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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 26, 1889.

Present—Commissioners Post, Matthews and Cram.

The minutes of the meetings held September 16, 17, 19 and 20, 1889, were read and approved.

The communication from P. J. Brady, Dock Master, recommending that permission be granted to the Hudson River Steamboat Line to berth the steamer "C. Vibbard" on the south side of Pier new 59, near the foot of Twenty-ninth street, North river, was,

On motion, laid on the table.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit: From Hon. J. S. Coleman, Commissioner of Street Cleaning—In reference to and requesting that in future the Dock Department shall undertake the erection of all dumping-boards required by the Department of Street Cleaning, in the prosecution of its work. Referred to the President to reply thereto.

From the Department of Public Works—Requesting permission to store old paving-blocks at the foot of Perry street, North river. The action of the President in suggesting that the same be placed temporarily on the site of the Old West Washington Market, between Vesey and Dey streets, North river, was approved.

From Hon. Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller—Approving sureties of John W. Flaherty, on Contract No. 309, and Barth S. Cronin, on Contract No. 312.

From the Mayor's Office—Inclosing communication received from Thomas S. Clarkson, respecting bulkhead, between Morton and Leroy streets, North river. The action of the President in replying thereto was approved.

From Counsel to the Corporation—Respecting claim against Thomas O'Brien, for failure to repair Pier 55, East river. Referred to the Treasurer.

From the Board of Electrical Control—Transmitting report of Special Committee on Explosions of Illuminating Gas.

From Ransom Parker, Jr.—Requesting permission to drive 5 or 8 piles in front of the bulkhead foot of West Eleventh street, about 100 feet west of West street. The action of the President in issuing a permit, the said piles to be driven under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and remain during the pleasure of the Board, was approved.

From Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah—Agreeing to the terms and conditions of the permit regarding the 72 feet of bulkhead southerly of Pier, new 35, North river.

From New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company:

1st. Requesting permission to dredge slip of ferry-rack at Willis avenue, Harlem river.

2d. Requesting permission to repair ferry-rack and drive about 500 piles for rack and foundation for bridge at Willis avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-third street, Harlem river, within existing lines.

3d. Requesting permission to drive about 20 fender-piles at Pier 50, East river, within the existing lines. The action of the President in issuing permits therefor, all of the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and the piles to remain during the pleasure of the Board, was approved.

From Secretary House of Refuge—Requesting repairs to Pier at Randall's Island. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine and report.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company—In reference to the car-float upset in slip between Piers, old 41 and 42, North river.

From Daniel F. Tiemann and others—Requesting the Department to cause more docks to be constructed between One Hundred and Twenty-eighth and One Hundred and Thirty-fourth streets, North river.

On motion of Commissioner Cram the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to examine and report as to what wharfage accommodations can be made in that vicinity.

From Gas Engine and Power Company—Requesting permission to erect a platform upon piles upon land under water lying west of the westerly boundary of the proposed Commerce avenue, and the northerly side of the proposed platform to be on the south side of the proposed Powell place. The platform to be about 170 feet east and west and about 40 feet in width, as shown on tracing submitted. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

From Michael Kane—Requesting permission to remove a small portion of the deck of the easterly side of Pier foot of Thirty-seventh street, East river, for the purpose of putting in place some filling proposed to be done and inclosing the consent of the lessees of the Pier. The action of the President in issuing a permit, provided the portion of the deck removed is replaced to the satisfaction of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, was approved.

From D. W. Bogert, Dock Master—Reporting hole in the bulkhead between Piers 5 and 6, North river. The Baltimore Transportation Company notified to repair under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From Charles H. Pendergast, Dock Master:

1st. Reporting repairs required at the terminus of Water street, opposite Coe's Stores. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report was approved.

2d. Reporting dangerous hole in the bulkhead about two hundred and fifty feet south of Pier 60, East river. The Knickerbocker Ice Company directed to repair, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

From William J. Reilly, Dock Master—Complaining of a dangerous nuisance under Pier 29, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to remove was approved.

From William T. Coggeshall, Dock Master—Reporting that the backing-log at Ninety-sixth street, North river, is in a bad condition. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and repair, if necessary, was approved.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Reporting assignment of employees to special duty.

2d. Reporting the amount of work done during the week ending 21st September, 1889.

3d. Reporting that fender-piles require refastening at Pier foot of West Twentieth street, West Thirty-fifth street, and Piers "E" and "F," foot of West Sixty-fourth and Sixty-fifth streets, and new Pier near the foot of Seventieth street, North river. The action of the President in notifying the lessees of said piers to repair, as directed by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department and under his direction and supervision, was approved.

4th. Reporting that he had directed that Laborers Acting Watchmen Nicholas Habing and John Doonan be not assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen for ten days, and John Cuff and James Fox be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchmen, and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, his action was approved.

5th. Reporting further repairs required at Pier, old 42, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make further repairs to said pier, as recommended in his report.

6th. Reporting damage to fender-pile at crib-bulkhead at East Seventeenth Street Yard by tug "Edith Beard," and recommending that John Gillies, Contractor, be directed to repair at once.

On motion, his recommendation was adopted.

7th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9179, in relation to the communication from J. Bruce Ismay, agent White Star Line, requesting the Department to increase the allowance for repairing Pier, new 45, North river. The Secretary directed to send Mr. Ismay copy of the Engineer-in-Chief's report and advise that the Board have no authority to change the contract heretofore made.

8th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9423, respecting the application of the President and Faculty of Manhattan College, for permission to build a bath-house between One Hundred and Thirty-fifth and One Hundred and Thirty-seventh streets, North river, for the use of the college.

On motion of Commissioner Cram, permit was granted to erect and construct a floating shed or house foot of One Hundred and Thirty-sixth street, North river, subject to the said college obtaining the consent of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company for use of so much land under water, belonging to said company, as may be covered by an approach to said structure, and also on condition that arrangements are made with the Department for the use of the land under water thereat to be covered by said structure.

9th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9488, that employees of the Mutual Benefit Ice Company have filled in with stone and earth the holes in the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river, caused by the recent storm.

10th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9495, repairs required to bulkhead foot of Twenty-ninth street, East river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair as recommended in his report, was approved.

11th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9487, that several holes in the bulkhead between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river, caused by the recent storm, have been filled in by unknown parties.

12th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9467, that he had repaired the northerly half of Pier, old 34, North river, at a cost of \$106.64. The Treasurer authorized to collect said amount from Trempier & Morris, lessees.

13th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 6005 and 9319, in relation to building a pier foot of Fifty-sixth street, North river.

14th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 7641, that he had built a box drain on a pile foundation, foot of East One Hundred and Fifteenth street.

15th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 8009, in reference to repairing Pier 55 East river.

16th. Report on Secretary's Orders Nos. 8721, 8901, 9140, 9160 and 9162, that the orders to superintend work specified therein has been suspended by Secretary's orders Nos. 9508, 9509, 9510, 9511 and 9517, respectively.

17th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9256, that he had superintended repairing Pier foot of Eighth street, East river.

18th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9273, that he had superintended erecting temporary platform and scales on the northerly half of Pier 56, East river.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9274, that he had superintended repairing Pier, old 41, North river.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9290, respecting repairs ordered to the bulkhead east of Pier, old 36, East river.

21st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9405, that he had repaired sheathing on deck of Pier 48, East river.

22d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9413, that he had superintended placing a window in the north side of ferry-house foot of West Fourteenth street.

23d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9416, that he had directed and superintended repairing sheathing on Pier and bulkhead foot Seventy-ninth street, East river.

24th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9435, that he had superintended repairing sheathing on Pier, new 60, North river.

25th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9436, that the order to superintend repairing bulkhead, between Piers 48 and 49, East river, had been superseded by Secretary's Order No. 9506.

26th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9441, that he had superintended driving piles on north side of Pier, between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, North river.

27th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9456, that he had laid a foot-walk on inner end of Pier, new 57, North river.

28th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9459, respecting the condition of approach to Pier, old 6, East river.

29th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9463, that he had superintended removal of bath from Pier at Twenty-eighth street, East river.

30th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9468, that he had superintended repairing pavement at entrance to Pier, old 26, North river.

31st. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9479, that he had superintended repairing pavement in front of Pier, old 12, North river.

32d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9481, that he had repaired approach to Pier at West Seventy-third street.

33d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9482, that he had superintended repairing bulkhead, between One Hundred and Thirtieth and One Hundred and Thirty-first streets, North river.

34th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9498, that the hole in bulkhead adjoining south side Pier 8, North river, has been repaired.

35th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9513, that he had superintended the raising and removing of Deck Scow "Pat" from the river bottom at bulkhead between Seventeenth and Eighteenth streets, East river.

36th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9505, that he had repaired platform for access to public bath on bulkhead, between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and One Hundred and Thirtieth streets, North river.

37th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9461, that he had superintended removal of stone sunk in slip at Forty-eighth street, East river.

38th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9489, repairs required to Pier at One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, North river. The action of the President in directing the Engineer-in-Chief to repair, as recommended in his report, was approved.

The application of the New England Terminal Company for permission to build a platform along the face of the bulkhead extending from Pier, old 49, East river, southerly to Pier 48, a distance of about one hundred and thirty feet, the said platform to be 12 feet in width and about two feet in height to be used for backing trucks against to receive and deliver freight to vessels lying in the slip, accompanied with the consent of the owners of the property, was,

On motion of Commissioner Cram, ordered to be placed on file, and permission was granted by the affirmative votes of Commissioners Matthews and Cram, the President voting in the negative; the said work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

Van Tassel and Kearney, auctioneers on behalf of the Board and in accordance with the resolution adopted September 5, 1889, offered for sale at public auction, the right to collect and retain all wharfage which may accrue for the use and occupation by vessels of more than five tons burden, at the following named wharf property:

ON THE EAST RIVER.

Pier 48, foot of Clinton street, reserving and excepting therefrom a berth one hundred and twenty-five feet long at the outer end of the westerly or lower side of the Pier, and one half of the surface of the Pier adjacent and contiguous thereto, together with the outer end of said Pier, for a term of five years, commencing October 1, 1889.

There being no bids the same was withdrawn, and the Secretary directed to notify the Dock Master to collect wharfage thereat, and the communications from Jarvis & Co. and E. F. Driggs & Co. for lease of said pier were taken from the table and ordered on file.

Commissioner Cram reported that he had received from the Treasurer, the following estimates for furnishing the Department with cement, coal, and wrought spikes.

At an executive meeting of the Board of Docks, held September 27, 1889.

Present—Commissioners Post, Matthews and Cram.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, action being taken where necessary, as stated, to wit:
From T. and A. Walsh—Requesting permission to occupy, for a few weeks, a portion of the slip foot of Ninety-sixth street, East river, as a timber basin. Permit granted, to continue during the will of the Board, at the rate of \$1.00 per week, payable when due, to the Dock Master of the District, commencing Monday, September 30, 1889.

From Edward Mack—Requesting use of dumping-board on the north side of Pier at Thirty-seventh street, North river. Application denied.

From Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, stating that they are not the owners of the floats upset between Piers, old 41 and 42, North river.

From New York Central Lighterage Company—Requesting permission to erect office on bulkhead between Piers, new 40 and 41, North river. Application denied.

From William Baillie, laborer—Tendering resignation. Resignation accepted, to take effect September 25th instant.

From John W. Duncan—Requesting permission to use part of the northwest side of the dock foot of Lincoln avenue, Harlem river. Referred to the Dock Master to examine and report.

From Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Respecting the proposed temporary platforms between Piers 16 and 17, Piers 51 and 52, and between Ninety first and Ninety-second streets, East river.

On motion the permits issued for said platforms were revoked.

2d. Reporting that he had directed that Laborer Acting Watchman Michael Magee be not again assigned to duty as Acting Watchman and recommending that his action be approved.

On motion, his action was approved.

3d. Report on Secretary's Order No. 9247, in relation to the communication from the Health Department respecting premises at Sixty-second and Seventy-ninth streets, East river. The President authorized to request the Department of Public Works to extend the sewer at the foot of East Sixty-second street, to within ten feet of the outer end of the small Pier at the foot of said street by means of a wooden box.

The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair the sewer-box at the foot of East Seventy-ninth street, as recommended in his report.

4th. Partial report on Secretary's Order No. 9247, respecting premises at East Eleventh street, East river. The Secretary directed to notify the Greenpoint Ferry Company, and the National Ice Company, to dredge under bulkhead platform, from East Tenth to East Eleventh street, East river, and in front of the same for a width of fifty feet, and George Hagemeyer to dredge under inner end of East Eleventh street Pier, and in the half-slip adjoining south side of said pier to a depth of fifteen feet at mean low water, or until sufficient is removed for sanitary requirements, under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

The President authorized to request the Department of Public Works to extend sewer to outer end of Pier at East Eleventh street, and have privy thereat connected with drain in East Tenth street, if practicable.

5th. Partial report on Secretary's Order No. 9247, in relation to premises at the north end of Third Avenue Bridge, Harlem river, and recommending that the owners be communicated with and requested to remove the filth, etc., from the small slip on the easterly side of the Third Avenue Bridge abutment, or in some other way abate the nuisance.

On motion, his recommendation was adopted.

6th. Partial report on Secretary's Order No. 9247, respecting the premises at the south end of Third Avenue Bridge, Harlem river, and recommending that the City's portion and the area asated to belong to the United States be dredged and cleaned by contract by the Department of Docks, and the private owners be directed to dredge and cleanse their portion in conjunction with the city.

On motion, his recommendations were adopted and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to prepare specifications and form of contract for dredging thereat. Commissioner Cram voting in the negative on so much of said recommendation as relates to dredging the area belonging to the United States.

7th. Reporting non-commencement of work at various places on the North, East and Harlem rivers. The Secretary directed to notify the owners, occupants or lessees of the platform at Pier, old 1; between Piers, old 16 and 17; between Piers, old 18 and 20; from Pier, old 25 to old 28; in slip between Piers, old 41 and 42; between Piers, old 23 and 24; at foot West Forty-second street; half slip north of West Forty-second street, and bulkhead between West Forty-second and Forty-third streets, and half slip west of Forty-third street, North river, to dredge thereat as heretofore ordered, and under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for dredging foot of Thirtieth street, East river, at East One Hundred and Fifteenth street, and from One Hundred and Twenty-second to One Hundred and Twenty-third street, Harlem river, in accordance with his report, and the communications from the Engineer-in-Chief in relation thereto taken from the table and ordered to be placed on file.

The pay-rolls for the month of September, 1889, amounting to \$9,797.24, were approved and audited, and the President authorized to transmit the same, with requisitions for the amounts, to the Finance Department for payment.

The following Dock Builders were discharged:

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereon to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be further paved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 351 of the New York City Consolidated Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following charges are made in charging and collecting water rents.

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be cancelled or record on the books of the Department.

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMAS F. GILROY, COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 449, LAWS 1889, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 AND 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws of 1887, as follows:

The Commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now in use, and shall be paid by the owners of the buildings to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordinary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other purposes, number of families or occupants, or consumption of water, and in accordance with the modality, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be determined as to the regular rents, and shall be collected as a charge on the regular rents, and shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, may be collected on the premises of the owners of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water, and, in such cases, including the extra charges aforesaid, shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge whatever shall be made against any building in which a water-meter may have been or shall be placed as provided in this act. In all such cases the charge for water shall be determined only by the quantity of water actually used as shown by said meters.

The said Commissioner of Public Works is hereby authorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such reasonable rules as he may, from time to time, make for the proper use of the water-pipes; such fines shall be added to the regular water rents.

The regular annual rents to be collected by the Department of Public Works shall be as follows, to wit:

The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.

The appurtenances of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and for each additional family, one dollar per year shall be charged.

Meters will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.

The extra and miscellaneous rates shall be as follows, to wit:

BAKERIES.—For the average daily use of flour, for each barrel, three dollars per annum.

BARBER SHOPS shall be charged from five to twenty dollars per annum each in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works; an additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be added for each bath-tub therein.

BATHING TUBS in private houses, beyond one, shall be charged at three dollars per annum each, and five dollars per annum for each one thousand bricks laid, and for stone-work to be measured as brick—ten cents per yard. For plastering, forty cents per hundred yards.

COWS.—Each cow, every cow, one dollar per annum.

DING SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

FISH STANDS (retail) shall be charged five dollars per annum.

For all stables not metered, the rates shall be as follows: HORSES, PRIVATE.—For two horses there shall be charged six dollars per annum; and for each additional horse, two dollars.

HORSES, LIVE.—For each horse up to and not exceeding thirty in number, one dollar and fifty cents each per annum; and for each additional horse, one dollar.

HORSES, OMNIBUS AND CART.—For each horse, one dollar per annum.

HORSES, LIVE.—For each trough, and for each half barrel or tub on sidewalk or street, twenty dollars per annum; each trough is to be fitted with a proper ball-cock to prevent waste.

HOTELS.—Hotels shall, in addition to the regular rate for private families, be charged for each lodging room, at the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LAUNDRIES shall be charged from eight to twenty dollars per annum, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

LICOR AND LAGER BEER SALOONS shall be charged an annual rate of ten dollars each. An additional charge of five dollars per annum shall be made for five gallons of water or wash-bowl.

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.

PREMISES OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commissioner of Public Works.

SODA, MINERAL WATER AND ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.

STABLES, when not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows: For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of five dollars per annum; for each exceeding fifteen, the sum of five dollars per annum.

WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.—To each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sewer shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises.

WATER-CLOSET RATES.—For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves or hoppers, and is provided by closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.

For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, plunger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, supplied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe of the building, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, which are so constructed that no water can be drawn or depressed from the cistern, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be carried like a safe waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars.

Cistern answering this description can be seen at this Department.

METERS.

Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act of 1882, no water meter or pattern shall be hereafter placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, ferry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1882, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, now provided by law."

All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter.

Water measured by meter, ten cents per one hundred cubic feet.

The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water.

Steamers taking water one-half cent per ton (Custom House measurement).

Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works.

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.

All persons using water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all waste of water.

Use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted.

No horse-troughs or horse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose.

All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning the stop-cock in the street, or by becoming dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals must be left running under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, horse-fronts, yards, courts, gardens, and other stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of the Department may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water.

Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed.

The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed, will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water meters is to enable this Department to detect and detect the use of an unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to householders that in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
