At a meeting of the Board of Docks held November 17, 1887.

Present—Commissioners Stark, Matthews and Marshall.

The minutes of the meeting held November 10, 1887, were read and approved.

The following communications were received, read and,

On motion, laid on the table:

From Health Department—Requesting removal of blocks of granite and gateway from the southerly line of premises foot of Seventeenth street, East river.

From Old Dominion Steamship Company—Requesting the leasing of the bulkhead between Piers, new 26 and 27, North river, and the one hundred and twenty-five feet next south of Pier, new 26, before the completion of the bulkhead.

From J. Hahn, Jr., attorney for Hencken & Co.—Requesting delay in the matter of fixing the compensation for use of land under water, foot of Ninety-fourth street, East river.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:

From Department of Public Works—Reporting hole in Pier foot of Eighth street, East river.

The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting repairs to coal dock at Randall's Island, East river. Referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report.

From Central Gas-light Company—Giving the names of the parties who obstruct their wharf at Port Morris.

Referred to Dock Master, John Callan.

From Maine Steamship Company—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of resolution adopted November 10, 1887, for the erection of platform at Pier 38, East river.

From Samuel Kilpatrick—Enclosing diagram of property at Twenty-ninth street and Avenue A, East river, which the owner, James Sutherland, desires to sell to the City. Referred to Commissioners Matthews and Marshall.

From Glen Cove Manufacturing Company—Acknowledging receipt of communication respecting the sale of one hundred and twenty-five feet of bulkhead west of Jackson street East river.

From Morris & Cuming Dredging Company—Requesting that the time to complete the work of removing the remains of burned Pier, new 37, North river, near the foot of Charlton street, under Contract No. 253, be extended from October 8, 1887, to November 7, 1887.

The Engineer-in-Chief having reported that the time for the completion of the contract may be properly and justifiably extended to the 7th November, 1887, as he did not know of any damage the City's interest had suffered by the delay in question.

On motion, the time was extended as requested.

From William P. Clyde & Co.—Requesting permission to substitute another form of truss for the one they were granted permission to erect on Pier 15 East river, and enclosing tracing of the same.

The Engineer-in-Chief having recommended that the substitution be authorized and the plan approved,

On motion, his recommendation was adopted.

From A. T. Decker & Co.—Requesting permission to erect a derrick on the bulkhead, twenty-five feet rear of backing-log north of Bethune street, North river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From Patrick Dunican—Requesting permission to place an ordinary derrick for hoisting coal foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river. Referred to the Dock Master to examine and report.

From Cavanagh & Collins—Requesting permit to retain hoisting derrick on the bulkhead north of Pier, new 1, North river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From The Canal and Lake Steamboat Co.—Requesting permit to maintain two derricks and tally-houses on Pier 6, East river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From Old Colony Steamboat Company—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of resolution relating to platform and shed between Piers, old 28 and 29, North river.

From B. Zoeller—Calling attention to the condition of Pier 4, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Charles L. Bucki & Co.—Requesting renewal of permit for hoisting engine on bulkhead between Little West Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, North river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From Consumers' Ice Company—Requesting renewal of permit for ice-bridge and engine-house on the bulkhead between Horatio and Jane streets, North river. Permit granted, to be and remain during the will of the Board.

From Patrick J. Brady, Dock Master—Reporting that repairs are required to the pavement at approach to platform foot of West Twenty-fourth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair where necessary was approved.

From J. B. Erwin, Dock Master—Reporting small holes in deck of Pier at West Fifty-first street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair where necessary was approved.

From George A. Dearborn, Dock Master—Reporting that a roadway has been made to the bulkhead foot of Seventy-sixth street, East river, and the street planked about half way to Avenue A by an association of stevedores and coal dealers. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

From Charles B. Husted, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting favorably on the application of A. T. Decker & Co. for permission to erect derrick on the bulkhead north of Bethune street, North river.

2d. Replying to communication from Department of Street Cleaning, respecting the cleaning of the piers in his district. Referred to Commissioner Marshall.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending November 12, 1887.

3d. Reporting repairs required to Pier 5, North river, Piers at West Fifteenth street and West Nineteenth street, North river, and also reporting that portion of fence on bulkhead, between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river, has been torn down and destroyed. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, as recommended in his reports, was approved.

Beckman, President of the Board of Aldermen, with the request that the ordinances passed February 24 and March 22, 1887, be rescinded.

13th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7029, that he had superintended driving a cluster of piles at ferry premises, Barclay street, North river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6551, that he had superintended the erection of platform scales, etc., at bulkhead north of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, west side of Harlem river.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6751, that he had directed and superintended repairing Pier at Third street, East river.

26th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 6955, that he had directed and superintended repairing bulkhead between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, East river.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7123, that he had made requisition for dredging in slip adjoining south side of Pier, old 34, North river and supervised the work thereat.

28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7127, that he had repaired Pier 37, East river.

29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7137, that he had repaired Pier at Forty-sixth street, North river.

30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7148, that John Gillies took Bracing Pile Driver No. 8 on November 8 and returned same November 9, instant.

31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7157, that he had repaired sheathing on deck of Pier at West Eighteenth street, North river.

32d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7161, that he had refastened two fender piles under dump of Department of Street Cleaning on south side of Pier at Nineteenth street, North river.

33d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7162, that he had refastened two fender piles on north-west corner of Pier at Fifteenth street, North river.

The following resolution was,

On motion, adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for building a new wooden pier in place of Pier, old 46, East river.

The President reported that he had received from Ronan & Co., the sum of \$100 in settlement of claim for damage done to Pier 46, East river, and the same was paid to the Treasurer.

On motion, his action was approved.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Matthews, reported that on October 28, 1887, he had awarded to Brown & Fleming the right to fill in, to the extent of about 30,000 loads of clean earth filling, behind the bulkhead wall, between Piers, new 26 and 27, North river, at the rate of fifteen and one-half cents per single cart load, the same to be completed on or before May 15, 1888.

On motion, his action was approved.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's Order No. 7020, submitting plans, form of contract and specifications for building a new pier foot of One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the form of contract and specifications, as prepared and submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief, for building a new pier, with a crib-bulkhead, at the foot of East One Hundred and Seventeenth street, Harlem river, together with the necessary plans therefor, be and they hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Council to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of proposals printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates for doing the said work inserted in the papers designated by law.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief, on Secretary's Order No. 7139, stating that he had examined the plans and specifications submitted by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, for the erection of a shed on Pier, new 62, North river, and find them proper and sufficient for the purpose and recommending that they be approved, was,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, and the following resolution was adopted.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, lessees of Pier, new 62, at or near the foot of West Thirty-second street, North river, to erect and maintain thereon a shed for the protection of railroad freight received and discharged thereat, the said shed to be constructed subject to the regulations required by section 772 of "the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882," in conformity with the requirements of the building and fire laws of the City of New York and in accordance with the plans and specifications submitted therefor, which are hereby approved, provided that the same shall revert to and become the property of the City of New York at the expiration or sooner termination of a lease for said pier to be made under resolution of the Board, adopted January 28, 1887, and the agreement made under such resolution.

The said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, provided that the said company shall, within ten days from the date hereof, assent in writing to the conditions of this resolution as aforesaid.

The following preambles and resolution were,

On motion adopted:

Whereas, By virtue of the terms and conditions of a public sale held 30th day of March, 1885, there was granted and assigned to James L. Miller, he being the highest bidder therefor, for the term of three years from the 1st day of May, 1885, at a yearly rent or sum of \$300 per annum, payable quarterly in advance, all the wharfage or crange privilege, arising or accruing from the use and occupation of that certain wharf property known and designated as the bulkhead at Forty-third street, East river,

And whereas, In and by the indenture made by said James L. Miller, between the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, acting through its Department of Docks, of the first part, and James L. Miller of the second part, it is expressly agreed and provided between the parties thereto, that in the event of the said yearly rent or sum of money, or any part thereof, remaining unpaid for the space of ten days after the same shall have become due and payable in accordance with the terms and conditions of the lease entered into between the said James L. Miller and the Department of Docks, it should be lawful for the said Department of Docks to serve or cause to be served upon the said James L. Miller a notice in writing, declaring that the said lease, made as aforesaid, had become utterly null and void and thereupon the said Department of Docks should claim to have again, repossess, and enjoy said wharfage rights and premises in all respects and in like manner as though such lease to said James L. Miller had never been made or executed.

And whereas, The said James L. Miller has failed and neglected to pay the said rent or sum of money, as provided for in and by said lease, which was agreed to be paid in accordance with the terms and conditions thereof, and is now in arrears to this Department for a sum of money amounting to \$675, or thereabouts, on account thereof, therefore, it is

Resolved, That said lease to the said James L. Miller as aforesaid be and the same is hereby declared utterly null and void from and after November 17, 1887; and further

Resolved, That notice in writing of such action and determination of this Board on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, to have again, repossess, enter upon and enjoy said wharfage rights and all other franchises, powers, rights and privileges herein granted to or conferred upon the said James L. Miller, and to enter peaceably and quietly into possession of the premises referred to, in accordance with the terms and conditions of the lease as executed by the said James L. Miller, be served on him, and that he be ordered, required and directed to quit and surrender the occupancy of said premises on and after the date of this resolution, November 17, 1887.

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. The return of a building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through the meter.

3d. The return of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of a tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on full, or by water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that, until such notice is received, no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
