

METERS Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act r882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of r882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.
