avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, courses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, included within the limits of the territory in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Thirtieth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues of the territory in which the Company is authorized to operate by this contract.

SECTION 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

SECTION 4. First. absence of this contract; all of which claims, rights, privileges and franchises the Company asserts its intention to enforce by or in some form of action, suit or judicial proceeding. The Company agrees, on its part, to conform to, abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained, but only unless and until in any action, suit or other judicial proceeding, to which the City or one or more of its officers or departments shall be a party, the courts shall finally determine substantially that the Company had heretofore acquired the right to carry on its aforesaid business without and in the absence of this contract, had such right, privileges or franchises as entitles it to lay, maintain, use or operate wires or other lines of electrical conductors, in, over, along or under the streets and avenues of the City or some portion thereof, for the purposes aforesaid. And the City agrees, on its part, that the failure or refusal, in good faith, of the company to conform to or abide by and perform any of the terms, conditions or requirements in this contract fixed and contained, in order to raise or prevent questions or issues for the purpose of judicially determining as aforesaid its rights, privileges or franchises in the premises shall not, anything in this contract to the contrary contained, notwithstanding, subject the Company to any forfeiture or cumulative damages.

Second. Upon any such final judicial determination applying to or affecting the whole territory specified in Section 1 of this contract, all further obligation of the Company thereunder shall cease and determine and the moneys or securities deposited by it with the Comptroller as a security fund shall be returned to it, less any sum then lawfully due by the Company to the City. Should it be so judicially determined that such prior rights, privileges or franchises of the Company applied or extended only to some borough or boroughs or part or parts of the City, then in that case all obligations of the Company under this contract shall cease and determine as to such borough or boroughs or part or parts of the City, and thereafter the amount of annual compensation which the Company shall be required to pay to the City under subdivision second of Section 2 of this contract shall be computed upon the gross receipts of the Company only within the remaining parts of the City.

Third. The Company shall not claim or demand any money compensation or damages from the City or by reason of any moneys paid to the City under this contract or any expense, suits or other disadvantage incurred by it because of entering into this contract and it hereby expressly waives and surrenders to the City any such claim or demand.

Section 5. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to nor is the same intended to be an admission or recognition on the part of the City or any of its Boards, Departments or Officials of any authority, franchise, right or privilege in the Company, except as granted by this contract, nor shall the same in any manner bind the City, or affect or waive its right, freedom or privilege to defend any action commenced or prosecuted by the Company for the purpose of establishing its alleged rights, privileges or franchises independent of this contract.

In WITNESS WHEREOF, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused the corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

Amendments to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Department of Health held August 25, 1914, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That Section 66 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended, to take effect immediately, so as to read as follows:

Section 66. No person shall sell at retail or give away any poison without fixing or causing to be affixed to the bottle, box, package, parcel or receptacle, containing such poison, a label upon which shall be printed in red ink, in plain legible characters, the name of the article, the word "Poison," the name and place of business of the seller, or donor, if the poison be given away, a skull and crossbones, the word "Caution," the maximum dose of the poison and the antidote therefor.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to medicinal compounds containing poisonous drugs in therapeutic doses when the maximum dose of such preparation is marked upon the container.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
