

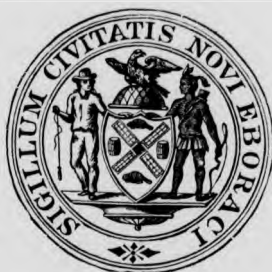

SIR—641 deaths were registered in this office during the week ending at noon of Saturday, September 28, 1889, representing an annual death-rate of 21.06 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 1,582,975.

# BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

The Board of Street Opening and Improvement met at the Mayor's office on Friday, October 4, 1889, at 2 o'clock P. M., pursuant to the following notice:

### Major W. BULLARD, Chief Inspector:

I would respectfully report that my attention has been called upon several occasions to the lack of suitable facilities for drainage for the property adjacent to Melrose avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-second and One Hundred and Forty-ninth streets. This street is at the bottom of a valley, between Third and Railroad avenues. There is a small, inefficient, and defective drain built by the old town of Morrisania; the Department of Public Parks have prepared, and are ready to proceed with, a perfect system of drainage as soon as the street is declared legally open. In the meantime the following houses are flooded during every severe or protracted rainstorm: No. 646 to 650 East One Hundred and Sixty-second street, Nos. 647 to 652 East One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Nos. 646 to 650 East One Hundred and Sixtieth street, Nos. 650, 651 and 653 East One Hundred and Fifty-ninth street, Nos. 634, 636, 638, 640, 642, 645, 651, 653 East One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, Nos. 648, 650, 655 East One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, Nos. 649, 650, East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Nos. 642, 648, 650, 657 East One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street, Nos. 644, 646, 648, 647, 649 East One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, and during very severe storms fully fifty other houses have surface drainage discharged into their cellars or living apartments.

The initial proceedings for opening the street were commenced more than five years ago, but owing to legal complications, were abandoned. A new commission was appointed about a year since and have made some progress.

The opening, grading and sewerage of this street is of such sanitary importance that the Board of Street Opening ought to hasten the proceedings. I, therefore, recommend that this report be referred to the Board of Street Opening, of which Clarence Berry, Esq., is Secretary, address, 200 Broadway, and that they be requested to urge forward with all possible diligence the proceedings in the matter of legally opening Melrose avenue between One Hundred and Forty-ninth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets.

In order that the school-house now being erected at the corner of Ogden avenue and Orchard street, and the school-house about to be erected on One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, near Courtland avenue, may have sewer connections as required by the Board of Health.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening be and they hereby are respectfully requested to commence proceedings to open Ogden avenue, from Orchard to Woolf street, and also to further the proceedings already begun to open East One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street.

In the matter of High Bridge Park, the following communication from the Counsel to the Corporation was presented and read:

### Hon. THEODORE W. MYERS, Comptroller:

SIR—In reply to your letter of September 13, requesting my opinion as to the power of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement to diminish the area of High Bridge Park, I beg to say that I have examined the laws affecting the proceedings, and have reached the conclusion that the Board have the power.

The original act, chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, conferred upon the Department of Parks the right to commence proceedings for the acquisition of the land embraced within High Bridge Park; but by chapter 185 of the Laws of 1885, the Board of Street Opening and Improvement were granted the same power and authority as "laying out \* \* \* altering and closing all streets \* \* \* parks, parkways and public places in said city as said Board now has as to any street or avenue south of One Hundred and Fifty-fifth street and the Harlem river."

By section 955 of the Consolidation Act authority is conferred upon the Board of Street Opening and Improvement, whenever they may deem it for the public interest so to do after laying its proposed action before the Board of Aldermen and giving full notice of the same for ten days in the CITY RECORD, to alter the map or plan of any street, avenue, public squares and places in the City of New York.

I am, therefore, of the opinion that the Board of Street Opening and Improvement have the power to alter, enlarge or diminish the area of High Bridge Park upon complying with the provisions of law above referred to.

### Honorable HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor of the City of New York:

HON. SIR—My client, James Gordon Bennett, is the owner of about forty-five acres of land at Fort Washington. At a recent interview with him in Paris, we discussed the subject of High Bridge Park, and he concluded it was a most uncalled for burden on the adjoining real estate owners, and if such a park was to be, it should be reduced to the smallest dimensions possible. He directed me on my return to New York to carry out his views on the subject.

Since my return to New York I learn that a petition of property owners in opposition to said park has already been presented. I have examined that petition, and, as the representative of Mr. Bennett, and upon his behalf, I concur in the prayer of the petitioners, that you will lend your aid to relieve them from, or to reduce, the threatened burden.

Mr. George S. Lespinasse and others appeared and spoke against extending the area of High Bridge Park below One Hundred and Seventieth street and above One Hundred and Eighty-first street.

After much discussion of the matter, the Mayor offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the matter of the area of High Bridge Park be referred to the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works and the President of the Department of Public Parks to report what lines, in their judgment, should bound the proposed park, and whether it should be diminished or not; and, while awaiting such report, that the Counsel to the Corporation be requested to delay any further proceedings in the matter of the said Park.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

## IN THE MATTER OF THE EXTENSION OF COLLEGE PLACE.

The Comptroller offered the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted on motion of the Comptroller on March 15, 1889, for the extension and widening of College place, from Chambers street to Dey street, be rescinded.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of the City of New York do hereby adopt and approve of the recommendation this day submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works for the proposed widening and extension of College place, from Chambers street to Dey street, as laid down on a certain map, which is hereby adopted, dated October 4, 1889, and signed by Joseph O. B. Webster, Assistant Engineer of the Department of Public Works, and upon the lines marked A on said map.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest for the widening and extension of a certain street or place, known as College place, from Chambers street to Dey street, do hereby respectfully request the Commissioner of Public Works to furnish this Board with the necessary maps for filing.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller, the Commissioner of Public Works, the President of the Department of Public Parks, the President of the Board of Aldermen—5.

In the matter of the widening and extending of Elm street, it was decided to hold a special meeting of the Board on Friday, October 11, at 2 o'clock P. M., for consideration of that matter.

The following communication, with resolutions from the Commissioner of Public Works, relative to the opening of One Hundred and Thirty-second and One Hundred and Sixty-ninth streets, was presented.

### Hon. HUGH J. GRANT, Mayor, and Chairman Board of Street Opening and Improvement:

SIR—In the matter of the inclosed petitions for opening One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues, and One Hundred and Thirty-second street, from the Boulevard to the Hudson river, I respectfully report that the petitions represent the requisite frontage of property to warrant the institution of proceedings for opening the street, and I know of no objections against such openings.

Resolved, That this Board, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby respectfully requests the Counsel to the Corporation to take the necessary proceedings, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York, to acquire title, wherever the same has not been heretofore acquired, for the use of the public, to the lands required for the opening of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, from the Boulevard to Twelfth avenue, in the City of New York, and hereby determines that the entire cost and expense of said proceedings shall be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby.

Those entitled to exemption are: Clergymen, lawyers, physicians, surgeons, surgeon-dentists, professors or teachers in a college, academy or public school, licensed practicing dentists, and those who are engaged in their respective professions and not following any other calling; militiamen, policemen, and firemen; election officers, jury non-residents, and city employees, and



United States employees; officers of vessels making regular trips; licensed pilots, actually following that calling; superintendents, conductors and engineers of a railroad company other than a street railroad company; telegraph operators actually doing duty as such; Grand, Sheriff's, and Civil Court jurors; stationary engineers; and persons physically incapable of performing jury duty by reason of severe sickness, deafness, or other physical disorder.

Those who have not answered as to their liability, or proved permanent exemption, will receive a "jury enrollment notice," requiring them to appear before me this year. Whether liable or not, such notices must be answered in person, if possible, and at this office only, under severe penalties. If exempt, the party must bring proof of exemption; if liable, he must also answer in person, giving full and correct name, residence, etc., etc. No attention paid to letters.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, if unpaid, will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents. All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their service by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, and permanent absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States jurors, are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement and every case will be fully prosecuted.

#### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the City of New York, described in any grant of land or water from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repaving, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of the lot or lots in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of the lot, his heirs and assigns shall be deemed to have released from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except an assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire to be released from such obligation, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

#### PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 459, Laws of 1889, amending section 290 of the City of New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 18, 1889, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rates:

1. The water charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1889, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rates have heretofore been treated.

2. In every building where a water meter or meter is now, or hereafter, used, the charge for water, as determined by meter measurement, shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the completion of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered or levied on the lot or lots against the respective buildings or property, if not collected, or returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1889, will be canceled and returned to the holder of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 359, Laws 1889, as follows:

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to the dimensions, values, exposure and use of the premises for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, as near as may be practicable, and, after, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are respectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be a lien upon the property of the owner. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be stated upon estimates of water, or street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which water can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge or lien shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.

THE SAID COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS IS HEREBY AUTHORIZED TO PRESCRIBE A PENALTY NOT EXCEEDING THE SUM OF FIVE DOLLARS FOR EACH OFFENSE, FOR PERMITTING WATER TO BE WASTED, OR FOR A VIOLATION OF SUCH REASONABLE RULES AS HE MAY, FROM TIME TO TIME, PRESCRIBE FOR THE PREVENTION OF THE WASTE OF WATER; SUCH FINES SHALL BE ADDED TO THE REGULAR WATER RENTS.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the premises; but if an additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

METERS will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERSIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BATHS.—Baths shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each bath tub therein.

BATHING IN PRIVATE HOUSES, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum each in public houses, boarding-houses, and bathing establishments. Combination stationary wash-tubs, having a movable division in the center and capable of use for bathing, shall be charged the same as bathing tubs.

BUILDING PURPOSES.—For each one thousand bricks laid, or for stone-work—to be measured as brick—ten cents per thousand. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—For each and every cow, one dollar per annum.

DINING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES AND WATER.—For each horse and horse, one dollar per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSES, LIVERY.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSE TROUGHS.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar per annum to prevent waste.

HOTELS AND BOARDING HOUSES shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each sleeping room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LIQUOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for each tap or wash-bow.

PHOTOGRAPH SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STREAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each; and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of ten dollars per annum.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each. WATER CLOSETS.—For each hopper of any form, when the water is supplied direct from the Croton supply through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-clocks, stop-clocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the hopper, each per year, one dollar.

For any pan or cistern, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper, or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern, when such cisterns are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depressed, or raised, or such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cisterns answering this description can be seen at this Department.

#### METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act 1882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings.

It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." \* \* \*

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, and their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order, and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overflowing the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalks or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Foundries, ice-jets, hot houses, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, horse-fronts, yards, cart-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have been corrected without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless such requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
