

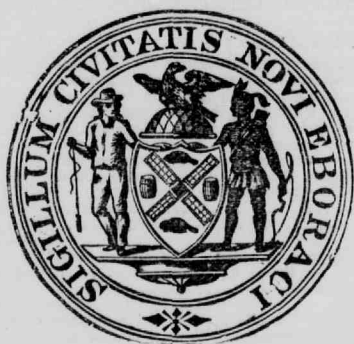

LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

SPECIAL SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, November 23, 1881,
12 o'clock, M.

The Board met in their chamber, No. 16 City Hall, in pursuance of the following call :

F. J. TWOMEY, *Clerk Board of Aldermen, etc.* :

On motion of Alderman Hawes, the Board went into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1882.

And the President called Alderman Hawes to the chair.

After some time spent therein, the Committee arose, and the President being absent, on motion, Alderman Sauer was appointed President pro tem.

Alderman Hawes, Chairman of the Committee of the Whole, reported as follows :

The Committee of the Whole, having had under consideration the Provisional Estimate for conducting the public business of the City and County of New York for the year 1882, have made hereto the following amendments, which I am instructed to report to the Board for adoption, viz. :

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Amend Harlem River Bridges, Repairs, Improvements and Maintenance, \$20,000, so as to read as follows :

For the repairs, improvement and maintenance of bridges now over Harlem river, including the rebuilding and maintenance of the bridges known as Farmer's Bridge, and Kingsbridge, and including the rebuilding and maintenance of the bridges over Cromwell's Creek, at One Hundred and Sixty-first street and One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, over Tibbet's Brook, Mill Brook, and other streams in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, \$50,000.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Reduce the amount appropriated for new apparatus, horses, rents, hose, and all other supplies from \$230,000 to \$220,000 ; increase appropriation for repairs shops pay-roll from \$50,000 to \$58,000, and increase appropriation for Headquarters pay-roll from \$43,110 to \$45,110.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Maintenance Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards—Maintenance and government of public places, streets, roads, and avenues, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, including supplies, salary of Superintendent, and wages of all persons employed on the work, be increased from \$35,000 to \$80,000.

Sewers and Drains—For cleaning and repairing sewers and drains in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, be increased from \$5,000 to \$7,500.

Surveys, maps, and plans, etc., in Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, be increased from \$6,000 to \$12,000.

POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Insert for a new Police Station in Twenty-eighth Precinct, \$40,000.

Salaries of Clerical force, as follows : To increase the amount of \$45,000 to \$47,100.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.

Repaving Streets and Avenues (under chapter 476, Laws of 1875)—To increase the amount of \$342,000 to \$450,000.

Laying Croton Pipes (chapter 381, Laws of 1879)—Increase the amount of \$235,627 to \$300,000.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

To increase the amount of \$3,500,000.

Add for two new school houses in the Nineteenth Ward, \$200,000.

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt the report of the Committee of the Whole.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with the Provisional Estimate for the year 1882, as amended.

Which was decided in the affirmative, by the following vote, viz. :

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW

CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments,
and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton
water rents, in the City of New York.
(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in
Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid
on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls
and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered
to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall
be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by ad-
vertisement for at least ten days, in two of the daily news-
papers, and in the City Record, printed and published in
said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid
to him at his office on or before the first day of December,
in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed
to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following
section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the
said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said
Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect
upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addi-
tion to the amount of such tax, one per centum per annum
from the date of such entry in the said record of titles of
assessments, and to charge, receive, and collect upon such
tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January
thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of
seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the
day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall
have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the
date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and col-
lected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred
and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of
this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a
charge for the collection of interest at the rate of
twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on
real and personal estate within the City of New York,
upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and
street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton
water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu
of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum
per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the
officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears
of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest
upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum
per annum, to be calculated from the same period as inter-
est at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now re-
quired by law to be calculated thereon. This provision
shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents
remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which
the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter
sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided,
however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to
affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assess-
ments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to
authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from
sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sum
collectible for such redemption under the provisions of
existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the
City of New York to give public notice by advertisement

for at least ten days, in the City Record, printed and
published in said city, immediately after the confirmation
of any assessment for a local improvement or street open-
ing in said city, that the same has been confirmed
specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its
confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of
Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and
by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings,
and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assess-
ments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments,

Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of
Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and per-

both of said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief
officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called
"Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of
Markets."
