

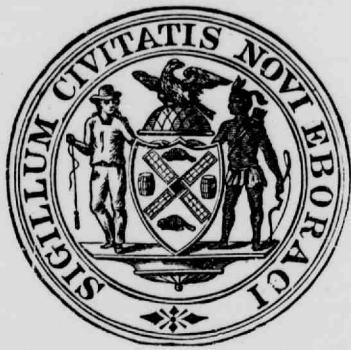

This promotion is due to the efficiency and fidelity shown by Michael Foley in all the duties to which he has been assigned.

He has never asked for a transfer to lighter or pleasanter duties; neither directly nor indirectly has any one for him ever solicited advancement, nor has he for himself, except as he has applied for examination for promotion to Sergeant—he then complying with the rules regarding such examinations. This Board reaffirms its intention to promote officers who are worthy, as fast as opportunities present, and to be governed in such promotions by the record and fitness of the officer alone; and states that any Patrolman or officer of the Police Force who is found qualified for a higher position than he now holds, will be promoted as fast as occasion offers; and it will ignore all outside influences which have no place in the enforcement of law.

BOARD OF REVISION AND CORRECTION OF ASSESSMENTS.

At a meeting of the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments, held at the Comptroller's office, in the New Court-house, on Tuesday, May 22, 1877, at 2:55 o'clock, P. M.

Present—John Kelly, Comptroller; William C. Whitney, Counsel to the Corporation.

Absent—John K. Hackett, Recorder.

The minutes of the meeting held April 21, 1877, were read and approved.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the following assessment lists, received from the Board of Assessors, with communications dated May 9, 1877, viz.:

1. Twenty-first street, flagging, between Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues.
2. One Hundred and Thirtieth street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, between Seventh and Eighth avenues.
3. Thirty-fifth street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, from First avenue to the East river.
4. One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, flagging and reflagging, from Third to Eighth avenue.
5. Thomas avenue (east side), flagging, from New Fordham School-house to southerly line of Kingsbridge road, in Twenty-fourth Ward.
6. Sixty-third street, flagging, between Third and Fifth avenues.
7. One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, sewers, between First avenue and Harlem river, and in Avenue A, between One Hundred and Twenty-third and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets.
8. Eighth avenue, sewers, between Sixty-eighth and Eighty-first streets.
9. Basin on southeast corner of Second street and Avenue A.
10. Basin on southeast corner of Ridge and Houston streets.
11. Basin on southeast corner of Sixty-fifth street and Fourth avenue.
12. Ninety-fifth street, regulating, grading, setting curb and gutter stones, and flagging, from First to Third avenue.

13. Fifty-first street, paving with granite-block pavement, from east side of Twelfth avenue to bulkhead line.

14. Eightieth street, paving, with Belgian pavement, from Third to Fourth avenue.

The foregoing assessment lists being in proper form, and no objections having been filed relating thereto, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, they were severally confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for regulating, grading, setting curb and flagging, and paving, with Telford-Macadamized pavement, Ninth avenue, from north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street to north side of One Hundred and Twenty-sixth street, and objections filed to the same by Esther Moses, Alice Lederer, the Female Academy of the Sacred Heart, Cardinal John McCloskey and others, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated May 9, 1877.

After hearing Mr. Ward, of Messrs. Johnson and Ward, attorneys, in behalf of Cardinal McCloskey and the Academy of the Sacred Heart, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, all of the objections received in said matter were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for paving One Hundred and Nineteenth street with Belgian pavement, between Third and Fourth avenues, received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated May 9, 1877, and objections filed to the same by Messrs. John Sandmann, Frederick W. Boehlk, Charles F. Eisenprize, and Belferkent, together with a communication from the Commissioner of Public Works relative thereto, were also presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

After hearing Mr. Boehlk in support of his objections, on motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list was laid over for an examination relative to the performance of the work by the contractor.

The assessment list for flagging in One Hundred and Twentieth street, from Third to Sixth avenue, received from the Board of Assessors, with communication of May 9, 1877, and objections filed to the same by C. M. Lichtenheim, were presented to the Board by the Comptroller.

After consideration of the said objections, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the same were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The Comptroller presented to the Board the assessment list for paving Eighth avenue with square granite-block pavement, from circle at Fifty-ninth street to One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, and objections filed to the same by Messrs. Robert Chapman, C. G. Havens, Charles A. Coe, and George H. Peck, the same having been received from the Board of Assessors, with communication dated May 16, 1877.

After a consideration of the objections, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, they were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

The assessment list for grading One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, from Willis to St. Ann's avenue, together with objections filed to the same by Nancy Bryants, Christian Rieger, David Watson and others, was presented to the Board by the Comptroller, the same having been received from the Commissioners appointed in said matter.

After hearing Messrs. Rieger and Watson in opposition to the assessment, on motion of the Comptroller, the said assessment list was laid over.

The assessment list for regulating and grading One Hundred and Forty-third street, from Willis avenue to St. Ann's avenue, laid over at the last meeting of the Board, was taken up.

After hearing Mr. Herbert A. Shipman, attorney for Mr. J. D. Ottiwell and others, in opposition to the assessment, on motion of the Counsel to the Corporation, the objections stated by Mr. Shipman were overruled, and the assessment list was confirmed—all the members of the Board present voting in the affirmative.

At 3:35 o'clock, P. M., on motion, the Board adjourned.

street, Sixty-fourth street to Eighth avenue, Eighth ave-
nue to Ninety-seventh street, Ninety-seventh street to Fifth
avenue, Fifth avenue to One Hundred and Eighth street,
One Hundred and Eighth street to Second avenue, Second
avenue to One Hundred and Sixth street, One Hundred and
Sixth street to the East river, between midnight and
6 o'clock A. M.

5th. From the cattle yards by the fourth route to second
avenue, on Second avenue to One Hundred and Twenty-
ninth street, on One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street to
Third avenue, across Harlem Bridge, up Third avenue to
the slaughter-houses in Morrisania, between midnight and

any of the foregoing conditions.

Eleventh avenue to Thirty-ninth street, between mid-
night and 6 A. M.

8th. From the cattle yards on Sixtieth street to Tenth
avenue, on Tenth avenue to Sixty-fourth street, on Sixty-
fourth street to Eighth avenue, on Eighth avenue to Sixty-
fifth street, through Central Park by transverse road to
Fifth avenue, on Fifth avenue to Sixty-seventh street,
through Sixty-seventh street to Fourth avenue, on Fourth
avenue to Sixty-eighth street, through Sixty-eighth street
to First avenue and down First avenue to slaughter-
houses, upon the express condition, however, that the
cattle shall not leave the yards before midnight or after
5 o'clock A. M., that the drivers shall be orderly and quiet,
and that the crosswalks shall be cleaned each morning
before 8 o'clock. Permits under this subdivision shall be
revoked by the Sanitary Superintendent on violation of
any of the foregoing conditions.

9th. The Sanitary Superintendent may, in special cases,
with the approval of the Board, give temporary permits
to drive animals on other routes than those herein desig-
nated.
