Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

Work of the Sanitary Inspectors.

The following is a summary of the operations of the Sanitary Bureau, which is charged with the duty of inspecting and reporting in proper form all nuisances or causes of danger to the public health, with the execution of the orders of the Board, and with the care of contagious diseases.

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 96,674.

The number of causes of complaint returned was 14,867.

The number of complaints received from citizens was 2,975, all of which were referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Sanitary Superintendent during the same period, under instruction and authority of the Board, granted 1,036 permits to discharge cargoes, upon proper vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 2,948 permits to empty privies; 55 permits to land rags (in bulk) under bonds; 83 permits to transport manure; and 10 miscellaneous permits under the Sanitary Code.

During the three months ending June 30, 1884, eight thousand three hundred and forty-six (8,346) permits were granted for burials. During the same period two hundred and thirty (230) applications for transit permits were received and permits granted; seven hundred and sixty-four (704) permits were granted for the burial of still-born children; nine hundred and fifty-nine (959) Coroners' certificates were received and recorded; one thousand three hundred and forty-four (1,344) searches of the records of births, marriages and deaths were made; and seven hundred and four (704) transcripts of the records of deaths, one hundred and one (101) of marriages, and eighty-six (86) of births from said records were issued. There were six thousand one hundred and sixty-four (6,164) persons registered as married during the quarter, and six thousand nine hundred and forty-six (6,946) children were born during the same period.

The certificates of 684 births, 41 still-births, 187 marriages and 647 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 27, 1884. This shows a decrease of 11 still-births, 39 deaths, 101 marriages, while births remained the same, when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 102 births, 6 still-births, 117 deaths, and 47 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 2; diphtheria, 9; puerperal diseases, 8; diarrhocal diseases, 33; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; heart disease, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 3; brain and nervous, 18; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; and premature and preternatural births, 2; while there was an increase of deaths from croup, 1; erysipelas, 2; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 3; malarial fevers, 2; inaniiton, 2; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; cancer, 6; bronchitis, 5; pneumonia, 6; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 11; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; suicide, 7; and drowning, 1; while the deaths from small-pox and typhus fever was the same in two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 187 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 246 under two years, 283 under five years, and 51 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of elaths of children under five years of age was 58 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 43.74 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 148 were in institutions, 339 in tenement-bouses, 141 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 131 on the first, 155 on the second, 110 on the third, 56 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 647 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-residents; 84 were stated to be single, 103 married, 68 widowed, and the condition of 332 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 647; still-births, 41; bodies in transitu, 11. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 78 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 684 births, 188 marriages, 41 still-births; 647 deaths, 11 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 85 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 16 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 48 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending September 27, 1884, was 68.1 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.071, the mean humidity was 80.0, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,153, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 614 deaths and still-births, or 89.24 per cent, of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 20; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 240; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 95; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran (undenominational), 95; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machpelah, L.
