HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ET

No where or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons. All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-uppes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from trust, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all veste of matter.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot oe permitted.

No horse-troughs or norse-watering fixtures will be permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a ticense or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or waste by overrunning he sidewalk or street, or to become dangeroms in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.

No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste winter, the supply with be not becomes dangerons in winter, the supply with send becomes dangerons in winter, the supply with send becomes dangerons in winter, the supply with send becomes dangerons in the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and trinnis must not be left running, under the penalty of five dollars for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.

Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-salons, confectior eries or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the fauctes to be turned on in full force in water-closests, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premiser. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing jayment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and he law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore; here to call householders that in all further applications for reduction of waste of water optimizing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occurred who was the control of the water of the waster of the worsers of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their rormises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
