

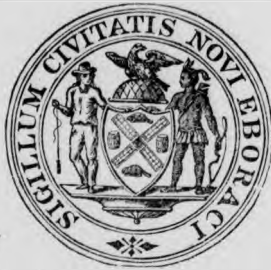

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 18, 1884:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 7,507.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 868.

During the past week 190 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

69 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

14 permits were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds).

1 miscellaneous permit was issued under the Sanitary Code.

99 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

26 premises were visited where contagious diseases were reported, and 23 disinfections and 9 fumigations were performed.

1 case of contagious disease was removed to Riverside Hospital.

The number of vaccinations performed was 866, of which 270 were primary and 536 revaccinations.

10,030 pounds of meat, and 1,025 pounds of fish were seized and condemned.

82 specimens of milk were examined, and 2 arrests were made, and the amount of fines was \$240.

The certificates of 673 births, 59 still-births, 270 marriages and 648 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 18, 1884. This shows an increase of 41 births, 26 marriages and 27 deaths, and a decrease of 10 still-births when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 56 births, 19 still-births, 45 marriages and 124 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; typhoid fever, 3; malarial fevers, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 18; alcoholism, 2; pneumonia, 9; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5; premature and prenaternal deaths, 6; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 1; drowning, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 1; diphtheria, 5; croup, 9; whooping cough, 4; puerperal diseases, 4; inanition, 2; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 5; heart diseases, 7; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 3; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; Bright's disease and nephritis, 11; cyanosis and aelectasis, 4. The number of deaths from cerebro spinal fever was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 171 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 232 under two years, 293 under five years, and 48 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 6 more than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 45.22 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 114 were in institutions, 368 in tenement-houses, 150 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 133 on the first, 162 on the second, 126 on the third, 62 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 7 on the sixth; 646 were stated to be residents of New York City and 2 non-residents; 68 were stated to be single, 150 married, 70 widowed, and the condition of 360 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 648; still-births, 59; bodies in transitu, 15. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 65 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 673 births, 270 marriages, 59 still-births, 648 deaths, 15 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 124 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 68 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 18, 1884, was 56.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.94, the mean humidity was 78, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,468, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.40 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 622 deaths and still-births, or 87.98 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 16; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 255; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 75; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran (undenominational), 114; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 21; Evergreen (undenominational), 41; Woodlawn (undenominational), 22; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 16; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 8; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending October 11, 1884, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 1; Third, 3; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 7; Sixth, 8; Seventh, 23; Eighth, 11; Ninth, 22; Tenth, 20; Eleventh, 33; Twelfth, 86; Thirteenth, 19; Fourteenth, 16; Fifteenth, 5; Sixteenth, 27; Seventeenth, 37; Eighteenth, 29; Nineteenth, 108; Twentieth, 39; Twenty-first, 54; Twenty-second, 39; Twenty-third, 13; Twenty-fourth, 8.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 11, 1884, was 627; this is 36 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1883, and 64 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.83 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,368,362.

SIR—There were 654 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, October 25, 1884, which is an increase of 6, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 113 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actual mortality for the week ending October 18, 1884, was 646, which is 74.4 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.53 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,369,137.

Resolved, That the ordinance approved September 15, 1884, as amended by resolution approved October 7, 1884, entitled "An ordinance requiring owners of express wagons in the City of New York to give bonds for the safe and prompt delivery of all articles entrusted to them for that purpose," be and is hereby further amended so that said section shall read as follows:

Section 1. Every owner of one or more express wagons, residing or doing business as an expressman in the City of New York, whether now licensed, or who may hereafter be licensed as an expressman, shall give a bond in the penal sum of one hundred dollars, with one good and sufficient surety, who shall be a householder capable of justifying in the sum of \$250 in this city, and shall be competent to justify, as such householder, in double the amount of the sum mentioned above, over and above their just debts and liabilities, conditioned for the safe and prompt delivery of all goods, wares or merchandise, and every other article or thing which shall be entrusted to the owner or driver of any and every such express wagon for delivery at any place within the corporate limits of the City of New York.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 24 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880. The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 24 of article IV. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Every driver of a public cart shall be at least twenty-one years of age, a citizen and resident of this State, and shall be licensed by the Mayor, and pay for such license the sum of one dollar, which license shall be renewed on the 1st day of December in each and every year after the 1st day of December, 1885, upon payment of fifty cents annually. He shall also while at work wear a badge with the number of his license engraved thereon, and of a size and style to be prescribed by the Mayor or Mayor's Marshal, and who are also empowered to revoke all such licenses. A failure to comply with any of the provisions of this section shall be deemed a violation of this article."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
