PETITIONS.

By Alderman McQuade—

Petition of the Manhattan Electric Lighting and Power Company for permission to lay, erect, construct and maintain suitable wires, tubes and conductors, etc., in the avenues, roads, streets and public parks and places in the City of New York, as follows:

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Your petitioner, the Manhattan Electric Lighting and Power Company, a corporation duly organized and existing under the Laws of the State of New York, respectfully prays:

That, by resolution of your Honorable Board, a franchise be granted authorizing said company to lay, erect, construct and maintain suitable wires, tubes or other conductors, with the necessary poles, pipes or other fixtures, in, on, over or under the streets, avenues, roads, public parks and places of the City of New York, subject to existing laws and the conditions and requirements to be fixed and prescribed by the Department of Public Works and other municipal authorities.

And your petitioner hereby offers and agrees in consideration thereof to furnish the City of New York—free of cost to said city—for public lighting four lamps, and in addition thereto one lamp for every fifty lamps furnished by said company to private consumers and of the same quality, and to furnish to the City of New York, in addition to such free lights, such lamps as shall be required at prices not exceeding those charged to private consumers, all lights furnished the city to burn all night, without additional charge for the period per night beyond that charged private consumers up to midnight.

The company proposes to adopt the following scale of prices to private consumers, and agrees to be restricted thereto by your Honorable Board:

For the period between dark and midnight—

Each arc-lamp of first grade, not more than sixty-five cents per night.

Each arc-lamp of second grade, not more than fifty cents per night.

Each sixteen-candle power incandescent lamp, not more than fifteen cents per night.

In consideration whereof, said company is to furnish the City of New York—free of cost to said city—for public lighting four lamps, and in addition thereto, one lamp for every fifty lamps furnished by said company to private consumers, and of the same quality.

The prices and charges made to private consumers for each lamp burning for any period or service between dark and midnight shall not exceed sixty-five cents per night for each arc-lamp of the first grade, and fifty cents per night for each arc-lamp of the second grade, and fifteen cents per night for each incandescent lamp of sixteen-candle power strength.

Lights shall be furnished to the City of New York, in addition to the free lights before mentioned, at prices not exceeding those above stated, but all lights furnished to the city shall, without additional charge, burn all night.

All lights furnished to the city shall be erected in such places upon the works operated by said company as the Department of Public Works may prescribe.

All excavations in the streets etc., removals and replacement of pavements and sidewalks, shall be done under and in accordance with the directions of the Department of Public Works, and under such conditions for security against damage to sewers, water-pipes, gas-pipes or other pipes, as may be prescribed by the Mayor, Comptroller and Commissioner of Public Works.

Each and every licensed hackney coach or cab shall be provided with a suitable lamp on each side, and across the middle of the outside of each such lamp shall have a metal band not less than two inches in width, out of which the number of the license shall have been cut after the manner of a stencil plate, the component figures of such number to be not less than one and one-half inches in height, and the style of the whole to be approved by the Mayor or the Mayor's Marshal. And each and every such coach or cab shall also have the number of the license in raised metal figures not less than one and one-half inches in height, or legibly engraved upon a metal plate, affixed to the inside of the coach or cab in such conspicuous place as may be designated by the Mayor or Mayor's Marshal."

Sec. 2. Section 99 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880 is hereby repealed, and the following section, similarly numbered, ordained and substituted therefor, to wit:

"Sec. 99. Each and every licensed hackney coach or cab, while waiting at night for employment at any public stand, shall have its lamps lighted as soon as it becomes dark, and thereafter kept trimmed and burning while at such stand and during employment."

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts thereof inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 14th day of July, 1885, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Health Department, sections 56 and 184 of the Sanitary Code, for the security of life and health, be and the same are hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 56. That the keeping and slaughtering of all cattle, and the preparation and keeping of all meat and fish, birds and fowl, shall be in that manner which is, or is generally reputed or known to be, best adapted to secure and continue their safety and wholesomeness as food. The slaughtering shall not be permitted or conducted at any place in the City of New York south of Thirty-ninth street, nor north of said street without a special written permit from this Department; nor unless the same shall be done in buildings located upon the water-front.

Section 184. The business of slaughtering animals in the City of New York shall not be conducted south of One Hundred and Tenth street, unless the same shall be in buildings located upon the water-front, and so constructed as to receive all stock deliverable therefrom by boats, cars or transports; and to secure the proper care and disposition of all parts of the slaughtered animals upon the premises or the immediate removal thereof by means of boats; and no cattle, sheep, hogs or calves shall be driven in the streets of this city below One Hundred and Tenth street, except through Sixtieth street and Eleventh avenue, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 350 of the Laws of 1883, and subject to the provisions of chapter 394 of the Laws of 1885; nor shall any fat, hides, hoofs, or entrails, or other refuse, parts of slaughtered animals, be transported in said streets; nor shall any buildings be erected or converted into or used as a slaughter-house or factory or place for fat-rendering, or for any offensive business growing out of slaughtering, such as fat-melting, hide-curing, gut-cleaning, bone-boiling, glue-making, etc., until the plans thereof have been duly submitted to the Board of Health and approved in writing by the said Board.

That no live chickens, geese, ducks, or other fowls shall be brought into, or kept, or held, or offered for sale, or killed in any yard, area, cellar, coop, building, premises or part thereof, or on any sidewalk or other place within the built-up portion of the City of New York, except in the public markets of said city, without a special permit in writing from the Health Department and subject to the conditions thereof.
