Resolution Requesting Heads of Departments to Grant Leaves of Absence, with Pay, to Members of the G. A. R. to Attend Encampment at Ithaca June 24 to June 27, 1918.

Resolved, That the heads of departments of The City of New York and of the several boroughs thereof be and they hereby are requested to grant a leave of absence with pay to veterans of the Civil War in the employ of the City or its several boroughs, who are members in good standing of the various posts, for the purpose of attending the Fifty-second Annual State Encampment and Union of the Grand Army of the Republic, to be held in the City of Ithaca, from June 24 to June 27, 1918, inclusive, except where such leave of absence would interfere with the proper transaction of public business, on condition that those to whom such leave of absence has been granted shall present satisfactory proof by the official certificate of the Department Commander and Assistant Adjutant-General of the Grand Army of the Republic that they were in attendance at said encampment on the day above set forth.

Resolution for Special Revenue Bonds, \$3,600, to Provide for the Correction of a Clerical Error in the 1918 Budget of the Brooklyn Museum.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of three thousand six hundred dollars (\$3,600), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Trustees of the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences for the purpose of correcting a clerical error in the Budget for 1918.

Resolution Authorizing the Commissioner of Parks, Brooklyn, to Purchase Asphalt Oils and Refined Liquid Tar Without Public Letting.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Parks, Borough of Brooklyn, is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase without public letting 40,000 gallons of asphalt oils or 40,000 gallons of heavy refined liquid tar for road repair work during the year 1918.

Resolution Authorizing the Commissioner of Parks, Brooklyn, to Purchase Broken Stone Without Public Letting.

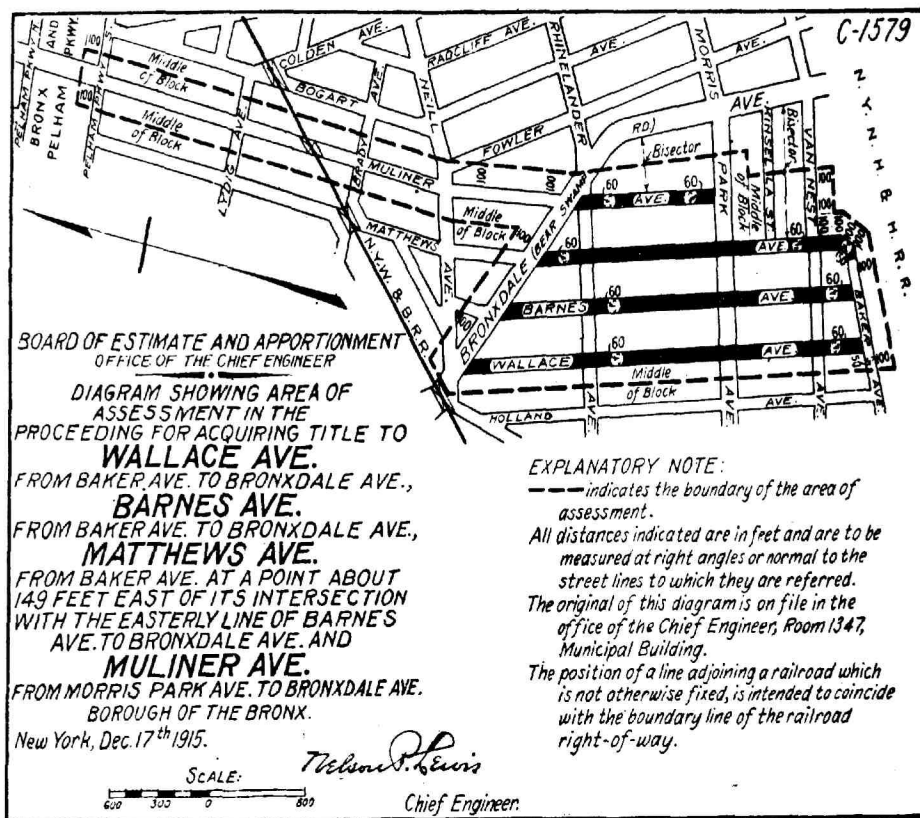

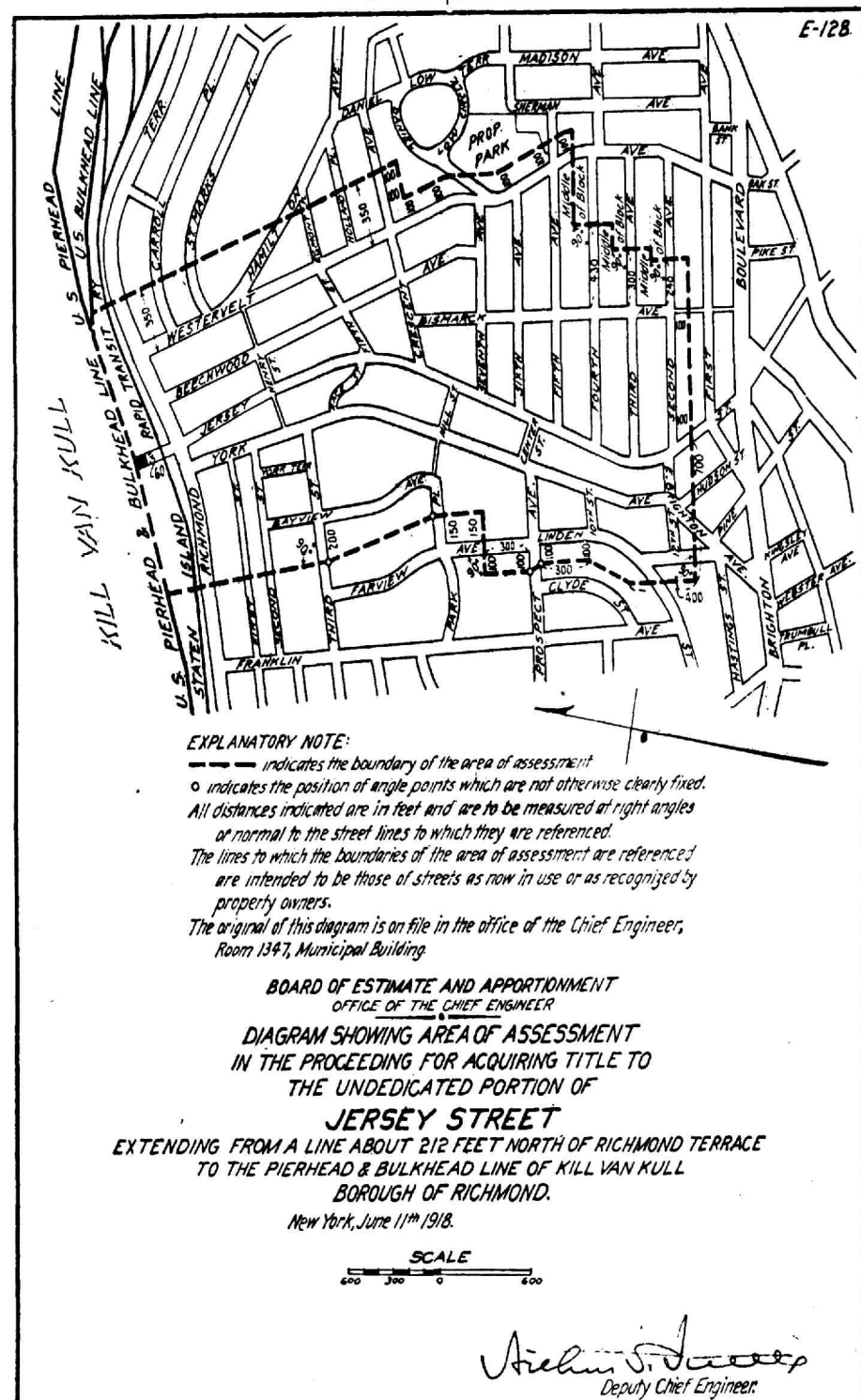
